PLYMOUTH TO JOIN MARCH OF DIMES DRIVE

The annual "March of Dimes" campaign to fight against infantile paralysis was begun in Plymouth this week as the nation prepared to observe President Roosevelt's Birthday on next Tuesday, January 30th.

Sealed cardboard containers were placed in every store and business place this week and merchants are being asked to cooperate in bringing the fund to the attention of patrons.

The funds received from the March of Dimes will be divided evenly between the National Foundation For Infantile Paralysis and the Huron County chapter of the foundation.

The annual campaign for funds to aid the fight against the dread disease was started about six years ago as an endowment for Wm. Spring Foundation. When the first President's Birthday Ball was given. The permanent organization for handling the fund was set up in 1938.

In addition to the March of Dimes, Plymouth will join with New Haven Township and the Ohio Pastors Convention to be given at the Willard High School next Tuesday evening. An orchestra will furnish the dance music and the affair is scheduled for 8 o'clock. Lloyd Lippus is chairman for Plymouth and reports a goodly number of tickets have already been sold. These tickets are 25c per person and can be purchased from any Legionaire.

Rev. Wintemute to Attend Convention

Rev. H. T. Wintemute, pastor of the Plymouth-Shiloh Methodist Church is planning to attend the Ohio Pastors Convention to be held in Memorial Hall, Columbus, Ohio, Jan. 25 to Feb. 1. This is the twenty-first Convention of the Pastors of Ohio and is attended annually by more than 1000 pastors of many denominations. It is said to be the greatest meeting of its kind in the United States. Among the leading speakers on the program for this year will be: Reinhold Niebuhr of Union Theological Seminary; Dr. Merton S. Rice, Pastor of Metropolitan Methodist Church, Detroit; Sam Morris of Del Rio, Texas; The Voice of Temperance, on the Radio; Dr. Sherwood Eddy, noted world traveler, lecturer and writer; Dr. Roy L. Burkhardt of Columbus, prominent pastor and worker with young people; Dr. Samuel H. Goldenstein, rabbi of Temple Emanuel, New York City; and others.

A number of special meetings and discussion groups will also be held. During the past year ten special committees on problems in the town and country field have been at work and these will make reports. Rev. Wintemute is chairman of the committee on Religious Education in Rural Churches.

Teachers Taxed This Year

Because of a new ruling, public school teachers and other state and county employees, who have previously been exempt from the federal income tax, will be subject to the tax this year for the first time.

Most unmarried and some married teachers will be affected. All single teachers making \$1000 or more a year and married teachers making \$2500 a year or more must file income tax reports.

RURAL WOMEN'S CHORUS FEATURE OF FARMERS' WEEK PROGRAM

MANY HURON COUNTY WOMEN EN TAKE PART IN PROGRAM.

Ohio may well be proud of one Farmers' Week feature, the Farm Women's Chorus of 200 voices selected from chorus groups in 14 counties, which will appear at Ohio State University, Wednesday, January 31st.

These singing groups were started in 1934, when farm women in Warren County decided that lack of money to buy commercial entertainment might be a blessing in disguise because it compelled people to utilize their own talents. Group singing not only entertained the chorus members but furnished wholesome recreation at rural meetings where the chorus appeared.

Since 1934, seventeen counties have had rural women's choruses, with 400 women participating. Local musicians have donated their time to rehearse the groups, and some of the county choruses have acquired reputations extending much beyond the county borders.

Women from Coshocton, Crawford, Darke, Fairfield, Fulton, Gallia, Greene, Henry, Huron, Licking, Lorain, Mahoning, Seneca, and Warren counties will be in the massed chorus Farmers' Week. The program will be conducted by Professor Joseph Leader, Ohio State, and the accompanist will be Miss Romette Shoemaker. If I Were Hitler

"Or Stalin, or Mussolini, or Any Other Dictator. The Book I Would Make Everybody Read Is In The Plymouth Library."

Upon second thought, if everyone read this book, seriously, and intensely, he would have such a splendid outlook on life that there soon would be no place for such an atrocity as a dictator.

The book is translated from the French and has been listed before in this column. It is "Wind, Sand and Stars" and the man who wrote it is Antoine de Saint-Exupery. Since I have read, (and re-read) this book, I have wondered how the French government could possibly send a man with such an amazing mind and understanding heart to war in the air against the Siegfried line, or any other so-called line. Maybe they haven't but if they do the act would be a concrete example of the wastefulness, the uselessness of war.

