ORDERS CUTS IN CORN ACREAGE

AAA PUTS COUNTY ALLOT NT AT 25,928 FOR 1940, HIKES PAYMENTS.

Richland county farmers must reduce their 1940 corn acress by 3,023 acres to comply with new federal AAA requirements, G. I. Taylor, county AAA chairman, announced last week. The county's corn acreage allotment was set at 25,925 as compared with 29,951 acres in 1939, Making up for a part of the acreage reduction, however, will be a one-cent increase in the government conservation payment will be 10 cents a bushel this year.

government conservation pay, ment will be 10 cents a bushel this year.

Taylor cited a huge increase in Ohio's corn production last fall as the reason for the cut in the acreage allotment. Although less acreage was planted last year than in 1938, 14,258,000 most bushels of corn was harvested.

"A carryover of 561 million bushels of corn in the nation in 1940 is the best way to tell county farmers corn acreage this year will have to come down in order to level of production and protect corn prices," Taylor said.

"Fewer acres plus higher yields as demonstrated in 1939 and the 10-cent conservation payment.

10-cent conservation paymen will more than protect farmen income from corn this year," h

income from corn this year," ne added.

The cut in corn acreage is in contrast to the eight per cent increase in the county's wheat allotment for this year. Wheat production fell off in 1939 and the county's 1940 and boosted to 27,784 acres.


