Thirteen children of school age and one of pre-school age have been quarantined with the disease in the last month. The last case among the school age children was reported last Monday and that of another child, two years old, Saturday.

It is believed that the epidemic has been halted by closing of school and the quarantining of all homes where scarlet fever has been reported, Creelius said.

LEGAL ADS

RESOLUTIONS—
BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Trustees of Public Affairs of the Village of Plymouth, Ohio.

Section 1—That from and after Feb. 1st, 1940 the following rules shall govern the sale of water and electricity within the village.

A—The practice of furnishing water to tenants shall be discontinued and water service will only be furnished tenant properties upon application of the owner or owners of said property and all water consumed upon said premises shall govern the sale of water to the owner or owners thereof.

B—That Tenant consumers of electricity shall be required to deposit with the Clerk of this Board the sum of Five (\$5.00) Dollars in the event the electric current is used within a residence and the sum up to Twenty-Five (\$25.00) Dollars in the event same is used by a business establishment.

C—As an alternative for making the deposit in rule "B" any consumer of electricity furnished by this board may furnish a good and sufficient bond signed by the owner or owners of real property located within the corporate limits of the village of Plymouth as a guarantee of said account.

D—All applications for water service shall be made to the clerk of this board and all applications for electric service and deposits or bonds shall be made to said clerk, who shall have authority to approve the bond submitted and order the Superintendent of water and light service to immediately provide such service.

E—All Bills not until last payment date—5 per cent penalty charged thereafter. Service will be discontinued 30 days after last payment date.

Section 2—That all resolutions, rules or regulations now in force providing for water or light service be and the same are hereby abrogated.

Section 3—This resolution shall take effect immediately upon its passage according to law and the clerk is hereby ordered to provide for the publication of this resolution in the "Plymouth Advertiser" for a period of two weeks.

ORDINANCE NO. 28

An Ordinance to fix the salary of the Superintendent of Water Works and Electric Light Plants.

Be it Ordained by the Council of the Village of Plymouth as follows:

Sec. 1. THAT, WHEREAS, the Board of Public Affairs has established the position of Assistant Superintendent of the water and electric Light plants and fixed his salary at One Hundred and twenty-five (\$125.00) Dollars per month; and Whereas, it is the

opinion of the council that the duty of fixing salaries for employees of the village is within the jurisdiction of the council only, therefore

Section 2—Be it further ordained that the salary of the assistant superintendent of the water and electric light plants be and the same is hereby fixed at One Hundred and twenty-five (\$125.00) per month payable monthly.

Section 3—It is further ordained that all ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent herewith, be and the same are hereby repealed.

Section 4—This Ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after passage and publication according to law.

ORDINANCE NO. 29

An Ordinance to fix the salary of the Superintendent of the Water Works and Electric Light Plants.

Be it Ordained by the Council of the Village of Plymouth as follows:

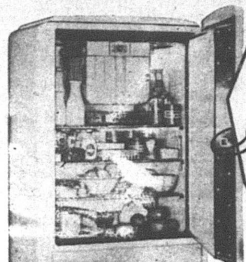
