

ASSIST TWP. WITH ROADS

PLYMOUTH TOWNSHIP TO
BUILD AND FIX 15 MILES.

Richland county commissioners and County Engineer Howard C. Sward have agreed to help the county's township build and repair 15 miles of new construction, during the rest of 1940.

Sward announced the construction plans following conferences last week with the trustees from the county's 18 townships at the courthouse. Only Jefferson and Perry townships requested no help from the county.

The townships and the mileage they intend to build and fix are: Bloomington, 2.30 miles; Sharon, 4.15; Jackson, 3.10; Wells, 2.10; Madison, 3.20; Mifflin, 2.60; Worthington, 3.60; Troy, 1.60; Plymouth, 1.50; Franklin, 1.15; Sandusky, 1; Washington, .85; and Erie and Piquette, .70 each; Cass, .42 and Monroe, .35.

DIES SUDDENLY FATHERS TO BEHISTS TO DAUGHTERS FRI.

MRS. MARY ERVIN OF MANSFIELD PASSES AWAY SUDDENLY; BURIAL HERE ON TUESDAY.

Mrs. Mary Margaret Ervin, 50, former Plymouth resident, died suddenly Saturday night at 10 o'clock after suffering a cerebral hemorrhage at 5:30. Mrs. Ervin was shopping in downtown Mansfield and near the Huron drug store, she was overcome. Emergency applications failed to make her regain consciousness and she was removed to the Mansfield General Hospital where death came at 10 o'clock.

The deceased was born in Bellville, Ohio and made her home there until her marriage to G. W. Ervin. She resided in Shelby until 1926 and then the family moved to Plymouth where she made her home until 1931.

For the past three years Mrs. Ervin had been keeping house at the home of A. E. Pugh near Mansfield.

Mrs. Ervin was a member of the Plymouth Methodist Church and during her residence here she made a host of friends who regret to learn of her sudden passing.

She was preceded in death by her husband, G. W. Ervin, one daughter, Martha Esther, and one son, Harold. Reginald Ervin, the only surviving member of the immediate family, graduated from Plymouth High School in 1930 and is now residing in Akron. Don Castor of Bellville, a half brother also survives.

Deadline Near For Auto Tags

CARS MUST HAVE 1940 LICENSE BY APRIL FIRST; WARNING ISSUED.

A survey just completed by the Ohio Bureau of Motor Vehicles reveals that 1939 automobile license plates on cars in every section of the state still outnumber the 1940 plates, which, under the law, must be on all cars April 1.

RECORD CROWD WILL OF CATHERINE TAYLOR EASER SUNDAY CONSTRUED BY COURT IN AN OPINION RENDERED TUESDAY

Judge Edgar Martin Instructs Executor To Distribute Residue of Estate in Conformity With Last Will and Testament.

An interpretation and opinion of the will and testament of the late Catherine Taylor was rendered Tuesday by Judge Edgar G. Martin of the common pleas court in Norwalk. The will had been in litigation for some time and the decision will be read with much interest by Plymouth residents.

Ida Cheesman, executrix of the last will and two codicils of Catherine Taylor, had petitioned the court in Norwalk. The bill has been amended to grant the judgment in construing the last will and testament as well as the two codicils.

"That by the second codicil dated June 9, 1937, of her will, it was the intention of said Catherine Taylor, to amend and revoke the bequest of said \$10,000 made to the Trustees of the First Presbyterian Church of Plymouth, Ohio, in the first codicil to said will and to reduce said bequest to the sum of \$10,000.

"It is, therefore, considered by the court that the plaintiff, Ida Cheesman, executrix of the last will and two codicils of said Catherine Taylor, deceased, is entitled to the residue of said will and two codicils as herein expressed."

1940 AAA FARM PLAN IS READY

The 1940 AAA "Farm Plan for Participation" must be signed for each farm separately before May 1st to qualify a farm for the Program, Willard F. Porter, Vice Chairman of the Huron County AAA committee, said recently. Allotments, maximum payments and soil building practices are shown on the "Farm Plan."

