



"The Seven Last Words of Christ" To Be Presented Sunday Evening By Combined Choirs of Plymouth

"The Seven Last Words of Christ" by Th. DuBois will be given by the Combined Choir at the Combined Service in the High School Auditorium this Sunday evening at 8 p. m.

The work by DuBois is considered one of the outstanding Lenten Cantatas and is very widely used. This Cantata was presented throughout the Mid-West by the Choir of Wittenberg College in the past few weeks and is being given in Mansfield at the Presbyterian Church on Friday evening.

The Choirs of the Methodist, Presbyterian, and Lutheran Churches are joining with the High School Chorus in giving this Cantata under the direction

of Mr. R. Byron Griest, director of music in the Plymouth Schools. Mr. Griest was accompanist for the Wittenberg College Choir in presenting this Cantata for some years and is well fitted to direct it.

The solo parts for soprano will be sung by Mrs. Richard Hampton while Mr. John F. Root and Rev. Richard Wolf will sing the tenor and baritone solo parts.

Mrs. Willard Ross will accompany the Choir at the piano and Mrs. D. W. Eisel, Sr. at the organ. An Eisel organ will be used for the Cantata, supplied by the kindness of the Jones Furniture Company of Mansfield who are donating the use of the organ for the evening.

NATIVE OF PLYMOUTH DIES
AT HOME IN SAN DIEGO.

Word has been received of the death of Mr. Clem Butler of San Diego, Cal. He is a brother of Mrs. Nellie Randall and an uncle of the late Mrs. Ida Hosler.

Mr. Butler was born in Plymouth on Bell Street, in the house now owned by his nieces the Hanck Sisters.

When he was fourteen years of age he went to Willard to be the first telegraph operator. There were two farm houses there at that time. When asked what name to give the station, he suggested Chicago Junction, a name which remained many years. The following year the first hotel was built and houses sprung up.

Mr. Butler progressed in the art of telegraphy until he became chief dispatcher at Pittsburgh, Pa. When his health failed he was compelled to move west to a more favorable climate. His first stop was Colorado Springs where his children are buried. Later he moved to San Diego. The remains will be brought to Colorado Springs to be interred on the family lot. His wife preceded him in death six years ago.

MOON SHOWS OFF —

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ALFALFA AND CLOVER MAKE GOOD TEAM

Farmers who want the largest amount of high-grade legume hay regularly year after year will do better to use both alfalfa and red clover in the hay mixture than to try to decide which is best, advises C. J. Willard, Associate Agronomist of the Ohio Agricultural Experiment Station.

Alfalfa is usually credited with yielding more than red clover, but at Columbus in 1938, red clover yielded nearly two tons per acre at the first cutting, when alfalfa made only 2 tons. This difference has occurred in wet seasons generally. On the other hand, in 1939 alfalfa made over two and one half tons and red clover less than two tons. In seasons drier than 1938 the alfalfa has been even greater.

There are, furthermore, corresponding differences in obtaining a stand of the two crops. Alfalfa is more likely to make a stand in dry seasons than red clover, whereas red clover is more likely to make a stand in wet seasons than alfalfa.

There is no possible way to know what kind of season to expect next year, or even later this spring, when legume seedlings will be made, but a good way to be prepared for either kind of season is to sow both alfalfa and clover in mixture. Any soil that will grow really good red clover will grow some alfalfa, and alfalfa can be used in mixtures on soils that are not limited sufficiently to be safe for alfalfa alone. Lime is needed for good crop of either on a large proportion of the soils in the state.

Does this mixture work out in practice? It does. In experiments on twelve different experimental farms in all sections of the State, a mixture of alfalfa, clover, and timothy has outyielded both alfalfa and timothy and clover and timothy, as well as alfalfa alone, for the past four years. A great number of farmers in all parts of the State are using the same mixture.

A combination which has been found reliable by Experiment Station Agronomists and farmers of Huron County is alfalfa 4 to 6 pounds per acre, red clover 4 pounds, alsike clover 2 pounds, where desired, and timothy 3 pounds in the fall or 6 pounds in the spring.

PHEASANTS RELEASED

A total of 125 mature pheasants, 70 percent of which were cocks, were released last week in Huron County by Game Protector, Joe Walker and Game Management Agent, Dan Atzenhoefer, assisted by Jerry Monahan of the Ohio Wildlife Research Station, Ohio State University. The pheasants, which were supplied by the Ohio Div. of Conservation and Natural Resources, came from the State Game Farm at Urbana, Ohio.

