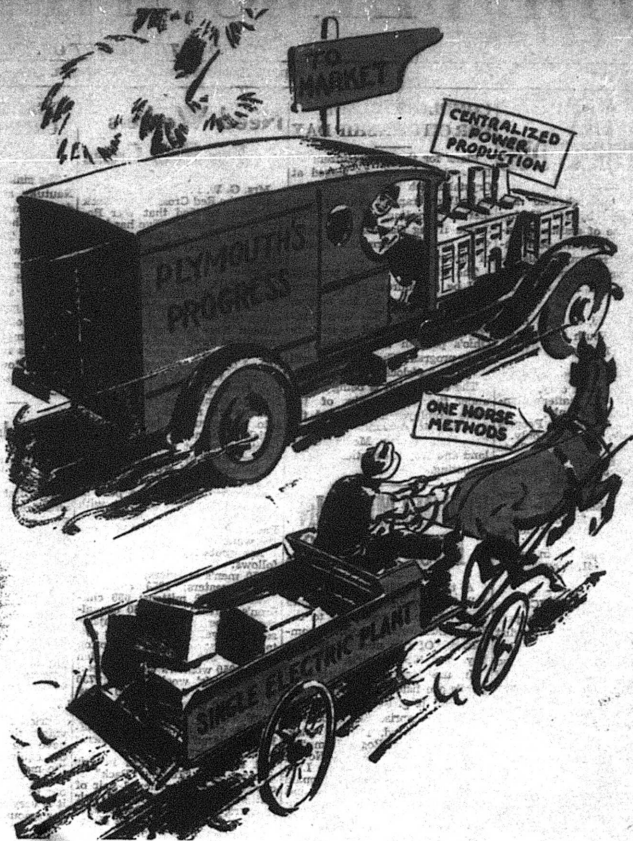

THREE VOLUNTARY RATE REDUCTIONS IN PURCHASED POWER

During the past twenty years in which The Ohio Power Company has supplied power to Plymouth at wholesale, it has made two voluntary rate reductions which have almost cut the cost of power to the Village in half (46% less).

It now offers a third reduction which will produce a saving to the Village of \$1,500 a year.

The proposed rate is much less than the cost of making power in a village electric plant.

A non-resident land surveyor is promoting a "one-horse" oil engine electric plant here that is not large enough to properly serve the present requirements of Plymouth homes and industries. Such a plant can never assure the Village an adequate, dependable power supply, such as is now being furnished by The Ohio Power Company with its plants having installed capacities of more than half a million horse-power.

With the Government's demands for defense production, industry today is moving into small towns. Many villages have doubled their population almost overnight, mainly because they had available ample electric power.

Plymouth's only industry cannot afford to handicap itself by depending on a small isolated village plant for its power supply. It cannot take a chance on having its workmen thrown out of employment by the failure of a village plant.

The Fate-Root-Heath Company is buying all of its power from The Ohio Power Company on identically the same rate schedule that is now being offered to the Village of Plymouth. This schedule will result in savings to the village of more than \$1,500 a year.

A GOOD RECORD

Regarding Mayor Johns statement that Plymouth had the 3rd highest rate in the state of Ohio prior to January of 1941. We find in checking the Federal Power Commission's report F. P. C. R. -21 "Typical Electric Bills-Ohio 1941" that Plymouth's annual consumer using 25 KWH ranked 29th from the lowest out over 1000 towns.

Further in regard to Mayor Johns' statement that the reduction in rates recently given the consumers in Plymouth is unfair because it helped the large customer instead of the small customer, I find from the above report that Plymouth's 1000 KWH customer ranked 152nd from the bottom while the 250 KWH customer ranked 146th from the bottom.

From the above it is apparent that the recent reduction was designed to put Plymouth in line for all size customers with the rest of the state. With the LOW rates that Plymouth customers have enjoyed for several years past, consistently lower than rates in all neighboring towns, it might be of interest to know what had been done with electric light funds. In addition to maintaining the lines in good condition, the light fund in 1937 had been increased by \$6,000.00. In 1932 the light fund contributed \$55,000.00 to the new water works. In 1935 the water softener plant cost \$3,000. In 1937 the village truck cost \$450 and in 1939 the cemetery gained \$2,000 at the electric light fund's expense. Thus a total of \$16,950.00 has been taken from this fund for other purposes since 1927. Even so, the amount in the fund at present, the neat sum of \$15,000.00 for emergency use in case of storm damage to lines or similar emergency expense. Incidentally the fund had increased from Jan. 1, 1941 to July 1, 1941 by approximately \$900.00.

