Are you really serious about starting the New Year right? Fine! Then how about posting yourself on your buying for 1940 by reading the book, mentioned in this column, "Behind the Label."

About keeping up on world politics—"If you fill in the background of everyday world news with books concerning the personalities in and geography of European and Asiatic countries, fast-moving political events will not be so bewildering."

"Foundation of Democracy" by T. V. Smith and Robert A. Taft, published by Knott, is suggested for keeping up the home-political angle.

"Building the British Empire" according to James Truslow Adams assists one in getting the English viewpoint, which cannot be ignored, nor yet can it be wholly commended in the light of history.

"Inside of Europe" by Ganthier, is more timely, it is needless to say. And quite as pertinent concerning world politics is "Inside of Asia."

So often, too, one needs encouragement. Others have dealt with problems similar to yours. Why not read about them? Maybe the fashions of the characters are different, but the problems are the same.

For happy reading do not neglect the Red Pepper Burns series, (adult) the J. A. L. books, any of Gene Stratton Porter's books, Best Street, Arthur's writings, "It Takes All Kinds"; you might even read "Gone With the Wind" if you haven't read it to do this before. With the picture coming within the next few months, reading this book should be all the more interesting.

You might be surprised, no matter how hard-shelled you are, how a few lines of poetry might hit your mood or problem right on the head. There are several shelves of poetry at Plymouth's library. No red-blooded man should miss reading Kipling and Maseloff.

Or do blustery January evenings suggest to you a warm fire and a good lamp, easy slippers and a filled pipe (ah-h-h), and a fine mystery.

"Miss Trauger, find me a couple of good mystery books to-night," says I.

"Of course, Mr. X. Here are—" Miss Trauger's—"Mystery Omnibus."

Agatha Christie's—"Mystery of the Blue Train"

"Murder at the Vicarage"

Above all—if you like a mystery that is grunting and growling, one that will guarantee to keep you from slumber, ask for the book "About the Murder of a Starlet Lady," written by Anthony Abbot. Even the ending didn't keep me from shivering for quite awhile.

This is about enough for January, but you must not leave religion out of your reading, or your year is slated for failure before you even begin. "The Secret of Victorious Living" by Fodick.

OK'S MEASURE COUNTY SCHOOL BOARD APPROVES \$7,500 APPROPRIATION.

An appropriation measure providing \$7,500 for expenses of the Richland county board of education and superintendent of schools in 1940 was adopted Saturday by the county school board.

The appropriation, which sets up \$250 more than was available last year, provides for the salaries of the superintendent, his secretary, and the attendance officer, traveling expenses for county school board members, and county school office supplies.

The board divided a \$1,021 debt of the former Bloominggrove township school district between the Union rural and Cass township districts which absorbed the district. The Cass township board was ordered to pay 73.26 per cent of the obligation and the Union board 26.74 per cent.

J. W. Snook, Millin township, who has been a candidate for the county board for seven and a half years, completed his term with Saturday's meeting. He was elected township trustee in November and was not a candidate for the county board. He will be succeeded by Irwin Hunter of Bloominggrove township.

RETIREES JANUARY 31st

John Drake of Kimball, Ohio's oldest post master, announces he will retire January 31. He will be 80 years old next December. Drake has operated a general store at Kimball many years and has served in the Ohio State Senate. Because of a twice broken hip Drake is required to walk with a cane.

NEW OFFICIALS TAKE OFFICE

William Johns took over the reins of the village government Tuesday night when he was sworn in as mayor for the next two years. He took oath of office under the outgoing mayor, Dr. J. T. Gaskill. Along with Mr. Johns, six new councilmen and three members of the Board of Public Affairs also took oath of office.

The change of village officials occurred Tuesday night when the old council met for the last time, and closing its business for the year of 1939, turned over the office to new members. In leaving office Dr. Gaskill expressed his appreciation to the outgoing councilmen for their support and wished success to the new mayor and councilmen.

The new councilmen, who took their oath Tuesday night are as follows: Maurice Bachrach, Henry Fackler, Geo. W. Pickens, James Root, Willard Ross and E. L. Earnest. Ross was nominated and confirmed as president of the council.

