

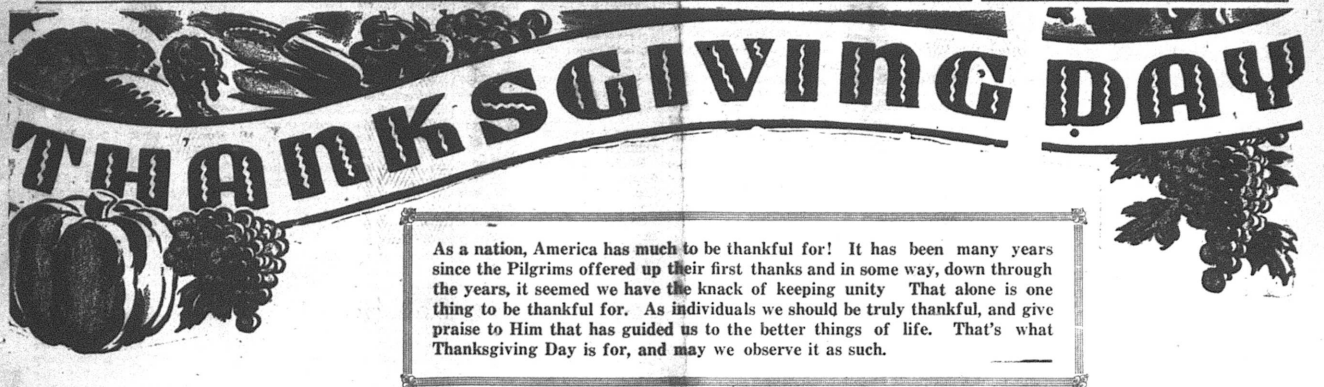

TAKES PART IN PRAYER WEEK AT WOOSTER

Wooster, O., Nov. 19 — David Brown, of Plymouth, Ohio, a junior here at the college of Wooster, will be one of the student leaders for the annual Week of Prayer on the Wooster campus December 1 to 7.

The general theme for the week will be "Developing a Christian Philosophy of Life." The off-campus leader will be the Rev. Paul C. Johnson, pastor of the Third Presbyterian Church of Rochester, N. Y.

He is president of the Presbyterian Board of Foreign Missions. Three announced subjects will be "The Heroic Mind," "On Being Spiritually Radio-active," and "Youth Validates its Future." Dr. Charles F. Wiesner, president of Wooster since 1919, will preach in the college chapel Sunday, December 1, to open the week's service. The Wooster Big Four, which includes the college Y.W.C.A. and Y.M.C.A., the Sunday Evening Forum and the World Fellowship Group, is sponsoring the week's observance. No other extra-curricular activities are scheduled for this period.

Brown is the son of Mr. Stacy C. Brown. At Wooster, he is majoring in chemistry and is a member of the men's glee club.

ISSUED PERMIT

Norwalk — A building permit was issued here last week for the erection of a new Schine theatre building on East Main at a total cost of about \$100,000. The structure will go up on E. Main St. near Prospect and without the equipment will cost \$58,000. Materials will be brick, steel and concrete. The structure will be 66 1/2 feet in width, 172 feet long and 55 feet high. Announcements of contracts awarded for equipment and other items will be given out later. Clarence Knowlton of Bowling Green is the general contractor.

North Fairfield To Vote Again On Bond Issue, December 27

The Board of Education of N. Fairfield has filed a petition with the Board of Education for another vote on the proposed \$30,000 bond issue for the remodeling and enlargement of the North Fairfield high school.

At the election Nov. 5, the measure failed to receive the required 65 per cent vote. The date of the next election is set for Dec. 27.

ORDERS SALE OF PROPERTIES

Foreclosure sale of nearly 20 properties in Mansfield, Shelby and Plymouth to pay delinquent tax judgments totaling \$4,064 has been ordered in Richland county common pleas court.

The Matlock Chapel property on Grace street, Mansfield, and a property in Coolidge Heights will be sold on a judgment for \$3,699 obtained by County Treasurer John E. Kolb against Gerald W. Cruik and others.

Sixteen Shelby and Plymouth properties amounting to \$498 in back taxes and penalties. The judgments were returned against Henry Bachrach and others as owners of the lots.

Deputy Sheriff Frank Robinson who will conduct the sales at the courthouse said the properties will be appraised next week and dates for the sales will be set then.

SULPHUR SPRINGS SCHOOL CHILDREN GETTING VACATION

Arrangements are completed for classes to be resumed on Monday, Nov. 25, at Sulphur Springs school, which was damaged considerably by fire last Tuesday. Until then the 200 pupils of the school will be on a forced vacation, County School Supt. Glen C. West reported.

