FIRE DESTROYS URICH HOME

BUILDING AND CONTENTS LOST IN BLAZE SUNDAY EVENING.

An exploding coal stove set fire to the John Urich home on the County Line road Sunday evening which resulted in the complete loss of the house and all its contents. Don Echelberger, Tom Myers and a Mr. Shira were the first to discover the blaze. At about 10:30 p. m. the blaze started was opened. It was seen that the stove had blown open, throwing red hot embers all over the room.

The home, located on what is known as the Heltzer farm, was a ten-room house, well constructed throughout, the main timbers being 12x12. The blaze started shortly after six o'clock, and burned rapidly, being fanned by a high wind from the west. Loss of the home and contents is partially covered by insurance.

Council Will Immediately Go To Work On Home Defense Plan; Outline Police Requirements at Friday's Session, And Appointment Will Be Made At Regular Meeting Tuesday, Jan. 6th.

Due to pressing national, state and local emergencies the change-over in the official family of Plymouth will be made on Thursday, January 1, when J. B. Derr will be sworn in as mayor of Plymouth, succeeding Wm. Johns, whose term expires Dec. 31.

In a statement from Wm. Johns, present mayor, he pointed out that inasmuch as his term expires on Wednesday, Dec. 31, he has held up the appointment of many local committees designed to take part in the national defense program, as well as the organizing of a Home Defense Council, and forming a Board of Division of Civilian Supply. Mayor Johns stated that inasmuch as J. B. Derr, the incoming mayor, would have to "carry on" the work of the organization and work with various committees, he felt that it would be only fair to Mr. Derr in letting him make his own selection of members.

In view of the demand being made upon the village by the state and national groups for information concerning local needs and supplies, Mayor-elect Derr said in an interview Tuesday, January 1st, at which time all members would be sworn into office.

A special meeting will then be held on Friday evening at which time the mayor and council will have a reorganization of the official family. At this meeting it is hoped that the local officials will be able to set up plans for the Home Defense Council, which will have the power to govern the sale of rubber tires for all types of vehicles.

The main job at Friday night's session, will be to determine a policy for the local police department. It is the intentions of the mayor and council to make rules and regulations which will protect the village.

Applications for the police and street commissioners' office will be available at the official opening Friday night as to the rules and regulations, and the salaries of police officers. After coming to an understanding as to what will be required, etc., a hand bill will be published Saturday morning and placed in the various business houses around the Square, and will be widely distributed.

The purpose of the hand bill will be to inform those who may be interested in securing the policeman's job the qualifications necessary, and the salary to be paid.

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Organize Legal Defense Council

While the village leaders may think that the village is about Home Defense, statistics show that Ohio is one of the leading states in supplying the nation with all types of war material. It is for the protection of the source of supply in which Home Defense enters the picture. It is the intention of the mayor and council to organize for their own safety and protection of this in-kind. Mayor Derr will begin at the earliest moment possible in appointing a committee to carry out the completion of plans for Plymouth's Home Defense unit.

TO APPOINT Local Board

In a communication received by Mayor Johns from the Office of Price Administration, it is stated that the United States is faced with a serious crude rubber shortage and that it will be necessary to "ration" available to the public. It is hoped that this information will be available in this country.

Under the plan, a local "rationing" board is to be established and will function with the power of the Office of Production Management behind it. The classification of the users will be available to the users which will point out those vehicles which can be equipped with new tires. Mayor Derr will appoint a committee shortly after the first of the year.

Mus Have Priorities

Another phase of the war is felt in Plymouth in that the village officials are required to make up an estimate of highway materials and equipment which will be used in 1942 for the upkeep of roads, streets and alleys. The estimate will be turned to government agencies who are re-vamping highway materials supply. Military highway materials are heavy and the allocation of materials will be made to the states in accordance with the estimate and the requirements for the village will have to have a priority rating.

Miss Eva White Lives Through Four Wars; Writes Splendid Letter

One of the greatest gifts and blessings of all times, is the gift of good health and the ability to think clearly. Miss Eva White who now makes her home in Elyria at the Home for the Aged wrote such an exceptionally good letter to Mrs. Frank Plitzen, that we are sure her friends in Plymouth would like to share it. While her eighty-nine years, she spends his time in everyday affairs and while she remembers clearly events of the past, she certainly doesn't live in them.