The first duties of Mayor Johns were the appointment of the various committees, fire chief and village solicitor. The committees appointed for the next two years are as follows: Finance Committee—Maurice Bachrach, Willard Ross, Fire and Police Committee—Henry Fackler and Geo. W. Pickens. Street Committee—Henry Fackler and James Root. Brinkerhoff Committee—James Root and E. L. Earnest.

Stewart Resigned

Mayor Johns made the appointment of F. B. Stewart as village fire chief and the council confirmed the appointment. Mr. Stewart has been a member of the local fire department for thirty-seven years and the past nine years as fire chief. It was back in the old days when the fire department had a steam pumper when "Bud" Stewart began his fire-fighting career. His "Bud says"—they were the good old days.

W. S. Stabile was appointed village solicitor to succeed L. S. Wise. Mr. Kimble has had several years experience as a city solicitor and for many years was connected with the state tax department at Columbus. His experience in city government will no doubt be a great help to the new officials, and the appointment will be confirmed by the passing of an ordinance, which is required on this particular office. During his residence here Mr. Kimble has made many friends who will be glad to know of his appointment.

Messrs. Neal Shepherd, Willard Wirth and Dawson succeeded Messrs. Carl Lofland, Arthur Myers and B. R. Scott as members of the Board of Public Affairs.

Mrs. Mary B. Chappell, who has held office as village treasurer for the past two years, also took her oath to the same office for another year.

James Rhine, village clerk, was also sworn in. Rhine was appointed about a year ago as clerk, and he was re-elected to this office at the November election.

Deaths, illness and absence from the village were the causes given for only two members of the old council being present at the last meeting. They were P. W. Thomas and Clay Hays.

Harry Dick was appointed custodian of the village buildings.

Ohio's New License Plates To Be White and Dark Blue

For the first time in a number of years Ohio's license plates for 1940 will be in two colors, background with white letters and numerals.

For the last few years the plates have been light background with dark letters, according to Frank Beverstock, deputy registrar. They go on sale the middle of March and must be displayed April 1st.

The final quarter for the sale of 1940 plates opened Tuesday morning. Plates will be sold for one-fourth of the annual license fee and may be used for three months.

Ohio and Maryland will both have white on dark blue in 1940. While three other states have white on various shades of blue. The color combinations of the 1940 auto tags are as follows:

Colorado—Black on yellow.
Connecticut—Black on aluminum.
Delaware—Blue on gold.

Idaho—Green on gold.
Illinois—Cream on coffee brown.
Indiana—Aluminum on black.
Iowa—Blue on orange.
Kansas—White on black.
Kentucky—Red on white.

REP. ASHBROOK DIES AT HOME

OHIO CONGRESSMAN EXPIRES AFTER PARALYTIC STROKE.

William A. Ashbrook (D-Ohio), serving his 10th term as congressman from the 17th Ohio district died at his home at Johnston, Monday night. He was 72.

Stricken by a paralytic stroke, he became unconscious about 5 p. m. Sunday and died twenty-seven hours later.

The newspaper publisher-banker-farmer 72 years old, was stricken last October in Washington, but had improved rapidly until another stroke came Sunday.

Rep. Ashbrook first went to Congress in 1906, after resigning from the Ohio legislature and served until 1920, when he failed of reelection by 123 votes. The voters of the 17th district, which embraces Ashland, Coshocton, Delaware, Knox, Licking and Richland co., returned him to the House in 1934 and he has been there since.

The Congressman whose home is on a nearby farm which his grandfather bought in 1821, is credited with sponsoring more soldier's pension bills than any other representative. His friends nicknamed him "pension bill."

He has been a member of the U. S. Army Commission and was on a Congressional committee which visited the Belgian and French battlefields.

The funeral will be held at 2 p. m. Friday at the home, and Dr. A. A. Shaw, president of Denison university, and a close friend of the family will officiate. Burial will be in the nearby Green Hill cemetery, which was established soon after the first Ashbrook settled near Johnston and which has been the family burial ground for more than 100 years.
