SCOUT TRIP TO DETROIT TUES.

SPLENDID OPPORTUNITY TO ENJOY CRUISE ON LAKE ERIE.

The Girls Scout excursion to Detroit, Mich., on the steamer, Put-In-Bay, Tuesday, Aug. 27th, will be the last one sponsored by the steamship company from Sandusky.

An invitation is extended to others from this vicinity to accompany the girls. The boat will leave Sandusky from the Big Four dock at 8 a. m. and those going from Plymouth will leave here at 6:30 a. m. It will be a delightful cruise over the waters of Lake Erie up the Detroit river, Lake St. Clair, St. Clair river and through the famous St. Clair flats to beautiful Tashmoo Park, the city of hotels, clubs, stores and beautiful residences, built in mid-lake. This is a 250-mile cruise.

Passengers have the privilege of stopping off at Detroit until the steamer Put-In-Bay returns from Tashmoo Park, if they desire. A baseball game between Philadelphia at Detroit, is scheduled.

There will be free music and dancing throughout the cruise, tables for bridge and ocean steam chair are available.

Those making the trip will have one and one-half hours at Tashmoo Park. Picnics can be held in the grove and there is free dancing at the park and many mechanical amusement features are provided. Another feature is the Walpole Indian reservation at Tashmoo.

The expense of the trip for the Scouts, which includes their fare and evening meal, will be taken care of by funds from the organization. The noon meal can be a sack lunch provided individually. Personal incidentals must also be taken care of by the girls themselves.

The fare for those who take the trip is \$1.50 for adults and children under twelve, 75c. The Scouts will have to depend on volunteer transportation to and from Sandusky and they will appreciate any offers.

Miss Dorothy Spensler is in charge of arrangements and can be reached by phoning 1471, D. J. Ford residence. A scout meeting has been called for Monday evening, Aug. 26th, for final instructions. Stress is laid on the requirement of a written consent of parent or guardian before they can make the trip.

On the return the group will arrive in Sandusky at 12:15 a. m. Wednesday morning.

A DAY BY DAY TRIP TO THE WEST COAST AS SEEN BY J. C. MURLIN

AUG. 2:
Today we followed U. S. 80 from Big Spring to Pecos, Texas, and then U. S. 285 to Carlsbad, N. M. It was interesting to see how the vegetation, which is mostly mesquite and cactus, changed from a height of 8 to 10 feet down to about three feet. The cactus plants in this region are of two kinds, Spanish Dagger and Yucca. At Midland we were told that the city took on new life about 1925 due to a new oil field. The municipal buildings are very beautiful. They are built of yellow stone. Another oil field is located at Odessa. Near here we visited the site of a meteorite crater. Here the University of Texas is excavating and drilling test wells to locate the meteorite. It is over 200 feet under the fill and about 1100 feet wide. In about two years with the help of W. P. A. they expect to have a free state park and a university museum. On our way off the main highway back to the crater, we stopped at a drilling well and found that they drill about 4200 feet to oil pay rock. The derricks are of steel structure, and the drilling equipment is very modern with gasoline or electric power.

Huge Barbecue For 2000 To Be Feature of Farm Bureau Meeting

The largest barbecue ever to be prepared and served in the state of Ohio will be one of the features of the second annual Farm Bureau Field Day, to be held at the Ohio State Fairground on Tuesday, Sept. 17, it was announced today by James R. Moore, chairman of the general arrangements committee for the event.

Twenty prime steers and 45,000 bushels of corn are the supplies that will be required by the plans for the day. The barbecue will be completed to serve lunch to 20,000 persons during the noon hour at the rate of five a second. Mr. Moore said.

Most, if not all county Farm Bureau offices and stores, will be closed for the entire day, Tuesday, Sept. 17, and also the general offices and warehouses of the Ohio Farm Bureau and affiliates, at Columbus, Cleveland, Toledo and Cincinnati. Several thousand employees will join an estimated 20,000 members and patrons and their families for the annual achievement celebration.

Bricker's Cruelty To The Poor

Nobody in Ohio was hungrier when Martin L. Dacey was Governor, although he did insist on businesslike and humane handling of the relief problem. He pioneered the legislation to put the administration of relief back in the hands of the local officials, who knew their neighbors and can do a far better job.

Every informed person in Ohio knows two things. First, that Bricker had undisputed control of the Legislature; and second, that his attitude on relief was cruel and stubborn.

Bricker took up the policy, that Governor Dacey inaugurated, of fifty-fifty matching of State money with local funds. He made the promise that the State would furnish half the money. But he did not let the Legislature appropriate enough for the State to furnish half. In 1939, the State furnished only about thirty-seven per cent. True to form, he broke his word.

He boasted of a pay-as-you-go policy for the State (which has always been the rule) but he forced the counties and cities on a borrow-as-you-go basis.