A total of forty-four different pheasants were made in the county of which each township received some birds. An attempt was made to release the pheasants where there was an unbalanced sex ratio and in an area where cover conditions and food supply were sufficient to warrant survival of the birds.

Huron County Dairymen To Hold Banquet

Dairymen of Huron County are making plans for a banquet to be held Tuesday evening, March 26. Among the speakers will be Jack Nisbet, at present Executive Secretary of the Ohio Dairy Products Association. Mr. Nisbet was at one time engaged in Dairy Husbandry work at the University of Wisconsin and Kansas State College. He also spent about ten years as Associate Editor of Hoards Dairymen during which time he became well known to Ohio dairy producers.

Emergency Crop and Feed Loans Now Available for 1940

Emergency crop and feed loans for 1940 are now available to the farmers in Huron County, and applications for these loans are now being received at the County Agent's Office.

These loans will be made, as in the past, only to farmers whose cash requirements are small and who cannot obtain a loan from any other source, including production credit associations, banks or other private concerns or individuals.

As in former years, the money loaned will be limited to the applicant's necessary cash needs in preparing and cultivating his 1940 crops or in purchasing or producing feed for his livestock. Borrowers who obtain loans for the production of cash crops are required to give as security a first lien on the crop financed, or, in the case of loans for the purchase or production of feed for livestock, a first lien on the livestock to be fed.

TEMPTING MENUS

Something New For Lent

Interest and variety are to be featured in Lenten menus this year. Fortunately there are countless methods of preparing and serving the various meat substitutes which are available. Meals can be prepared easily, attractively, and still remain well balanced.

The most important meat substitutes are eggs, fish, cheese, nuts, and vegetables which are rich in protein, such as peas and beans. As well as offering a complete source of protein, these foods also contain other valuable food substances found in meat.

As the week of February 5 through February 17 is National Canned Salmon Week, it would be very appropriate to start the Lenten season with Southern Salmon Cutlets.

Southern Salmon Cutlets
1 lb. canned salmon
1 1/2 tsp. salt
1 tsp. white pepper
1 tsp. dry mustard
1 Tbsp. lemon juice
2 Tbsp. Worcestershire sauce
1 egg yolk
1/4 C. mayonnaise dressing
1 Tbsp. green pepper, chopped
1 C. cracker crumbs
1 egg, slightly beaten

Blend flaked salmon, seasonings, egg yolk, mayonnaise, green pepper and 1/4 C. of the cracker crumbs. Form into cakes. Dip egg in beaten egg, then in cracker crumbs. Fry in hot fat until golden brown. (If deep fat is used fry at 375 degrees.)

A menu such as the following could be built around these cutlets:

Southern Salmon Cutlets
Harvard Beets Mashed Potatoes
Head Lettuce with Thousand Island Dressing
Lemon Bavarian Cream
Dutch Dish of Vegetables is as interesting to prepare as it is to eat:

Dutch Dish of Vegetables
2 small onions, chopped
1 No. 2 can tomatoes
3 eggs, beaten
1/2 tsp. baking powder
1 lb. cheese
Seasonings

Fry onions in butter, add tomatoes (strained). Let come to a boil then add grated cheese. Roll cheese has melted, add well-beaten eggs, baking powder and seasonings. Scramble until golden and serve hot on slices of toast.

Eggs with a new environment are featured in the last dish:

Biscuit Ring With Creamed Eggs
1 recipe biscuit dough
1 1/2 C. milk
4 Tbsp. flour
1 tsp. salt
1 C. butter
6 hard-cooked eggs

Roll out biscuit dough very thin. Brush with melted butter and sprinkle with grated cheese. Roll as for jelly roll. Place in heavily buttered ring mold. Be very careful to fill the two ends of mold. Bake for 25 minutes in oven at 425 degrees. Place on platter and fill with creamed eggs.

Scald milk in double boiler. Blend butter, flour and salt into a fluffy mixture. Add to scalded milk. Cook until thickened. Add sliced hard-cooked eggs to sauce. "Another filling for this biscuit ring might be creamed salmon and tiny lima beans or you might like creamed tuna fish. These are both delicious Lenten fillings."
