The opening of maple sugar camps in this section awaits only continued thawing weather to start the flow of sap.

Often the camps are opened by the middle of February and many gallons of syrup are made by this time. Freezing weather at night and thawing in the day time for an extended period means a good maple syrup season. For the past few years, maple syrup has been bringing a good price on the market.

This section of Ohio produces a fine quality of maple syrup but so many trees have died or been cut off that sugar bushes are not as large as in past years.

State law requires the consistency basis of maple syrup to be eleven pounds of syrup to the gallon of sap. Maple sugar runs seven pounds to the gallon.
