

ELEVATOR HANDLES BUMPER CORN CROP FARM PRICES UP

With the biggest bumper corn crop in all history in this section The Plymouth Grain Elevator, operated by Jerry Ratcliffe, brings to a close a huge task of corn-shelling.

The Elevator this season has handled more than forty thousand bushels of corn, which is a good volume for elevators in towns much larger than Plymouth. Mr. Ratcliffe and his crew have worked nights and Sundays in order to get the corn shelled before severe winter weather sets in. At one time more than 15,000 bushels have been stored in temporary bins outside the elevator building, and after the shelling operations, the sparrows and starlings have been having the time of their lives. The birds have been so well fed without the slightest molestation, that they are becoming comparatively tame.

Burr Knaus, who operates the LaDow farm west of Plymouth, said a big portion of the corn to the local elevator. Mr. Ratcliffe

states that his elevator is enjoying a fine volume of farm trade, and that farmers in this section are receiving good incomes for their produce.

The shelled corn was shipped to dryers in Fostoria, Mansfield and Buffalo, and it was purchased by firms in these cities. With the operation of the Plymouth Grain Elevator, the community is being served with the greatest efficiency, not only in the purchase of supplies and equipment, but in the marketing of grains. Highest cash market prices are paid by the local elevator, and competitive prices are met at all times.

The closing price of corn on Wednesday was 95c per bushel, the highest here in a long time. This price is for corn on the ear. Wheat closed Wednesday at \$1.18, high \$1.20; Soy Beans, high \$1.85, and at \$1.82. This is very indicative of an upward trend in farm markets and purchasing, and should present prices prevail for the coming season, this section of Ohio should be in store for a real spring of prosperity among the farm people.

RODENT ATTACK CHILD IN CRIB

CRIES FRIGHTEN AWAY RAT BEFORE SERIOUS INJURIES INFLICTED.

Shrieking to the top of its voice, the nine-month-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Clancy Roe startled the father and mother early Sunday morning as they peacefully slept long side their child. Realizing that something had gone wrong with the youngster which occupied a crib in the same room with its parents, Mrs. Roe turned on the light which revealed her baby covered with blood, and both Mr. and Mrs. Roe were dazed to what had happened.

Sleeping peacefully in its crib, the child apparently let its right hand hang over the side of the crib. It is supposed a stray rat was in the room which attacked the youngster. SHILOH SCHOOL APPROVED FOR DEFENSE WORK; PLANS OUTLINED

COURSES WILL BE OFFERED TO STUDENTS WHO DESIRE TO TAKE UP TRAINING.

Cass Township schools have received official approval from the Federal Government for a defense shop course in the school at Shiloh. The following information is being given out to pupils who are interested in enrolling in the course.

SUBJECTS TAUGHT

The following subjects will be given: Forging, Acetylene welding, electric welding, metal lathing, and general metals.

TIME OF COURSE

The course will last eight weeks, starting on January 5. It will run from 6:30 p. m. to 10:30 p. m. on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday.

REQUIREMENTS

Any boy who has graduated from High School or who is definitely excused from attending school beyond the age of 17 years to 25 years are eligible. They must not miss more than four nights during the course if they want a training certificate.

All boys enrolling in the course must sign with the State Employment office in Mansfield. However, they need not accept a position with the office unless they so desire.

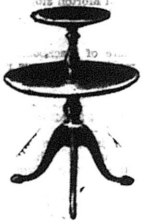

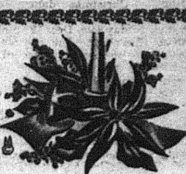

HINTS TO HOMEMAKERS

"Christmas Is Coming"

The time is coming when everyone lays aside the heaviness of spirit and joins in world-wide yuletide celebrations. But the busy housewife knows the vast amount of preparation that is necessary. If she wants to have any time for celebrating, she must have many things done ahead of time. Think how nice it would be to go to a well-stocked pantry shelf and find homemade fruit cakes, plum puddings and other Christmas delicacies.

