

CASS VILLAGE BOARD CUTS FUEL COSTS IN HALF AT SHILOH SCHOOL

Shiloh, Ohio — If one should have happened in the boiler room before the fall of 1936 during the cold weather they would have found an old cast iron furnace with three fire doors. This furnace also had a direct draft to the chimney. By standing in the furnace room and looking into the check draft one would be able to see black clouds of unburnt carbon and flames shooting up the chimney to the outside with no heat being retained.

At that time the board of education was conscious of this waste and the unsatisfactory method of trying to heat the building. They needed to try and better the condition.

During the summer the board instructed N. N. Ruckman, clerk of the board, to advertise for an all-steel boiler with an underfed super stoker.

On July 7, 1936, these bids were opened and a purchase was made of an Erie City Boiler and National Stoker from the Chas. Hoffman Co., Mansfield, who was the lowest bidder. The price for this boiler and stoker was \$1,621.75 complete and installed, before school was to open in the fall.

They were all anxious to see the results of this purchase and kept close watch on the heat in the rooms as well as the amount of coal used. The rooms are easily heated with this new set up, and the janitor has more time about the building doing other jobs. The building is much cleaner, being free from coal soot.

From an economy standpoint the board has made a great start.

The new heating plant is starting its fifth year and is in excellent condition. A saving so far on fuel is \$1,132.00 for the four years of use, and in two years more the plant will have paid for itself.

Should a child fail a subject no units are credited for the work done in that subject. Until all credits are equal to the above, the student shall be rated according to the schedule stated. This enables the child to have at least 12 full units before entering the senior year in high school.

ADAM BY DAY TRIP TO THE WEST COAST AS SEEN BY J. C. MURLIN

AUGUST 5: We followed U. S. 70 from Lordsburg, N. M., to Phoenix, Ariz., and then to Yuma, Ariz., by way of U. S. 80. We saw cotton in the irrigated sections. The hills were more mature than any we had seen. The type of trees here are scrub cedar, manzanita, juniper and live oak. We passed several copper mines near Miami and Globe, Ariz. It has the first cork tree planted in the U. S. Mr. Craig had a splendid collection of copper ores which he showed us. We ate dinner with them and expected to stay in Phoenix. When we arrived there we found that curios and views could be purchased at Yuma as well. It was nine o'clock and the temperature was 107, so we decided to make the drive over the desert at night. We arrived at Yuma about 2:30. We drove 481 miles today.

AUGUST 6: Today we followed U. S. 80 from Yuma to San Diego. We had about three hours more of desert before we started climbing into the mountains again. It was over 120 by the car thermometer. U. S. 8 is a new road replacing the old corduroy, parts of which can still be seen. A high tension electric line follows the route. This was the most uncomfortable part of our trip since we left Bardonia, Ky. This section is called the Sahara of the U. S. This is where Sahara scums for motion pictures are taken. The Manzanita Indian reservation is located near this highway. We saw several of them. As we neared San Diego the highway was divided and the terrain was extensively landscaped and beautified. Our mileage was 198 miles today. We selected cabins near the Ryan Aeronautical Co., and then met the sixth member of our party at the San Diego hotel. This person is Miss Ruth Paxton, a teacher in the East Cleveland schools.

AUGUST 7: Today we crossed the bay from San Diego to Coronado Beach by ferry. We followed the Silver Strand highway to Tijuana and Agua Caliente. It was much easier to go into Mexico at this point than it was at Juarez. At Caliente we saw a Federal school

—the famous race tracks and a bull fighting arena. At Tijuana we found the souvenir shops to be more reasonable than some places in the States. We had our first Mexican tamales here and they were very good. The young people in the shops here are trained in Los Angeles and can speak English as well as Spanish. One interesting young man told me that he took four years of high school in three years, and a twelve months business course in eleven months. As we were to leave Mexico, the first U. S. officer was a Mr. Goss from Indianapolis, Ohio, near Akron. We had to go through a rigid inspection because we had bought some souvenirs. This was quite interesting for the first time but I do not think you would like it many times. We stopped for the night at Seal Beach. We ate barracuda for the first time. Our mileage was but 147, too much sightseeing.

AUGUST 8: We ate breakfast at Long Beach and then drove to Wilmington where Miss Gilliland and Miss Van Cleft took the boat to Santa Catalina. The rest of the party came on to Los Angeles where Miss Brooks called on Mrs. Schott. On our way to Glendale and Temple City we drove thru the campus of the University of Southern California. The buildings are very beautiful. We saw several Ohio cars there. At Temple City we called on Lela Crall (formerly of Plymouth). We had our second mail there. Don is still in the flying service.

But above all, it should be made to help, and not starve the unemployed. Let's be a little more humane, and generous, and just.

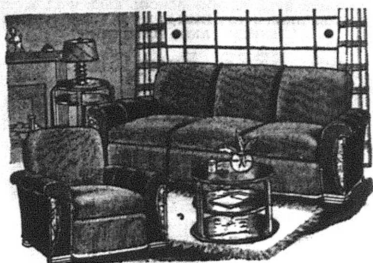

Chiseling The Unemployed Under Bricker

The Unemployment Insurance Law was passed under the Davey administration, in December 1936, to conform to the Federal law. It was intended to provide \$15 a week for those who were temporarily unemployed, through no fault of their own. Bricker chiseled them down to \$4, \$5, and \$6 a week, and sometimes as low as \$1.50 or \$2 a week. He has been inflexible.

Davey set up the vast machinery for the handling of unemployment insurance on a businesslike basis, and on the advice of insurance experts. So good was the machinery in organizing this department under Davey, that Ohio was the only State in the country that was ready to pay benefits on time.

Under Davey's administration, the employees were selected by Civil Service. The United States Social Security Board provided \$92,000,000 for the Civil Service Commission. Thousands of Ohio citizens paid their money in good faith to take these examinations. The Social Security Board supervised this. The selections were made according to law.

The first thing Bricker did was to pass a "topper" law to get immediate political control of the unemployment insurance program. He promptly fired hundreds of Civil Service employees who had a right to the position under the law, and who had the experience to do the work properly.

Their only desire is that the child will strive to keep all things as nice as they are on their first entrance to the buildings on the first day of school.

WHO MAY ENTER SCHOOL

Any child being six years of age before January 17 will be admitted to school. No deviation from this rule can be allowed. Please do not ask the teachers to do so.

NOTICE, PARENTS

There will be a card sent home for you to fill and sign. This is merely a precautionary measure for the safety of the child. Had we had such a check hereof in the state, without a doubt many serious difficulties would have been avoided.

If any of you desire your son or daughter to be excused to a stranger by the teacher, you will

please send a written notice to the school so that the teacher may check with the card as to the handwriting. Otherwise, your child may not be excused.

BUS DRIVERS CERTIFIED

Each of our bus drivers is certified in first aid work. This is demanded by the state regulations. Too much care for the safety of our children cannot be exercised. A number of our students were availing themselves of the NYA Aid last year. Materials have been received in order that we might give the worthy student the necessary aid to finance their way through the coming year. Application for this aid should be made the first week of school.

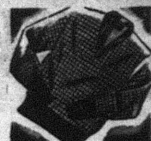
