

SCHOOL TERM STARTS MONDAY

School bells will call Plymouth students back to their classes on Monday morning, Sept. 11th, ending a three months vacation. Sup. E. L. Bailey states that the buildings and schedules are all in readiness and pupils will report for registration and assignment of classes.

Regular recitation periods will be held on Tuesday. The time of starting school will be 8:45 and the evening dismissal will be at 3:45, in order that all classes may receive the required quota of time. Nearly all choices of classes were made last May before the summer vacation, therefore there will be no need of loss of time in beginning the year's studies.

Each school is to be given the grade children on the first day of school. It is urged that no requests for these transfers be made before that day. High school texts may be acquired on Friday, Sept. 8, from 8:45 to 10:30 a.m. to 4:30, and on Saturdays and Sundays from 8:45 to 1:30 and 3:30. Arrangements will be made to secure lockers at the above mentioned hours.

SACRED MUSIC TO BE GIVEN AT LOCAL CHURCH

Mr. and Mrs. Wilbur Fish, "The Joy-Bell Ringers" from Columbus, Ohio, will present "The Life of Christ" a service of sacred music at the Presbyterian Church of Plymouth, Ohio, at 7:30 p. m. 9 o'clock, Tuesday evening, Sept. 12th.

Mr. and Mrs. Fish have played before clubs and churches in thirty states and have been called by the church to fill three or four recital engagements.

One of the instruments is a large set of musical glasses, each glass of which has been selected from between 6000 and 8000 others for the tone which it gives. A few of these glasses are to be used in the correct tone. There are thirty-four glasses, seven of which are from Czechoslovakia and the remainder from Belgium. This is believed to be the only set of glasses equipped with horizontal resonators or amplifiers which make the music four or five times as loud.

These sets of instruments will be used in this unique presentation. In addition to the musical glasses they will use a set of Piccolo-Corrells, Mrs. Fish, Vibra-Harp, and Piano Accord. These instruments will be used singly and in various combinations.

STATISTICS GIVEN LONG BEACH

A clipping attached to the letter states some recent facts about Long Beach where Mrs. Rogers has made her home for several years:

Within the city limits of Long Beach are 30 square miles of land, 20,000 acres, divided into 80,000 parcels. Of these parcels, 42,708 are improved, leaving 37,292 vacant. The number of new buildings the past year increased 2827.

These figures from the office of City Assessor William A. Vondecare are being used by City Accountant Leigh A. Hume in making up his part of the City Manager's annual report.

The total number of buildings in the city is 72,708. In the tabulation, dwellings and private garages total 62,705.

There are 3500 apartment houses, flats and courts. Other buildings:

Factories, warehouses and hangars, 3177; office buildings, stores, and public garages, 2221; oil storage, 185; churches and hospitals, 100; hotels, clubs and lodges, 65; theaters, 18; and mortuaries, 14.

In addition, the city owns 370 buildings and the school district 388.

Within the Long Beach city limits are 735 oil wells, of which 639 are producing.
