

P. H. S. TEAMS COMPLETE FINE B. BALL SEASON

The reserve and varsity basketballers of P. H. S. under the tutelage of Coach Donald Dunham have just completed one of the most successful seasons in recent years. After getting off to a rather poor start, dropping the first two contests, the varsity won nine in a row to establish a new consecutive winning streak for P. H. S. teams. Two honors were won by the varsity, first place in the Twin Valley League and tied for second in the Richmond County League. P. H. S. outscored their opponents 482 to 483 in the regular season. "Cider" Reed, a Junior, led all scorers in the Richmond County League with a total of 120 points, ten ahead of his nearest rival, Slood of Bellville. Dick Rule also finished among the first ten scorers.

Several outstanding players will be lost this year through graduation: Joe Moore, Dick Rule, Junior Lane, and Vance Hoffman. Coach Dunham, however, will have several first-string players to build his varsity around next year including Sid Thoms, Jim Rhine, and Bill Reed together with several of the reserve squad: Tom Moore, Quentin Ream, Lester Willford, and Bob Ross.

The Junior varsity likewise turned in an enviable record for the year, completing the season with 13 wins out of 15 tries. The reserve finished their Twin Valley schedule with a perfect record. Outstanding players for the reserves included Ross, Moore, Ream, Berberick, Scott and Willford.

FOUND GUILTY OF MURDER

JURY RETURNED CHARGE OF MANSLAUGHTER AGAINST MRS. ROETHLISBERGER

After deliberating slightly more than two hours, the jury Monday afternoon returned a verdict of manslaughter against Mrs. Emma Jean Roethlisberger, 29, Willard, who was indicted on the charge of slaying her husband, Louis 47, July 22, last year. The penalty provides a sentence of from one to 20 years imprisonment. Judge E. C. Martin told the jury that they had five possible verdicts, first degree with death in the electric chair mandatory; first degree murder with mercy plea; second degree, manslaughter or acquittal.

1941 DRIVERS' LICENSE EXPIRE ON APRIL FIRST

Special warnings are being issued to holders of 1941 drivers licenses who have not secured the 1942 permits, by Cylon W. Wallace, registrar of motor vehicles that after April 1 those persons will have to take drivers examinations.

In other words even though you already have a permit from a previous year, after April 1, motorists not having the current certificate, will have to take an examination just as do those applicants who never have secured a drivers license previously.

The requirement is under the provisions of the new uniform traffic act which went into effect September 5, 1941. Under these provisions even those seeking renewals will have to first secure a temporary instruction permit, pay 65 cents and then take an examination and if successful secure a driver's license.

Negligent motorists can save themselves this additional expense by prompt action. Registrar Wallace advises. New motorists all have to follow the new procedure even now. All motorists are urged to secure the driver's license even though in some instances they do not intend to operate their own vehicles as they may be driving at times for someone else.

AUTO TAG

DEADLINE APRIL 1st

Motor vehicle registrars over the state have reported an early rush to obtain automobile licenses and that registrations probably will not drop to any appreciable extent this year.

The 1942 green and white plates must be on all cars by April 1, that being the deadline there being no exceptions for anyone. Arrests follow for all motorists using vehicles without the new plates.

A patriotic service is offered motorists this year. If they will drive into a filling station and have their plates changed free of charge, the filling stations will give them a Red Cross pin to wear over to the Red Cross which will in turn sell them and use the proceeds.

On the Home Front

Production records of our speeding war machine are largely military secrets, but a good idea of the rapid progress being made in gearing the nation's stupendous industrial machine to all-out war production can be read in the ever accelerated activities of the War Production Board and its subsidiary authorities.

Orders governing priorities, rationing and prices flash from Washington hourly in ever increasing tempo. While everyone of them spell less and less for the citizen on the home front, there is behind them the heftening assurance that each is an effective step toward victory.

There is no aspect or circumstance of civilian life that is not being affected.

Sugar rationing is a week nearer, and so far as strategic rubber is concerned, it is beginning to look as if even the old tires we now have on our cars, may be requisitioned from us for military use.

Today you cannot buy a type writer, either new or used, because the typewriter companies have been ordered to use their machinery to make munitions.

Tin cans are out for the duration for commercial canning, and your canned goods will soon be coming in glass jars, restricted to uniform shape and larger, to save labor and shipping costs. Only the army and navy will get tinned foods.

Rubber was taken out of women's corsets and foundation garments two weeks ago, and now the War Production Board has told the men and boys how their suits and overcoats must be cut. This for a 26 per cent saving in woolen cloth. Banned is the extra pair of pants, suits for formal wear, the double-breasted tuxedo. On business suits there will be no cuffs on the pants, no pleats anywhere, no belted effects.

Speaking again of rubber, manufacturers of athletic equipment are trying reclaimed rubber for tennis balls, base-balls, squash balls. There may be fewer home runs and more tennis pellets afloat the net. There is yet no solution for the golf-ball problem.

County quotas of tires and tubes are not altogether rigid, but are being revised on the basis of data being constantly collected by the Office of Price Administration. Original quotas were fixed arbitrarily on the basis of motor vehicle registration. County quotas are now being adjusted to meet local conditions, such as concentrated local defense activities, seasonal demands like harvesting and lumbering, and data on the number of registered vehicles eligible for tire purchase certificates.

Truck, truck-tractor and trailer sales, banned by "freeze orders" since Pearl Harbor, reopened this week by order of the Director of Industry Operations. Like passenger automobiles, they will be allocated. If you hope for a new truck you must apply to one of the nearby field offices of the Federal Bureau of Carriers of inter-state commerce.