"Wind, Sand and Stars" is so interesting that it is as if one put oneself up in a closet with only the book for company, so completely does it rivet the mind's attention. I cannot find suitable adjectives to describe the book.

To quote again from Christopher Morley, "He is the Joseph Conrad of the air; by which I mean he writes of the ocean of sky above us in the same spirit the great Pole dealt with the ocean of salt water. As with Conrad, the human spirit is his true theme. This is a book out of a new kind of world, and it deserves the best kind of readers a book can have."

When you read this book the air your breathe will no longer be just air; it will be alive with swirls, waves, eddies, valleys, slides and willfulness. You will be aware of the air just as you are aware of the ground beneath your feet.

If you do not avail yourself of this chance to read "Wind, Sand and Stars" you are missing one of the greatest opportunities of your life.

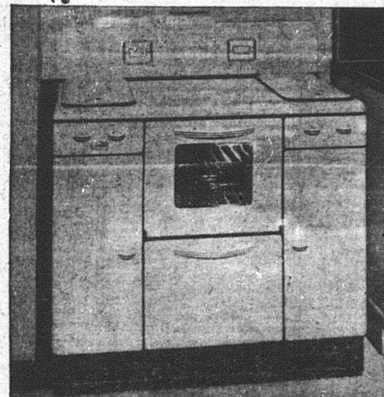

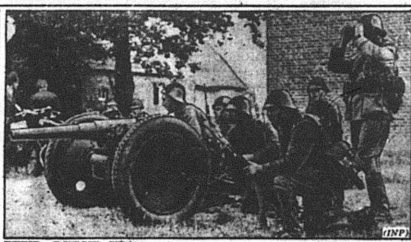

HINTS TO HOMEMAKERS

by PAULINE SCHOFIELD

Questions and Answers.

Can you suggest a few dainty refreshments that are made from crackers?

I have so many new and different ways to use crackers in sandwiches, salads, and desserts that I am going to devote my entire column to your question.

Toasted Cinnamon Crackers

Plain Crackers
Melted Butter
Ground Cinnamon
Granulated Sugar

Spread the crackers generously with butter and equally generously with a mixture of 3 parts of sugar to one part ground cinnamon. Crisp in a hot oven, and serve piping hot.

Orange Mallowes

Butter Crackers
Orange Marmalade
Grated Orange Rind
Marshmallow Creme

Toast the crackers, then spread generously with orange marmalade and put on top of each a spoonful of marshmallow creme, into which a little grated orange rind has been stirred. Bake just long enough to puff and slightly color the marshmallow and serve immediately.

"Volcanoes"

Soda Crackers
Cottage Cheese
Raspberry or Apricot Jam
or Marshmallow Creme

Season the cheese, adding a spoonful of two of cream, as necessary to make it light. Pile it on the crackers in cone form, making an indentation in the top for the crackers, and in these placing a spoonful of the jam or a cherry with a little of its syrup, allowing this to run down the sides of the mountain.

Cracker Tarts

Uncooked pastry
Jam
3 Tbsp. butter
4 Tbsp. sugar
Eggs
1 C. crushed crackers
1 C. milk
Grated rind 1/4 lemon
3 Tbsp. lemon juice
1/2 C. quartered seeded raisins
1 1/2 tsp. baking powder

Line small pans with the pastry and put a teaspoon of jam into each. Cream the butter and sugar, and add the eggs, well beaten. Meanwhile, scald the milk and pour it over the crackers, add these to the first cream mixture with the lemon rind and juice, the raisins and baking powder. Fill the pans three-fourths full with the mixture and bake 20 min. at 350 degrees.

There are many other ways to use crackers than the above recipes. They can be used in making refrigerator cakes, assorted sandwiches, used in place of toast for creamed and devilled dishes. They can be used as an accompaniment for any soup or salad, or for outside layers of ice cream sandwiches. Have you ever tried crushing a few crackers and using them as extenders—for instance—to scrambled eggs or an omelet mixture. Try this some day and note the increase in bulk.

I hope I have given you a few useful suggestions—and if I can be of assistance to you at any other time, please feel free to write me.

