

Erect Soy Bean Storage Here

Cooperating with the Commodities Credit Corporation, G. L. Rogers, proprietor of the Plymouth Grain Elevator, stated on Tuesday, that the local elevator is installing three bins for the storage of soy beans. The bins will probably be completed some time next week.

Due to the vast increase in the bean crop in northern Ohio a bottleneck has arisen in a number of communities, caused by the lack of storage space, and practically no demand at present for beans. The situation is being relieved through the cooperation of elevators and the Commodities Credit Corporation. This government has guaranteed producers the minimum price of \$1.60 per bushel, but since harvest time there was no place for growers to sell or store their beans other than on their own farms. As a result many farmers lacked storage for beans due to the fact that many of them are still holding a goodly portion of their wheat crop.

Mr. Rogers, in an interview Tuesday, said: "We are doing everything possible in Plymouth to help the farmers out of their predicament caused by the shortage of storage space. That's why we are cooperating and building the bean bins. We are here in Plymouth to give the farmers service, and we are not sparing any effort to do so." Some of the bins which are 8x8x16 in size, have a capacity of 1600 bushels each, giving a total of storage capacity of 4800 bushels. In addition to the bins, the elevator has erected two corn storage cribs.

The bean crop in this immediate section is small. Some farmers suffered loss due to extreme cold and frosts, and others have found it impossible to even harvest their crop. However, there is a feeling that the crop will prove to be of fair yield and a profit for the grower.

New High In Wheat
John Ganzhorn, manager of the local elevator, states that Tuesday's quotation on wheat is the highest so far this year. Wheat brought \$1.29 Tuesday. Mr. Ganzhorn pointed out that the elevator handled very little wheat this season, far behind the number of bushels last season, which is a good indication that the elevator in the community are holding out for a higher price. Government loans are based on \$1.28 per bushel, and as a result wheat now is by no means lower. But as to how high the grain price will climb is uncertain, due to the ceiling price which is set on flour. However, the demand for wheat is growing and elevators are not experiencing any difficulty in finding a market. One well-known farmer says: "Wheat should bring at least \$1.50 a bushel. To which all growers will agree."

The gallon value of the coupons is fixed by the Office of Price Administration.

The A ration is designed to provide an average of 240 miles per month; of this 150 miles is for occupational use and 90 miles is for family convenience. This is based on average of 15 miles per gallon.

Qualified applicants receive both A and B books, providing them with enough gasoline for proven occupational use.

The transport ration for all commercial vehicles (except motorcycles) and military vehicles. They receive a T ration but no A ration.

The E and R books provide a ration for non-highway equipment and purposes. The E book is for small users; the R for large users.

Gasoline Rationing Here; Many Complaints Heard; McGregor Voiced Opposition To The Plan

Local gas stations remained opened until midnight Monday, doing a rushing business, but few sales were made Tuesday, the first day of gas rationing.

Numerous complaints were overheard among farmers and truck owners, and there is no doubt but rationing boards will be busy receiving cases.

The bus line that serves Plymouth will have to cut their mileage by 20 per cent unless given more gas. Already the buses are overcrowded, and there is not standing room for Plymouth passengers.

Unless additional gas is given to the two local school buses the children will either have to walk two miles or the buses will be called out the route two weeks before school closes.

Congressman J. Harry McGregor of the 17th district, opposed the measure, and will reprint his speech in the House:

WHY RATION GASOLINE AND FUEL OIL IN OHIO

Extension of remarks of Hon. J. Harry McGregor of Ohio in the House of Representatives, November 30, 1942.
Mr. Speaker: On September 9, 1942, I made a speech on the floor of this House on this subject (Page A-3470 Congressional Record). In this speech I attempted to show that voluntary rationing was working as in the first half of 1942 Ohio motorists used 14,148,167 gallons of gasoline less than they did during the same period in 1941, and Ohio motorists reduced their travel 832,422-504 miles and thereby saved the equivalent of 120,000 new tires.

May I also call attention, Mr. Speaker, to a speech made by me on the floor of this House on July 24, 1942, in which, with your consent, I included a letter written to Mr. Leon Henderson and his reply. In this speech I called the attention of Mr. Henderson to the

cost of a gas rationing program to the people of Ohio and to political subdivisions—\$21,150,000 a year in reduced revenue for the State and \$7,950,000 a year for the Federal Government—an amount we are willing to sacrifice if it is necessary, but is it necessary for our War program? A few days ago Representative Johnson of Oklahoma, introduced a Resolution, which I favor, asking for deferment of the gas rationing program for a period of ninety days so that a thorough study could be made. Immediately Mr. Leon Henderson goes on the radio and makes the statement that "opponents of nationwide gasoline rationing are either ignorant or intentionally malicious." Such statements from men in high positions are disastrous to public morale and a hindrance to our war program, and the removal from public offices of people making such statements would be an asset to the happy and speedy conclusion of the war.

If all our officials here in Washington would take the same attitude as Mr. Henderson it would simply mean that we have arrived at a form of government ruled by a Gestapo—a government that refuses to be criticized, and a government whose heads feel they can do nothing wrong—"A Hitler government in America!"

I hope the people of the United States realize that the gasoline rationing program is not an act of Congress but a ruling and regulation set up by the Executive and Heads of Departments who, in my opinion, have not made a thorough study of the situation and refuse to listen to suggestions. Their order for gasoline rationing will make it impossible for thousands to continue their present occupations—many of whom are doing vital work in defense and war plants. If we deprive our people of their means of livelihood how can we expect them to pay taxes and buy bonds?

November 16, 1942

I am rather enjoying my stay here. Things are rather strange. There are French people and Arabs and all sorts of in-betweeners. The predominant language is French. We are having quite a time trying to understand them, but I am sure we will get it in a few days. They refer to us as their friends, and that makes it a much nicer place to be in.

You should have been here yesterday when the band took part in a little ceremony of lowering the French flag in a town. The Boy Scouts were there and a lot of people. Just a few days before we were here some of the boys were killed. It made me feel that we are fighting this war for a good cause. We have freed the people in this locality of the bonds of slavery—you should see them. A person must be in these different countries to see what is going on.

every day—I mean the band. We marched up town in what you might call a victory parade. We carried both French and the good old flag of the U. S. A.

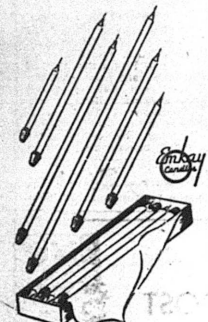