Last fall and early winter, when thousands upon thousands of people in this State were actually hungry and cold, when little children were suffering when the sick and infirm were in distress, when local officials begged and pleaded for help, Gov-

ernor Bricker treated the matter with cold and cruel disdain. He bluntly refused to call the Legislature.

Early last winter, when thousands of wild ducks were stranded on the southern shore of Lake Erie, he sent great quantities of food for them. Perhaps that was all right. But he would not provide food for hungry people. His attitude was hard, cruel, and inhuman. The moral is that if you want to be sure to eat in Ohio, while Bricker is Governor, you would better be a duck.

In 1938, a bad business year, Dacey furnished \$2,000,000 for relief, without any new taxes. In 1939, Bricker furnished only \$10,000,000. Bricker had \$30,000,000 more State revenues in 1939, than Dacey had in 1938.

Bricker chieled on relief. He chieled on old age pensions. He chieled on unemployment insurance. He chieled on labor. He is the enemy of the common people.

Dacey was kind, considerate and helpful. He was humane. He is the friend of the common people.

Dacey stood for efficient relief administration, for every reasonable economy, but insisted on humane treatment of the needy. No one went hungry, while Dacey was Governor.

Things to Worry About Just 3,183 Years From Now

Evaston, Ill.—There's no immediate cause for alarm—but in another 3,183 years there's going to be an extra leap-year day.

Dr. Oliver J. Lee, Northwestern University astrophysicist, says it's got to be that way because the calendar-makers, from the ancient moon-readers to Pope Gregory XIII, were mixed up in their calculations.

Julius Caesar's calendar, in 46 B. C., was the first based on the time the sun takes to make from one equinox around to the same equinox, Lee says. The period was five hours and 48 minutes longer than 365 days so a leap-year day was added every fourth year.

By the 16th Century, the fact that Caesar's calendar was .0078 days too long each year had made a difference in religious observance and seasonal equinoxes, so Pope Gregory ordered a change.

Clavius, the Pope's astronomer, reduced the annual error to .00284 days by eliminating the leap-year day from century years which are not divisible by 400, as in 1900. The Gregorian calendar was put in use in 1582.

Computing the error, Dr. Lee estimates a loss of 14 minutes since 1582, and by the same percentage a full day in another 3,183 years.

He suggests the extra day be taken care of by following a leap-year day to one of the century years which normally would be deprived of one because of indivisibility by 400.

But Dr. Lee said he wouldn't be around to press his suggestion.

A Day By Day Trip

that they feed over a radius of 100 miles. They migrate to Old Mexico for the winter months. Our travelling distance for today was 305 miles.

AUGUST 3:
Today we followed U. S. 62 from Carlsbad to El Paso, Texas. We left Carlsbad about 7:30 Mountain time in order to be at the Caverns to register for the 9:30 trip through the cave. At White City, six miles from the caverns, we registered as many of the tourists do and when we returned six hours later from our trip we were able to purchase their paper listing the registered visitors by states and territories.

We had the only one from Pennsylvania who went on the

early trip. The trip through the caverns is wonderful. There is nothing like it in the world that is what they say about Mammoth Cave. We are nearly three hours going down into this cave. During this time the 558 visitors and 11 guides and nurse passed by huge columns, rocks, stalagmites, stalactites and rockeries of pure gypsum. It is thought that the cave was made many years ago by dissolving soluble substances. Then later as water dripped from the roof of the cave, the water carrying dissolved gypsum gave it up leaving the formations mentioned above. Our mileage was 184 miles.

AUGUST 4:

We followed U. S. 80 to Lordsburg, N. M., today. While we were in El Paso, we drove down town to the U. S. A. - Mexico bridge. We parked the car in a nearby park and took a taxi for an hour's tour through the city of Juarez. This is named after their revolution hero and first president. He is considered their George Washington. We visited a bull fighting ring, saw the city jail (our guide said it was air-conditioned because it has no roof), passed by the Masonic Temple, the mayor's home, the peddler's market. We visited the Guadalupe Mission during the morning services, so we had to climb the old wooden stairway. This was made of cedar logs fastened with one upright pin or log. To make the treads the logs were turned on the pin in order to make a circular stairway. This mission is over 400 years old. The beams in the ceiling are made of mahogany and are hand carved. The statuary is highly covered. Our guide was a Mexican. He was born near Mexico City and came to El Paso when he was 3 years old. His education was of three years' duration in the grades and a three months guide and fresh inspiration from every hour spent here. All exhibits will be in place the full seven days. Gather the family and come!

The merchants of Tijuana are trained in the States, many of them in Los Angeles. From El Paso we drove on to the White Sands Monument. This is a vast area of gypsum, which drifts into dunes. It is very white. There are 176,000 acres in this area. Two of the members of our party had a car ride over some of these dunes. From their long conversation it must have been equal to a roller coaster ride and a thriller

at that. We travelled onto Lordsburg, N. M. Distance on these level stretches of land is very deceiving. Lordsburg seemed but 5 miles away, when it was over 20. Our distance today was 295 miles.
