

AROUND 4500 REGISTER FOR SUGAR RATIONING BOOKS HERE

EACH INDIVIDUAL MUST OBTAIN BOOK TO PURCHASE SUGAR; BOOKS TO BE ISSUED ABOUT MARCH 17.

Since our government has ordered the rationing of sugar, it is mandatory that all register. Instructions received this far are that one must register before receiving a sugar rationing booklet. This registration is being held at the high school building on Monday and Thursday evenings of each week following the defense meetings.

Inasmuch as the school teachers, with the aid of students, are conducting this registration, it is impossible to register during school hours. Hours of registration are 7 to 9 o'clock on the evenings designated.

Know Your Dates
One person may register for his family, and each individual in the family must be registered on a separate card. The date of birth of each member of the family must be known, as well as the age. This causes quite a bit of hurried figuring and not a few smiles as applicants try to compute the exact year in which the various members of their families were born.

To Register Here
Comprising the estimated number, 4500, who will have registered at Plymouth High school, will be residents of Plymouth village, Plymouth township, and New Haven township, exclusive of Willard village.

In Richland county the estimate made by Boyd Robinson, county superintendent, was set at more than 70,000. Richland county's population in 1940 was 72,953.

James Bailey is Richland county rationing board chairman.

Books Out March 17
The sugar rationing books will be ready to be issued to families and business places on or near March 17. These books will not be given to anyone who has more than a two-month supply when the nation-wide registration begins.

gins. Sugar uses will be limited to eight ounces a week, the War Production Board announced. Each member of the family will be issued a rationing book. Servants, lodgers and other persons living in the household, but not members of the family unit, must register separately.

How Sweet Are You?
Each household must declare the amount of sugar it has on hand, and each ounce over two pounds per person will be considered above the normal inventory.

Members of the armed forces, inmates of institutions, and persons confined to hospitals or other institutions will not be registered.

Noah Washburn, the sixth son of Stephen and Zanetta Hitchcock Hatch, was born November 3, 1853 in Lebanon, Madison County, N. Y.

At the age of five years he came with his parents and brothers to Ohio, first settling west of Shelby, Ohio, but after a year spent at Shelby where he has since resided except for a very few years spent in Van Wert County, Ohio.

On May 12, 1882 he was married to Addie K. Sims of Willshire, Ohio. To this union were born twin daughters, Ethel and Estelle (Estelle passing away in infancy) and one son, Stephen Hatch. Two grandchildren were cared for and raised to maturity in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Hatch. Nothing was too much to do for his family. Their education and interests were his chief concern and he willingly made every sacrifice for their welfare.

At a very early age he united with the First Lutheran church of Plymouth and remained a loyal and interested member, even to the infirmities of age prevented his attendance.

Mr. Hatch was spared to his family and friends for 88 years, 3 months and 25 days. Although quite frail and feeble for the last few years he still was able to perform the necessary tasks about his home. He always kept an alert mind taking very keen interest in politics and world affairs. He departed his long and active life Saturday noon, February 28 after a very brief illness with pneumonia.

He was preceded in death by parents, one infant daughter, six brothers, and an only sister, the late Mrs. Adaline Danner.

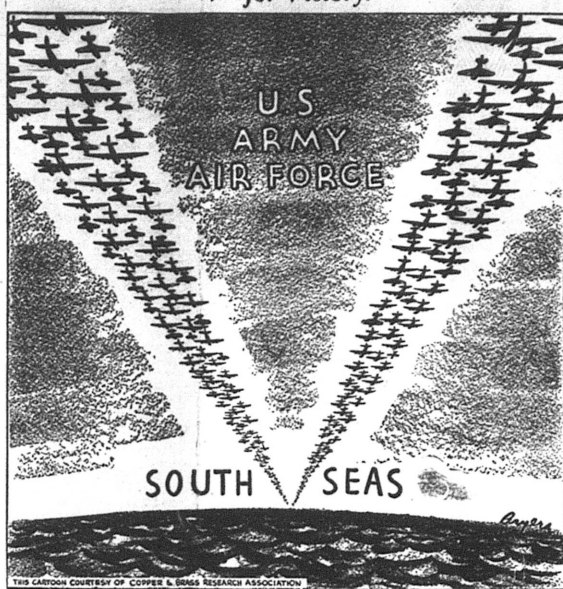

Last rites were conducted from the home on Monday afternoon, with Rev. John C. Searle, of Shelby, officiating. Burial was made in Greenlawn cemetery.

