RULES OF SUGAR RATIONING PLAN

SUGAR RATIONING ARRANGEMENTS COMPLETED; SOME QUESTIONS ANSWERED.

The county co-ordinators of the rationing for all counties have distributed supplies to the various schools. Registration will be held in the school buildings of the various school districts. For the immediate community, persons will register at the Plymouth H. school on May 4, 5, 6, and 7. The hours of registration are from 3 p. m. to 9 p. m., each day. Registration will be in charge of Mrs. E. L. Bulley, and the co-ordinators of Plymouth schools. Teachers of Plymouth schools are working in this capacity willingly. They cannot answer the questions for the registration, but will cooperate so that the registration may be carried on rapidly and correctly.

Persons are urged to register on the days set. This will be the advantage of the persons registering as after May 7, all registering will be done by the Rationing Board. Children are not to register for the household, as the head of the household must sign the blanks. No blanks will leave the school building, as all of them must be accounted for by the chairman of the committee. All will co-operate, it is expected.

For the information of those who will follow in answer to questions

1. Can students in college register here?
No. They are to register where they are in college, if they are 18 years or more of age. Even though they board at a restaurant or college cafeteria or club and do not expect to use the ration book for sugar they must keep same and have need for same for some other commodity which may be rationed.

2. Who can register?
All persons 18 years or over of age. Married persons; under 18 can register.
3. Who shall register for those under 18 years of age?
Parents or legal guardians.

4. Is one compelled to register?
No. If you have more than six pounds of sugar per person of your family, you may not register unless you care to. Should

Further plans for the local scrap drive were discussed this week by local authorities, and most people have asked "what" is needed.

Articles that are vitally needed for the war effort at this time, which can be found in almost every home include, old rags, old rubber, waste paper, and scrap metals.

Scrap metal includes: iron, steel, brass, copper, old life cords, aluminum, lead, tin, discarded garden tools, old metal beds, old heaters and electrical equipment, old kitchen utensils, tire chains, discarded metal toys, old shoeing.

Old rubber can be obtained from garden hoses, raincoats, over shoes, hot water bottles, sink mats and discarded tires and tubes.

Useable rags can be obtained from draperies, mattresses, pillows, carpets, sugar bags, sheets and towels.

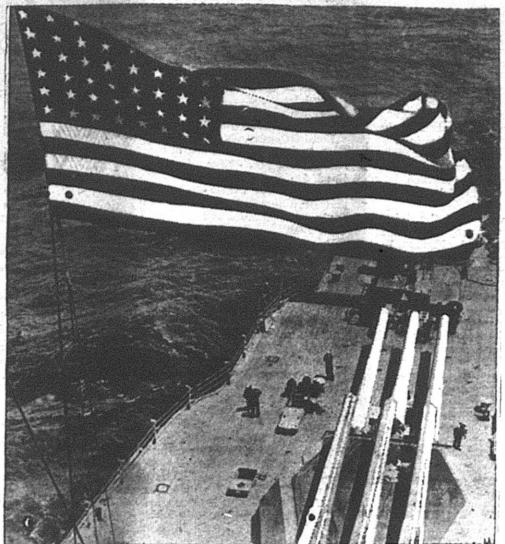
Waste paper in the form of newspapers, wrapping paper, cardboard cartons, magazines, advertising material and cardboard boxes.

PLYMOUTH JOINS STATE IN DRIVE TO INCREASE SALES OF WAR BONDS

HOUSE-TO-HOUSE CAMPAIGN WILL BE STARTED HERE FRIDAY; CANVASS TO BE UNDER THE DIRECTION OF JAMES ROOT AND COMMITTEE.

Tomorrow will be a red letter day in the history of Ohio for the greatest all out effort in the state's history will be inaugurated with a nine day "Pledge for Victory" drive to have every wage earner in the state invest regularly in War Savings Bonds and Stamps.

