\$2,000,000 DEBT IN 1928 TO BE PAID OFF THIS YEAR, AUD-ITOR ANNOUNCES.

When the present year of 1940 closes, Richland county will have no bonded indebtedness, for the first time in twenty-five years, The county debt, gradually reduced from more than \$2,000,000 in 1928, will be paid off at the gradual than the present that years of the year. County Auditor Norman Wolf, states.

Norman Wolf, states.

The county budget which was tentatively drafted Saturday calls for \$427,098, for the operation of the county government in 1941, approximately \$3,500 mc.

The additional levy which have been necessary for debt retirement and interest, will be dropped from the tax books, so the payment of all the indebtedness will not release any funds for operating purposes, Wolfe pointed out.

Wolfe said the slight operating woire said the slight operating increase was requested by a number of county departments and not by any one office. It was set up with the expectation that the county's income from property taxes will increase about \$10,000 in 1941.

Wolfe predicted that there would be few, if any, cuts in the county budget requests when they go before the budget commission for final approval He said department heads had co-operated with the commission in the competitive requests within the keeping their requests within the anticipated income for the year.

A request for \$256,000 for road and bridge construction and repair was submitted by the country engineer's department. That amount is the same as this year's figure, but the final budget figure any vary slightly, depending upon the state motor vehicle and gasoline tax money that is available.

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