Besides all this, the village receives from the electric light system, these free services - free street lighting, traffic light, pump pumping and lighting for municipal building, fire station, jail and public library.

This is a good record for a small town electric light system. It is hard to see how it can be improved on, merely by spending \$400,000 per year more money necessary on the source of electric current, the \$4,000.00 representing the cost of power plant, electricity, over and above the cost of purchased electricity under the 10 year contract price.

MORE REFERENCES

With further reference to our light rates, we agree that if the consumer pay his bill by the 20th of the month he will pay for 30 KWH the sum of \$1.43. If the consumer pay his bill by the 10th of the month he pays \$2.93, which proves the point I wish to make, that the consumer using 30 KWH received no reduction while the consumer using 100 KWH received 84c or approximately 17 per cent. Is that fair? Isn't the small consumer entitled to a reduction? Is it fair that the consumer using 200 KWH receives approximately 25 per cent reduction? Would it not have been a matter of justice to all to have given 7 or 8 per cent to all?

It has been stated that we can not pay for a plant due to lack of revenue. Why is it that other villages having less consumption than we, can retire their bonds, pay all other expenses while at the same time giving their people lower rates. Mind you, they are able to do this during liquidation of their bond issues. Let's vote favorably on July 23rd and then see just what a plant will cost and if it develops that prices of materials and equipment have risen to such an extent that construction of a plant is impossible we have no intention of selling Plymouth short.

PREDICT BUMPER
CORN CROPS FOR
HURON FARMERS

Maurice Tillson, deputy sealer of weights for Huron county reports that field corn is further advanced than at any time within the past sixty years. Tillson, who resides in Townsend township, forecasted a bumper corn crop this fall.

In reviewing the grain outlook in Huron county, Tillson pointed out that while the 1941 wheat harvest started a week to 10 days before July 1, normal cutting time, he added that in the summer of 1880 wheat was harvested as early as June 22. plants DO make money for the town, and yet enjoy a low rate. Should the municipal power plant program receive the endorsement; we have been dubious within the years to come Plymouth will own and operate a modern light plant thereby assuring lower rates for electric consumers; it will mean additional revenue for the village. In other words it will give our town more than anyone ever dreamed of.

In voting YES on the question at the poll, you will not be increasing your taxes one cent. The power plant is to be constructed through the sale of mortgage revenue bonds, and they do not interfere with the local tax rate.

Ever since the question of the municipal plant has arisen, we have been slow to make any endorsement; we have been dubious about believing the figures presented by both sides. But after carefully checking the operation and maintenance of other communities that operate light plants The Advertiser is convinced that Plymouth should endorse the municipal issue for its own betterment.

Remember, if the present utility isn't making money through the sale of power to Plymouth, then why should they employ various means of defeating the forthcoming election?

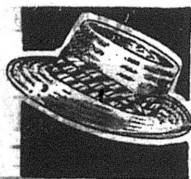

With a stout heart and lots of muscle he threw off his coat and by the aid of a team he graded and laid the pipes for irrigation. The above was taking place in 1921. After and during his plotting he built a barn and a small cottage—Then came the planning and planting of his orchards. They consist of peaches, cherries, walnuts and almonds as principle crops, with figs, plums and apricots as secondary crops.

During all this interim he has gradually improved the home with all its surroundings.

It would probably be uninteresting for me to try to describe their beautiful yard and garden—with the high surrounding hedge and the vine clad house. What is surprising to me is the wonderful development in the 6 years since I was here in 1935. I am sure that one of our World War heroes is setting pretty 'way out here in California. He may have more than just one incentive, so I will just drop a hint to some of our pretty girls—to watch out and set their caps for a good catch.

Now to my good friends of Plymouth. If our good editor has the tolerance and grace to print this rambling letter I will close for this time by just saying that "all's well" with Florence and I and that we are enjoying our California visit beyond our expectations.
