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HOLD RITES FOR MRS. I. FLEMING

Funeral services for Mrs. Ida Spear Fleming, who passed away Saturday night after an illness of several months, were held at the family home on Mulberry street at 11 o'clock Monday morning.

Rabbi Charles Late of Canton, O., and Rev. H. L. Bethel, pastor of the Presbyterian church, officiated. News of the death of Mrs. Fleming brought deep regret to the community for she was one of Plymouth's most beloved and best known women. Active in civic circles, Mrs. Fleming enjoyed her work in helping to promote the betterment of the town. In her quiet and unassuming manner she won for herself many friendships in early life that existed to the end. She devoted much of her time to the Girl Scouts, being one of their former leaders. She was a member of the Plymouth Garden Club, the Martha Jefferson Club and the Plymouth Library Board.

The deceased was the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Solomon Spear and had been a life-long resident of the community. She graduated from Plymouth High School in 1893. She was always interested in everyone in Plymouth, and had a mutual interest in the activities of not only civic affairs, but also for the welfare of Plymouth school and its graduates.

Surviving are two brothers, Nathan Spear, Sr., of Pittsburgh, Pa. and Alec Spear of New York City; two sisters-in-law, Mrs. Rae Spear; and Mrs. Lillian Spear of Pittsburgh; nine nephews and three nieces. Her husband, John S. Fleming, preceded her in death several years ago.

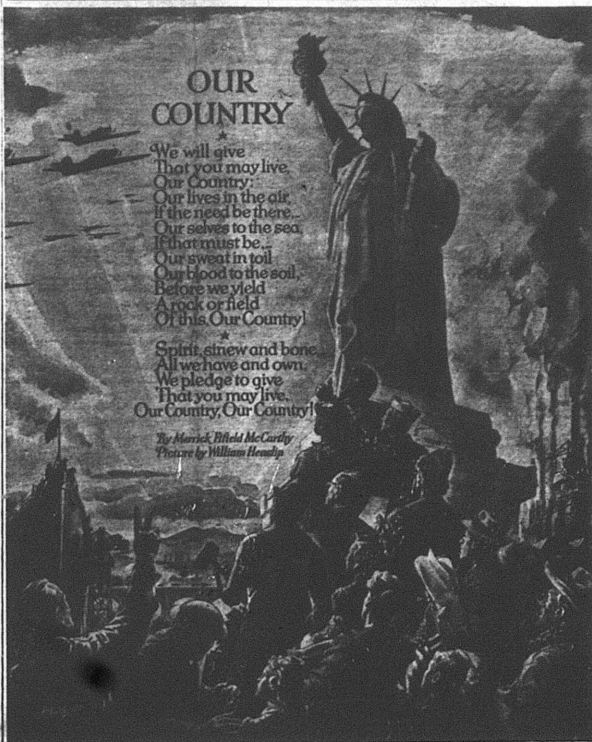

GREAT ORGAN VIRTUOSO WILL BE AT LUTHERAN CHURCH TONIGHT

Gatty Sellars, the world's great descriptive organist-composer, whose films, records, compositions have gone all over the world, comes in person to the organ at the First Lutheran church, Plymouth, this evening, May 21, at 8:30 o'clock, when his performance will prove a revelation in the handling of "The King of Instruments" from a descriptive standpoint. Those who have seen and heard the reproduction of such compositions on the screen, on the air, and on the records, will doubt less assemble in large numbers to

"test piece" for one of the great English Band Contests. In over two thousand five hundred recitals in seven years in Europe, North and South America, he has appeared on more organs than any living organist, attracting the largest audiences in the history of most of the cities visited, for an organ recital.

In South America nine appearances were made in the St. John's Pro-Cathedral, Buenos Aires; even then hundreds were unable to gain admission, a remarkable achievement for a single artist.

Programs are usually played entirely from memory, and an extemporization given on any theme requested.

Residents of Plymouth and vicinity are cordially invited to attend.

There is no admission charge, but a free-will offering will be taken.

POPPIES WILL BE SOLD SATURDAY

GIRL SCOUTS WILL CANVAS TOWN FOR AUXILIARY IN ANNUAL DRIVE.

Poppies in honor of the men who have given their lives for America will glow on the lapels of millions of Americans on Poppy Day, Saturday, May 23rd.

In Plymouth the annual sale of poppies will be directed by the Ladies' Auxiliary of Elmhurst Post. Girl Scouts will offer the flowers for sale on the public square.