Surviving are the widow, Nancy Mathews, three daughters: Mrs. Ray Dinninger, Plymouth; Mrs. Carl Dinninger, and Mrs. Earl Moore of Shelby; one son, Earl Mathews, Shelby; five brothers: Shannon, of Woodfield, Charles of West Virginia, Alex of Washington State, Sampson of Shelby, and W. B. Mathews, of Plymouth; and one sister, Mrs. Belle Dean of Mannington, West Va.

The deceased was born on March 1, 1866 in Monroe county, Ohio, and was 75 years, 11 months and 28 days of age at the time of his death. He was a well known farmer, having resided south-west of town for the past twenty-five years. The Miller-McQuate Funeral Home had charge of the services.

SHELBY NEWS

Westward, Ho

Mr. and Mrs. George Wolever returned from the Pacific Southwest on Saturday evening. And among the gleanings from these student travelers, we secure some interesting facts, unrecorded in history.

Out where the West began in 1877 and situated near the center of Cochise County in Southern Arizona, between two mountain ranges, is Tombstone, a town too tough to die.

At an elevation of 4500 feet, its summers are pleasantly cool and winters mild. The sun imparts more ultra violet rays at this point than any other place yet found in the United States.

One of the questions the traveler first asks is, "How did Tombstone get its name?"

With a prospector's outfit and thirty dollars, Ed. Schieffelin headed for the Apache country.

Each day he rode with the scouting parties for protection. Working in this manner was too confining and he longed to roam thru a group of hills that was clearly visible in the far distance.

When he told the men his plans they laughed and said that all he would find in those hills would be his tombstone, meaning the Indians would get him.

Late in August in 1877 he struck rich pay dirt and he named the location Tombstone. He formed a partnership with his brother. In 1880 they sold out the Confection for \$10,000 and later sold other holdings for \$600,000 and around these mines rose the mightiest city of El Paso and San Francisco.

In 1896 Schieffelin died in his cabin in Oregon and his request that he be buried under a pros-

pector's monument was carried out and he rests three miles from Tombstone under a monument amid rugged rocks and sage brush.

During the early days of the copper law and order were unknown. One of the most notorious gun battles ever fought in Tombstone was the climax of an old-timer's feud; many were killed and buried in Boot Hill graveyard, in which there are 150 graves in a crazy-quilt fashion, with no markers except a little border of small stones around the rim of the grave.

The townsfolk of Tombstone was laid out in March, 1879 and one year later had a population of 3,000 and in the early 90's had a population of 15,000. Mining has always been the chief industry, and in 1882 the output from the mines was \$7,359,000.

Today small operators work the old shafts down to the water level, but so far no one has penetrated the watery depths in search of the precious metals, and today Tombstone is a small mining town with a population of about 800.

One of the interesting sights is found in the patio of the Rose Tree Inn, where grows the world's largest rose tree. It was planted 55 years ago by a Scotch lassie, from a slip sent to her from Scotland. Through the many years of strife and growth of Tombstone this rose tree, a White Lady Parkia has grown to a height of nine feet and spread over an arbor 50 by 60 feet. In April it bears hundreds of thousands of fragrant white blossoms.

This rose tree is not the oldest, but the largest in the world, according to Robert Ripley of "Believe It Or Not."

Will Speak on the

Production of More Tomatoes for Canning

Ross Irons of the Bellevue Kraut Company will speak at a meeting at the Township house, Saturday evening, March 7th, at 8 o'clock, on the matter of producing tomatoes for the canning factory under contract.

The U. S. Government wants a large production of canned tomatoes in 1942.

Buying the canned products at a certain price and stipulating that canners pay growers certain definite prices according to grades. The public are cordially invited to this gathering that the plan may be considered and decision made as to whether this community cares to grow the acreage necessary to make it worth while.

This is the nearest factory to this section. Planters are available. County Agent George B. Ganvard expects to be present with information of proper fertilizers for different soil types, as well as outlining necessary sprays. Tomatoes are one of the necessary fruits needed in large quantities in this war time.

Almost every householder has had experience in growing this crop at least in a small way.

This week he writes - "Dear Tommy": Just wanted to write and tell you that the Advertiser is a welcome "Mail Box full" down here every Monday afternoon. I can kind of keep a mental picture of what is happening in the home town.

