WILLARD RESIDENT ENDS HER LIFE IN RAILROAD RESERVOIR

The body of Miss Lucy Newman, 56, Willard, was found at 6:30 Tuesday morning floating in the B. & O. Willard reservoir adjoining the Newman farm, mile and a half west of Willard.

Coroner J. D. Bradish gave a verdict of suicide. He said the woman had been dead five or six hours.

Four years ago a brother, a teacher in a Cleveland high school, returning to the home farm after a nervous breakdown, and having himself, Mr. Derr, when Miss Newman was found missing, members of the family searched the house and barn. Her brother, Phillip, mounted a horse and rode over the farm, finally discovering the body floating face down in three feet of water.

Other survivors are a brother, John, and sister, Rena, at home, and three other sisters, Mrs. William M. O'Neil, Mrs. Cora Conn of Hutchinson, Kas., and Mrs. Netta Peterson of New Mexico.

He will rush from the convention to speak at the Norwalk meeting at nine. John Wise, of Willard is the general chairman for the rally.

Former Gov. Martin L. Davey

Davey balanced the state budget every year with out new taxes and without any financial juggling.

Bricker balanced his budget by robbing the public school fund of \$6,500,000 (which he put in his general revenue fund) and by letting people go hungry.

VETOED APPROPRIATIONS

Davey vetoed over \$15,000,000 in unnecessary appropriations, in order to save money for Ohio taxpayers.

Did Bricker veto any appropriations? Not one dollar.

TAX REDUCTION

Davey gave the people of Ohio \$22,000,000 tax reductions from 1935 to 1940 inclusive. He repealed the sales tax on food, cut automobile license fees \$2,000, a year, cut farmers' truck fees \$1,000,000 a year, reduced admissable taxes from 10% to 3%, cut intangible taxes from 6% to 5%, etc., etc.

Did Bricker give any tax reductions? Not one dollar.

PUBLIC SCHOOLS

Davey gave Ohio the great public school foundation law, which reopened the closed schools and saved the school system for this state.

Bricker robbed the public school fund of \$6,500,000 in order to make a pretense of doing something for the schools.

OLD AGE PENSIONS

Davey increased old age pensions twice by executive order—the first time \$10 per month and the second time 10%.

Bricker broke all his pre-election promises to the old age pensioners, which he made in his campaign letter.

Davey promises to increase old age pensions in accordance with the new federal law, and he promises to return all the property to the old age pensioners which the state has taken from them. Davey makes good his promises.

Bricker has the power to call the legislature right now to increase old age pensions and restore the property to the old folks. But will he? Not unless he is scared into it.

LABOR ATTITUDE

Davey has been a friend of labor for many years throughout his long service in Congress and as Governor of Ohio. He produced much favorable legislation that is now on the statute books.

Bricker has slapped labor in the face at every turn of the road. He seems to be anti-labor. His handling of unemployment insurance has shown a desire to chisel the unemployed.

UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE

Davey set up the unemployment insurance department in Ohio and organized it on a business basis with one of the lowest overhead costs of any state in the United States. He did more for Conservation in 4 years than had been done in the previous quarters of a century. He kept Conservation out of politics, and appointed men who knew their jobs. He gave all sportsmen's fees to Conservation, which had been previously withheld, secured large Federal sums, and gave Ohio its only great program.

Bricker proceeded immediately to make the Bureau of Unemployment Insurance a political football. He discharged many of the most capable employees and stacked it with his own henchmen. He established an anti-labor policy in the administration of the law.

CARE OF HIGHWAYS

Davey kept the highways of Ohio cleared of snow, and covered the icy places promptly with sand or ashes. He kept the highways of this state in fine traveling condition, better than the surrounding states. The result was a sharp decline in winter accidents. He built more miles of good roads for the same money, and kept the highways repaired.

Bricker's fake economy has neglected the highways and allowed them to be piled with snow day after day. The icy places have not been protected. The result has been a tremendous increase in winter accidents. He has confined himself largely to the building of the most expensive highways and neglected the maintenance of the others.

