TRAIN KILLS WOMAN AT SHILOH CROSSING

SHILOH, O.—Another tragedy on the main street crossing of the Big Four cost the life of Mrs. Helen Johnson, shortly before 2 o'clock Monday afternoon.

Mrs. Johnson had recently purchased the property at the intersection of Main street and the railroad. She had moved her household goods from Mansfield to this place on Monday morning. After dinner Mrs. Johnson and her mother, Mrs. Margaret Duda drove to the post office, rented a box and then started for their home on High street.

A freight train was passing and several automobiles were standing in line. Mrs. Johnson, who had halted on the left side of the other cars, waited until the long freight passed and then drove on to the tracks in the path of the freight train. No. 35, going east, struck the front of the automobile completely demolishing the front part, and killed Mrs. Johnson instantly.

Mrs. Duda was able to get out of the car unscathed and walked to Dr. Butner's office. A careful examination revealed no serious injury, with the exception of severe bruises. She was then taken in the McQuate ambulance to the Willard hospital for an X-ray and the doctor's diagnosis was found to be correct. She was suffering from a fractured hip. She was later removed to Mansfield.

The body of Mrs. Johnson was badly mangled. It was taken to the McQuate funeral home and later to Wapner's in Mansfield.

Several people narrowly escaped death from the flying debris and a large stone was hurled through the window at the depot just missing agent, E. L. Cleveland.

Funeral services will be held today (Wednesday) at 2 p. m. at the Wapner home with interment in the Mansfield cemetery. Surviving are one daughter, Mary E. Johnson, her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Steve Johnson and one brother, Nicholas Duda of Mansfield.

PLYMOUTH TO HOLD SOAP BOX DERBY

The soap box derby, the classic of boyhood, will be run off in Plymouth on Tuesday evening, July 16th, according to an announcement made by Rev. Wolf.

The prizes will be donated by the local merchants and it is hoped that there will be many more than there were last year, in that heat prizes will be given as well as first, place and show prizes.

The rules of the race are essentially the same as they were last year. And these rules must be observed:

1. All cars must be designed and built by the boy racing it, although he may have the help of other boys of derby age.

2. Entrants must be between 11 and 15 years old.

3. Combined weight of car and driver must not exceed 250 lbs. and the maximum weight for the car is 150 lbs. No weight can be added such as bricks, sand, metal blocks, etc.

4. If there are enough entrants the race will be divided into two classes, A and B. A—13 to 15 years, B—11 to 12 years.

5. All entries must be in the hands of Rev. Wolf on or before Thursday, July 11.

6. All cars must be presented for inspection at 4 o'clock, Tuesday, July 16th.

If cars are to be entered either in Shelby or Mansfield they must be built in exact accordance with the rules laid down in the official rule book. Several boys in town have these rules and will share them with others.

J.C. WOODWORTH DIES SUDDENLY

CHURCH PLANS FOR ITS 100TH ANNIVERSARY

The Lutheran church will celebrate its 100th Anniversary this fall. The plans for the celebration are rapidly being completed by the Anniversary Committee, under the leadership of Mr. J. A. Root.

The date of the celebration has been set as the week of October 20th and the program will be so arranged as to take in two Sundays, October 20th and 27th and four week-day nights, October 22nd to 25th inclusive.

It is expected that on Sunday, Oct. 20th, the Rev. Herbert Veler, president of the Central Conference of the Synod of Ohio, will be the guest preacher. While on Oct. 27th, the committee hopes to have Dr. Joseph Sittler, D. D., president of the Synod of Ohio of the United Lutheran church in America, to preside for the communion service, which will close the celebration.

The week-day nights will be divided "among" Organization Night, Congregational Night, Community Night and Homecoming Night.

On each of these nights a varied program will be presented. In the meantime the congregation is making a determined effort to increase both its membership and its benevolent gifts. At present with six months gone the congregation has given just short of one hundred dollars less than the total contribution of last year, or \$334.34. If the remaining six months keep up this pace the congregation will pass the \$600 mark for the year. The communicant membership has already reached a new high with better than 250 members having received the communion thus far in 1940.

No effort or time is being spared to make this a great celebration for it is the only one of its kind in which the present generations will ever share.
