These permits may be had by making application to Mr. Sir Lewis of the county superintendent's office at the court house in Mansfield. Mr. Sir Lewis will also have charge of irregular attending students.

NEW MAP OF U. S. RELEASED BY STANDARD OIL CO.

A map of the United States showing the location of more than 525 military establishments within the country has been prepared by The Standard Oil Co. of Ohio and is ready for release at its service stations.

On the back of the map is a collection of military information of particular interest to the families of men in the services.

Included is a diagrammatic description of the organization of the modern triangular Infantry Division which has supplanted the square Division with which the veterans of the first World War are familiar; reproductions of the insignia of Army Officers' ranks, of the Army branches and bureaus, of the Army, Corps and Divisional insignia, of non-commissioned chevrons, and the collar insignias and cap devices; reproductions of rank insignias, rating badges, specialty marks, rating marks, cap and button devices of the Navy; and the same information for the Marine Corps. A brief description of each National Guard Division training camp is included, together with directions to guide the camp visitor.

PIONEER CARRIED HEAVY DUTCH OVEN 45 MILES IN 1825

Walking 45 miles and carrying a 15-pound Dutch oven was no extraordinary feat for a pioneer back in 1825.

Just 116 years ago Thomas Hills walked into Wooster, the nearest land office, to make a payment and get the deed to an 80-acre tract of land near Paris, now Plymouth, north of Shelby. The farm is still in the family, and Hills' granddaughter, Miss Mary Hills, lives in Plymouth now.

After Thomas Hills made his payment on the farm he had some money left over, so he bought the Dutch oven and carried it home, a distance of 45 miles.

Cooking utensils were scarce then in the wilderness cabins and a Dutch oven was quite a luxury. Bread and Johnny cake were baked in it on the hearth, and it also could be hung on the crane

A Vacation Trip Through "The SMOKIES"

 Dear Folks:

I am enclosing a letter which is the result of observation, historical and study. I have jotted down the "Smokies" on the dividing line between Tennessee and North Carolina. I am not suggesting that you publish the letter (nor offering advertising rates to publish it) but it is still open to disposition via waste paper basket. Use as you like.

Hundreds of people come here and go away again without writing a word about it, and thus practically keeping all they have seen and enjoyed wholly to themselves, hence not sharing it with others who have not had the privilege of such an experience and sight. That would appear to be selfish indeed.

To make these letters all-in-one I thought it would be proportionally too much for one issue, hence I divided them into two parts. Much of these letters are necessarily historical and existing facts on which I spent some time preparatory before coming here for this visit.

I visited in this adjacent section covered by the Smoky Mountains (a part of the Allegheny Blue Ridge range) 18 years ago, when Warren G. Harding was president, which time is indelibly fixed in my mind as the news of his tragic death came here from San Francisco in August, 1923. At that time myself and wife were down here at a mountain resort called Balsam in company with Rev. Dr. O. L. Kiplinger and wife, who was then pastor of the First Congregational church at Mansfield.

On account of the untimely decease of President Harding and Sunday coming near, along, a memorial meeting was called at Balsam. Dr. Kiplinger and being from Ohio, and a neighboring town to Marion, Mr. Harding's home town, and having been acquainted with him, we were looked to take a leading part in the service, which we did. I have known Mr. Harding the longer and having been in his newspaper office (the Marion Star) to see him. Dr. Kiplinger politely shoved on my lap the responsibility of making the leading address of the occasion.

Balsam was near across the state line of Tennessee in North Carolina, there was not a post office. It consisted of a large square frame hotel on top of one of the loftiest mountains of the range, where mainly southern people came for summer vacations as well as a relief for their hay fever and T. B. Our audience crowded the auditorium of the hotel and it was a solemn and attentive audience, consisting of more than half colored people. It was an interesting as well as interested audience.