The letter follows:—
809 West Ave.
Elyria, Ohio
Dec. 18, 1941

Friends:

I have been going to write to you ever since I came home last fall to explain to you why I didn't call on you when I called at Clark's. I didn't go any place else except to Mr. Robinson's, the two places in our neighborhood where there had been deaths. Reed only had so much time for me to go to work. His hours were from late afternoon to early mornings and he had to eat before going to work. I was sorry to not get around more, but I can't wait any longer to do so. I am so glad that my friends came to see me; I did appreciate your coming to Cole's with your girls to meet me. I am sure you understand. I am such a procrastinator about visiting and of course it grows worse as the years go by. Just think—I will be eighty-nine years—an inhabitant of this war torn earth. I can't begin to realize it.

I always enjoyed being in your home and I wish you and your family could visit me at the Home.

I had a letter from Iva today and she says some of them will be here on Sunday—if the roads are not dangerous for driving.

Zetta Brooks was just over to see Mrs. Head and I. She goes home tomorrow for the holidays and she always comes over at Christmas time. This is the fifth year the three Plymouth girls have been teaching here.

This is the 46th year in my lifetime. I will not probably live to see the close of this one. I listen to the war news very interested. It is terrible, but I want to know about it. Your husband and I have tried to care for, so you have no fears—as yet—as to his having to, but think of the many, many that must go and we are not to blame. That demon Hitler is at the bottom of it all. Of course he had his pals, and they pretend to think they are right. God pity everybody if he and his clique win, but they will not win. Did you hear Gabriel Heister, Tuesday evening at 9:30 when he told of the doctor ordering him to bed and that some one said he had "can't-take-it-tile"?

I like him and Bercovici equally as well as Lowell Thomas. I enjoyed being at the Anniversary exercises at Plymouth so much. I went to Walter's—Mrs. Markley took me, after being at the parsonage at a short time.

MAYOR APPOINTS COMMODITY DISTRIBUTION COMMITTEE

A letter received by Mayor G. W. Page from the Ohio State Council of Defense, that all mayors are requested to immediately call a meeting of tire dealers and distributors in their community to discuss the rationing plan. A committee should be appointed including at least one tire dealer or distributor. This committee should consist of five to eight persons, representing a cross section of tire purchasers from institutions, industries and the public in general. This committee should be named "The Commodity Distribution Committee" of your local Defense Council. You will note that the Ohio State Council of Defense is the supreme authority for the administration of the rationing plan and local defense councils will be the only authorized units to ration tires in local communities.

Mayor Page has appointed the following committee: E. J. Steenson, E. P. Elliott, Robert Forsythe, Earl Huston and Donald Barnes.

Sales of new tires will be limited to individuals and agencies requiring them for the maintenance of industrial efficiency and civilian health. These will include the following items: trucks, vehicles required for the maintenance of public safety and health; passenger transportation equipment, excluding motor passenger cars; and a limited group of essential truck operators. Details of this list of users who may be permitted to purchase new tires will be issued within a few days. In any event sales of new tires to owners of private passenger cars will be virtually prohibited for the present.

Would-be purchasers of new tires will be required to show the local rationing board, which will fall within the eligible groups, and that it is essential for them to get tires for the safe operation of their vehicles.

The rationing plan will be issued as a priority order and will carry all the legal sanctions be-

A WEEK OF THE WAR

Great Britain's Prime Minister Churchill arrived in Washington for a meeting of the "United States-British War Council" which includes the heads of the nations and their ranking naval and military advisers. The White House announced the primary objective of the conference was the "defeat of Hitlerism and the world."

The statement also said "It should be remembered . . . the present conferences which will include Russia, China, the Netherlands and the Dominions . . . the other interested nations will be kept in close touch with this preliminary planning."

In a side-by-side press conference the President and Mr. Churchill said they were working out a broad development of strategy to be turned over to the military for execution in cooperation with all anti-Axis countries.