This year the poppies will be inspiring memories of the men who fell on the victorious battlefields of the first World War to help steel the nation for the sacrifices of today's struggle. The poppies also will give everyone an opportunity to contribute to the welfare of the disabled veterans of both wars, their families and the families of the dead.

The poppy was first worn in New York in 1918 and later, thru the inspiration of Miss Moina Michael, of Athens, Georgia, it was adopted as the official memorial flower. It was quite natural that the poppy should have been adopted because it was the one touch of beauty that had survived from the horror of war and represented the living symbol of all of the sacrifices of their dead comrades.

There are 13 million of the poppies to be sold throughout America to be worn not only as a pledge of remembrance but as a living, patriotic badge of Victory too.

Every penny of the dimes, quarters and dollars dropped into the contribution boxes Saturday will go into the welfare and rehabilitation funds of the Legion and Auxiliary and will help support Legion and Auxiliary work for the war needs during the year ahead.

Church announcements for the remainder of the week including the Board of Education Meeting this evening at the parsonage have been cancelled.

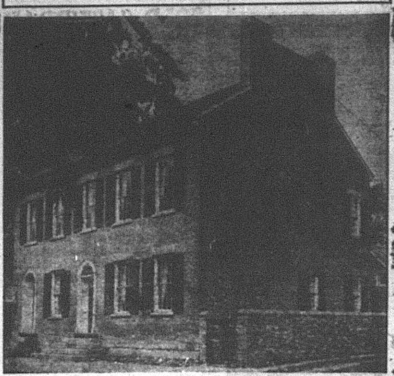

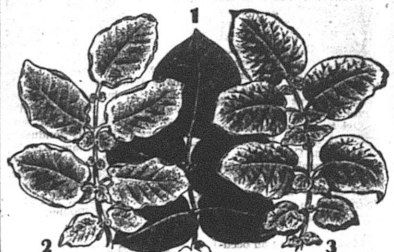

Choose Best Diet for Potato Crop



How potato leaves reveal plant food hunger is indicated by above illustrations which show: 1—A healthy growth; 2—The effects of nitrogen deficiency; and 3—Typical signs of potato starvation.

Whether feast or famine is to be the result to potato harvest time is an event that can be foretold during the growing season.

Potatoes, like other crops, require a properly balanced ration of plant foods. Their diet should always include nitrogen, phosphorus and potash in greater or lesser amounts.

When any of these elements is lacking, the growing crop shows definite symptoms of distress. To enable the potato grower to detect these signs so that he can apply correctives and provide his soil with adequate plant food, the Middle West Soil Improvement Committee has listed these symptoms:

Nitrogen hunger. The young plants are runty and leafless. Leaflets lose

their healthy green color and take on a pale green or yellowish-green hue. Leaves later show a tendency to "fret" and curl at the edges.

Phosphorus hunger. Plants are spindly and slow growing. Leaves are darker in color. Foliage is crinkly and leaves fail to expand normally.

Potash hunger. Potatoes are heavy potato consumers. Without it they cannot live. With potash deficiency the leaves lose their smooth surface, are underized and become droopy. Older leaves become yellowish and eventually develop a brown or bronzed color, starting from the tip and edge and gradually affecting the entire leaf. Sometimes the lower leaves dry up.

KROGER OFFERS 23 SCHOLARSHIPS IN AGRICULTURAL SCHOOL

Richland and Huron county rural boys and girls who are seniors in high school are eligible for twenty-three scholarships offered in the College of Agriculture at Ohio State University by the Kroger Grocery and Baking Company.

The awards will be made for use during the school year of 1942-43, and applications must be made by July 1. Final selections will be announced in August.

These scholarships, having a value of \$125 each, will enable boys and girls from rural Ohio homes to continue their education in agriculture and home economics. Selection will be made after consideration of each applicant's high school grades, personality, and participation in school, church, and agricultural activities, particularly in 4-H club work and vocational agriculture. Preference will be given students from families of limited means who otherwise might be unable to attend college.

Applications, which should include a complete report of high school and agricultural organization activities, may be made through L. L. Hummel, agricultural counsel for the Kroger Grocery and Baking Company, Cincinnati; W. H. Palmer, state 4-H club leader at the university, or through any agricultural extension agent or vocational high school instructor.

Representatives of the college and of the state department of education will make the selections.

HINTS TO HOMEMAKERS

Pocketbook Meats

Meat is unexcelled as a source of protein and furnishes heat and energy. It is high in iron, copper and phosphorus. It is even valuable for its vitamins. But it is also the most expensive class of food in our menus. Therefore we must learn to use expensive cuts and make them appetizing.

