His entry was ten ears of Pfister's 280 and brought him a \$10 prize. S. H. Widders of Weller township received second prize in the district on his entry of Pfister 268, winning \$5.

Mr. Renner's exhibit scored a 99 1/2 per cent and yielded in a bushel of 120 bushels of shelled corn per acre. He now has a chance at the national prize of \$100. The seed for this corn was sold by Francis Baker, also of Weller township.

NEW SERIES FOR AUTO TAGS HERE

WP SERIES TO REPLACE WB: GO ON SALE TOMORROW.

The WP license plate series will replace the WB series in use here the past year, according to Clarence Ervin, local auto vehicle registrar who announces that tags will go on sale here tomorrow, March 1st.

The WP series will run from 301. The new tags, white numerals on a dark blue background, may be displayed on March 10th and must be in use by April 1st. Fees will be the same as last year. For cars up to 25 horsepower the fee will be \$7, for cars from 24 to 31 horsepower, inclusive, the fee will be \$10 and for cars over 31 horsepower \$18.

UNEMPLOYMENT FUNDS SOUGHT

SEASONAL DECLINE IN EMPLOYMENT REQUESTED IN NEW CLAIMS.

New claims for unemployment benefits received by the Mansfield Employment Security Center of the Ohio Bureau of Unemployment Compensation increased during January, reflecting an extension of the winter season. The center reported an increase in unemployment, C. W. Handley manager of the center reported recently.

The 425 claims filed last month by unemployed Mansfield workers was an increase of 123.4 per cent over December, 1939.

Continued claims for unemployment compensation increased in December, and benefit payments in January numbered 2300 an increase over the previous month of 67 per cent.

The amount paid in benefits to Mansfield claimants in January increased 67 per cent over December and totaled \$20,953.69, Manager Handley said.

Average weekly benefit amount for total unemployment was \$9.64 and the average weekly benefit check for partial unemployment was \$5.83. A total of 2300 individual Mansfield claimants received benefits in January.

Balance available in the Ohio unemployment compensation fund for benefits at the end of January was \$133,779.219, Manager Handley said it had been informed.

However, placement through the Mansfield Employment Security Center increased in January, over that of December, in spite of the increase in claims and benefits.

1940 Parity Payment Rates on Corn and Wheat Announced

Parity payment rates on corn and wheat for 1940 were announced this week by the Huron County AAA Committee. The rates announced are: corn, 5 cents per bushel; and wheat, 10 cents per bushel.

These payments, according to Robert E. Finlay, Huron County AAA Chairman, will be made on the normal yield of each farmer's acreage allotment for each of the crops if the farmer cooperates with the provisions of the Agricultural Conservation Program.

The parity payments announced this week are in addition to the regular agricultural conservation payments made to farmers who cooperate in the 1940 AAA Farm Program. Thus farmers cooperating in the 1940 Farm Program will receive a total payment of 19 cents per bushel on wheat and 15 cents per bushel on corn.

Easter Dawn Service At Lutheran Church

The Lutheran Church will hold its beautiful Easter Dawn Service again this year. Started three years ago the Service has grown in attendance and beauty each year.

This year the Service which begins at 6:30 will see both the Junior and Senior Chorus helping in the music. Last year the music of the Junior Chorus was something to be long remembered as the young folks caught the joyful spirit of Easter and led the worshipping spirit of the whole congregation.

Pastor Wolf will deliver his only full Easter Sermon at the Dawn Service since the 10:30 Service will be The Holy Communion Service and will have just the brief communion meditation.

Before the Dawn Service, and again after it, at 8 and 10:30 respectively the Senior Lutheran League will serve its annual Easter Breakfast. Last year more than fifty persons enjoyed the food and fellowship of these breakfasts.

Plymouth Township Purchases Truck

G. L. Rodgers of Mansfield was the successful bidder on a two ton International chassis cab and dump body truck at their bid of \$1495.50.