While there I learned this section was one of the leading T. B. and hay fever resorts of the entire country, that Asheville, N. C. only a few hours' driving distance is a sanctuary for tuberculosis patients. The Balsam Hotel was the victim of a fire a few years ago and was completely burned down and thus Balsam was blacked out forever. This was but a small speck in comparison to the Smoky Mountain part of the Allegheny range, and lumbermen then were busy and industriously felling trees and converting them into lumber leaving the mountainous remains a clearing.

Note: That the reader may get the picture of our vacation party; it consists of the writer and grandsons, Harrison Lowrey, of Mansfield, Ohio, a 1941 graduate of Michigan University, Ann Arbor, with a B. A. degree, and is now entering his second year in the same university, medical department, hoping in due time to earn and get the degree of M. D. With his inspiration and aid, both our observations, this letter is produced.

The Great Smoky Mountain National Park (for short called "the Great smokies") is on a line dividing the states of Tennessee and North Carolina. It is a little more than 400 miles southeast of Richland County, Ohio.

Our guide, a federal employee, says there are 36 consecutive miles of park; is an average of over 5000 feet altitude and has 16 peaks more than 6000 feet high. The park is over 50 miles

long and averages twenty miles wide. The mountain range meanders through it diagonally more than 70 miles. It is hoped down here it will, in due time, comprise 700 square miles or more than 450,000 acres.

No equal area in the United States possesses so great a variety of plants. Some 1200 different flowering plants; 1000 fungi; 300 mosses; 200 lichens; 100 liverworts; all these now are recorded here. Flowers commence to bloom in the latter part of January in the lowlands and continue into December of each year, they report here.

No hunting or trapping is allowed at any time of the year; thus wild life is entirely protected from the former ravages of the unrestrained hunter.

There are wild animals and birds here quite plentiful; such as black bear, white-tailed deer, and both red and grey-fox, wild turkey, ruffed grouse, etc. It is claimed there is more than 50 species of fur-bearing animals; about 200 kinds of birds; three dozen kinds of snakes; (don't shudder) 36 amphibians; 60 kinds of fish. The animals are not to be molested, touched nor teased, under penalty.

Adjacent to the south is the Qualla Indian Reservation which the government instituted over a century ago when the whole tribe of Cherokee Indians was ordered to be removed to the Oklahoma Territory. Most of the tribe was removed, but some few individuals and families dodged and hid themselves in the wilds of the mountains here and escaped going.

The present Indians are direct descendants of that tribe which were looked after and cared for by the government which civilizes and educates them as much as Indians can be civilized and educated. Souvenirs are sold at stands (supposed to be) made by them, that bear Indian car-marks.

Our guide says there are 57 miles of highway roads in the Great Smokies Park. The highest point in the park is found on Clingmans Dome highway that reaches an altitude of 6311 feet and is said to be the most altitudinous road in the East (that means east of the Rockies.) It is asserted that there are 600 miles of trout streams in the park which, every year are restocked with rainbow brook trout and small mouth bass.

Fishing season commences the middle of May and ends in September each year. It is strictly regulated and the rules of the catches are obtained from rangers and wardens or the general superintendent, who have charge of the park.

Licenses are necessary and are easily obtained through caretakers from either or both states—Tennessee and North Carolina.

FLY FREE DATE SET FOR WHEAT SOWING

The Fly-Free date for sowing wheat in Huron county has been set for Wednesday, Sept. 24. The infestation from Hessian Fly in wheat fields of the county was 4% in 1941 as compared to 1.6% in 1940.

Hessian fly infestation appears to come in rather definite cycles. In Huron county this infestation is on the increase. In order to be safe in having a clean field of wheat next year, it will be wise to plant little or no wheat until after the fly free date.

Dr. T. H. Parks, of Ohio State University, states that the Hessian fly may become a serious pest in early seedlings of winter barley in 1941 winter barley carried about one-half the numbers of the insects as wheat.

For further information on the control of Hessian fly contact the county Agricultural Extension office, court house, Norwalk, O.
