PLYMOUTH PARTY RETURNS HOME AFTER LONG TRIP

After a three weeks' vacation "doing the west," it may seem a little hard to buckle down to work again for A. D. Points, manager of the Rogers store, but he reports it one of the best trips he has ever made.

The party, which included Mr. and Mrs. A. D. Points and daughter Drusilla of Akron, and Mrs. Mabel McFadden, returned home Monday evening, having covered 7500 miles on their trip which took them to the Pacific coast and back.

The northwest is unequalled in scenic beauty and the highlight of their trip were Seattle, Wash., down the Oregon coast into California and Los Angeles, with side trips to the Rocky Mountain National Park in Colorado, which is far superior to the Yellowstone, according to Mr. Points. They also attended the Cheyenne Rodeo.

Visit Former Plymouth Boy
One of the most interesting sights to the local group was their visit to Hamilton Field, just outside of San Francisco, and where Lieutenant Elmer Parsel, son of Ben Parsel of Plymouth, is located.

Lieutenant Parsel has made rapid strides in the field of aviation and took the local group through one of Uncle Sam's latest flying fortresses. To fly one of these ships it takes four years of active service and an unbelievable amount of mechanical technique to operate. On the ship inspected by Mr. Points and his party, they saw the dashboard, which contained 110 different gadgets and gauges, some used for quadruple purposes. On their recent test run of a thousand miles to Oklahoma City, Lieut. Parsel was in command with 11 sub-pilots under him. Of his squadron of 29, only nine are capable of flying one of these bombers. Plymouth can be justly proud of her "flying son."

Mrs. Parsel is also an enthusiast and while not permitted on the government field, does her flying at the Oakland field. Another Plymouthite they looked upon was Miss Fayma Sampson, who left here several years ago with the Parsels to make California her home. She was delighted to see them and is employed in San Francisco.

Mr. Points stated the entire trip was made without any serious mishap; a burnt bearing in a wheel and a blowout being the most serious.

NO CHANGE IN LICENSE FEE

A story that seems to have been widely circulated in Ohio in recent days that a fee of \$10.00 is to be charged next year for the reservation of license plates of each series from one to fifty which are handled direct from the Bureau in Columbus was scotched today by Cylon W. Wallace, registrar of motor vehicles.

In a statement issued at Columbus, Mr. Wallace said that the Bureau of Motor Vehicles has no authority to charge more for license plates of any other kind than the fee fixed by the state legislature, and that to make a charge of any kind for reservation of plates for cars would require an act of the general assembly.

So far as he is aware, Mr. Wallace said, "It is not contemplated that any additional fee shall be charged for the issuance of reservation plates to automobile owners."

Persons who have been getting these reservation tags, he added, should follow the practice that always has prevailed and write to the Bureau of Motor Vehicles just as in the past, making their request for the tags they wish, and if they are available, will be assigned for 1941. Mr. Wallace also states that the usual license tag fee, which is based on the horsepower of the car, will prevail.

A Day By Day Trip

(Continued from Page 1)

We followed S. R. 7 to Arkadel-
phia and S. R. 67 to Prescott,
Ark. We saw much cotton. It is
in blossom and is about 36 inches
high. In this region there are very
few gardens. Every few miles
there is a cotton gin. Oak is the
main kind of tree found here.
One in a while one sees a sycam-
ore, pine, wild cherry or a will-
ow. "Use this highway called
"the Broadway of America,"
it is built up high with a very deep
ditch on each side. There are no
guard rails—only signs of warn-
ing. Near Prescott, Ark. We trav-
elled through nearly twelve
miles of woodland. We passed
through the Quachita Mountains
near Hot Springs. They are very
old highlands and a part of the
Ozark group, which were at one
time the most lofty on this con-
tinent. Near Little Rock we fol-
lowed along Hills Lake for five
miles or more. From the lake bed
scrub cypress is growing and re-
minds one of some of the South-
ern swamps. At Hot Springs we
had a view of the city and sur-
rounding territory from a 165-ft.
tower on top of Hot Springs
mountain. There are 19 beautiful
bath houses here, which are pri-
vately owned and also a free
government bath house for the
indigent. The mileage today was
351. The temperature at Lonoke
was 103.

WEDNESDAY, JULY 31:
We followed U. S. 67 from
Prescott to Texarkana and then
U. S. 71 to Shreveport, La. Here
we headed for Dallas, Texas on
U. S. 80 and travelled to Terrell.
We were in watermelon country
all day. Most of the fields of
melons are back of the road. We
saw much cotton, hay and corn.
The trees are still mostly oak
with now and then a sycamore
or a pine. The saw mill companies
burn their waste or scrap lumber
as it is made. An endless con-
veyor carries it to a pit surround-
ed by corrugated iron sheets.
We passed through Marshall,
Texas. This city is the center of
the lumber industry of the county
of Madison. There are 47 lumber

mills in this county employing
about 2500 men.

THURSDAY, AUG. 1:

Today we followed U. S. 80
from Terrell to Big Spring, Tex.
I am still learning to like to visit
Dime stores as I had to two years
ago on a similar trip. In this sec-
tion the learning is easy as these
stores are air-conditioned. The
interior of them is very beautiful.
Before leaving home we had been
used to listening to the Breakfast
Club with Don McNeal. We have
had them nearly every morning.
There are a few places where we
have been too far from any sta-
tion to get anything. We heard
about the Akron wreck on the
Kate Smith hour. At Dallas we
stopped to eat at the Greyhound
Bus Depot. At the barbecue
there we saw a lady barber. She
surely was handling that razor in
style. There were separate rest
rooms for colored and white.
Along the highway large barns
could be seen. The words, "Stock
Farms" were on the roofs. Later
on and in connection with these
farms we passed the Arlington
Downs race track. Today we saw
a new bird. It had a very long
tail and is very swift. We found
it to be what they call a Road
Runner. Cacti and sunflowers
grow along the side of the road.
There is much Mesquite around
this part of Texas and it is in-
teresting to see how it gets small-
er the farther west we travel. It
is exceedingly large around the
city of Abilene. Much of the farm
crops here are cotton and a kind
of sorghum that looks like Kaf-
fir corn. Hay is baled as it is
cured. It is either hauled away to
market or piled. These piles are
so constructed to look like barns
with roof and all. This sheds off
