LONG ILLNESS ENDS IN DEATH

ELZA MARTIN, RETIRED FARMER, DIED SATURDAY; SERVICES TUESDAY

WHEAT GROWERS URGED TO INSURE 1941 CROP NOW

Wheat growers in Huron county are urged by Robert E. Finlay, chairman of the county AAA committee, to get their applications for all-risks crop insurance on file at the county office as soon as possible. No application for insurance will be received this year after Aug. 31, which means that they will have to be on file and premiums paid two weeks earlier than last year.

The Aug. 31 deadline applies uniformly this year not only to winter wheat growers in Huron county, but to all winter wheat growers in every state, Mr. Finlay said. This deadline is the last possible date on which growers can get all-risk insurance on the 1941 crop since under the Federal Crop Insurance program premiums must be paid before the crop to be insured is seeded. The early deadline places all growers on the same basis, since each grower at the time of application will have equal indication of the yield the seeded acreage may produce.

This is the third successive year that all-risk insurances have been offered to Huron county wheat growers. In 1939 the 111 growers in this county who insured their crops against all unavoidable hazards, collected 387.0 bushels of indemnities. A total of 361 growers insured their 1940 crop.

Huron County Court Notes

In his annual report for the year ended July 1, to be sent to the Secretary of State, George M. Neffner, county recorder John Elmlinger, revealed that 113 real estate deeds and 625 mortgages on real estate were recorded. The average price on farm lands was \$47.63 an acre. The grand total of mortgages on real estate including complicated and mixed mortgages is \$1,802,868.01. This includes mortgages covering real estate in several counties. More than 400 real estate mortgages were cancelled. Total consideration of mortgages cancelled is \$825,688.98. During the year 381 estates were recorded. This is about three times the usual number. The high mark of 4,308 chattel mortgages was reached, covering anything from bicycles to diamond rings.

TEMPTING MENUS

"The Snack Bar"
Back into the kitchen; not to work, but to play. Tea-sipping and merry-making are not restricted to the drawing room, in fact, the best of parties are had in the kitchen. A snack bar is the 1940 edition of grandmother's work shop. As she swiftly turned out rows of pies, bread, and cakes, it was our chief delight to sneak in on some flimsy pretext and act as the official taster. Now that the kitchen is designed for such and other happy affairs, there is no necessity for a pretext, flimsy or otherwise.

Don't confine the use of the snack bar to the family's pantry raids; invite your guests out to sample the delicious delicacies and bountiful bill of fare right from the bar.

If your snack bar is in need of zip and spice, include any of these suggestions and then note the results!

Ovenized Pineapple

- 1 large pineapple
- 1 1/2 to 2 lbs. ground cooked ham
- 2 Tbsp. ground fresh pineapple
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1 tsp. ground cinnamon
- 1 Tbsp. lemon juice
- Melted butter

Cut off the top and outside skin of the pineapple. Take out the eyes. Scoop out the inside as much as possible so that only a shell remains. Combine the ham, pineapple, and seasonings, then stuff the pineapple shell. Stick whole cloves into the holes left by the eyes. Place upright in a small baking pan, add no water. Brush over with melted butter. Bake for 1 hour at 400 degrees. Serve with baked tomatoes stuffed with cooked green lima beans. Garnish with watercress.

Cool Cucumber Salad

- 1 pkg. lime gelatine
- 1 C. hot water
- 1 C. canned grapefruit
- 1 tsp. vinegar
- 1/2 C. grated cucumber
- 1/2 C. diced cucumber
- Dash of salt

Dissolve gelatine in hot water. Add grapefruit juice (drained from segments) vinegar, salt, and grated cucumber. Strain; chill until slightly thickened. Season diced cucumber with dash of salt and fold into slightly thickened lime gelatine. Turn into individual molds, chill until firm. Unmold on crisp lettuce and garnish with "pipings" of creamy mayonnaise. Serves 4 to 6.

