Mrs. Catherine Ann Seaholts, widow of Frank C. Seaholts, died unexpectedly Sunday evening at her home on West Broadway about six o'clock. In failing health the past year, she was still able to be up and around the home; cause of death was attributed to a heart ailment.

The deceased was the daughter of Sarah A. Striebel and Christian Raish and was born May 5, 1862 in Williamsport, Pa. The family moved to this community and her childhood days were spent on a farm north of Plymouth on the New Haven road.

On Feb. 12, 1884 she was united in marriage to Frank Seaholts and to this union one son, Charles was born, who preceded his mother in death in 1937. Mr. Seaholts passed away in 1938. Since 1938, the family had resided in Plymouth, although ten years of their married life were spent in Norwalk, returning later to the farm north of Plymouth now occupied by L. Phillips and family.

Mrs. Seaholts was an active member of the Lutheran Church a member of the Eastern Stars, the Twentieth Century Circle, and the W. B. A. of Norwalk.

She is survived by her daughter-in-law, Mrs. Bertha Seaholts who resided with her, two grandsons, John and Gordon; a sister, Mrs. Ida Mittenbueher of Mansfield and a brother, George Raish of Bellevue.

Pre-School Clinic

Set For Friday, May 3

MEDICAL EXAMINATIONS
FOR NEW PUPILS SET FOR
MAY 3RD IN PLYMOUTH.

The morning of Friday, May 3rd, is the date set by the Richland County Health Department for the opening of pre-school conferences in the county. At these conferences children entering school for the first time in the fall of the year are offered a medical examination to detect physical defects. Parents' attention is directed to the defects found such that the child may be taken to the family physician for correction before school begins in the fall. In the past many of the defects have been found in teeth in which case the family dentist should be consulted. Correction of defects will promote the child's health such that loss of time from school and studies may be avoided.

Examinations are scheduled to begin in Shiloh on the morning of Friday, May 3rd and will be held in Plymouth on that same afternoon. The conferences will be in charge of the County Health Department nurses, Miss Mary Lucille Bushey and Miss Rachel Mitchell, and a Department physician. Further, all conferences will be held in the school buildings at the times and places listed in the schedule below. Approximately seven days will be required to complete the examinations in the county.

W. C. McFADDEN DIES SUDDENLY

William C. McFadden, 60, died suddenly before midnight Saturday at his home on Plymouth Street, death being due to a heart ailment. Mr. McFadden's health had been on the decline for the past two years and while his condition was not serious, he had been in such a state as to guard himself from over-exertion.

News of his passing was received with genuine shock by hundreds of his friends in the community. "Mac" as he was known almost to everyone, had been around the Square Saturday noon and was greeted in the usual way by his many acquaintances. During the early hours of the evening he complained of not "feeling so good," and suggested to his wife that a physician be called. "Mac's" disposition would not let him complain through his sales contacts, and after the doctor left his home early Saturday evening, he showed no improvement but did not become alarmed.

At bed time Mr. McFadden attempted to retire, but pain was so intense that he could not lie down. A comfortable living room chair afforded him a little comfort and it was while Mrs. McFadden seated beside him, and feeling some sewing, that "Mac" quietly dropped off to sleep shortly before midnight.

During his residence here, which began some 25 years ago, Mr. McFadden was always associated with automotive sales, and has represented various car manufacturers at different intervals during the past fifteen years. Through his sales contacts he became widely known in this vicinity.

He was a civic-minded citizen, always boosting for Plymouth, and has served on the village and township boards and on the council. He was a sportsman through and through, with hunting and fishing taking his greatest love for the outdoors. There is no doubt but what a man's disposition is somewhat determined by the things he admires, and it must have been in "Mac's" life. He was always cheery and good-natured, and there is every reason to believe that it was his love for dogs, birds, fishing and all the outdoor life afforded, that gave him a disposition few men can boast.

The deceased was born near Savannah, Ohio, Feb. 3, 1880, and moved to Plymouth 25 years ago. During his residence here he won for himself a host of friends, not only by his affable manners, but because he was a real sportsman.