Goal of the Ohio campaign is pledges totaling \$100,000,000 a month or one-tenth of the national monthly goal of \$1,000,000,000. Over 67,000 Volunteer "Minute Men" are being recruited to make Ohio's drive. No Ohioan will be overlooked in the campaign. The results of the campaign will: 1. Serve to guide the government in setting up its tax program; 2. Step up actual buying by all classes of income earners; 3. Check inflation in a market of constantly diminishing commodities; 4. Help to give us economic security after the war, and 5. Help preserve our ideas, our plans for the future.

The pledges are to be made voluntarily and there will be set up no machinery to collect the amounts promised. The pledges

will be confidential and no one but the Pledgor and the recording officials will know if or how much anyone has pledged. The pledges are to be signed also by those who are already buying Defense Bonds, because one of its purposes is to determine how many people are already participating in the program and the extent to which they intend to pursue the regular purchase plan.

The Pledgor will take upon himself the responsibility of buying the amounts of bonds he has promised to buy. The campaign is based on faith in Americans—faith that our citizens are eager for a chance to help defend their freedom—faith that they will not shrink.

Locally the canvass will be under the direction of Chairman James Root and his committee consisting of Donald Ford, Richard Hendricks, Sherman Moist, and Marshall Burns. Every wage earner in Plymouth will be asked to pledge and also every employee of the Fate-Root-Heath Company. The company has already installed a pay roll deduction plan for their men to purchase bonds, and to date the results have been quite satisfactory.

HUNTING SEASON OPENS NOV. 20TH; CHANGES LISTED

A later hunting season for 1942 was established by the Ohio Conservation and Natural Resources Commission, Wednesday, when it tentatively adopted regulations governing game and fur-bearing animals. While the regulations will not be officially adopted until the May meeting of the Commission, it is expected that the rabbit and bird season will begin on November 20 instead of November 15 as last year.

Conservation Commissioner Don Waters in announcing the action of the Commission, which followed a two-day session of the Commission, one day of which was taken up with the public hearing and a session with the district representatives, comprising the advisory council, gave the following reasons for the later date for the opening of the hunting season:

Starting the pheasant, Hungarian partridge, grouse, and rabbit season on November 20 will provide three week-ends so far as bird shooting is concerned, as well as the Thanksgiving holiday for persons engaged in defense plant work and other activities in connection with the war.

Considerable stress was placed by the persons attending the public hearing and recommendations made by the Advisory Council on starting the hunting season at a later date in order that as much of the soy bean crop as possible might be harvested. Members of the Commission, realizing the importance of soy beans as a part of the war program, concurred in the thought that a later date should be adopted.

Another reason for the setting back of the opening of hunting season is that the later date, if weather conditions are normal, will aid in the eradication of Tularemia, since colder weather is said to be a factor in the elimination of the disease. The Commission changed all of the hours affecting hunting and trapping to conform with Eastern War Time. While the hunting season will not start until twelve noon on November 20 and at 8:30 a. m. on each day thereafter, nimrod may stay in the field until 6:30 p. m. Eastern War Time, thus giving an extra half hour for hunt-ers who because of being in factories, schools, etc., are unable to get in the field until an evening hour.

Under the tentative regulations set up, the rabbit season will extend until January 5 and the bird season until December 5. The squirrel season was left as it was last year with the State divided in two sections. The squirrel season for the northern half of the State was tentatively set September 22 to 30 and from September 15 to 30 in the remainder of the State. Both hunting and trapping of rabbits will start on the same dates, the season having been set for

November 20 to January 15. No change was made in the division of areas on the red fox. They may be taken from November 20 to February 1 in that portion of the State where the season does not extend the entire year.