Pork is best when cooked slowly and is always served at the well-done stage.

Spring Style Ham Hocks
3 ham hocks
1 stick cinnamon
2 whole cloves
1 bay leaf
1/4 C. vinegar
2 small head cabbage
2 C. lima beans
2 small carrots

Parboil ham hocks in water to cover for 30 minutes. Place in fresh water to cover, add cinnamon, cloves, bay leaf and vinegar and simmer gently for one hour. Cut cabbage in quarters and add to ham with other vegetables. Continue to cook for 25 minutes. To serve, arrange hocks in center of platter with vegetables around the edge. Serves 1 to 6.

Hawaiian Pork Chops
1 lb. loin and pork chops
1 green pepper
3 slices pineapple
3 Tbsp. cornstarch

1 1/2 C. water
1/4 C. lemon juice
1/4 C. pineapple juice
1/4 tsp. salt

Brown chops slowly over slow heat. When browned add pineapple and green pepper that have been cut in large slices. Cook for 5 minutes. Add cornstarch to the liquids and mix well. Add to meat and continue cooking until the gravy is clear. Serve over hot rice. Serves 4.

Veal is tender but requires longer cooking than beef. It is usually served at the soft done stage.

Stuffed Breast of Veal

1 breast of veal
1 C. water
1 1/2 tsp. salt
3 Tbsp. flour
1/4 tsp. pepper
4 Tbsp. butter or bacon drippings

Have pocket cut in breast of veal. Wipe with a clean, damp cloth and stuff with the dressing. Tie or skewer into shape. Sprinkle with the fat, then sprinkle with seasoning and flour. Place on a trivet in a roaster and set in oven at 425 degrees for 30 min. Add C. water. Reduce heat to 300 degrees. Cover roaster and cook slowly, allowing 25 minutes to the pound.

Stuffing
3 eggs
6 carrots
3 apples
1 onion
3 C. prepared brown flake
1/2 cup nuts

Beat eggs light. Add grated carrots, peanuts, chopped brown flake, salt and pepper.

All sorts of lamb are tender and combine well with vegetables. For this reason, we sometimes combine it with vegetables for one-dish meals.

Deadline Extended

The OPA has extended to July 1, 1942, the deadline for retailers who handle cost-of-living commodities to file statements showing maximum prices for such commodities. The original deadline was June 1, 1942.

ITS STAMP NO. 2 NOW

If you failed to use your stamp No. 1 from your war ration books, it's just too bad now. Saturday was the last day consumers could purchase sugar with stamp No. 1. Stamp number 2 can now be used and is good until May 30th.

The whole program was worthy of the high standard which Mr. Griest has set-up in his three years as music instructor of the local schools; it spoke its own tribute to the untiring devotion and effort which he has given to the musical organizations. It is with sincere regret that the Plymouth schools bid Mr. Griest, who expects to enter the service of his country in June, "goodbye and good luck!"

ORDINANCE NO. 67

An Ordinance Authorizing Blackout and Air Raid Protection Orders, Rules and Regulations; Prescribing Penalties for Violation Thereof; and Declaring an Emergency.

WHEREAS, A state of War exists between the United States of America and Germany, Italy, and the defense of the United States of America is in the hands of the Army and Navy;

AND WHEREAS, In modern warfare no city, however distant from the scene of the war, is immune from attack;

AND WHEREAS, Lights at night time are a definite aid to the enemy in reaching military and other objectives;

AND WHEREAS, Blackouts, when ordered by the Army or Navy are essential to the preservation of life and property in this municipality, and it is imperative that the Village of Plymouth aid the Army and Navy in this endeavor;

AND WHEREAS, Failure to extinguish lights when ordered to do so by any authorized authority may result in loss of life by hundreds of the residents of the Village of Plymouth as well as the loss of property;

Nation when lights in this municipality are used as a guide to other objectives;

AND WHEREAS, Failure to comply with orders, rules and regulations governing evacuations, traffic control, and other public places will result in confusion and unnecessary loss of life during blackouts and during air raids in the daytime, now therefore,

Be it ordained by the Council of the Village of Plymouth, State of Ohio,

SECTION 1. AUTHORITY TO PROMULGATE NECESSARY ORDERS, RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR BLACKOUTS AND AIR RAIDS. In order to protect life and property in the Village of Plymouth from enemy action the Mayor is authorized and directed to carry out blackouts and air raid protection measures in said municipality at such times and for such periods as are authorized or ordered by the Army or Navy and to promulgate such orders, rules and regulations as may be necessary to insure the success of the blackouts and air raid protection measures and to protect life and property during said periods. Said orders, rules and regulations shall include traffic movements in case of emergency or other vehicles, evacuation of residents, congregation of persons on public streets, sidewalks, and in public places or buildings; but this enumeration shall not be taken as a limitation on the power to promulgate orders, rules and regulations governing any other subject, persons or property which must be regulated in order to insure the proper carrying out of any duly authorized blackout or air raid protection measure.