Speaking before an informal session of Congress, the Prime Minister proposed that following the present war the "germ of hate and revenge" should be constantly policed so "the pestilence can be controlled at the very beginning."

The War Front

The Navy Department reported during the past week 14 enemy submarines were sunk or damaged, one enemy transport and one mine sweeper were sunk, an additional transport and one seaplane tender were "probably" sunk. The Department said enemy submarines had sunk three merchant ships and shelled two American ships. It said its 400 officers and men and 1,000 construction workers, was reported captured. The War Department said an American Army bomber sank an enemy submarine off the California coast. There was heavy fighting in the Philippines and Manila was defended an open city.

A special House Committee investigating air transportation returned from a tour of the Ameri-

can Republics to report the Axis controls airports within easy bombing distance of the Panama Canal, strategic airports in Brazil just across from Africa, vast stocks of aviation gas and oil in Brazil, and "no less than 14" strategic airbases in Central America and others in Mexico which have informed German authorities abroad of U. S. merchant vessel departures from the United States. The committee also reported finding the Nazis having perfected plans for the sabotaging of all utilities in Buenos Aires and that in a crisis they could probably establish an operational base in Argentina.

The State Department announced a new trade agreement with Cuba and an accord with the Vichy Governor of French Madagascar to continue the "statu quo." Secretary Hull issued a statement that seizure of the islands of St. Pierre and Miquelon near Canada by the Free French military during the agreement of all parties concerned and certainly without prior knowledge or consent in any sense of the U. S. Government.

The president wrote Prime Minister Curtin of Australia "I give you our assurances that we consider the safety of your great Commonwealth as a definite essential in every plan of defense."

The President approved a plan for combining the productive resources of Canada and the U. S. and removing barriers such as tariff, money duties, and other regulations. The American Section of the Joint War Production Committee was asked to investigate what legislative action was necessary to fulfill plans Canada has already approved.

Parts of the OPM were reorganized "to speed up war production, to quicken the conversion of civilian industry to war production, to widen the participation of management and labor." OPM Contract Distribution Division announced the three special "contract" trains which will be used to exhibit the type of war work small manufacturers might handle, uncovered 11,000 factories able to do some of the work. Among them are a fish cannery, a manufacturer who can make springs for the Army and a beer-cannery concern which can make hand grenades. The first of 48 "department stores of production" was opened in St. Louis. The "stores" will exhibit samples of needed war equipment to prospective producers. The OPM issued an estimate that nearly \$4,000,000,000 in war materials could be produced by 15 industries if they are converted to war work.

Prices The Labor Department reported its check of 18 foods in 19 cities showed little net change in retail prices during the first half of December. Price Administrator Henderson moved to stabilize prices of: leather, sugar, reclaimed rubber, soles and heels cotton "fine goods," glycerin, ethyl alcohol, and dry colors. Mr. Henderson also asked manufacturers of rubber, glass, linoleum, watches and silverware to hold prices at not more than December 1 levels.

Priorities The OPM announced war production priorities will necessitate electrical power rationing and pooling for the Southeast, Southwest, Pacific coast and part of the Middle West during 1942 and the Middle West. The Priorities Division ordered owners of privately-financed defense housing projects to make definite statements on prices at which they will sell or lease properties they construct. The Division also issued new orders limiting uses of lead and tin, steel, burlap, wood, manila cordage, refined wax, wire, passenger cars and light trucks.

Labor The President's plan industry-labor conference to plan interrupted production agreed: (1) There shall be no strikes or lockouts; (2) All disputes shall be settled by peaceful means; (3) The President shall set up a proper War Labor Board to handle these disputes. The President accepted the plan without reservations and said he would act at once.

The U. S. Conciliation Service requested settlement of 28 labor disputes. Labor Secretary Perkins announced that during the past year hourly earnings of factory wage earners increased 14.7 percent, average hours rose 4.8 percent and average weekly earnings of both full and part time employment rose 20.6 percent.