Things are becoming pretty tense down here - Monday there was a call for blood donors at the school and three carloads of us were tapped at the local hospital, presumably for sailors that were injured in the rumored sinkings. Charter boats have been ordered off the ocean and marines are stationed on every bridge. Private flying seems to have ceased. Saturday morning I flew up the coast to Ft. Lauderdale, about 20 miles north of Miami, and was quite surprised at the number of oil storage tanks and

harbors there are along this coast. Boats travel in a steady stream up the coast staying close inshore and patrol planes are seen constantly in the sky, day and night.

Miami has had only one blackout which wasn't very successful. The only major industry down here is the "Inter-continental Aircraft Company," however, there are several large airports, and Miami is full of air activity.

Picture taking is almost a forgotten art down here. It isn't safe to be seen with a camera. The last pictures I took were over in Cuba and the trouble of getting the film back wasn't worth the pictures.

I expect to finish the first of April, then return home for a couple of weeks, and start from there.

BILL MILLER, WILLARD, RECEIVES "WINGS" AND COMMISSION

After seven and a half months of diligent work at the Army West Coast Training Center, California, Bill Miller of Willard, a brother of E. B. Miller of Plymouth, has received his "Wings" at Mather Field, Calif., distinguishing himself as a pilot in the greatest air force the world has ever known and his commission as Lieutenant in the Air Corps.

Graduation exercises were held Monday, Feb. 23rd with more than 200 flying hours to his credit. Mather Field is located in northern California and turns out more pilots and navigators per month than any other school within the West Coast Air Corps Training Center. Classes in navigation are formed every three weeks and upon their completion, students are commissioned as second lieutenants in the United States Air Corps Reserve and assigned to either combat service or transport duty.

Examination Tough
The air corps physical examination is really tough and is required every three months. Athletics are stressed considerably and before commissions are received they must be of a certain weight to height, must run a hundred yards in eleven seconds along with other requirements.

The training is very complete. Most of the time is taken up in tactical training which includes formation flying both day and

night; night and day cross-country; instrument flying, lots of "dog fights." In these fights the speed of the plane varies from seventy to three hundred and fifty according to the angle of your flying. According to Bill it is lots of fun but three you out in a hurry because of the strain on the controls and the number of times you blackout due to the rushing of blood from the brain. When flying at night and something happens to the engine the students are instructed to jump and never try to land the ship unless they can get into a lighted airport. In case of a forced landing in open country during the day "we never lower our wheel and always slide in on the belly of the ship. This will prevent any nosing over of the ship which usually starts a fire."

Independent from the navigation school is the advanced pilot training school which takes twenty weeks training in addition to the navigation and ground school training.

The graduation class had one hundred and twenty-four members who are now being assigned to the various fields over the country and South America. Bill will be located with the Air Force Combat Command, Cowan Field, Boise, Idaho, as co-pilot on a bomber for about six weeks. Later he will be commissioned as chief pilot.

Mr. Miller is the son of Mr. and Mrs. W. C. Miller of Willard and is a former member of the Plymouth High school faculty.

THE NORMANDIE AND MY KITCHEN

The French liner, Normandie, one of the greatest ships any nation has ever built, lies prostrate on her side in the harbor of New York and all America is concerned about it.

I am doing my every-day housework more thoroughly and conscientiously than ever before since I read the details of this disgraceful disaster. And what connection is there between a great Atlantic liner and my little house so far inland? Why does the shocking tragedy of the ship spur me on to better work?

The Normandie burned and then capsized, they tell us, not because of sabotage or carelessness. Because the men at work transforming her from a luxury liner to a great troop ship were not doing their level best in the most work-man-like way they knew, and because proper precautions were not taken.

Had this catastrophe been the result of enemy activity, it would be bad enough and the whole country would mourn the loss. But to have it happen because of inefficiency and a spirit of "this'll do—this'll get by" is something infinitely worse. It points a ruthless finger at a soft spot in our national life. So, I am going to clean my cupboard shelves this morning and from now on keep them tidy. I'm going to the market and pick out all the fruits and vegetables and meats I buy instead of ordering them by phone. I'm going to keep strict household accounts as John has always wanted me to do.