CONSERVATION

Davey took Conservation out of politics and made the Conservation Division one of the best in the United States. He did more for Conservation in 4 years than had been done in the previous quarters of a century. He kept Conservation out of politics, and appointed men who knew their jobs. He gave all sportsmen's fees to Conservation, which had been previously withheld, secured large Federal sums, and gave Ohio its only great program.

Bricker put the Conservation Division right back in politics. He appointed a Republican politician as Conservation Commissioner. He discharged nearly all the competent, trained professional employees, and put in their places politicians who knew nothing either the science or philosophy of conservation. Bricker let Conservation back ten years. He broke all his promises to Ohio sportsmen.

DIVISION OF INSURANCE

Davey put a high-class insurance man in charge of the Division of Insurance and kept it free from politics. He raised the standard of that division so that it ranked with the best in this country.

Bricker picked a politician to run the insurance division and he has been playing politics with it ever since. He discharged many of the most capable employees, and put inexperienced politicians in their places.

CLOSED BANKS

Davey inherited closed banks with 500 million dollars of deposits, and closed-banking and loans with over 100 million deposits. He made the best record of any state in the Union, returning 84% to the depositors. The next highest state returned 70%. He finished the work of reorganizing or liquidating all but 18 of 169 closed banks, and finished with a big majority of the closed buildings and loans.

Bricker had very little of the problem left regarding closed banks. But he has been playing politics with them. One of the most conspicuous examples of this is his miserable handling of the Building and Loans in Dayton. While Bricker was Attorney General, he raided the closed banks with contributory lawyer fees, that were shocking in their amounts.

CIVIL SERVICE ATTITUDE

Davey respected the Civil Service. Laws of Ohio. In only a few cases did he discharge Civil Service employees, and only then when the employees violated the law by pernicious political activity. Davey kept in the experienced personnel of the Ohio government, in order that the departments could function efficiently and economically in the public interest.

Bricker raped the Civil Service in a more audacious manner than any Governor in Ohio's history. His record of contemptuous action against Civil Service employees is worse than all Governors of Ohio combined since the law was passed. He discharged experienced, capable employees by the thousands. The result has been gross inefficiency and waste.

PROGRESSIVE LEGISLATION

Davey passed many progressive and constructive laws for the benefit of the masses of the people. His record is the best in 20 years or more.

Bricker's legislation was largely Ripper laws, intended to get political control of all the departments of the government. He has done nothing for the farmers, nothing for labor, and almost nothing for business.

TRUTH IN PUBLIC OFFICE

Davey told the truth to the people when he was Governor. He did not resort to misrepresentation or trickery devices regarding the affairs of the state.

Bricker has been guilty of many falsehoods, especially with reference to the financial affairs of the state. In fact Bricker has been running for President ever since he was elected Governor.

STATE REVENUES

Davey had to get along on greatly reduced state revenues in 1938, because of bad business conditions. And still he balanced the budget without levying any new taxes. He met all the state's legal and moral obligations, and left a cash balance in the Treasury for his successor. Davey raised the pay of the poorly paid workers.

Bricker had \$30,000,000 more in 1939 than Davey had in 1938. He actually spent \$23,000,000 more than Davey did in 1938. In spite of the hypocritical claims, Bricker spent \$1,000,000 more for salaries and wages in 1939 than Davey spent in 1938. But still Bricker cut the wages of the poorly paid employees.

TREATMENT OF MINORITIES

Davey gave representation in the Ohio government to all the groups of this state. For the first time in history, he gave important positions to representatives of all the minority groups. He believed that all citizens are entitled to proper representation, so that all may feel "this is my government."

Bricker drove out of the state government all these representatives of the minority groups, and appointed in their places his own little clique. He has shown himself to be narrowly partisan, prejudiced to the point of bigotry, cold-blooded and high-hat.

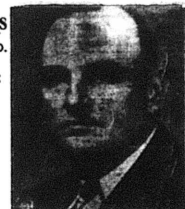

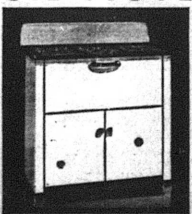
