

Old Church Was Saved By Two Early Pioneers

The first forty-five years of the history of the First Evangelical Lutheran church in Plymouth centers about the old church. This old building served the Lutherans from 1842 until it was replaced with the present building in 1887. It saw the steady and sometimes difficult growth of the little church. It housed the long and excellent pastorate of the Rev. Joshua Crouse. It saw the generous cancellation of a \$500 by Felix T. Fenner, Sr., and Samuel H. Trauger. It held a congregation which grew from seven families to more than one hundred fifty members.

In 1887 the new building replaced the old building and shorn of its tower it was moved down the Square to the place where it still stands on the County Line Road, still serving men, if only the capacity of a barn. First Lutheran church is justly proud that its original building still stands, a monument to the skill of those who built it, a mark of the love which put worthy materials into its construction.

The sturdiness of this old building is a token of the sturdiness of the congregation which it housed, and that sturdiness has been retained since the congregation moved into the new building. It has been the staunch love of many members which has made it possible for the First Lutheran Church to celebrate its One Hundred Anniversary this fall.

The week of October 20-27 has been set apart as the time for the centennial celebration. Much careful planning and hard work has gone into the preparation of this celebration. It will be the kind of a celebration which will come but once every one hundred years.

The services will open on Sunday morning, Oct. 20th with the Rev. Herbert W. Veler, President of the General Conference of the Synod of Ohio at the pulpit. Miss Eleanor Searle is making a special trip home to Plymouth. The Rev. H. Trauger will be unveiled by Mr. Paul Fenner and Mr. Elmer K. Trauger. Each of the Organizations of the church will have some part in this program on Tuesday.

Wednesday night will be Homecoming night with a special service for the former pastors back: Rev. Herbert, Rev. DeLaurer, Rev. Himes and Rev. Stull. Miss Searle will sing again this evening.

Thursday night will be Community Night with greetings being brought from the Village of Plymouth by Mayor Wm. Johns, and from the School Board as the representatives of the schools of Plymouth. The nation of Protestant churches will bring greetings as will the pastors from neighboring Lutheran churches.

Friday night will be Congregational Night with a gigantic covered dish supper at six o'clock. Mr. E. Lehr Bailey will be the toastmaster and a wonderful program around the tables has been prepared. Favors will be provided by the Young People's Class.

The congregation of the First Lutheran church cordially invites all its friends and neighbors to come and share its joy during this wonderful centennial celebration.

As a result of his visit Plymouth High School is continued on the list of first rate schools of the state.

We are always glad to have these inspectors visit our buildings and our school because we feel that their suggestions are made for our betterment.

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Fancy Work Display to Be Housed in Library

A. F. MARVIN RETURNS HERE

Three former public officials in Mansfield and Plymouth were free Friday after serving slightly more than a year and a half of one-to-ten-year terms in the Ohio penitentiary for embezzling public funds in their departments.

Released from the penitentiary were Allen K. Forts, former Mansfield municipal clerk; A. F. Marvin, former clerk of the Village of Plymouth; and Russell J. Denberger, former tax collector for the Mansfield Conservancy district.

They entered the penitentiary March 13, 1939 and were paroled last spring for release now.

Pleading guilty to embezzlement, indictments returned by the Richland county grand jury, the men were sentenced by Common Pleas Judge C. H. Hunter. He told them when he imposed sentence on them that he would not stand in the way of their parole whenever they were eligible.

All three of the men held jobs at the time they were paroled at the institution said they were "model prisoners."

Mr. Marvin has resumed his old job at The Fate-Root-Heath Co., where he worked while as clerk of the village.

GIVE U. S. BACK TO THE PEOPLE! SAYS WILLKIE

Demands Return of Government To All the Old-Fashioned Moral Principles

OPENING CAMPAIGN SPEECH

Republican Candidate Charges Roosevelt Has Lost Faith in the People.

COFFEYVILLE, Kansas. — Wendell Willkie's opening speech of his Presidential campaign, delivered in the Kansas town where he was to teach school, was an impassioned plea for the return of the U. S. government to the people. His principal charge against President Roosevelt was that after seven years, he "has lost faith in the people." He followed this with a ringing challenge: "Sooner or later—I say the time is NOW—the people will lose faith in him." Passages in his speech which evoked the most enthusiastic applause from his audience included the following:

"Let me make myself clear. I say nothing about the personal motives of Mr. Roosevelt. But in his hands our traditions are not safe. He has lost his grip on our American principles. He gives lip service to them but he does not know how to preserve them. He has put our democratic system in danger of its life."

"The issue we have to decide in this campaign is whether we shall leave in the hands of the President, now seeking a third term, the power to destroy our system."

Goal of Campaign
"That is the substance of the charge I bring. That goal—the preservation of democracy—will be the goal of my campaign. I shall go up and down this American land, the doctrine of freedom, the doctrine of equality, the doctrine of democracy."

"Let us recognize that democracy is not something that just anybody can have. Democracy is the highest form of government, and the hardest to keep. To have it and to hold it, we must understand and believe and insist upon the home virtues that we learned when we were boys and girls."

"Only we, the people, can save our country. And we can do so only if we are worthy of our country."

"A man who cannot save democracy in peace cannot save it in crisis. No man can save democracy who has lost his faith in the people. And so I turn to the vast mistaken, deluded government of ours in Washington, and I say: Give our country back to us."



I know the democratic way of life as an experience. I have worked on the ranges and the farms. I learned about civil liberties, not in textbooks, but in the hard struggle for survival.

The high level of war in the United States was made possible through the use of machinery which increased the productive power of the worker. The need is like the breath of life itself: it cannot be had and held forever; it must be continually re-created and renewed.

Willkie Banner Rallies 1200 Organizations Protesting Bad Public Spending.

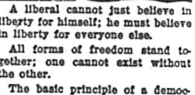

Instead of taking conservation out of politics, Bricker has plunged it deeper into the political mire than all the other governors of Ohio combined. His action in this matter has been positively disgraceful and dishonorable.

Bricker has set conservation in Ohio back more than ten years. He knows nothing about the purpose of conservation and thinks of it only as a political machine. He has betrayed his trust most shamefully.

Contrast this disgusting performance of Governor Bricker with that of Governor Martin L. Davey, who has been a life-long devotee of conservation.

Governor Davey really did take conservation out of politics and would not let politicians touch that Department. He kept the most competent employees, and hired additional ones on the basis of their knowledge and experience, without regard to politics.

Davey did more for conservation in four years, than had been done in the previous quarter of a century. He made it something real in Ohio.