It isn't much—my own conversion to hard, conscientious work. It isn't going to make the country over. But, if every woman in the United States who was shocked by the fate of the Normandie would do to herself and her family in hand, the whole country would change—and quickly, too! A new standard for efficiency and thoroughness would be able to take the offensive in this war many months sooner than we will if we continue to bungle.

We've been an easy going, pleasure loving people. Things have come to this generation with very little effort. Even in recent months, we've laughed at the idea of real danger. A country the size of this with all of our resources will win the war hands down!

But will we—if we continue to let things like the burning of the

Normandie happen? Will we if every one of us does not buckle down now to do his very best? This is a war of production and every workman in every factory needs to feel his responsibility and to do his job, no matter how small it is, with care and skill and pride.

Too many of us have lost the sense of responsibility and hard work that enabled our forefathers to carve a great nation out of a wilderness. We've relied on the other fellow—or on the government.

We're all in this war together—you and I in our homes, the men in the factories and offices, as well as the boys in uniform. We expect them to do their best no matter how difficult or unpleasant. Isn't their right to expect us back home to do the same?

RICHLAND CO. CROP SPOILAGE CAN BE HALVED

Prevention of waste in food distribution will be a vital factor in the effort of Richland county's 2,611 farm operators and workers to achieve their wartime food production goals, it was indicated today in a survey by a leading distributor of Ohio farm produce.

At least half of the estimated \$12,100,000 annually lost from spoilage and damage to Ohio fruits and vegetables alone can be prevented by the use of better grading, packing and by better and more direct distribution methods, Earl R. French, marketing director for Atlantic Commission Company, A & P produce buying affiliate, declared in the survey's summary. He indicated that further savings could be realized from improved handling of other Ohio farm products.

If Richland county farmers, working with distributors, cut by half the average 10 to 12 per cent of fruit and vegetable shipments lost through damage and spoilage, they will have achieved the equivalent of a 5 to 6 per cent increase in production without any extra acreage, seed, fertilizer, equipment or farm labor," French said.

"Under wartime conditions, use of efficient production methods and efficient distribution channels such as those developed by chain stores is becoming increasingly important," he continued. "For example, Richland county's 2,137 farm family workers will find their job of increasing production made more difficult because of the shrinking farm labor supply, rising farm wages and limited availability of farm machinery and supplies.

"The latest census counted 474 regular hired hands in the county. Since that count was made, farm labor has decreased as much as 49 per cent in certain areas and up to 46 per cent in some Ohio districts," French said.

But despite future labor curtailments, he said, past performance indicates the farmer can approach food production goals. In ten years, covered by recent government reports, the farmer had increased his productive efficiency by 25.2 per cent. The average farmer, the survey revealed, fed 11.7 persons in 1929 and ten years later was feeding 14.1 persons from his fields.

YOUR INCOME TAX.

Have you filed your Federal income tax return? If you come within the group from whom returns are required, you have only until midnight, March 16, in which to file a return. Single persons who earned as much as \$14.43 a week for the 52 weeks of 1941; or married persons living together who had aggregate earnings of as much as \$28.85 a week for the year, are required to file returns. The instructions attached to the forms describe the method of preparing returns, but if further information is necessary it may be obtained at the offices of the collector of internal revenue, deputy collector, or an internal revenue agent in charge. They make no charge for their services.

If income tax returns are placed in the mail, they should be posted in ample time to reach the collector's office on or before the due date—that is, midnight on March 16 for calendar year returns. Taxpayers subject themselves to a penalty for failure to file returns on time.

Farmers who have not produced more than 3.0 acres of potatoes for sale in any of the years 1939, 1940, or 1941, but who expect to grow more than 3.0 acres in 1942 should apply now for permitted potato acreages on their farms, according to a statement issued today by both the Huron County and Richland County AAA Committee.

Potato allotments already have been determined for all farms whose past potato history is 3.0 acres or more, and permitted acreages should be secured for all other farms on which the operator expects to plant more than 3.0 acres this spring.

In case marketing quotas become effective on the forth coming crop, permitted acreages will be necessary, and will become allotments in later years if the potato program is continued.

It was explained that AAA payments will not be made on permitted potato acreages in 1942. Farmers who will be affected must make written application to Robert E. Finlay, Chairman, Huron County Agricultural Conservation Committee before March 14, 1942 and in Richland County to Guy L. Taylor, Mansfield. Permitted acreages cannot be obtained after that date.
