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Where Does It Go?

The following is taken from The Cleveland Plain Dealer and will be of interest to all taxpayers.

"GETS BACK THIRD OF TAX" — Richland county has received \$1,136,611. It is returned.

"County Auditor John A. Zangerle yesterday reported that of the \$9,859,922 in sales tax paid by Cuyahoga County in 1939 the county got back only \$3,136,611. The remainder went into the state's general fund."

Zangerle said a change in the rate of distribution of the sales tax between the county and the state at the beginning of the year resulted in the county receiving \$2,600,000 less than it would have received under the former distribution."

With the enactment of the sales tax law Plymouth did not get a cent from Huron county for the year 1938 and 1939 the Huron county board gave the village a few dollars, in comparison with other towns in the county.

Richland county budget commission is a little better. We received approximately \$600 per year.

For 1940 after squabbling with the budget commissions we have managed to secure \$2600 in sales tax money. This is a \$1600 increase. Truly we can be thankful for this much.

Back in the old days prior to the sales tax law our village treasury carried a balance from \$7,000 to \$10,000 or more. In the past three or four years, its treasury has been empty except for operating expenses. Records will show the amount of money received before and after the sales tax enactment.

Streets Must Be Free of Snow-Ice

Several complaints have been registered with the street department in regards to sidewalks not being swept or cleaned after snow falls.

At council meeting Tuesday night Mayor Wm. Johns stated that it was very plain in the village ordinance that all sidewalks and streets must be cleaned after a snow fall before 9 a. m.

The ordinance was authorized to be published by the village council and notice is hereby given of the ordinance. The ordinance is as follows:

Section 132. Cleaning sidewalks, alleys and gutters. Removals of snow and ice. The owner or occupants of a building or lands shall cause the sidewalks, gutters and alleys, upon which such lots or lands abut to be kept clean at all times. The owner or occupants shall sweep a snow fall before 9 a. m. and not less than one dollar (\$1.00) nor more than twenty dollars (\$20.00).

The foregoing is section 132 of the revised Village Ordinance. I hope that it will not be necessary to enforce this upon any citizen of our Village. "A word to the wise is sufficient."

Village Council Has Busy Session;
Protection For Firemen Is AskedMANY MATTERS COME UP
FOR DISCUSSION AT MID-
MONTH SESSION OF COUN-
CILMEN.

The lights burned late for the village fathers at the Tuesday evening session of Village Council. Quite a number of matters came up for discussion other than routine business, which required much time.

With Mayor Johns presiding, councilmen approved the ordinance for employing W. S. Kimball, local attorney, as village solicitor. It also approved the purchase of a 1939 edition of the General Code of Ohio.

Fire Chief "Bud" Stewart asked the council to consider some plan of protection for members of the volunteer fire department. He pointed out that although the village was paying into the state compensation fund, no provision is available for paying doctor or hospital bills in case of injury to a member. The matter is to get further discussion.

A representative of the Ohio Power Co. was present and discussed at length a proposition of a lower rate for the village if the village would sign up for a ten year contract with the power company for the supply of electrical energy. The present contract expires this October. The representative stated that if the town would agree to buy its power from The Ohio Power Co. for the next ten years, a reduction of approximately \$100 per month would be made in the village power bill. No action was taken at the meeting.

A few months ago the village council passed an amendment to the ordinance setting the salaries of village officials. It was the amendment stipulating the salary of village electrician that was repealed, and threw the salary question onto the board of public affairs. It was revealed that this was an error on the part of the former council, and that it would be necessary to amend the changes in the ordinance concerning salaries.

Ed. Phillips and Clyde Crawford were present at the meeting.

It was revealed that the present year will see an increase in the general funds, due to the fact that the sales tax allotment for Plymouth has been increased \$100. This increase is due to the oversight made by Huron County for three years in which Huron county budget commission failed to contribute any part of the tax money to Plymouth. Last year's sales tax receipts for the village totaled around \$1,000. This year the total is estimated at \$2,000.

The night club license issued to Ward's Night Club also increased the village funds to the extent of \$1,000. With the additional money the village treasury will not be in such bad shape as compared to previous years.

ORDERS CUTS IN
CORN ACREAGEAAA PUTS COUNTY ALLOT-
MENT AT 26,328 FOR 1940.
HIKES PAYMENTS.

Richland county farmers must reduce their 1940 corn acreage by 4,023 acres to comply with new federal AAA requirements, G. I. Taylor, county AAA chairman, announced last week.

The county's corn acreage allotment was set at 26,328 as compared with 29,951 acres in 1939. Making up for a part of the acreage reduction, however, will be a one-cent increase in the government conservation payment will be 10 cents a bushel this year.

Taylor cited a huge increase in Ohio's corn production last fall as the reason for the cut in the acreage allotment. Although less acreage was planted last year than in 1938, 14,254,000 more bushels of corn was harvested. "A carryover of 561 million bushels of corn in the nation in 1940 is the best way to tell county farmers corn acreage this year will have to come down in order to level off production and protect corn prices," Taylor said.

