

LOCAL PEOPLE IN CRASH

Chauncey Woodworth and Wife Are Seriously Injured; Infant Girl Fatally Hurt

An auto wreck which resulted in the serious injury of Mr. and Mrs. Chauncey Woodworth, and the death of their two and one-half year old daughter Margaret, occurred Monday evening at 8:30 o'clock on U. S. Route 224 approximately three miles east of New Haven.

The tragedy occurred when Glen Sterling, 18 year old Shelby youth, who was driving east, attempted to pass another car, and crashed head-on with the Woodworths who were driving west into New Haven. State patrolmen investigated the tragic accident stated that Sterling was driving at a high rate of speed.

Sterling told state highway patrolmen who investigated the accident that the Woodworth car

suddenly showed up after he had gotten his car halfway around the other machine he was passing. He was unable to turn his car out of the way to avoid the Woodworth automobile which was approaching from the east. Sterling was alone in his automobile.

Margaret Woodworth, the little daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Chauncey Woodworth succumbed Monday morning at 8:30 o'clock in the Willard hospital as a result of the injuries sustained in the wreck.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Woodworth are seriously injured and their condition remains very critical. The Woodworths who reside in the H. C. Martin property on the Shelby Road had been visiting

friends in Delphi and were on their way home when the accident occurred.

Woodworth received fractures in both legs and severe head cuts. Mrs. Woodworth is suffering from a fractured pelvis and broken left leg and severe head injuries and cuts. Both cars were wrecked beyond repair.

Mr. Sterling is in the Willard Hospital with a fractured right leg and severe injuries.

The baby is survived by her parents; her maternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Waters of Plymouth; and two aunts, Mrs. Clarence Reed and Mrs. C. L. Kookan both of Shelby.

Funeral arrangements for Margaret which were scheduled to be held Wednesday afternoon, have been held up pending the outcome of her parents' condition, which is said to be very critical.

She was a member of the Friendship Circle of the Methodist church and attended services regularly until ill health prevented.

Funeral services were held Sunday morning at 10 o'clock in the Geiger funeral home, New Washington. Rev. H. Wintermute, Methodist minister of Plymouth, officiated, and burial was made in the Union cemetery, New Washington.

The Methodist Church plans for a "Church Night" Program to be held at the Church Thursday, Nov. 27 beginning with a covered dish supper at 6:30. Each family is asked to bring their own table service.

Navy Opens Drive In Ohio For Recruits; Exceptional Advantages Are Offered

At the suggestion of Secretary of Navy Knox, P. W. Thomas, Editor of The Plymouth Advertiser, has been named Navy Editor, to help the Navy in giving ambitious local young men information about the opportunities the "Two-Ocean" Navy offers them for technical training and advancement as they serve their country in its emergency.

According to an announcement made public in Washington, a limited number of additional men between the ages of 17 and 50 will be given a chance, by enlistment in the Navy, to see the world, to get to the top, with big pay, in jobs which by their aptitude and as a result of examination they show themselves fitted, from among nearly 50 different trades and vocations. These include such callings as aviation machinist, dental technician, photographer, diesel engineer, radio technician, electrician, welder, storekeeper, and baker. Enlisted men may also qualify for commissions as officers.

Beginning this week, the Navy has set a limited time to accept new qualified men for training. These men will be sent to one of four Naval Training Stations and may have a chance to go to a Navy Trade School even before assignment to the fleet. During this period they will be given regular Navy pay and the Navy's free schooling is valued at hundreds of dollars.

"Never in the history of the United States has there been greater opportunity for loyal young Americans to serve their country and build their futures right now," said Secretary Knox.

In outlining the many advantages offered by enlistment in the United States Navy, Mr. Thomas, Editor of The Advertiser said: "It is possible for a bright young man to increase his pay seven times during his first enlistment and he can earn as much as \$126 a month. This monthly figure is actually worth much more when it is remembered that the man has few living expenses and is provided with the finest of medical and dental care.

You have all your food and lodging, and also your original outfit of clothing provided by Uncle Sam free," Mr. Thomas continued. "In addition there are free sports and entertainment—even to the latest Hollywood pictures. On top of this you get free travel and adventure in colorful places—a thing few civilians can afford.

"When you consider the size of this country and the fact that the Navy will select only 15,000 applicants a month from many times that number throughout the United States, the quotation 'Many are called but few are chosen,' will apply to local young men interested.

Navy men are a 'hand-picked' lot. Candidates must be men of more than average intelligence and ambition, of fine moral character and must have the written recommendation of at least two local townswomen."

As Navy Editor, Mr. Thomas has just received from Washington a supply of free illustrated booklets for all men interested in enlistment, will welcome inquiries from young men who wish to look into the new and greater opportunities the Navy now offers for training for future civilian careers as they serve their country now in its emergency.

MOCK LAND PURCHASED

DEAL IS CLOSED FOR 1400 ACRES BY STATE, FEDERAL GOVERNMENT.

Sportmen hailed as good news the report that funds have been made available for the purchase by the Ohio Division of Conservation and Natural Resources of approximately 1433.6 acres of land in Huron and Crawford counties, known as the Willard Marsh.

Conservation Commissioner Don Waters stated that he had received word from the State Controlling Board of the release of an approximate total of \$38,000 of the Ohio Division of Conservation and Natural Resources' funds to complete the transaction. He further stated—which will be pleasing to all Ohio nimrods—that as soon as it is practical to do so that the tract would be opened to the public hunting.

Under the provisions of a Pittman-Robertson project which has been set up, the tract which is in the northern duck marsh territory and is suitable habitat for not only migratory waterfowl but also pheasants, will be used as a natural propagation area.