The Plymouth Township Trustees asked for bids. Bids were opened on Feb. 15th but action deferred until the trustees had an opportunity to examine all trucks and consider all bids submitted by R. W. Ervin Sales. The Bourgeois Company of Shelby and the C. L. Rogers Company of Mansfield. The offer of the W. C. Gump Company was not considered, not meeting the specified requirements. There was a difference of \$115.00 between the highest and lowest offer, the quality of the truck being the deciding factor in purchasing by the trustees.

The purchase of a snow plow was also considered, two bids being presented, one by the Gledhill Road Machinery Company of Galion and the Burch Corporation of Crestline. These bids are still under advisement.

Trustees for Plymouth Township are Messrs. George Chessman, Sam Cashman and George Harris.

OWEN CLARK KILLED AT CLEVELAND

Plymouth residents were stunned Thursday when news of the tragic death of Owen Clark reached here. The deceased passed away Thursday morning in St. Sinai Hospital, Cleveland, from injuries suffered earlier in the day when his auto struck a safety zone stationer at the intersection of Euclid Avenue and E 6th Street.

He suffered a crushed chest and fractured skull in the accident. Employed at the National Tube Steel Company at Lorain, he had roomed at the residence of Mrs. Loh Wassam at Elberta Beach for the past six months.

Clark is a native of Plymouth and was 28 years of age. Several years ago he was employed by the village as Speed Cop, later becoming a member of the State Patrol. He was well liked here and had a host of friends who regret to learn of his death.

He is survived by his wife Zelma of Salem, Ohio, his mother, Mrs. Lotta Ux and three brothers of New London, Mrs. Laura Clark of Plymouth Street in his grandmother with whom he made his home during his residence here.

LOCAL CHURCH PLANS FOR CENTENNIAL

Plans for the celebration of the 100th Anniversary of the Lutheran Church were started last week by the 100th Anniversary Committee under the leadership of Mr. John A. Root.

The celebration is tentatively set for some time in the autumn, probably near Thanksgiving time, since the Church was founded in the fall of 1840.

A history of the congregation is being prepared by Mr. E. K. Trauger with the assistance of Rev. Wolf for publication in the anniversary booklet. Mr. Trauger was given the task of making the committee find the facts of the history of the church.

Mr. Trauger has a collection of pictures of many of the former pastors, but some are lacking and he would welcome any photographs which will help round out his collection for giving to the church.

Part of the plan for this Anniversary Year is to make it the best year the Church has yet had and the cooperation that the members are giving to see this make this goal an assured thing, for attendance at all services, both of Church and Sunday School are on the increase, and the regular winter communion more than doubled the winter communion of last year.

With such spirit it will be a great year for the Lutheran Church.

Miller-Scott Company Dissolves Partnership

The Miller-Scott Company dissolved partnership Wednesday, February 28th, effective immediately. Following the death of Mr. Miller, Mr. George E. D. Scott of Akron took charge of the furniture store and funeral parlors for the past nine years the firm operated under the name of Miller-Scott.

MARVIN TO GET PAROLE OCT 1ST

FORMER VILLAGE CLERK AND TWO MANSFIELD MEN WILL HAVE SERVED 18 MONTHS.

Albert Marvin, former village clerk, received a parole from the Ohio Parole and Pardon Commission Tuesday. His release becoming effective Oct. 1, 1940. By the time his release becomes effective Marvin, along with two Mansfielders, will have served 18 months and 18 days.

All charged with embezzlement of public funds Marvin of Plymouth, Allen K. Ports and Russell Erdemberger, were sentenced on March 13, 1939 for a term of from one to ten years. Marvin had served as village clerk here for a period of six years, while Ports was a former clerk in the municipal court at Mansfield. Erdemberger was a former clerk of Mansfield conservancy district. The trio were given a trial at the same time, and the sentences were of their duration.

While Marvin, during his trial, maintained that his discrepancies did not exceed an amount over \$800, the state audit showed a shortage in light and was amounting to \$8700. The entire amount with which the trio was charged with embezzling totaled \$8700.