However, the government wants to keep the commercial and industrial vehicles now in use, running as a war necessity. During the last week it made possible continued supply of spare parts by raising the priority preference rating on parts. Orders apply to medium and heavy.

Farmers Asked to

Withhold Crushing Of Soy Bean Crop

Secretary of Agriculture, Claude R. Wickard, has asked that soybeans suitable for planting purposes be withheld from crushing until farmers have had sufficient time to make necessary purchases for spring seeding. Robert E. Finlay, Chairman of the Huron County AAA Committee, announced today.

To insure producers against a loss from holding these seeds, Commodity Credit Corporation has offered to purchase all lots of unimproved varieties of soybeans remaining on hand May 31, 1942 at a price of \$2.00 per bushel provided the germination is 85 per cent or better, Mr. Finlay reported.

Secretary Wickard explained that larger seed supplies will be necessary to achieve the expanded national soybean production goal of 9 million acres recently announced.

Recent surveys have indicated that a sufficiently quantity of good germination seed will be available provided seed now on hand is not crushed before farmers obtain their seed requirements.

Producers are requested to have germination tests made of their soybean seed immediately and to withhold from the market the high germinating seed of recognized varieties of oil content designated by the State Agricultural Experiment Station.

False Teeth May Join The Army Now if They Can Chew Army Chews

False teeth will no longer keep draftees out of the army, authorities say. If you have enough teeth of any kind, real or false, to chew the army meals, you're eligible for service. The requirements for selective service requirement have been materially reduced, and thousands of men once refused, will now be taken. Your teeth must be "well nourished, of good musculature and free of gross dental infections."

New eye standards for "all non-combatant branches" require visual acuity "below 20/100, but not below 20/200 in each eye without glasses, if correctable (by use of glasses) to 20/40 in each eye. Previously, visual acuity of at least 20/100 was required. The army still will provide glasses for inductees if needed.

Sportsmen's Show

Exhibits include animals, birds and fish and panel displays. Newest features will be a sports and conservation quiz booth. Wildlife will include a raccoon family, three large acquisitions of native Ohio game and fange fish, an eagle, a number of horned owls and a deer.

There will also be habitat cases of partridges, pheasants, mallards, gray squirrels and fish. Panel displays include: law enforcement panel; public relations panel, how the sportsman's dollar is spent panel, highway mortality panel and squirrel and coon dens.

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WAKE UP, AMERICA—IT'S LATE

◆ The nation needs to awaken to the full gravity of the peril that confronts it.

It needs to appreciate how badly we have been defeated in three months of war.

It needs to understand that it is possible for the United Nations and the United States to lose this war and suffer the fate of France—and that this possibility may become a probability if the present tide does not change.

It needs to realize that there is grave chance of the Japanese pushing through India and the Germans driving through the Near East, to join their armies and resources in an almost unbeatable combination.

It needs to get away, once and for all, from the comforting feeling that while we may lose at the start we are bound to win in the end.

Only when fully aware of existing perils will the United States do its utmost. Pray God that awareness will not come too late, as it did in France!

◆ Production Director Donald Nelson appeals for vastly increased industrial output on a 24-hour, seven-day basis—168 hours a week. Maximum production, in short.

Can we get it?

Not on the present basis—not under the psychology of recent years.

Not until we quit thinking in terms of less work for more money.

Not while there is greater concern about overtime pay than overtime production.

Not while farmer politicians are more interested in higher prices than raising more essentials.

Not while Government bureaus—created to meet a depression emergency that is ended—continue trying to grab for themselves money needed for armaments.

Not while an army of federal press agents clamors to promote and perpetuate activities that have no present need or value.

Not while congressmen try to put over useless canals and river schemes and take up the time of defense officials clamoring for factories and contracts as if war were a great gravy train.

Not while WPA, despite a shortage of labor, seeks to carry on projects which it doesn't have the men to perform or the need for performing.

Not while CCC and NYA stretch greedy hands for funds to pamper young men who ought to be in the armed forces or the war plants.

Not while strikes hamper war production, despite a solemn promise that they would stop.

Not while the life-and-death need for uninterrupted production is used as a weapon to put over the closed shop.

Not while double time is demanded for Sunday work which is only part of a 40-hour week.

Not while a man can't be employed on an Army project or in a war plant until he pays \$20 to \$50 or more to a labor racketeer.

Not while criminal gangs control employment and allocation of men to work on the Normandie and the other ships along New York's vast waterfront.

Not while fifth columnists are pampered and enemy aliens move freely in defense areas.

Not while the grim job of preparing our home communities against air raids and sabotage is gummed up with a lot of high-faluting, boondoggling, social service activity.

Not while pressure blocs clamor for bigger benefits, bounties and pensions.

◆ We will not get maximum production, in short, unless, first, we fully realize our awful peril; and, second, get over the gimmes of recent years.

Gimme shorter hours, gimme higher wages, gimme bigger profits, gimme more overtime, gimme less work, gimme more pensions, gimme greater crop benefits, gimme more appropriations and patronage, gimme plants for my congressional district, gimme fees and dues to work for Uncle Sam, gimme ham'n eggs, gimme share-the-wealth, gimme me \$30 every Thursday.

France had the gimmes, too—had them till the Germans were close to Paris. Then everybody went frantically to work—too late.

France has no gimmes today — except gimme food for my baby, gimme a place to lay my head, gimme death.

Will the United States wake up too late?