"Fewer acres plus higher yields as demonstrated in 1939 and the 10-cent conservation payment will more than protect farmers' income from corn this year," he added.

The cut in corn acreage is in contrast to the eight per cent increase in the county's wheat allotment for this year. Wheat production fell off in 1939 and the county's 1940 allotment was boosted to 27,764 acres.

Air Training is Extended to
Young Men in This VicinityHARRINGTON AIR SERVICE
TO CONDUCT GROUND AND
FLIGHT SCHOOL COURSES
IN THE TRAINING OF 20,000
CIVIL PILOTS.

The Mansfield Chapter of the National Aeronautic Association advised recently that word has been received from Washington that all young men and women between the ages of 18 and 25 in this locality will have the opportunity to take part in the Civilian Pilot Training Program and to possibly become one of the 20,000 civilian pilots to be trained this year at the expense of the government.

Mansfield has been chosen as the training center for one-third of the non-college students that are to be trained in Ohio with Cleveland and Toledo training the other two-thirds.

It was announced recently by the Mansfield N. A. A. that the young men and women of Mansfield, Shelby, Plymouth, Galion, Crestline and Ashland would all have an equal opportunity to compete for flight training scholarships.

Ground school classes are to be immediately organized which will consist of 72 class hours in the following subjects: History of Aviation, Civil Air Regulations, Air Navigation, Meteorology, Parachutes, Air Craft and Theory of Flight, Engines, Instruments and Radio. Textbooks used will be the same as are now

in use in the Civilian Pilot Training Program in the various colleges throughout the country. The course will be given over a period of 12 weeks within the class rooms of some local institution at Mansfield by the Harrington Air Service who have been directed to conduct the ground and flight school courses.

Any number of students may take the ground school instruction course and at the completion of the course competitive examinations are to be held by the Harrington Air Service and the Civil Aeronautics Authority at which time the ten highest ranking students will be awarded the scholarships for flight training.

Flight training will begin at the completion of the ground school and will last throughout the entire summer culminating with 35 to 50 hours of actual flying which will be sufficient for the students to obtain private pilot licenses.

The Mansfield N. A. A. announced the entire cost of the flying instruction will be borne by the Government although it is necessary for all applicants to pay a fee of \$10.00 with their application as laboratory fee for ground school instruction which includes the necessary textbooks.

Before starting the flight course at a later date it will be necessary to pay \$6.00 for the Civil Aeronautics Authority physical examination and \$14.00 for personal insurance.

Applications for the course may be obtained from the Harrington Air Service at the Mansfield Municipal Airport, Mansfield Chamber of Commerce, American Abrasive Company, Galion, or The Autocall Company, Shelby.

Norman H. Kann, President of the Mansfield N. A. A. announced that after fifty applications have been received, enrollment would be concluded as the ground school course would be limited to that number of students.

FARMERS REAP PROFITS ON 1939 TRIPLE A LOANS

The 1939 wheat crop which did not turn out to be so profitable at harvest time is rapidly taking on the color of a "golden harvest," Robert E. Finlay, Chairman of the Huron County AAA Committee, said recently.

Approximately 28c a bushel of 1939 AAA wheat loans farmers already have cashed in on their 1939 AAA wheat loans because the present market price is well above the loan rate.

The wheat market price at harvest time, he pointed out.

Farmers are realizing a profit of approximately 28c a bushel over the price prevailing at harvest time.

Since July 1939, sixty-two farmers secured loans on their 1939 wheat crop rather than accept the 63c a bushel offered on the local market. These loans amounted to 72c per bushel providing the farmer was a co-operator in the AAA farm program.

These farmers stored 23,142 bushels of wheat and received a loan of \$16,875.97 from the Commodity Credit Corporation. If the wheat had been sold at the harvest it would have brought \$14,579.46 or \$2,296.51 less than its loan value.

At the present market price this wheat is valued at approximately \$23,142.00 or \$26,068.00 more than the July price. This sum represents extra income for farmers which otherwise would have gone into the hands of speculators outside of the county.

ORDINANCE NO. 28

An Ordinance to employ a Solicitor for the Village of Plymouth for a period of two years from January 1st, 1940.

Be it Ordained by the Council of the Village of Plymouth as follows:

Sec. 1. That W. S. Kimball, an attorney at law, admitted to practice in the Courts of this State, and is hereby is hereby employed by this council as Solicitor of the Village of Plymouth for the period of two years from the first day of January 1940 to the first day of January 1942.

Sec. 2. The compensation of the Solicitor of the Village of Plymouth shall be Two Hundred (\$200.00) Dollars per year, payable quarterly, for all ordinary services as counsel to the Village and its officers, and the preparation of all ordinances and resolutions that may be requested by the Mayor, Council or Clerk. For any unusual services in Court or otherwise, he shall be allowed all extra expenses and reasonable compensation to be approved and allowed by the Council.

Sec. 3. This Ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage as provided by law.