Prosecutor Glenn Mariott had recommended minimum sentences at the time the men were taken to prison, and two months ago he wrote a letter to Judge H. W. Wolf, chairman of the Pardon and Parole Commission, asking that they be granted a parole as soon as possible.

Mariott pointed out the fact that none of the three were of the criminal type, but had been victims of their own weakness and that he believed all of them had learned their lesson. Since starting in prison the three men have been doing clerical work at the penitentiary.

Despite his weakness and misdoing Marvin has many friends in Plymouth who will be glad to know that he is to get an early release.

Lexington who will also journey to Carey for the sectional tournament defeated a much favored Madison aggregation 39 to 29, and turned back a good Lucas team 41 to 27. Lucas won the consolation tournament with a 51 to 28 decision over Ontario.

Belleville has previously defeated a pre-tourney favorite, Butler, in a thrilling 39 to 35 victory. The tournament, which is in charge of E. L. Bailey, was well attended. Wednesday night a crowd of 1500 jammed the Mansfield High Gym. to set an all-time tournament record.

REFUSE SLASH IN POWER RATE

Norwalk, Feb. 29—

Firelands Electric Cooperative Inc., a local REA unit with a rate of 1 1/2 cent a kilowatt from the Norwalk city power system, has asked for a reduced figure thru Milton Wilhelm of Monteville, construction superintendent of the company. Wilhelm said the Ohio Public Service Co. has offered a lower rate.

Councilman C. H. Hill, who acted as spokesman for the council, said it was against the policy of the city to make an effort to knock out far beyond the city limits to serve power patrons and predicted that the city would not reduce the rate, which he said was the lowest possible figure that could be offered. Hill declared that rates for city customers will be cut before reductions for outsiders will be considered.

Council has appropriated from the light fund \$40,000 to buy piping and combustion elements for the 583 horse power boiler to be erected soon at the city power plant. The total boiler and assembly will cost \$130,000 reports M. G. Irvin city light plant superintendent.

LOCAL LIBRARY CAN GIVE ALL NECESSARY INFORMATION ABOUT CONFUCIUS.

Confucius may say a great number of things today, but what can YOU say about Confucius?

Well, he was a man, now let me think—anyway he was born about the year . . . oh, yes, and he was important because . . . now, I have heard SOMETHING about him, but it seems to have slipped my mind, now isn't that strange!

The majority of U. S. A. citizens know a lot of what Confucius is saying TODAY, but the same man lived today for his nation's sake. He was not one of Stalin's stooges.

In place of saying smartly, "Confucius says—" why don't you find out what Confucius said, and who he really was, by looking on page 168, Volume One—Ancient, of the World's Great Events, at the Plymouth Library. For Confucius WAS one of the world's great events.

It is rather odd that he should appear in news items in every one's mind today for his nation's sake. He was not one of Stalin's stooges. He was not one of Stalin's stooges.

This wise little man might well appear today, and so he has.

The library also has a volume which gives many of the true sayings of the Chinese sage. Harvard classics, Sacred writings I. Introduction and several pages beginning with page 5. VERY interesting; and how intelligent you will feel when you can tell something that Confucius DID say.

And also on the subject of China is "China Fights for Her Life," by Ekins and Wright. On the Japanese line is "Children of the Rising Sun."

NOT A REVIEW

OSBORN WELLS, HELEN HAYES
IN "BROOME STAGES"
A few Sunday evenings ago Orson (Marsman) Wells and Helen Hayes interpreted by radio drama a part of "Broome Stages." For me this bit of play activity brought to life the strong personalities of

Clemence Dane's book, and I read the entire volume through again, and was every bit as interested as during the first reading, several years back.

Those of you who were fortunate enough to be listening to the radio dramatization of "Broome Stages" should without fail read the entire story of the stages and lives dominated by the Broome family on a small island. Only a small part of the chronicle was given as this book can not easily be adapted to radio or screen although it concerns a theatre stage which we in America are not acquainted with today.