Plans call for the elimination of drainage of that portion which can best be used for migratory waterfowl and the seeding of certain portions to provide food for migratory and non-migratory birds.

A refuge area will be established to insure the proper "seed stock" for the remainder of the area on which supervised hunting and possibly the trapping of surplus game may take place.

The purchase of the Willard Marsh land is in keeping with the Division's attempt to furnish additional hunting areas for Ohio nimrods, as well as establish areas for propagation.

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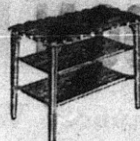

Must Teach Five Years To Obtain Contract

Teachers, to qualify for continuing (life) contracts under the new teachers' tenure law, must have taught five full school years of at least 120 full school days each. Attorney General Thomas J. Herbert ruled this week in an opinion to J. Dale McNamar, Licking county prosecutor.

The only exemption is for a teacher who had a leave of absence during the five year period to attend college.

In Licking county a vocational

agriculture teacher was employed for two years jointly by two school boards. The teacher spent a half day at each school. The past four years he has been employed full time by one of these boards. Mr. Herbert said the teacher does not qualify for the permanent contract until next year.

To the Advertiser:

A letter to many of my friends of Plymouth. I have just been transferred to the fifth armored division as a radio operator.

I got out of school on the twenty-ninth of October. I graduated with the sixth highest grade of the class. There were over three hundred to get their Diplomas. There were thirteen in the class that didn't pass. The school term lasted for twelve weeks. I can receive twenty-five words a minute and send twenty. To pass it required that you receive twelve and send eight. The company I am in now has only two radio operators in it. We will also receive a specialist rating for our work.

They are getting some new radio sets in our company and we will get plenty of work then till they get some more operators. The company when in full strength will have eighty men.

We are staying in tents. They are cold to sleep in at night and are not very water proof. We got some snow on November seventh and it is still snowing today. They are going to move the fifth division to California some time after the first of January.

My best regards to Wayne Patterson, Whitney Blackford, Louis Lynch and all of the family who have been down to see me.

Four Hundred Million Dollars To Be Distributed To Christmas Club Members Throughout U. S.

Four hundred million dollars will be distributed to more than eight million Christmas Club members by approximately five thousand banking and savings institutions and other organizations during National Prosperity Week starting Monday, December 1st, according to an estimate given out yesterday by Herbert F. Rawlin, founder and president of Christmas Club, A Corporation.

In less than two months the 1937 wage records of the Social Security Board may be considered closed. Persons who want to check their earnings in employment covered by the Social Security Act, before this time limit expires, may obtain post cards which are used to obtain these reports. Cards may be obtained by writing to Edward S. Broughton, manager of the Social Security Board field office in the Richmond Trust Building in Mansfield. There is no charge for this service except one cent for postage. If all wages earned have not been credited, the Social Security Board will undertake to find and rectify the error, according to Mr. Broughton.

R. A. Black Cows Make New Official Records

Peterborough, N. H. — Two Guernsey cows owned by Roger A. Black of Mansfield, Ohio have just finished new official records for production which entitles them to entry in the Advanced Register of The American Guernsey Cattle Club. Change for Hunters

Since the printed "digests" or pamphlets giving the hunting laws were distributed with licenses, the Ohio Conservation and Natural Resources Commission made a change in the regulations which should be noted by hunters.

Opussum and Skunk regulations now conform to the raccoon regulations and may be hunted with dog and gun from November 15 to January 15 and may be trapped from December 1 to January 15. All trapping starts on December 1.

FRUIT SCHOOL OFF

Richland and Huron county fruit growers are receiving notice that the annual Fruit Growers' School which was scheduled by Ohio State University for December 3-5 has been called off. The dates conflict with the annual meeting of the American Pomological Society to be held at that time in Michigan, which many Ohioans attend.

'BLACK WIDOWS' STUDIED
The Black widow spider is found in only thirty-two of Ohio's eighty-eight counties, according to a survey by Frank M. Semans, Youngstown College, published in the current Ohio Journal of Science at Ohio State University. Specimens were reported only in eastern and southern sections of the state, in quick-draining areas, and never more than twenty-five miles from the borders of hilly regions.

dot the shores of the United States just as the tuberculosis associations dot the cities and towns warning and guiding the people against treacherous currents and the shoals of indifference to a serious health problem," continued Dr. Dunham.

It was soon after he had begun to show his work and had earned national recognition that Dohanos, muralist and illustrator, discovered that he had tuberculosis. "In studying the 1941 Seal," said Dr. Dunham, "one cannot help feeling that Mr. Dohanos was inspired by the light of knowledge which guided him back to health, his work and a normal, happy life."

Some of the high-lights of the artist's life were projected by Dr. Dunham today. The temptation to risk his health while keeping up his work was great, but Dohanos made his decision and went to Saranac Lake, N. Y. where he underwent a period of treatment and complete rest. Less than three years from that time, Dohanos was chosen by the Treasury Art Project in Washington to do paintings in the Virgin Islands for federal buildings. Back in the United States since 1937, he has continued his work in the fine arts field, recently completing two mural projects.

From mural work to design is quite a transition for any artist but Mr. Dohanos brilliantly has portrayed the lighthouse as representative of tuberculosis prevention. With breadth and dignity and artistic excellence he depicted the winter-sweet lighthouse scene. The light itself, held in illumination, beams outward into the night, a certain beacon for those who would be guided to desired security.

That, in essence, is the message of the Christmas Seal—tiny beacons lighting the way for the unceasing fight on tuberculosis.
