

## PLYMOUTH MERCHANTS SPONSOR PLAN TO CONSERVE NEEDED PAPER

Plymouth women today are urged to carry baskets or shopping bags when they go to the stores. This will help conserve a great amount of paper, which can be used in our national defense, officials declared.

Chain stores have already placed their signs asking for cooperation which is being closely followed by other merchants. A great many people have no idea that paper is so important in our defense program. The American government declares federal requirements must be filled before civilian needs.

The following figures of federal purchases since the start of the defense program show why wrapping paper and paper bags are costing more, as well as why the supply is limited.

**Federal Purchases**  
7,500 tons (or 375 carloads) of mimeograph paper.  
3,500 tons (or 175 carloads) of typewriter paper.  
4 1/2 MM sheets carbon paper.  
2,000,000 rolls toilet paper for each army camp.  
50,000,000 paper milk bottles per day, at the present time, for the camps.  
100,000,000 pounds of defense saving stamps.  
100,000,000 pounds paper for soldiers' hand books (if stacked, this amount of hand books would

be 10 times as high as the Washington monument.)

100,000 pounds paper for soldiers' hand book covers.

15,000 tons (or 750 carloads) large papers.

**Paper for Warships**  
14,000 pounds asbestos paper for each cruiser of which 64 are now being built.

1 carload blueprint used in the construction of each battleship.

11,000 tons (or 550 carloads) paper each month for wrapping shells.

1,000,000 envelopes for lease-lend work.

1,000,000 pounds waterproof paper to cover equipment sent to Iceland.

3,800 tons Kraft paper for cement-lumbers.

50,000,000 grocery bags.

50,000,000 corrugated cases to ship canned goods to England.

This is only the start. The government printing office will use approximately 5,000 carloads of paper during 1941. Steel plants use paper to the extent of 3,000 carloads for the purpose of interleaving armor plate.

**Paper Need to Increase**  
As our defense program increases, so will the use of paper in all kinds of ways. So, it is the duty of everyone to save as much as possible for our boys in the service of our country.

## HOW ABOUT YOUR AUTO STAMP?

Have you purchased your auto stamp yet? The stamps are now on sale in the Plymouth postoffice, cost \$2.00 and all motorists must have them affixed to their cars after February 1st.

While the stamps are required by federal law, the government anticipates some difficulty in collecting from 30,000,000 motorists. Until an enforcing system is set up, the government hopes that motorists will consider it a patriotic duty to purchase the stamps. It should be so considered. The tax is small enough for the privilege of driving a car. So buy your stamp today. Don't wait until the last minute.

## SPEED UP EXAMS FOR AIR CADETS

Substitution of an aptitude test for formal educational requirements will speed up final qualification of Army Aviation Cadet applicants from Plymouth vicinity who already have been examined physically. Fifth Corps Area Headquarters, Columbus, O. announced recently.

Hundreds of applicants from Ohio, Kentucky, West Virginia and Indiana who were waiting for the February educational examinations now will not be required to take them. Instead, they will be notified individually by mail within a few days where to report for the new aptitude test.

Arrangements will be made in most cases so that they may be given the qualification test by the same board which examined them physically. Those who pass may be appointed Aviation Cadets and sent to training stations the same day.

Any male American citizen either single or married who is at least 18 years old and not yet 27 may apply for Aviation Cadet training regardless of the amount of formal education he has had. Applications are taken at all Army Recruiting Stations.

## Renew Contract

Richland County Commissioners have renewed the contract of Dr. C. O. Butler of Shiloh to care for relief clients in Bloominggrove and Cass townships this year.

The agreement calls for treatment of indigents and semi-indigents outside hospitals at \$1.25 each for the first office call, 75 cents for the second and succeeding office calls, and \$2 each for country calls.

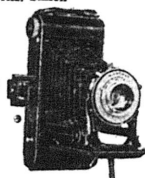

- Thirty-eight inches per season in northern Ohio, 30 inches in the middle section of the State, and 23 inches in southern Ohio. Snowfall frequently exceeds 60 inches in a season in northeastern Ohio along Lake Erie.
- In Lake, Geauga, Portage, Ashtabula, Trumbull and Harrison Counties.
- January 1918, with an average temperature of 14.9 degree. Other cold months were January 1940, January 1936, and February 1899.
- Snow falls an average of 64 days per year in Toledo, 50 days in Columbus, 44 days in Cleveland and 36 days in Cincinnati.
