GRADUATION OF CLASS OF 1870

MISS EVA WHITE AND MRS. NORA WYANDT WILL RECEIVE DIPLOMAS.

Graduation Day may be a bright memory for many a Plymouth High School graduate of past years, but there is no such picture for two gentle ladies of the earliest graduating class on record here.

There were three girls who completed the required studies and answered the tedious questions of the last year and then catastrophe befell the plans for a beautiful commencement. Superintendent William Gunsauli became ill and died before the arrangements could be completed. The lessons were finished, but commencement was never held.

No diplomas were signed and awarded, and no class orations were memorized in the year 1870. But this year on May 24, 1940, Miss Eva White of Ellyria and Mrs. Nora Reed Wyandt of Plymouth have been invited to become a part of the class of 1940 and receive their diplomas with the graduates. The third girl graduate, Mrs. Frank Gypson Beelman, has completed her life course and has been granted a "Well Done" by the Divine School master.

Miss White, at the age of 87 years, and Mrs. Wyandt, at the age of 89, have accepted the invitation and will have a place on the auditorium stage with the 23 seniors of this year.

Miss White for years made her home in Plymouth on West Broadway, and she is remembered as a fine neighbor and a splendid friend. Because of her health she became a member of the Ellyria Methodist home and for the past several years has lived in that city.

Mrs. Wyandt is known throughout the entire community as a woman of fine character and interesting personality and friends of this class "graduates" will be happy with them this year in their commencement plans.

Both ladies will also be honored guests at the Alumni banquet next Wednesday evening. The Alumni paper and a nationally known magazine have a come interested in this unusual situation.

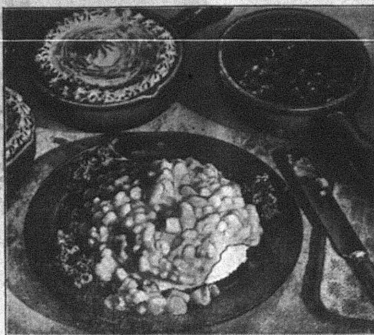

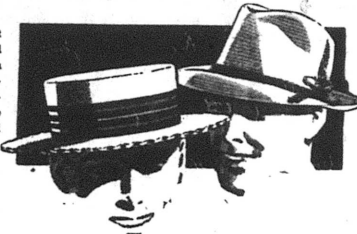

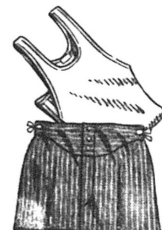