Plum Pudding

1/2 lb. chopped fruit
1 lb. seeded raisins
1 lb. currants
1/2 lb. cut citron
1 C. sifted flour
1 1/2 tsp. salt
6 Tbsp. sugar
1 tsp. ground nutmeg
1 Tbsp. ground cinnamon
1 1/2 tsp. mace
2 eggs, separated
1/4 C. medium cream
1/2 C. orange juice
2 Tbsp. grated orange rind
3 C. fine, dried bread crumbs

Mix suet, raisins, currants, and citron with 1/2 C. C. mix. Remaining flour with 1 tsp. salt, sugar, and spices, and sift; combine with fruit mixture. Beat egg yolks until thick and lemon-colored; add cream, orange juice, orange rind, and bread crumbs, and mix well. Combine egg yolk mixture and fruit mixture. Beat egg whites until foamy, sprinkle 1/4 tsp. salt over top and beat until a point of egg white will stand upright when whip is pulled out; fold into fruit mixture until no flecks of egg white can be seen. Put batter into a greased 2 qt. mold; cover. Steam 5 hours. Serves 24.

Harvest Bread

2 C. sifted flour
4 Tbsp. baking powder
1/4 C. sugar
1/4 tsp. salt
2 eggs
1 C. milk
3 Tbsp. shortening
C. chopped nuts
1/4 C. chopped candied citron
1/4 C. currants
2 Tbsp. chopped candied cherries
2 Tbsp. chopped candied lemon peel

Sift flour, baking powder, sugar and salt together. Add the fruit and nuts. Beat eggs and combine with milk and melted shortening. Add the combined liquids to flour mixture and stir just enough to moisten the flour. Pour into well-greased loaf pan and bake in moderate oven, 375 degrees, for 1 hour. Makes one 1-lb. loaf.

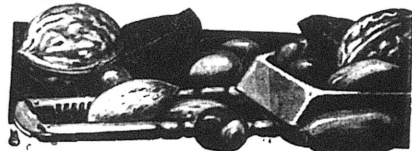

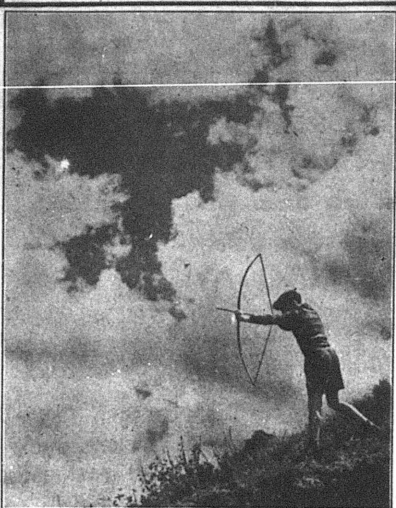

The SNAPSHOT GUILD FILTERS



Clouds make your snapshots more interesting and forceful. Here a medium yellow filter recorded this scene just about the same as it appeared to the eye.

SUMMER is the outdoor season, and the great cloud masses standing out against a deep blue sky offer one of the best opportunities for glorifying snapshots. Given two pictures of identical subjects, in which the sky appears, it is a safe wager that your attention will be held by the one showing fluffy white clouds, and not the one with an unattractive, grayish white sky.

Photographic films are very sensitive to blue and ultra-violet light, and unless the exposure is very accurate, a blue sky will be recorded in a very light tone. We can, however, be quite certain of rendering the sky in a natural tone, with the clouds showing up a brilliant white, by slipping a color filter over the lens.

Inexpensive and easy to use, the purpose of a filter is to hold back rays of certain colors, allowing others to pass through the lens to the film. A medium yellow, commonly called a "K-2" filter, is probably the most universally used, and should be the first choice of the camera-hobbyist. It records a blue sky in approximately the relative tone value as seen by the eye, and it is useful for obtaining better color tones in landscapes, beach scenes, sunsets, and many other outdoor subjects.

For more dramatic or special effects, there are, of course, other filters available. Of these, the deep yellow and light red are often used by the amateur in addition to the

medium yellow. The former, usually referred to as a "G" filter, darkens a blue sky more than the "K-2," emphasizes foreground objects, and aids in the elimination of distant haze in landscapes. The red, or "A" filter, used only with "pan" type film, darkens blue skies still more, producing heavy, dramatic cloud effects. These three filters also render objects of their respective colors lighter in tone.

