Production records of our speeding war machine are largely military secrets, but a good idea speeding war machine are largely military secrets, but a good idea of the rapid progress being made in gearing the nation's stupendous industrial machine to allow the production can be read in the ever accelerated activities of the War Production Board and its subsidiary authorities. Orders governing priorities, rationing and prices flash from Washington hourly in ever increasing tempo. While everyone of them spell less and less for the clitzen on the home front, there is behind them the heartening assurance that each is an effective step toward victory. There is no aspect or circumstance of civilian life that is not being affectioning is a week neare, and so far as strategic rubber is concerned, it is beginning to look as if even the old tires we now have on our cars, may be requisitioned from us for military use.

Today you cannot buy a type-writer, either new or used, be-cause the typewriter companies have been ordered to use their machinery to make munitions.

Tin cans are out for the dura-tion for commercial canning, and your canned goods will soon be coming in glass jars, restricted to uniform shape and larger, to save labor and shipping costs. Only the army and navy will get tinned foods.

Rubber was taken out of wom-en's corsets and foundation gar-ments two weeks ago, and now the War Production Board has told the men and boys how their suits and overcoats must be cut. This for a 26 per cent saving in wo woolen cloth. Banned is the ex-tra pair of pants, suits for formal wear, the double-breasted tuxe-do. On business suits there will be no cuffs on the pants, no pleats anywhere, no belted ef-fects.

Speaking again of rubber, man-ufacturers of athletic equipment are trying reclaimed rubber for tennis balls, base-balls, squash balls. There may be fewor home-runs and more tennis pellets afoul the net. There is yet no solution for the golf-ball prob-lem.

County quotas of tires and tubes are not altogether rigid, but are being revised on the basis of data being constantly collected by the Office of Price Adminisby the Office of Price Adminis-tration. Original quotas were-fixed arbitrarily on the basis of motor vehicle registration. Coun-ty quotas are now being adjusted to meet local conditions, such as concentrated local defense activ-ties, seasonal demands like har-vesting and lumbering, and data on the number of registered ve-hicles eligible for tire purchase certificates.

Farmers who have been longing for a new style phone, must continue going to the wall and cranking, and city folk who are waiting for dials will be disappointed for the duration. WPB has ordered stoppage of luxury installations.

All this adds up to two items of very good news: (1) midwest plant now has now "M-40" medium tank rolling off the assembly line, and WPB announces that the President's goal of 45,000 tanks will be passed 'this year. (a) Wm. L. Batt, director of materials, announces that there will be enough aluminum to make the 60,000 planes in 1942 and the 125,000 in 1943, the President's program demanded.

Private manufacturers trying rrivate manutacturers trying to commercialize sale of gas masks for civilian use are ordered to stop. All masks to be made by order of government and to army specifications, and only for military and Civilian Defense

Cigaret manufacturers prices must remain where they are by OPA order. While rationing and priorities are causing civilian shortage, Mr. Henderson is squelching attempts to hike pric-es. For example, last week:

Mr. Henderson warned rubber goods dealers against unwarrant-ed price demands: "War in the Pacific—not—an excuse for prof-iteering," he told the dealers, and asked public to report cases.

These new rules, Mr. Nelson points out, will not only speed war production, but will make for "maximum utilization of the productive capacity of the nation."

Secretary of Agriculture, Claude R. Wickard, has asked Claude R. Wickard, has asked that soybeans suitable for planting purposes be withheld from crushing until farmers have had crusing until tarmers have had sufficient time to make necessary purchases for spring seeding, Robert E. Finlay, Chairman of the Huron County AAA Commit-tee, announced today.

To insure producers against a To insure producers against a loss from holding these seeds. Commodity Credit Corporation has offered to purchase; all lots of unmixed approved varieties of soybeans remaining on hand May 31, 1942 at a price of \$2.00 per bushel provided the germination is 85 per cent or better, Mr. Findy reported.

that larger seed supplies will be
necessary to achieve the expanded national soybean production
goal of 9 million acres recently
announced.

Recent surveys have indicated
that a sufficiently quantity of
good germination seed will be
available provided seed now on
hand is not crushed before farmers obtain their seed requirements.

Producers are requested to have germination tests made of their soybean seed immediately and to withhold from the market the high germinating seed of reconized varieties of oil content designated by the State Agricultural Enginement Station.
