DIES OF HEART ATTACK
ON WAY HOME.

Stricken while on the way home from a business call, Walter W. Webb, Mansfield accountant, was found dead on the lawn in front of a Rae avenue residence late Monday.

Dr. L. B. McCullough, Richland county coroner, said death was due to coronary thrombosis.

The body was found by Joan Van Tilburg, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Curtis L. Van Tilburg, 137 Rae avenue. He had been walking along the street and evidently collapsed in front of the Van Tilburg home. The Van Tilburgs summoned Mansfield police who in turn called the coroner.

Mr. Webb was born in Plymouth on Jan. 21, 1889 but had resided in Mansfield for several years, maintaining a public accountants office. In recent years he has been associated with the R. E. Moorhead Auto Sales company.

He was a member of the First Christian church of Mansfield and the Bueyrus Elks lodge. Survivors include his wife, Minnie L. Webb; a daughter, Mrs. R. E. Moorhead, both of Mansfield; a brother, Henry Webb of Plymouth, and two grandchildren.

The body was removed to the Jones Memorial home where services were held Wednesday at 3 p. m. with Rev. E. P. Hargraves officiating assisted by Rev. Henry Ford. Burial was made in Mansfield cemetery.

THE FIRST FEDERAL TAX ON AUTOS BECOMES DUE ON FEB. 1

The new Federal use tax on motor vehicles of \$5 per year, effective Feb. 1, 1942, will be handled by collectors of Internal Revenue direct with vehicle owners, and plans for collecting the levy through post offices and possibly agencies outside the government have been abandoned, according to the American Automobile Association News Review.

According to official information, collectors of Internal Revenue throughout the country are now preparing to compile lists of owners of motor vehicles and will notify them that the tax is due Feb. 1. On that date, payment of \$2.00 covering the five-month period from Feb. 1 to July 1, 1942 must be made. Then on July 1, \$5 will be due for the full fiscal year July 1, 1942, to July 1, 1943.

For payment of the use tax, a sticker will be issued by the Bureau of Internal Revenue to be attached to the motor vehicle. The sticker follows the vehicle, so when it is sold or traded, the

buyer benefits and the original owner securing a new vehicle must secure another sticker. Penalties are provided for owners permitting the use of vehicles without the revenue stickers.

This new use tax marks the first "federal registration fee" levied on motor vehicles and it is anticipated that it will raise \$160,000,000 per year.

IT'S CHRISTMAS AND NOT "XMAS"

Merchants throughout the country are adopting the policy of avoiding the use of the word "Xmas" in newspaper advertising, store displays, correspondence, and otherwise. It is urged that the word "Christmas" be used exclusively.

LATEST IN SCIENCE PRESENTED BY WELL KNOWN PHYSICIST

In the New York Times, recently was a picture of Dr. Floyd A. Firestone with the device which enables him to imitate simultaneously the singing voices of one to ten persons.

The instrument was demonstrated at a dinner of the Acoustical Society of America. This Society is a national organization of scientists engaged in the study of sound and at that meeting heard a new synthetic streamlined barber shop quartet, in which one man by merely moving his lips in utter silence, produced a combination of voices, ranging octaves above and below any human voice, all singing in a harmony that only years of training could produce.

The synthetic one man chorus was presented by Professor Firestone, University of Michigan physicist, at the annual dinner of the society at the Hotel Pennsylvania.

Professor Firestone, in the words of the program "was assisted

ed by his own troupe of highly trained electronic gadgets, in his rendition of "Songs My Mother Never Taught Me." The program included "Finlandia," "Wassail," and many variations of "Sweet Adeline."

The effect was achieved by a novel utilization of a modern electrical novachord. The instrument was attached to a loud speaker, which in turn was hooked up with a curved glass tube, hooked up in turn to an amplifier and a public loud speaker.

Professor Firestone opened his mouth wide over the glass tube and just grunted with his lips. His fingers moved nimbly over the keys of the novachord.

Out of the loud speaker on the outer end of the room came sounds of human voices, soprano, contraltos, tenors, baritones and deep basses, of ranges greater than those of the Metropolitan.

Dr. Firestone is the son of Mr. and Mrs. A. W. Firestone of this place.

LETTERS FROM BOYS IN CAMP

Dear Shiloh:

Just a line to let you know all about the Army camp where I am located at Lowry Field, Denver, Colorado.

Three years ago this still expanding post had a personnel of 250 men living in an obsolete T. B. sanitarium on 100 square miles of bombing range. Today some 10,000 men attended bombardment, photographic and clerical classes in this Army Air Corps Technical School Division. The pride of Lowry Field is the 41-250, 000 plus barracks which, if it isn't the army's most gigantic, is very close to it. Completely self-contained, the four story stucco palace, with its tile roof, houses 2,000 men. The place is a bedlam at reveille and mess time.

No fliers are trained here, just technicians in bombs and arms operable from planes, Air Corps Cameramen and lads peculiarly

adapted to handle the highly specialized paper work. The latter division recently overflew to Fort Logan, a post since civil war days, on the western side of Denver. Because of the photographic work, Denver is becoming the nation's most filmed terrain.

Big boss of the photo school is Lieut. Col. Albert Stevens, who with Capt. A. O. Anderson made the 60,613 foot stratosphere flight from Rapid City in 1934. The main bombing range where I am now a track driver and a bomb spotter is about 12 miles south-east of Denver, half way out is a bomb magazine and auxiliary field.

To cut down the noise which Denver citizens feared, bombs are either dummies or black powder semidummies which make holes just big enough to show hits. The 600 pound bombs sound like a distant thunder storm to the citizens of Denver and have't as yet dispersed the few remaining wild frong-horned antelopes living on the range.

There is very much excitement while working on the range, to

have a two or three foot rattlesnake come up alongside of you and scare you half out of your shoes. But it is so long for the snake as there is always something around to protect yourself. Well, Dear Shiloh, I will have to say so long until later as a host of wishes to all from a friend to everyone.

The band under the direction of Mr. Griest gave a concert of three numbers and played while the audience sang "America" and "The Star Spangled Banner." The program closed with the singing of "God Bless America."

MEDICAL CARE PROGRAM NOW AVAILABLE TO RURAL PEOPLE

More than 7,432 low-income farm families comprising 35,618 persons, working with the Farm Security Administration, U. S. Department of Agriculture, in Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Iowa and Missouri, are participating in a group Medical Care Program.

This information was received here this week by William B. Murray, rural rehabilitation supervisor for the Farm Security Administration in Huron county from P. G. Beck, regional director of this federal agency at Indianapolis, Ind.

The information, Mr. Murray said, was taken from a report for the fiscal year ending June 30.

The group Medical Care Program, sponsored by the FSA in cooperation with local physicians, makes medical attention more readily available to low-income rural people at a cost they can afford. The plan operates on a voluntary basis.

The Group Medical Care Program makes it possible for physicians, particularly in rural areas, to give essential medical care to needy farm families at the time it is needed. It also enables the participating families to safeguard their health and receive attention at a cost they can afford to pay.

This plan, according to Mr. Murray, has been in operation in some counties in this region for four years. It is now operating in about 800 counties throughout the United States, serving approximately 800,000 farm families.

Mr. Murray said that leading health officials generally believe