Two building contractors and an insurance adjuster are completing their check of the damage. No announcement has been made of the estimated loss. The building was covered by \$80,000 insurance.

Class will be held on the first floor of the building until repairs are made to the remainder of the two-story brick building.

The fire was believed to have been caused by a short circuit. It was discovered Tuesday morning shortly after eleven hours, and the 200 pupils failed to enter when the school fire alarm was sounded.

HURON COUNTY FARMER WINS CORN CROWN

DeKalb, Ill. (Special) Nov. 19 — An outstanding corn yield of 75.0 bushels per acre has just won the corn growing championship of Huron County for Edward Ott, R. D. No. 2, Norwalk farmer, in the 1940 National DeKalb Hybrid Corn growing Contest. Officials of the nation's biggest corn yield competition report that nearly 10,000 farmers from the 12 principal corn-producing states entered the contest.

Ott's 75.0 bushel per acre crop, which is almost 3 times bigger than the national average corn yield this year, was certified for production competition and witnessed by two farmer-neighbors. It will return more than 600 bu. of corn for each bushel of seed planted.

His corn was grown under ordinary farming conditions from hybrid seed, DeKalb 410 and in recognition of his splendid accomplishment he will be presented with a beautiful bronze trophy.

State Championship honors have been awarded to Howard Kochenderfer & Son, Richland County, Ohio. Mr. Kochenderfer's winning yield was given as 119.53 bushels per acre, made with DeKalb 404A.

Following this there will be separate meetings by age groups for study and discussion.

The young people at each place will follow the Epworth League discussion plan and a special program will be used by the children of interest to them. The services on Sunday evening began with good interest at each church.

SUPREME COURT RULES AGAINST MRS. R. KNAPP

The Ohio Supreme Court at Columbus has refused to hear arguments in the dispute of Mrs. Ruby E. Knapp of Columbus with heirs over the disposal of the estate of her late husband, Frank A. Knapp late of Bellevue.

Mrs. Knapp contended that she was forced to sign an ante-nuptial agreement before her marriage March 16, 1937, agreeing to a cash settlement of \$25,000 in case of her husband's death. She asserted that the agreement was exacted by her husband in order to "keep peace" among his grown daughters by a previous marriage.

Knapp's estate was appraised at more than \$900,000.

Huron county common pleas court ruled against Mrs. Knapp and the appellate court affirmed the decision.

Kitchen Katchall

Spiced Filled Coffeecake

- 3/4 C. sifted pastry flour
- 4 tsp. baking powder
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1/2 tsp. nutmeg
- 1/2 C. granulated sugar
- 1/2 tsp. cinnamon
- 6 Tbsp. shortening
- 2 eggs, beaten
- 1 C. milk
- 4 Tbsp. powdered sugar
- 2 Tbsp. butter
- 1/2 C. chopped walnut meats
- 1 C. heavy cream, whipped

Mix 3 C. flour, the baking powder, salt, nutmeg, granulated sugar, and 1/2 tsp. cinnamon. In shortening, beat in eggs and milk. Turn into a greased 9-inch cake pan. Mix powdered sugar, 1/4 C. flour and 1/2 tsp. cinnamon; cut in butter; sprinkle together with nuts over batter. Bake in a moderate oven, 375 degrees, 40 minutes. Cool in pan; remove, split, fill with cream. Serves 8 to 10.

Soft Molasses Cookies

- 1/2 C. shortening
- 1/2 C. brown sugar
- 1 C. molasses
- 2 eggs, well-beaten
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1/2 tsp. cinnamon
- 1/2 tsp. nutmeg
- 1 C. sour cream
- 4 C. flour
- 1 tsp. baking powder

Cream the shortening with the brown sugar; add the molasses, eggs, salt, cinnamon and nutmeg. Stir in the sour cream alternately with the flour, which has been sifted with the baking powder and soda. Chill thoroughly in refrigerator. Roll out in any desired shape, or place small balls of the dough on a greased cookie sheet, flatten with a spatula. Bake at 350 degrees for 10 to 15 minutes.

Pork Chops With Corn Dressing

- 1 C. corn flakes
- 1 Tbsp. chopped onion
- 1 C. chopped celery
- 2 Tbsp. fat
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1 tsp. pepper
- 1/4 tsp. poultry seasoning
- 1 C. drained whole kernel corn
- 1 C. stock, liquid from corn, or milk
- 4 pork chops
- 1/2 tsp. salt

Combine bread crumbs and corn flakes. Cook onion and celery in fat until slightly browned; add to bread mixture with seasonings, corn and stock. Mix thoroughly. Press into baking dish, 8-inch diameter. Arrange chops on top of dressing and sprinkle with salt. Cover and bake in moderately hot oven, 375 degrees, about 45 minutes; uncover and bake 15 minutes longer. Serves 4.