All filters including the K-2, G, and A have what are known as "factors," dependent on their density and the type of film used. This merely means that the exposure must be increased by the number of the factor. For example, with a factor of two, such as the K-2, you would double the normal exposure by using the next larger lens opening—such as f/8 instead of f/11—or use 1/50 of a second instead of 1/100.

Still another handy filter that is useful under certain conditions is known as a sky filter. This is a divided filter, the top half being light yellow and the bottom half clear. The design permits filtering the sky without affecting the foreground, and no increase in exposure is required. This is especially valuable when regular or a "chrome" type film is used in cameras having simple lenses and shutters.

Every camera-hobbyist should have several filters. They're easy to use and add materially to the quality and appeal of your snapshots.

Science in The News

America's strongest defense in the present emergency is the health and well-being of her people; building a health level for the entire population higher than that enjoyed in any nation in the world, one of the major concerns of the government at this time.

At the recent National Nutrition Conference in Washington, the importance of the essential vitamins and minerals in the national diet was emphatically stressed as a defense measure.

For national defense does begin at home, where healthy and happy families are the nation's greatest safeguard for high morale during periods of stress. Today, however, America is becoming more diet-shrewd. The demand is for nutritional minerals, and hand in glove with these minerals, which are the body builders, go the vitamins, watchdogs of human well-being. According to nutritional experts, it is best to get all the essential minerals and vitamins at one and the same time, regularly. These essential minerals and vitamins are:

VITAMIN A—Helps restore resistance to infection of the respiratory tract, reduce frequency of common colds, maintain normal night vision, correct dry skin.

VITAMIN B—The "miracle" vitamin—helps correct impaired appetite and characteristic nervous and digestive disorders, relieves irritability and fatigue.

VITAMIN B₆ (G)—Helps promote normal growth, relieves certain abnormal conditions of

lips and skin—and a characteristic eye disorder.

VITAMIN C—Helps guard against tooth decay, and tender bleeding gums, promotes the health of blood vessels—hence vital to general bodily resistance.

VITAMIN D—Works with Calcium and Phosphorus to promote and maintain sound bones and teeth. Prevents rickets in children.

VITAMIN P-P (nicotinamide)—Helps guard against pellagra and associated mouth symptoms.

CALCIUM PHOSPHORUS AND IRON—Calcium and Phosphorus are necessary for sound bones and teeth, and for body fluids. Iron helps guard against nutritional anemia and is necessary for blood formation.

One of the necessities of getting these essential vitamins and minerals daily is common knowledge. It is expected that the three out of every four families now said to be suffering from deficient diets will begin to see rapid improvement in health and stamina, both physical and mental. The national spirit, important not only in the present emergency period but in the reconstruction period to follow, will sweep upward.

For the idea of glowing health as the American standard is a dramatic and appealing one. And we owe time "vims" may well become the most flattering word in the language!

Rulings Handed Down

By the Attorney Gen.

Constables are peace officers as that term is used in the new state traffic law and therefore excluded from enforcing traffic laws on state highways outside municipalities, Attorney General Thomas J. Herbert said this week in an opinion to Harold K. Bostwick, Geauga county prosecutor.

Only state highway patrolmen, sheriffs and their deputies, are empowered under the new law to enforce state traffic regulations on state routes through the country.

The Director of Education was without authority to revoke the power of a college or university to grant degrees where the institution had met the requirements of then existing law and offered instruction and granted degrees for two years prior to enactment of the present college law, July 26, 1937, Attorney General Thomas J. The question was raised in connection with Alfred Holbrook College of Manchester, O. The college was incorporated in 1933 and moved from Lebanon to Manchester in 1935. Its charter was illegally revoked by their director several months ago.

It is not necessary that a foreign corporation transact all its business in Ohio to require it to obtain a foreign corporation license. It is sufficient that it does some business here, Attorney General Thomas J. Herbert said this week in an opinion to John E. Sweeney, Secretary of State.

A holding company whose assets are pledged with an out of state trustee with all income, except an amount necessary to pay taxes and operating expenses, assigned to the trustee to pay bond interest and retirement is doing business in Ohio if the Secretary, located in Ohio transacts any corporate affairs here. This is true even though directors and officers live outside Ohio and directors meetings are held in Delaware.

