NO CHANGE IN LICENSE FEE

A story that seems to have been widely circulated in Ohio in recent days that a fee of \$10,00 is to be charged next year for the reservation of license plates of each series from one to fifty which are handled direct from the Bureau in Columbus was seothed today by Cylon W. Wallace, registrar of motor vehicles. In a statement issued according to the control of the columbus was sectionable to the columbus was sent to t

registrar of motor vehicles.

In a statement issued at Columbus, Mr. Wallace said that the Bureau of Motor Vehicles has no authority to charge more for license plates of any other kind than the fee fixed by the state legislature, and that to make a charge of any kind for reservation of plates for cars would require an act of the general assembly.

So far as he is aware, Mr. Wallace said, "It is not contemplated that any additional fee shall be charged for the issuance of reservation plates to automobile owners."

Persons who have been getting these reservation tags, he added, should follow the practice that always has prevailed and write to the Bureau of Motor Vehicles furt as in the nast, making their to the Bureau of Motor Vehicles just as in the past, making their request for the tags they wish, and if they are available, will be assigned for 1941. Mr. Wallace also states that the usual license tag fee, which is based on the horsepower of the car, will pre-vail.