Mint Freeze

- 3/4 C. mint jelly
- 3 egg whites
- 1 1/2 Tbsp. lemon juice
- 1 C. whipping cream
- Chocolate sauce

Add jelly a little at a time to egg whites beaten stiff. Beat well between each addition. Stir in lemon juice. Fold cream, whipped to a custard consistency, into this. Pour into freezing tray of automatic refrigerator and freeze for 3 or 4 hours. Serve with chocolate sauce. For extra special occasions serve chocolate cake.

Chocolate Sauce

- 3 1/2 sq. bitter chocolate
- 1/2 C. boiling water
- 1/4 C. sugar
- 1/2 C. white corn syrup
- 4/5 C. evaporated milk
- 2 tsp. vanilla

Put chocolate into pan in which sauce is to be cooked. Set pan over hot water to melt chocolate. Add water slowly, stirring until smooth. Then add sugar and syrup and boil until a few drops form a very soft ball in cold water or until it cooks to 234 degrees by a candy thermometer. Remove from the fire and add milk and vanilla. Serves 12.

Feeding And Bedding Livestock At The State Fair Is A Big Task

Columbus, Ohio (Special)—Hundreds of thousands of visitors who stroll through the great cat barns and the poultry building at the Ohio State Fair admire the perfect grooming of these prize exhibits without giving a thought to the municipality of details and advance preparation required.

But the management of the Fair has to think and plan for all of these things. Food, bedding and water must be provided for the thousands of cattle, sheep, swine, horses, goats and poultry. Provision must also be made for prompt disposal of refuse from the cattle barns.

It will require approximately 12,000 bales of straw, 21,000 bales of hay—timothy, alfalfa—and mixed; 1500 bushels of oats and about five carloads of middlings and bran to feed these animals. To provide sufficient water for drinking and grooming purposes,

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a complete new, overhead water distribution system is under construction in the cattle barn. A three inch main will run from the main to the stalls and wash rooms which will be equipped with one inch outlets.

TO PREPARE THOUSANDS FOR FLYING

National Aeronautics Council Plans Course Under Military, Naval and Civil Experts

THE National Aeronautics Council has just launched a movement to teach aviation to its various branches to thousands of young men and women, under the guidance of recognized experts who are officials of civilian flying services as well as ranking officers, or ex-officers, of the Army and Navy. The individual cost will be nominal—only twenty-five cents a week. The plan has in mind the many youths who are enthusiastic on the subject of becoming pilots or seeking careers in airport work or airplane manufacturing, but who cannot afford a flying school course, or who are in localities where aviation training schools are not available. It aims to present by mail the numerous preparatory steps in "ground school" work and emphasizes the point that a flying assistant must learn a great many things on the ground before being fitted to sit at the controls of a plane.

General James E. Fécet, retired, formerly Chief of Air Corps, U. S. Army, heads the Editorial Board. Captain Holden C. Richardson, for-

merly with the Bureau of Aeronautics, U. S. Navy, and who piloted the famous NC-3 in its trans-Atlantic flight in 1919, is one of the advisory experts for naval aviation. Dr. Alexander Kleim, chairman of the Engineering Department, Daniel Guggenheim School of Aeronautics, New York University, is in advisory capacity for civil aviation. Coordinating the work of these and numerous other experts, as general editor, is Don Ryan Mochler, well known in the aviation industry for the part he has played in its astounding growth. Among those who will contribute the benefit of their varied experience in the form of lectures and specialized instruction are Col. Harold E. Hartney, who was commander of the First Pursuit Group, A.E.F.; Col. Roger C. Williams, pioneer trans-Atlantic pilot; R. W. Schroeder, vice-president, United Air Lines; Dr. Jean Picard, professor of aeronautical engineering, University of Minnesota, and some sixty other aviation executives and experts.

Many enthusiasts who do not aspire to become army pilots (perhaps because of age or slight phys-

ical defects) nevertheless may find the job they would fit in the humming atmosphere of the private or commercial airport. They may get the fundamental knowledge required for airplane engineering, designing or production department personnel, or for aerial photographer, radio operator, or some forty other jobs about the flying field. More than 1,500 photographs, charts and diagrams will have to be studied by the students in the course of mastering some 1,000 lectures; likewise air photos and working maps of the twenty-four principal American airports and others. All of these, however, are to be clearly and painstakingly explained in simple phraseology, as are more than 2,000 pages of instruction text.