The deceased is survived by his wife, Mrs. Mabel Patterson McFadden, four sisters, Mrs. Jennie Fast of Lorain; Mrs. Nellie Weedman of Wellington; Mrs. Myrtle Lewis of Lorain; and Grace Baum of Lakewood; three brothers, Byron of Massillon, Ralph of Canton, and Wayne of Sullivan, also survive.

Funeral services were held at the late home Tuesday afternoon with Rev. H. T. Wintermute, pastor of the Methodist church, officiating. Interment was made in Greenlawn cemetery with Miller-McQuate in charge of arrangements.

By the large attendance, floral offerings and expressions, it can be judged that "Mac" had a large host of acquaintances who will miss him in the community, and his absence will be noted for some time to come.

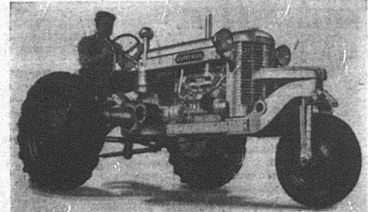

More than appropriate is the confusion included in the lines of "Tinklin' Streams of Spring;" and we can just see Mr. Caldwell with his fishing rod over his shoulder hiking across the greening up meadow—barefoot! Ah me! 'Twouldn't be bad at all at a "sleepy pool astittin' with your back again' a tree—" I believe spring fever is catching!

The blindness of man is suggested in "Romance," and suggests a mood rather than states it, but for downright good poetry and accurate description we nominate "Rural Winter Night" and "November Nights" for the honors. We have felt many a time

those "steel winds" that knife the darkness; and what could be a better picture of a shiny barn roof on a winter night than a frozen pond, heaved?

Perhaps Mr. Caldwell wouldn't mind if we printed the spring song that couldn't find a better time for the public—

TINKLIN' STREAMS OF SPRING

Oh, I love to hunt the squirrel in the leafy woods of fall

And I love to chase the rabbit when the snowflakes like a pall
Cover all the world with whiteness, yet my pulses throb and sing

When I think of goin' fishin', in the tinklin' streams of spring.

Perhaps a feller's lazy who would somehow rather be

By a sleepy pool astittin' with his back again' a tree

An' a cork aslowly bobbin' on the

waters just below

WHEAT LOSS ADJUSTMENT BEGINS SOON

Adjustment of losses on winter wheat crop reported by Huron County farmers who insured their 1940 harvest under the Federal crop-insurance program will soon begin, according to Robert E. Finlay, Chairman of the County AAA Committee.

The procedure for obtaining a crop-loss adjustment is fairly simple, Mr. Finlay said. If a farmer believes that his insured wheat crop has been damaged to the extent that he will be entitled to an indemnity, he should request an inspection of the crop.

If the inspection shows the crop to be a total, or "substantially total" loss, the farmer may immediately file a claim for an indemnity and obtain permission to put the insured acreage to other use. In the case of a total loss the grower may claim indemnity for the full insured amount. In the case of a loss which makes it useless to keep the acreage in wheat, the loss will be appraised, taking into account the potential production of the damaged crop.

When losses are not severe enough to justify using the land for other purposes, final adjustment will be made at the time of the crop is threshed and the actual yield is determined. The Chairman pointed out that where a part of the crop acreage is destroyed or severely damaged, growers may obtain an appraisal of the damaged portion in order to put such acreage to other use.

The Federal Crop Insurance Corporation has announced that wherever possible it will endeavor to follow the wishes of the grower as to the form of payment, either in cash or the cash equivalent, but has the option of paying in either where it is not feasible to comply with the grower's request.

An important improvement in the method of settling losses is the option for "Deferred settlement." If a grower wishes to postpone payment of the indemnity—as he might in time of a rising market—he may ask for a deferred settlement with the privilege of requesting payment to be made on notice at any time within 90 days. In such cases, the cash equivalent of the indemnity will be computed on the basis of the price in effect on the day the notice is received by the Corporation at its branch office.

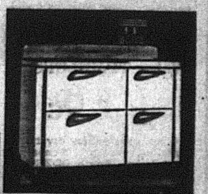
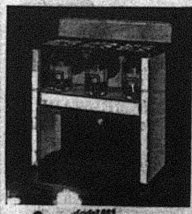

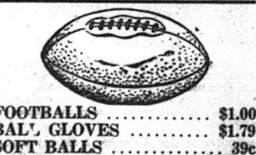