HINTS TO HOME-MAKERS

Kitchen Katchall

Peanut Butter Crumb Cake
2 C. brown sugar
3/4 C. sifted all-purpose flour
1/2 C. butter
1/4 tsp. salt
1 tsp. vanilla
1/2 C. uncooked butter
2 eggs beaten
1 C. sour milk
1 can tomato (undrained in 1 tsp. water)

Mix brown sugar, salt and flour. Cut in both butters until like cornmeal. Take out 1/4 C. of crumb mixture. To the rest, add the egg, milk, soda, and vanilla. Beat, pour into 2 greased 8-inch cake tins and cover with the crumb mixture. Bake at 375 degrees for 45 minutes.

Pork Chops and rice

4 thick lean pork chops
1 C. uncooked brown rice
1 green pepper, chopped
3 medium onions, chopped
1 can tomatoes, or tomato juice
Salt

Brown chops, place in baking dish. Sprinkle rice over them. Put onions and pepper on top and pour tomato juice over all and bake 2 hours. Rice may need to be added if it gets too dry.

Bermuda Salad

1 small head cauliflower
1/2 Bermuda onion
1 C. sliced stuffed olives
1/2 C. French dressing
Head lettuce
1/2 Boston tort cheese, crumbled

Separate cauliflower into flower-lets. Slice thinly crosswise; slice onion and separate into rings; add olives, sliced. Pour on the French dressing and let stand 30 minutes. Just before serving add head lettuce broken, and the cheese. Toss lightly and serve. Serves 6.

Baked Corn and Carrots

12 medium sized carrots
1 small onion
2 Tbsp. butter
1/2 Tbsp. flour
1/4 C. milk
Salt and pepper
1 1/2 C. cooked or canned whole grain corn
6 slices broiled bacon

Cook the carrots and sliced onion in boiling salted water until tender. Drain and place in a buttered baking dish. Boil down the liquid in the butter in a double boiler, add the flour and mix well. Add the milk and carrot liquid gradually and cook stirring constantly until thickened. Season with salt and pepper and add the corn and pour over the carrots. Bake in a moderate heat oven, 375 degrees, until liquid has thickened. Top with the bacon. Serves 6.

To use leftover veal loaf, make a sandwich by slicing it into thin slices. Mix 1/2 C. cottage cheese, 6 chopped olives, 1 tsp. grated onion and 1 Tbsp. mayonnaise. Place the sliced veal loaf on buttered bread and top with slice of bread spread with the cottage cheese mixture.

Appraise Real Estate

J. M. Clemenishan, Engineer of Cleveland, started regular periodic appraisal of real estate in Huron county last week. This is the first time that a private concern has ever made the appraisal. The work is in charge of E. I. Wilkins, a representative of the company. The appraisal will include maps of buildings, particularly dwellings; houses, one of the buildings; deterioration; amount of repairs needed, if any; as well as other facts.

When the last appraisal was taken about 10 years ago, the county tax duplicate was reduced from \$76,000,000 to about \$50,000,000. It is predicted that the new appraisal will increase the present tax duplicate about \$350,000.

ORDINANCE NO. 62
AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE PURCHASE OF LAND FOR MUNICIPAL PURPOSES, AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.
Be it ordained by the Council of the Village of Plymouth, State of Ohio:

Section 1. It is hereby deemed necessary and it is hereby authorized that, for municipal purposes, that be purchased the following described real estate to-wit:

Situate in the Village of Plymouth, County of Huron and State of Ohio, and known as being forty feet off of the North side of Lot Number One Hundred Sixty (160) in said Village, and being the same premises conveyed to Clay Hulbert by L. G. Wilson and Lela Wilson, and recorded in the deed records of Huron County, Ohio, in Volume 75, page 275, and conveyed by Adele Van Horn and James G. Van Horn and recorded in said deed records in Volume 113, pages 427.

Section 2. That the duly authorized and proper officers of said Village of Plymouth are hereby authorized to pay Clay Hulbert and Lavine Hulbert, husband and wife, upon delivering a good and sufficient deed of general warranty for the premises hereinbefore described, the sum of One Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$150.00) and the same shall be paid from the General Fund.

Section 3. This ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency measure necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health and safety and shall go into immediate effect. The reason for such necessity lies in the fact that said property is needed for municipal purposes and unless purchased at once will be unavailable to said village for purchase.