NEW YORK, Jan. 17.—(Special)—Growing out of a nationwide demand for a date when the American people can demonstrate their sympathy for the refugees invaded Finland, Herbert Hoover, national chairman of the Finnish Relief Fund, today announced the week of February 4 as "Help Finland Week."

Hundreds of benefit events, from brilliant social affairs to boxing matches, have been scheduled for "Help Finland Week" by chairmen of the 48 state committees, the District of Columbia committee and by committees in distant, tropical Hawaii and ice-bound Alaska, the former president said.

The nation's motion picture theaters are placing their facilities at the disposal of the drive and will set aside two days early next month as Finnish collection days.

School children, too, have volunteered to help underlead and carry Finnish children, bringing a penny for each member of the family to school during "Help Finland Week."

Sports writers, under the direction of a committee headed by Joe Williams, Scripps-Howard sports editor and columnist, are working with local and national promoters to set up wrestling, boxing, tennis, track and hockey matches for the benefit of the fund.

With Helen Hayes as chairman, a committee of noted stage and screen stars have set \$500,000 a goal, which will be raised through a series of personal appearances and benefit performances throughout the country. Such stars as Paul Muni, Katharine Hepburn and Tallulah Bankhead are working with Miss Hayes to set up shows.

FARMERS INCREASE USE OF HYBRID SEED CORN

Farmers nowadays are ready to accept new ideas as soon as their practicability is proven. Acting Huron County Agent, Marshall Whittier, reports that within four years after hybrid seed corn became available to the general public 57 per cent of the corn acreage of Ohio was hybrid. A total of 1,952,000 acres of corn were produced from hybrid seed in 1939. Only 64,000 acres or 1.8 per cent of the corn planted in 1934 was hybrid.

Mr. Whittier believes that the widespread use of hybrid corn is due to its superiority over open pollinated varieties and points to some statistics as proof. In 194 experiments carried on by the Ohio Experiment Station over the last ten years, the average yield of all hybrid varieties has increased 9.0 bushels more or an increase of 15 percent over open pollinated varieties. During this same period the highest yielding hybrids have outdistanced the best open pollinated varieties by 14.2 bushels or 20.8 per cent. A study of the data reveals that during the latter part of the ten year period hybrids excelled more than they did during the first years. This is due to constant experimentation and development of new varieties of hybrids and the elimination of those with less desirable characteristics.

During the summer of 1939 cooperative test plots were established on approximately fifty farms throughout the state, one of which was located in Huron County on the farm of Heyman Brothers, in Lyme Township.

Each cooperator was furnished enough seed to plant 100 hills of each of twenty varieties of hybrid and open pollinated corn. The plots were planted and harvested under supervision of the Experiment Station.

Although complete results are not available yet indications are that one or two very desirable new hybrids are being developed. Results also indicate that the individual should be sure that he is getting the variety most adapted to his conditions as different soil and weather conditions call for different hybrids.

The plaintiffs aver that Margaret Hopkins caused a motor wreck Oct. 10, last year when she backed a car out into Kniffin-st., Greenwich. The son sues for \$5,000 and the mother for \$25,000. E. K. Trauger and the Norwalk law firm of the Carpenter & Freeman represent the plaintiffs.

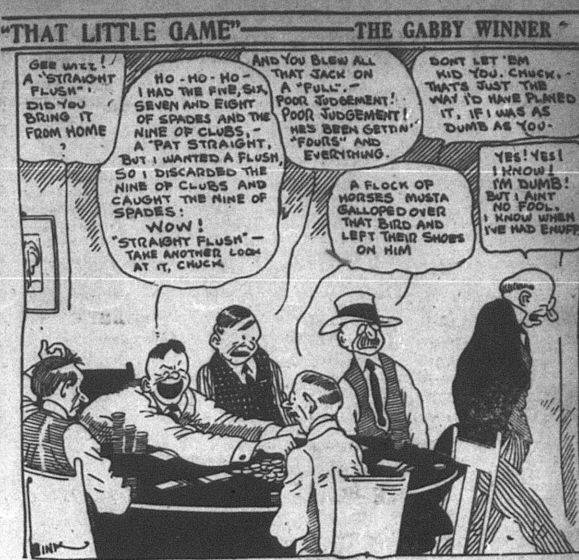