The Barrymore family is the nearest counterpart to the theatre stage which we know here, to the dynasty begun by young Richard Broome who got himself a name by crying, "Buy a broom!"

"Broome Stages" is concerned with the strong personalities of a family as is the "Jalna" series, but the Broomes are by far the most interesting and dominant. We feel as Helen Hayes did at the conclusion of the Wells broadcast, "Oh, but there MUST have been a Donna Broome!"

After reading this book and the next suggested, "The Forsyte Saga" of John Galsworthy, which deals with English personalities and family trees, we can easily see what the political and economic enemies of Great Britain are up against. After meeting the Broomes and the Forsytes you must have a respect for the British mind that forges on and on and that keeps a tenacious grip, a passionate grip, on its possessions and standing.

And you can also see the antagonism that is aroused by just such a mind.

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Even this was not enough. The Forsyte family got out of the hands of Galsworthy and became the property of the English reading public and bridged the Atlantic in one bound. Other members of the family besides Soames Forsyte became very important and readers wanted to know all about their lives and minds too.

Two more groups of novels were written about this amazing family. The White Monkey, The Silver Spoon, and Swan Song make the "Modern Comedy" trilogy; while the last group is combined into "End of the Chapter" and are titled individually: "Maid in Waiting," "Flowering Will," and "One More River."

And End of the Chapter it needs must be for the pen of Galsworthy no longer writes. But you owe it to yourself to get acquainted with the Forsyte family

and their stories, nine in all, each one complete in itself.

So real is the most important man, Soames Forsyte, that he once wrote to Galsworthy that he had "met Soames face to face on a London Street."

NEWS AND FICTION
To follow the political news in the dailies and look up the geography of the world today is well enough, but it is also good to find out about the people themselves and their personalities and their outlook. Thus we can do by reading such dependable fiction as Broome Stages and Forsyte Saga. Be sure to read the preface of the Forsyte story.

TRANSLATION
With the northern countries of Europe coming more and more into prominence in the news of today, "Growth of the Soil" of Knut Hamsun, and translated by W. W. Worster, makes interesting reading. The first three pages are worth taking the book home for a moment, but the story concerns itself with the Norwegian man Izak, risen in "elemental strength and simplicity" who remains stolidly bewildered but firm while all the other characters weave and rock about him in the hold of passion or ambition.

At the end of the story you are given back into the quietude of evening on the farmland and woodland.

"TIGERS" LOSE IN TOURNAMENT

Farmers to Operate New Barn Equipment Plat at Alliance

The new lines to be manufactured by the regional cooperative, which represent new developments in the organization's services, will include a full line of paints, stanchions, stalls, ventilators, and metal hog feeders.

H. W. Smoots, general manager of United Cooperatives, represented the organization at a recent conference in Alliance at which arrangements were completed for the new plant. Mr. Smoots, a native of Licking County, Ohio, was on the staff of the Ohio Farm Bureau for ten years, and early last year he left the position now occupied by Mr. Bennett to assume the management of United Co-ops.

The SNAPSHOT GUILD

PICTURE YOUR PETS



A flash bulb, fired just as the photographer aroused the dog from sleep, captured this picture. The camera is first set for "time" and the shutter opened.

FEW albums contain enough pictures of the family pet—the dog, kitten, parrot, or whatever animal companion you have. However, with a little patience and strategy, such shots are not difficult to get—and they certainly add interest and variety to your picture collection.

For a good picture of the pet, you need a large image—and here is where the portrait attachment comes in. Slip one of these on the camera lens, and you can take pictures with a box camera as near as a foot to the subject. Even nearer if you use a focusing model and you use the attachment.