Practice blackouts and air raid drills may be carried out at such times and for such periods as the Mayor shall in his discretion deem appropriate or necessary, and the orders and regulations promulgated hereunder, and the orders and rules and regulations promulgated hereunder, shall be in full force and effect immediately upon its due passage and approval.

SECTION 2. GENERAL OR-

DER'S, RULES AND REGULATIONS TO BE IN WRITING. All orders, rules and regulations authorized by this ordinance for the conduct of the general civil defense shall be in writing and shall be available for public inspection at the Mayor's office during the hours fixed by the Mayor.

SECTION 3. ORDERS, RULES AND REGULATIONS EFFECTIVE UNTIL REPEALED BY COUNCIL. Any order, rule or regulation promulgated pursuant to the authority conferred by this ordinance shall be in force and effect from the time of promulgation until amended or repealed by the Mayor or until repealed by the Council of the Village of Plymouth.

SECTION 4. APPOINTMENT OF SPECIAL POLICE—IDENTIFYING EMBLEM. The Mayor may appoint for a specified time all the powers and privileges and perform all the duties of private in the standing police force of the Village of Plymouth. Said special police must wear an identifying emblem as may be prescribed by the Mayor and it shall be unlawful for any said special policeman to attempt to carry any order, rule, or regulation promulgated under the authority conferred by this ordinance if he is not wearing said identifying emblem.

SECTION 5. UNAUTHORIZED WARNING OR ALL-CLIFF SIGNALS PROHIBITED. Any unauthorized person who shall use any other device so as to simulate a blackout signal or air raid, or the termination of a blackout or air raid, shall be deemed to be in violation of this ordinance and shall be subject to the penalties imposed by this ordinance.

SECTION 6. MUNICIPAL OR PRIVATE LIABILITY. This ordinance is an exercise by the Village of Plymouth of its governmental functions for the protection of the public peace, health and safety and neither the Village of Plymouth, the agents and representatives of said Village, or any individual, receiver, firm, partnership, corporation, association, or thereof, in good faith carrying out, complying with or attempting to comply with, any order, rule or regulation promulgated pursuant to the provisions of this ordinance shall be liable for any damage sustained to person or property as a result of said order, rule or regulation.

SECTION 7. LIGHTS DURING BLACKOUT DECLARED PUBLIC NUISANCE. Any light displayed contrary to any order or regulation promulgated pursuant to the provisions of this Ordinance constitutes a public nuisance and when deemed necessary in order to protect life or property during a blackout or air raid the Police or Special Police authorized hereunder are authorized and directed to enter upon any premises within the Village of Plymouth and use reasonable force, and extinguish lights or take other necessary action to make effect any order, rule or regulation promulgated under the authority conferred by this ordinance.

SECTION 8. CONFLICTING ORDINANCES, ORDERS, RULES AND REGULATIONS SUSPENDED. At all times when the orders, rules and regulations promulgated pursuant to this ordinance shall be in effect, they shall supersede all existing ordinances, orders, rules and regulations insofar as they may be inconsistent therewith.

SECTION 9. NO CONFLICT WITH STATE OR FEDERAL STATUTES. This Ordinance shall not be construed so as to conflict with any State or Federal statute or with any Military or Naval order, rule or regulation.

SECTION 10. PENALTIES FOR VIOLATIONS. Any person, firm or corporation violating any of the provisions of this ordinance or any order, rule or regulation promulgated pursuant to this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine of not exceeding one Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) or imprisonment for not more than six months, or by both said fine and said imprisonment.

SECTION 11. ENFORCEMENT OF PROVISIONS. It is the intention of the Village Council that each separate provision of this ordinance shall be deemed independent of all other provisions herein, and it is further the intention of the Village Council that if any provision of this Ordinance be declared to be invalid, all other provisions thereof shall remain in full force and effect.

SECTION 12. FOR THE REASON that a state of War now exists between the United States of America and Germany, Italy, and the Japanese Empire, and that the attack by enemy aircraft, this ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency measure necessary for the public safety and shall be in full force and effect immediately upon its due passage and approval.