Manpower For Industry

The OPM Labor Division said the U. S. has the manpower to meet 1942's need of at least 2,600,000 additional persons for war industries, but there is a shortage of industrial plant supervisors and skilled workers in some war trades and occupations. The Division said war industries now employing 4,500,000 will need 9,000,000 by June, 1943. These additional workers can be raised by "economic displacement" by utilizing all existing sources — women, Negroes, foreign born, older workers, and those displaced from civilian jobs, he said.

The Agriculture Department announced a favorable economic outlook for agriculture in 1942 despite entry of the U. S. into war, due to the expanded war effort and prospective accompanying rise in industrial activity, employment and wages. Agriculture Secretary Wickard said 1942 production goals call for more milk, eggs, pork, beef, canned vegetables, peanuts and soybeans, and a cut in production of wheat, cotton and tobacco. Mr. Wickard also said the millionth ton of American food shipped to Great Britain under the lend-lease system has arrived safely.

Farmers to Step Up Production in Defense Set-Up

That farmers of Huron County are ready to do their part in stepping up the production of needed food products is evidenced by a survey which is being conducted under the direction of the Huron County Board.

This survey which will include every farm in the county, indicates that the greatest increase is planned in the production of soybeans for grain. The contemplated acreage for 1942 is estimated at 23,760 acres. This represents an increase of 87 per cent over approximately 17,000 acres which were harvested in 1941, the need.

SPEED-UP OF ARMY AVIATION CADET ENLISTMENTS ADVISED

FORT HAYES—Changing previous regulations pertaining to Army Aviation Cadet procurement procedure, the War Department has issued instructions designed to speed up the process of getting future Army pilots into actual training. Steps have been taken to enlist immediately all applicants for Army Aviation Cadet scholarships who have previously qualified and who are now awaiting orders, according to an announcement made today by Col. E. F. Pierson, Fifth Corps Area Recruiting Officer.

Included in the War Department's relaxed requirements is a new plan in Army Aviation Cadet procurement under which Presidents of Fifth Corps Area Aviation Cadet Examining Boards are authorized to take final action on Aviation Cadet applications in the Army of the United States immediately upon completion of their physical examination

survey shows. The production asked for in the goals recently released would indicate that about 17,000 acres, or an increase of 100 per cent over last year, would be sufficient.

Among other articles in which it is indicated substantial gains will be secured are pork 21 percent, beef and veal 5 percent. Tomatoes for canning purposes show a reduction amounting to 9 percent below the 1941 planting.

Except for beef and tomatoes, these items are well above the minimum goals which were established for the county several weeks ago. Such goals would provide for increases in production of pork 11 percent, eggs 4 percent, milk 7 percent, beef 12 percent, and tomatoes 4 percent.

Members of the Board in commenting upon the situation gave it as their opinion that farmers when planning their program for 1942 should give careful consideration to the trends in production as indicated in the survey, and probably would do well to make some adjustments where necessary in order to produce more of the commodities which are most needed to that effect.

Immediate enlistment of one thousand Army Aviation Cadets from Ohio, Indiana, Kentucky and West Virginia has been authorized and steps are being taken to make this new plan operative as soon as possible, Col. Pierson said.

Married men may now be accepted for appointment as Army Aviation Cadets provided that their dependents have sufficient means of support and a statement is given to that effect.

Other previous requirements such as age limits of 20 to 27 continue in effect.

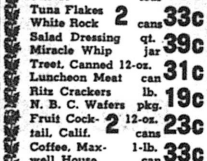

2. Do not try to reach the school. You could do a great deal of harm.
3. In case of a raid, stay off the street, get under cover. You take risk of injury from racing cars, shell fragments, and fire apparatus.
4. Do not try to telephone. The wires must be clear for the wardens, the police and the fire department. Should you not heed this you may prevent urgent messages from getting thru. We admit this is hard advice, and not easy to take. Think of the welfare of the children.

Immediately on the resumption of school, on January 5, a complete organization will be set up. Drills, information and directions will be given all the pupils. Information in first aid and assistance will be given. Every precaution will be used for the protection and instruction of the children. Supt. Bailey has been named chairman by the U. S. Office of Civilian Defense, and will shortly appoint his aides.