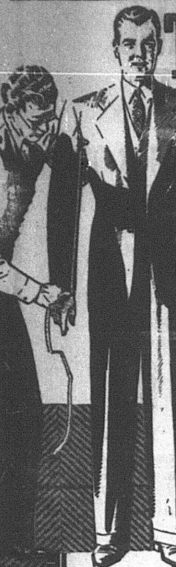
Naturally, you'll pick a moment when the pet is quiet. Bait is helpful. For example, a saucer of milk to tempt the cat. Put the milk in the chosen spot, under your picture lights—place the camera exactly the right distance away from the saucer—and as soon as the pet snatches the bait, you're ready to shoot. For shots with photo bulbs, the "food" type, load the camera with high speed film.

Flash bulbs are often a help in shooting pet pictures. The picture above is a "flash shot." First, the camera was placed just the right distance from the dog, while he slept under the kitchen stove. The shutter was set for a "time" exposure. Then the photographer turned off the kitchen lights—opened the camera shutter—made a loud noise to awaken the dog. Then it was necessary merely to close the shutter and wind the film for the next shot.

Thus, you see, you don't have to have a synchronizer for flash shots, although it's a convenient device. Indeed, you can use the flash bulb on any electric socket. Make sure, of course, that the light switch is in the "off" position before you insert the bulb. For flash pictures, either chrome film or high speed film can be used, but you must have the light at the right distance from the subject.

Pets are excellent subjects for indoor shots—and it would be fun, this winter, to make a collection of pictures showing your pet's antics and activities. No two pictures will be alike—and their interest never wanes. Try it and see.

FIVE PLANETS PLAINLY SEEN IN WESTERN SKY
Star-gazers have been witnessing an astronomical sight which may not be duplicated in the 20th century, and will end this February, according to Dr. Everett L. Yowell, director of the University of Cincinnati observatory.

Five major planets—Venus, Jupiter, Saturn, Mars and Mercury—have been visible to the naked eye in the evening, and was quite prominent Sunday evening in the western sky. Venus is the first to be seen shortly after sunset, then Jupiter appears and a little later, Saturn and Mars, and Mercury follows the other planets about February 20, and is low down in the west.

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that the Government will insist upon the proof of one's declaration of age before insurance payments are made. The law provides that monthly payments may be made to workers who have reached the age of 65 if they qualify, but Mr. Mish asserted, it will accept no loose statements as to age.

Similarly, the age of a worker's wife or widow or of his children must be proved before they can receive any of the supplementary benefits provided under the revised Social Security Act.

"But a claimant will be given every opportunity," said Mr. Mish, "to supply the required proof. The applicant probably will be asked if he has a birth certificate. As a matter of fact, birth certificates of persons now 65 years old or more are comparatively scarce. In only eight States and the District of Colum-

bia had the practice of keeping birth certificates been adopted before 1874. The District of Columbia began keeping of such records in 1874; Florida in 1885; Massachusetts in 1890; Michigan in 1897; New Hampshire in 1840; New Jersey in 1846; Rhode Island in 1853; Vermont in 1857; and Virginia in 1853."

The keeping of birth records in Ohio, Mr. Mish said, was begun in 1908.

Mr. Mish added that in the event an applicant is unable to produce a birth certificate or a church record, such as the baptismal record, he may submit the statement of the doctor or midwife with personal knowledge of his birth. But recognizing that this type of evidence would, in most cases, be as unavailable to a man of 65 as a birth certificate or a baptismal record, the Board's representative will suggest that he turn to the old family Bible.

He may find there, inscribed on one of those ornately coverd pages designed for the recording of family records, the date and place of his birth.

"If, however, it becomes evident the claimant cannot produce a birth certificate, a church record or similar documents," Mr. Mish added, "he may submit the statements of two other persons who have personal knowledge that he was born on a certain date, but since such persons will be even older than the claimant, the obtaining of this evidence is admittedly difficult. If it cannot be produced, the Board will open the way to the representation of a miscellaneous lot of evidence, which, when viewed as a whole, may be regarded as sufficient. This type of evidence will include public documents of varying nature, such as a man's army discharge, school records, or marriage certificates."