"One objective of the 'farm plan' is to encourage and assist farmers to shift from soil-depleting crops to soil conserving crops," Mr. Porter declared. Such a shift is desirable because a farmer can produce a desirable amount of food at less cost and still conserve the soil.

According to Ohio Experiment Station figures, he pointed out, corn, wheat or oats, and hay or pasture on a one-acre tract in a three year rotation produced a total of 6,300 feed units at a cost of approximately 13 cents per feed unit. The loss of top soil amounted to about 75 tons on a 10 to 12 percent slope.

A more economical plan showed that one acre in a good hay mixture of alfalfa and timothy over the three year period produced a total of 10,500 feed units at a cost of 6 of a cent per feed unit. Mr. Porter explained. Less under this rotation amounted to only 23 tons.

"This all fits into our program of soil conservation," he said. By signing the "farm plan," a farmer can share in benefits to both his farm and his income.

Flowers claims Doyle controls the majority of outstanding shares in Rotary printing, and that directors increased his salary and awarded him a \$15,000 bonus for 1938.

TEMPTING MENUS

by PAULINE SCHOFIELD

"Tricks With Cereals"

In one broad jump cereals have taken the imaginary distance between being a breakfast product and a first class, all-around food.

"Ordinarily, cereals are 'what one eats with sugar and cream in the morning,' but now they are stepping out high, wide, and handsome. They are the center of attraction in a luncheon or a dinner as well as a not-too-sweet conclusion to a meal."

Just as a starter, sample this Pineapple and Rice Custard Loaf:

- 1 C. boiled rice
- 2 C. crushed pineapple
- 1/2 C. sugar
- 4 Tbsp. flour
- 1/2 C. milk
- 2 egg yolks
- 1 tsp. almond extract
- 1 C. sifted dry bread crumbs

Drain pineapple. Mix together sugar, flour and salt in top of double boiler. Add 1/2 C. milk and egg yolks, beat well, and add remaining milk. Cook until thick in double boiler about 20 minutes, stirring occasionally. Remove from heat, add flavoring and fold in rice. Cover bottom of greased loaf pan with half the bread crumbs; pour in 1/2 the rice custard, then cover with layer of 1/2 the pineapple. Repeat layer of custard, remaining pineapple and remaining 1/2 of custard, stage with remaining bread crumbs. Bake in moderate oven at 350 degrees for 20 minutes. Let cool 10 to 15 minutes before unmolding. Slice and serve with Pineapple Sauce.

Pineapple Sauce
Cream 4 Tbsp. butter and 4 Tbsp. brown sugar in top of double boiler. Add 1 egg, beat well. Cook over boiling water, add 1 C. pineapple juice slowly while stirring. Add 1/2 tsp. almond extract. Taste from heat; beat well with rotary beater. Serves 8.

Substitute Puffed Corn Brittle for chocolate at Johnny's next party:

- 1 C. sugar
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1 C. peanut butter
- 1 C. puffed flake cereal

Melt sugar in a saucepan over a moderate fire, stirring constantly until a rich brown stage is reached. Add nuts, cereal and salt; stir together and turn out immediately on a buttered pan. When cold, break into pieces.

Let's not forget the other cereal products as noodles, spaghetti, and lasagna. They are, of course, more common, but often-times overlooked in this food classification. Perhaps, though, you've never heard of this one as it's founded on a more unusual base.

Hominy Ring With Meat Filling

- 1 No. 1 can hominy
- 2 Tbsp. chopped onion
- 2 Tbsp. butter
- 2 Tbsp. flour
- 1/2 C. milk
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1/4 tsp. pepper
- 2 eggs

Drain hominy, chop lightly and add onion. Melt butter in saucepan, add flour and stir until well blended. Add milk and cook until thick, stirring constantly before adding seasonings. Separate eggs, beat the yolks and add to milk mixture. Add hominy and cook 2 minutes longer. Beat egg whites until stiff and fold into hominy mixture. Pour into a well-greased ring mold. Set in a pan half-filled with boiling water and bake in moderate oven 350 degrees for 40 minutes until set. Fill with a filling of a well-seasoned, chopped meat or a steamed vegetable with cheese sauce. Serves 6. If your family does not care for hominy, steamed rice may be substituted in this recipe.