Mere maintenance of a secretary's office and a small bank account in Ohio for convenience of paying clerical help would not constitute "doing business" in Ohio where the only acts done by the Secretary was keeping books. Performance of any other corporate duties requires a license. The question was raised in regard to Alleghany Corporation, a Van Sweringen Bros. holding company formed to hold Chesapeake & Ohio Railroad stock. The Secretary's office is located in Cleveland.

Historical Sketch of Plymouth Advertiser By E. K. Trauger

In the year 1851, Mr. E. H. Sanford started a newspaper named The Plymouth Journal. It was printed in the building on the triangle, called the "Peninsula," which building burned many years ago. The site of the "triangle" is now a filling station. Sanford printed and published the Journal for two years and then sold to H. M. Wooster, who, soon afterwards, sold out to Robinson & Locke.

This firm increased the efficiency of the plant and renamed the paper, "Plymouth Advertiser." They operated the plant until the year 1859, when they sold out to A. H. Balsley.

David Locke was a man of literary attainments. He married a Plymouth girl, Martha Bodine. Mr. Locke continued his newspaper work after leaving Plymouth, in Mansfield and Findlay and then went to Toledo, where he took charge of the Toledo Blade. During the Civil War he achieved considerable notoriety by his newspaper articles, written in a semi-humorous vein under the pseudonym Petrolium V. Naby.

These newspaper articles were written from an imaginary place called "Confederate Cross Roads Kentucky." These articles were printed in many of the Northern papers. He acquired a national reputation. An excellent sketch of his life appeared recently in the Advertiser.

In connection with the publication of the Advertiser, Mr. A. H. Balsley operated a book store in Plymouth. In 1864 he sold out the Advertiser to J. Mitchell Beel-

man and went to Pittsburgh. "Mitch" was in general known in Plymouth took into partnership his younger brother, J. Frank Beelman, who did the printers job for a while. The partnership continued for twelve years (until 1876) when "Mitch" sold out to Frank and went to Fremont. Frank became sole proprietor and editor until about the year 1889 when the Advertiser was taken over by George Reed who was employed in the office for a long time as a workman. Frank Beelman removed to Dayton where he became editor of the Lutheran Evangelist.

For more than thirty years the Plymouth Advertiser passed through the hands of George W. Reed. In 1884 Mr. Reed came to Plymouth from Athens, Ohio and went to work as pressman on the Advertiser, for J. Frank Beelman. The office of the Advertiser was at that time in the room over the room now occupied by Rules Clothing Store.

In 1886 Mr. Reed married Miss Rosa Derringer of Plymouth, O. Mr. Reed continued his connection with the Advertiser until his death in Sept. 1917. When Frank Beelman moved to Dayton about the year 1889 or 1890, Mr. Reed continued the Advertiser in Beelman's name for five years when he became editor and manager for the rest of his lifetime. The length of time he conducted the paper is sufficient evidence to show that his efforts were satisfactory, and the entire community felt the loss of a true friend at his sudden death.

After the death of George W. Reed, a local company was formed to finance the Advertiser, early in the year 1918. This company secured the services of Oscar A. White, a newspaper man of Mt. Gilead, Ohio, who in his younger days had been a salesman of farm implements. Mr. White did the editorial work on the Advertiser, and also the advertising for Fate-Root-Heath Co. He had advanced ideas for Plymouth which were too advanced to suit the conservative element of the town. Tower Park was one of his "inventions." He bought a property on Portner St., where he died after five years management of the Advertiser.

For three months after the death of Mr. White, Frank Stachhouse published the paper and was succeeded by W. W. Davis of Tiro for about a year. A. W. Davis of Norwalk purchased the plant and after a year he sold out to the present owners. During this time Jack Hampton edited and managed the Advertiser. Mr. and Mrs. Thomas came to Plymouth from Lima, Ohio in January 1925. They put new presses in the plant both for the printing of the Advertiser and for job work. The work done on the job presses is as good as can be found elsewhere, and the entire plant raised to a high state of efficiency.

Plymouth is fortunate, indeed, to have the untiring services of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas, in keeping the interests of Plymouth ever in mind, and it is my humble opinion that Plymouth people know this and appreciate their services and hope that they may continue with us for many years.

Mr. Thomas is a native of Dublin, Georgia, and Mrs. Thomas was born in Cleveland, Ohio.