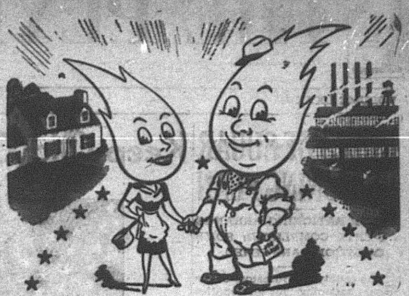

THE 1942 WHEAT

REFERENDUM

After all the rumpus that has been raised during the past year over the wheat quota voting in 1941, with the Administration appealing to the farmers to do everything they can to further the war effort, and with the apparent necessity for the production of every type of food possible, one would think that those in power would be willing to give up their effort to regiment the farmers, at least during this period when we are confronted with the greatest crisis which has ever faced this country. Apparently, however, they consider the matter of regimenting the American citizens of even greater importance than bending every effort to win the war, and will insist upon another quota election.

I have always been opposed to the compulsory provisions of the AAA, and always shall be. I think it violates every fundamental right of the American farmer, and an even more serious objection is the manner in which these elections are held, wherein the small wheat farmer, although he is as definitely interested in

wheat raising as is the large wheat farmer but simply in a smaller degree, is prohibited from even voting. Again, a man who normally raises wheat by reason of weather conditions was unable to plant the amount which he desired and which would have permitted him to vote, through no fault of his own is also prohibited from voting, although he is still interested in wheat raising and in the marketing conditions.

Again, the law does not require that the quota be carried by two-thirds of the wheat raisers, but simply states that if at the election held less than one-third of those voting against the proposition the quota becomes effective.

This is the time for every farmer, whether in or out of the AAA, to vote against this quota system. The chances are that in the not distant future the country will be crying for wheat. Perhaps it will even have to be rationed. The people have got to win this war to protect this country, in spite of measures such as the AAA wheat quotas, and so forth. It is up to every farmer to vote against and vote against the imprisonment of a wheat quota for 1942, as the referendum on May 2nd.

Let's get rid of all quotas, now, and forever! — Roy Lofland, Plymouth, Ohio.

It sort of looks like the A. A. A. chairman is wondering if he might not have to go back to work again by his writup in the paper last week urging the farmers to vote "yes" on the AAA wheat marketing quota program May 2nd.

I wonder if the AAA knows we are in the war, a war for our very existence, and a war that is going to need us all, to do our part, to win.

We do not need to do much arithmetic according to his figures on the estimate of wheat on July 1st to see that the AAA, in existence for about 10 years to reduce the over supply of wheat has been a miserable failure, so why waste millions more dollars. In the sugar beet growing regions their acreage was reduced and now what do we have? Sugar rations, do we want to be on bread rations too, or do we want to work together well fed to win the war.

Let us vote the wheat quota out now and forever, so if we want to feed a bushel of our own wheat we won't have to pay more penalty on it than the duty on Canadian milling wheat and on the duty on Canadian feed wheat.

As to storage space for grain, the rent spent throughout the state for AAA offices would furnish storage space for millions of bushel of grain.

About the wheat quota vote being of vital importance to the farmers it sure is of vital importance, of whether we shall do our farming under regimentation or orders or as a free and democratic nation should.

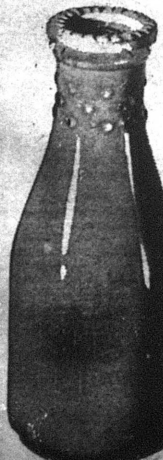

WAR HERO VISITS HOME FOLKS

The stories of war heroes and their service to their country are brought nearer when one of them returns to visit his parents, as in the case of Lieutenant Commander Harry D. Hale, who was on furlough last week in Fostoria. His picture and that of his wife and two children and his parents was in the Daily Review of that city, Saturday, the 18th.