Candied Sweet Potatoes

- 6 medium cooked sweet potatoes
- 1/2 C. butter
- 1 C. brown sugar
- 1/2 C. water
- 1/2 tsp. salt

Boil butter, brown sugar, water, and salt together for 5 minutes. Pour over potatoes which have been sliced and arranged in an uncovered baking dish. Bake in a moderate oven, 375 degrees for 45 minutes. Serves 6.

Brown Sugar Apple Sauce

- Combine 2 1/2 C. apple sauce with 1/4 C. brown sugar, 1/4 tsp. cinnamon, 1/2 C. seedless raisins and 2 Tbsp. butter. Heat. Serve hot. Serves 4.

Tenant Purchase Plan In Huron County

With a number of applications to work on the Huron County Tenant Purchase Committee is busy making investigations to determine which applicants are to receive 40-year, three per cent loans for the purchase of family-size farms this year.

Mr. Paul C. Williams, Farm Security Administration supervisor, at Norwalk, advises us that it is not too late for farm tenants and farm laborers to file application.

If the applicant is unable to obtain an option on a suitable farm within a reasonable time, another applicant will be chosen.

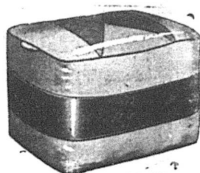

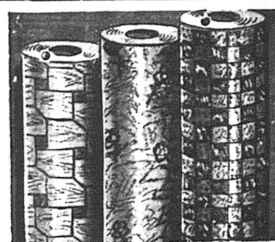

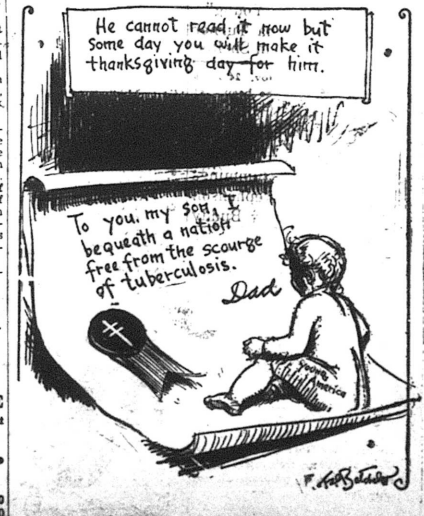

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ANSWERS TO QUESTION ASKED ON MILITARY SERVICE SET-UP

Questions asked by men of conscription age in regard to their chances of choosing which branch of the service they will enter, what chance there is for advancement, what advantages volunteers will have over drafted men, etc., are answered here by Francis J. Brown, consultant of the American Council on Education, Washington, D. C.

1. Now that registration is over, no man may enlist for one year only.

2. He may request that his service date be set forward, but if he does, he must go through the regular channels as for any drafted man.

3. Any registered man volunteering now will have no more freedom as to choice of service than the man who is selected through the regular channels of draft.

4. At any time prior to his being called or during his year of service for which he is called, he may enlist for the full three years in the regular army and may have opportunity then to choose the type of service which he prefers "at least within reasonable limits."

5. Any man who voluntarily enlists in the Navy either the full four or six year periods is not exempt from the required year of training if his number is called by the draft after the termination of his period for regular service in these forces.

6. A man called for service goes first to an induction center where for from one to three days he will take physical, intelligence and aptitude tests. Then he will go to replacement area, which are huge camps in which the individual remains for 12 weeks for basic training and classification.

7. After these two periods, there will be a possibility for the individual to be classified in the arm of service in which he is interested. (The Navy or Marine Corps at the present time will ac-

cept no persons for the one-year training period.)

8. A drafted man will be assigned to a branch of service determined by three factors—his ability, his interests, and the need of the army. For the group of men drafted, at least the factor of the army's need will come first.

There will be officer training facilities. The men sent to these camps will be drawn from those in training who demonstrate qualities of leadership and desire for promotion. There will be no discrimination between volunteers and draftees in the selection of men for officer training camps.

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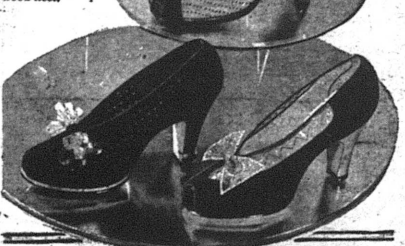

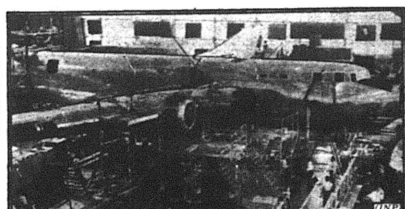