Aviation authorities estimate that 900,000 or more trained men and women will be absorbed by civil and government air branches in the next twelve months. Particulars may be obtained from, and applications for the course made with, the National Aeronautics Council, Instruction Department, 37 West 47th St., New York, N. Y.

Tenant Purchase For Huron County

With Huron county taking part in the Farm Security administration tenant purchase program this year, a committee of three farmers will be appointed by the Secretary of Agriculture to assist the FSA in the carrying on of the work in the county.

Paul C. Williams, county FSA supervisor, announces that two of the three committee appointments have already been received. They are: Dan W. Heyman of R. F. D. No. 2, Monroeville, and Valentine Tidwell, R. F. D. No. 1, North Fairfield. Mr. Williams states that the third appointment is expected within a short time.

One of their first duties will be to investigate applications and make recommendations to the farm security administration for approval of 40-year, three per cent loans, offered under the tenant purchase program.

Any farm tenant or farm labor family in Huron county may apply for a loan to purchase a family size farm. All applications will be investigated on the basis of character and experience of the applicant. In addition, Mrs. Williams said, farms that applicants propose to buy will be inspected for fertility, potential earning capacity and price.

Following their investigations, the committee will recommend to the FSA that approval be given to applicants when they believe will be successful. The committee's applications recommended for approval will, of course, be based partially on the loan funds available.

Trautman, chairman of the Ohio Conservation Commission; Don Waters and Walter Fry, president of the Ohio Division of the Izaak Walton League as the principal speakers.

Twenty-Four Counties Reaccredited For T. B.

Columbus O.—Since January 1, 1940, testing of cattle for Bovine Tuberculosis has been completed in 24 counties on Aug. 1, and each had been certified as meeting requirements to be reaccredited, according to Dr. Frank L. Carr, chief of the division of animal husbandry, Ohio department of agriculture.

Tuberculosis testing will get underway in five other counties—Clark, Putnam, Ottawa, Sandusky and Tuscarawas, during September, and is expected to be started in Union county during November of this year.

Counties in which work has been completed this year, and which have been certified are: Adams, Campaign, Crawford, Fairfield, Hamilton, Hancock, Hocking, Huron, Lawrence, Madison, Marion, Morgan, Mercer, Muskingum, Perry, Pickaway, Pike, Richland, Seneca, Wyandot, Washington, Williams, Fayette and Green. Jackson and Highland counties are expected to be added to this list before the end of the year.

In compliance with the 3-year requirement for testing cattle for tuberculosis, thirty additional counties will be due for this work in 1941.

STATE PARKS

PORTAGE STATE PARK

Portage Lakes, now one of Ohio's greatest amusement centers, were well known to the Indians of the State. They are of glacial origin and derive their name from the fact that they were on the portage between waters leading into Lake Erie and into the Ohio River.

Today, these lakes, just south of Akron, are under the jurisdiction of the Division of Conservation and Natural Resources of Ohio. Twelve in number, they are among sandy hills typical of the glacial debris of this area. The lakes are partially connected by a series of channels to form a chain of lakes.

The scenery around these inland waters is unusually beautiful, being a rare combination of open spaces on wooded slopes which reach to the water's edge.

Opportunities for sport and recreation are unlimited at Portage Lakes. They are well stocked with game fish and there are ample facilities for boating, bathing, picnicking and camping. Information and permits can be gotten at the State Conservation Office on Portage Drive.

Dancing pavilions, hotels and other resort attractions are numerous, while a commercially-operated golf course attracts the devotees of this fascinating game.

For those who wish to vacation out-of-doors there are sites for both tents and trailers, with facilities for group camps. Groves and tables are provided for the picnicker who enjoys cooking his outdoor meal.

In the winter the lakes, protected by hills from the sweep of heavy winds, attract thousands of skiers who enjoy manuevering over the smooth, glassy ice.