Commander Hale and his wife are very near friends of Supt. and Mrs. E. J. Joseph.

Mrs. Hale and children were with the husband and father when he was stationed in the Southwest Pacific. About a month before the trouble at Pearl Harbor he had sent his family to the United States by way of the Clipper. He was in the fight at Pearl Harbor, and later was a survivor of the sinking of the aircraft tender U. S. S. Langley, and the navy tanker, U. S. S. Peccos.

Quoting from The Daily Review, Lieut. Com. Hale revealed that the only thing he saved from the burning Langley was a photograph of his daughter and son. He ran to his quarters and found it afloat. He was unable to open his safe which contained more than \$2,000, and then found his life preserver afloat. He located a small rubber preserver used during fights, picked up the picture of his children and jumped overboard.

During his stay in undisclosed Australian port, the Fostoria navy flier participated in patrol flying and aided in the sinking of a huge Japanese submarine found to be 310 feet in length. Hale spotted the submarine in comparatively shallow water and

immediately noticed a destroyer. Following the plane to the sub's location, the destroyer dropped depth bombs which blew open both ends of the big underwater craft.

He also told of the activities of the destroyer which picked him up near Java. The destroyer, which was an enemy submarine below the surface where survivors were swimming. The destroyer kept from becoming a target of the sub by moving constantly directly over the underwatercraft, and continued picking up survivors. Later when enemy planes appeared, the destroyer headed for a nearby rain squall and by the time the figure of the sub in the storm area made it impossible for the planes to come in for bombing. The planes flew away when their gas supply dwindled.

One person who is especially glad the Commander Hale was in Fostoria was his grandmother, Mrs. Freda Brookman, who was honored with an open house party Sunday, the 19th, on her birthday. She makes her home with the flyer's parents.

Nothing was heard from the naval man after his family left for the States, and when he was landed in Australia he was unable to get in touch with them. The first they knew of his safety was when he arrived in San Francisco.

He and his family left last week for Norfolk, Va., where he reported for duty as commander of a new squadron of flying patrol boats on the Atlantic.

RULES FOR SUGAR

(Continued from Page One)—You not register and other commodities are to be rationed on your card, and you have need of the same, you will have to register before the rationing board. If through questioning you reveal that you have been using more than one-half pound of sugar per week per person, they can refuse you a ration book for yourself until they are satisfied you are rationing yourself properly.

5. How much sugar per person of our family can one have on hand and secure a ration book. Less than 6 pounds per person.

6. How much sugar and I allowed for canning? Each person is allowed 5 pounds per year. In order to get this the head of the household must apply with the ration board.

7. Who is our Ration Board? Wm. Jones, Harry Vandervort, J. E. Hodges.

8. Does the 5 pounds for canning purposes come off the ration book?

No. It is a special permit.

9. Does a baby get a ration book? Yes. Babies born after the registration of May 4, 5, 6 and 7 may be registered with the ration board by special arrangement.

10. What about the girl or boy eating away from home where they work even though they sleep at home? Officially, they should let their employer buy their sugar. However, this is not compulsory, but is recommended by the U. S. Department.

11. Can stamps be saved and sugar bought in larger quantities?

No. If the purchase is not made during the period specified, it is valueless.

12. Do you present books at restaurants? No. They have their allotment.

13. In case of illness and one needs more sugar than is rationed—can it be secured? Yes, by presenting a doctor's certificate that there is a need of more sugar for the proper care of the ill one.

14. What about securing extra sugar for home guests? Nothing can be done, but a considerable guest will bring sugar or the ration book along.

15. If the ration book is lost, can a new one be secured? Yes. By applying for another of the ration board, and waiting two months.

16. What all must be answered on the application blank? The name, address, height, color of eyes, weight, color of hair, age, total amount of white or brown sugar in any form which is owned by the person named.

17. What about sugar for lodges, clubs, churches, etc., when serving meals? By special application of the organization of the ration board, a small amount may be at their discretion, be certified.
