

Divorce Case Being Heard

Divorce action of Grace Heath against Earl W. Heath, Plymouth, was commenced Monday before Judge C. H. Huston. The divorce, according to court attaches, is one of the greatest settlements of any similar action ever heard in common pleas court in Mansfield.

Co-defendants with Heath are the Fate-Root-Heath company, of Plymouth, of which he is sales manager, the Peoples National Bank at Plymouth, the Shiloh Savings Bank company, and the Willard estate. Heath, where funds have been tied up pending final disposition of the action.

Witnesses for the plaintiff and depositions of her witnesses were heard Monday and Tuesday, in an attempt to prove her allegations of gross neglect and extreme cruelty. She seeks, besides a divorce, care and custody of the couple's five children, permanent possession of 450 1-3 shares of stock in the Fate-Root-Heath company, which are now held by her, and other claims.

Alleging that the defendant's monthly income was in excess of \$1,200 per month, Mrs. Heath was awarded temporary alimony of \$170 every two weeks, \$327 payment of premium on a life insurance policy and \$500 expenses of an action last July 18, when she decided the financial arrangement until final disposition of the case.

Besides his holding in the Fate-Root-Heath company, Mrs. Heath claims that the defendant derives additional income from farms and real estate owned by him.

Witnesses heard in the first two days of the trial have been introduced in support of her allegations of habitual drunkenness, indifference toward the children and improper associations. Testimony of detective hired by the plaintiff to report the defendant's activities in Washington, D. C. occupied the court Monday while a principal witness of the defense was a woman formerly employed by the Heaths.

Mrs. Heath is represented by Attorney W. W. Young, who is in progress today (Wednesday).

Pay Bonus

EMPLOYEES IN LOCAL PLANT GET CASH FOR THEIR CHRISTMAS

The Christmas spirit was spread over the community this month when officials of the Fate-Root-Heath Co. voted to pay a five per cent bonus to all employees.

A \$40,000 bonus, totaling nearly \$40,000, was distributed among approximately 400 employees and men who entered the service during the past year. The bonus was entered the service prior to the past year received a \$10.00 money order. This is the second annual bonus paid by the company. Last year employees received a five per cent bonus. Maritime Service To

Recruit Merchant Marine Officers To Continue

Lieutenant Gerard W. Cross, Regional Director for the United States Maritime Service recruiting offices in the states of Ohio, West Virginia, and Kentucky, announced today that under a special ruling, recruiting for cadets in the Merchant Marine Cadet Corps will continue without conflicting with War-Manpower Commission regulations, and that a special drive to enlist 500 future officers from the tri-state area is under way.

Candidates for officer training must be unmarried, single, State citizens between 18 and 23. However, coverage waivers may be given to applicants who submit evidence of having completed studies in an accredited college or university. An allowance of one year's education may be granted for each academic year completed, a maximum of four years credit may be allowed.

Entering as midshipmen in the Merchant Marine Reserve and the United States Naval Reserve new recruits train for sixteen months; six of which are spent aboard a merchant ship for practical experience.
