

PLYMOUTH RATIONING BOARD TO CEASE FUNCTIONING JUNE, FIRST

Announcement is made by the Office of the Commodity Rationing Coordinator for Huron County that arrangements have been completed to furnish clerical assistance at established headquarters in the several towns and cities throughout the county.

Mr. Floyd Rice, Clerk in the County Coordinators office will maintain the following schedule from nine o'clock until four o'clock until further notice: Monday, Willard; Tuesday, Wakeman; Wednesday (afternoon only) Fairfield; Thursday, Greenwich; Friday, New London and Saturday morning at Mountville. It is expected that an additional Clerk will be assigned in the near future and then it will be possible to allocate more time for each office.

Effective June 1st, the present Board at Plymouth will cease to function and all residents of New Haven Township will be directed to Willard for all information and transactions regarding the Rationing of Autos, Tires, Typewriters, Sugar and any other items that may be rationed as time goes on.

The established Boards will continue to function on all matters requiring a decision, and the eligibility of the applicant, but the Clerk will interview applicants and do the necessary bookkeeping and office work. Those who have questions with the Rationing Boards should arrange to call at the office during the hours when the clerk will be on duty.

Full time offices are maintained in Norwalk at 13 Whittlesey Avenue and in Bellevue at City Hall.

George Henry Watts Wins Medal On Rifle Range At Ft. McClellan

One more point would have awarded him a medal of sharpshooter instead of marksman.

The boys fire at a range of 200 yards, a 30 caliber Springfield rifle. The range of this rifle is 2700 yards and according to Hank it really kicks.

FREE SHOW OUT

As a result of an injunction filed by Ray Dininger and others in the Common Pleas Court last Spring asking that the streets of the village be kept open, and free for use and travel toward Ramsey, who has operated the free picture show here for the past 10 years states that the shows are out until the injunction is cleared up.

The Common Pleas Court favored the plaintiff in granting a perpetual injunction, the decision reading as follows:

"This cause having been heretofore submitted to this court, it is this day of April, 1942 considered by the court that this cause having been submitted to the Court and argued by counsel, finds the issues herein in favor of the plaintiffs and against the defendant; that the plaintiffs are entitled to the relief prayed for in their petition.

"It is therefore ordered, adjudged and decreed by the Court that the defendant be perpetually enjoined from barricading or in any other manner closing any of the entrances to the Public Square in the Village of Plymouth or in any way closing Sandusky Street in said city or diverting traffic therefrom."

The case is to be taken up before the Court of Appeals, and it is very likely that the free shows will be suspended until such a time the higher court makes a decision.

PLYMOUTH HOUSEWIVES CAN AD IN VARIOUS WAYS TO WIN THE WAR

Mrs. Plymouth, here's one of your most important war jobs: Save rubber, scrap metal, rags. Your son or husband or sweetheart or brother—YOUR soldier out there on the battle front—needs them.

Don't save excelsior, peach kernels, razor blades, bottle tops, old felt hats—not at present. Do not save any more paper. The shortage of paper no longer exists. The public has responded so splendidly that there is actually a surplus. By all means save everything you have in rubber—tires, heels, water bottles, hose, jar rings, the dog's ball, the baby's teething ring, that old rubber elephant, the darning once liked to play with, gloves, overshoes, bathing caps, raincoats.

Maybe you've already disposed of some of these things in your local salvage program. But more of them will accumulate in the attic and cellar and garage. Don't give way articles that you will have to replace immediately. Keep the things you really need and give the salvage folks the waste.

Keep metal, rubber and rags separate. Flatten out tin cans and boxes. Tie in neat bundles, keep dry and clean.

As for rags—don't sort them. Put cotton, wool, silk and linen rags in the same bag. These rags will be turned over to various manufacturing concerns. The cotton rags, which most housewives used to regard as rather useless,

NEEDS FOR WIPERS IN MACHINE SHOPS

All of this advice came today from A. A. Hoopingarner, chairman of the State Salvage Committee, who issued a strong appeal to the women of this city to help in the vitally important Salvage for Victory program.

The chairman has been requested by Robert O. Weible, executive Secretary of the General Salvage Program in Ohio, to name one or more local women as members of the local salvage committee.

"Housewives can do a great job in helping to get the scrap moving—and keep it moving," says Mr. Weible, who at the same time urges a friendly and tolerant attitude toward scrap dealers and other salvage collectors.

"Don't get mad at the junkman," he pleads. "He is the principal commercial channel for getting scrap back into its production. He's busier than he's ever been in his life, and don't get mad if he doesn't come the day he said he would."

"Don't get mad if the scrap seems to pile up too fast. Organize your home and family to deal with the new situation. Let the children help."

"Don't get mad if you think there's a lot of red tape. If you can't follow general directions of your salvage committee, you will be helping to create a bottle neck. This in turn slows up the whole war program."

OHIO FARMERS ARE PLANTING
49,000 ACRES IN SUGAR BEETS

Elmer F. Kruse, Chairman of the Ohio AAA Committee today reported that Ohio farmers are planting 49,000 acres of land to sugar beets for 1942 harvest.

This year's acreage, he said, is one of the highest on record, and represents an increase of 8,000 acres over 1941.

"Ohio farmers are doing their part to meet the sugar situation," the State AAA chief declared, pointing to records compiled by the Agricultural Marketing Service which show that only twice in the last fourteen years has the 1942 acreage been exceeded in Ohio.

Kruse said that sugar production has been encouraged and increased through efforts of the Agricultural Adjustment Administration, rather than repressed, as some AAA critics have charged.

"Average sugar beet acreage in Ohio from 1928 until the Sugar Act of 1933 was put into effect was 25,000 acres," he said. "In 1933, first year of the program, acreage in this State jumped to 42,000 acres, indicating that the sugar program was one of production, rather than restriction."

Fifty thousand acres were planted to sugar beets in Ohio in 1935, but the action of the Supreme Court in that year voiding the Sugar Act of 1933 caused sug-

ar beet acreage to drop to 28,000 acres in 1936. This downward trend continued in 1937, with acreage falling to a new low of 24,000 acres.

The sugar Act of 1937, administered by the AAA, prompted Ohio farmers to increase sugar beet production in 1938 to 51,000 acres, Kruse pointed out.

"Sugar beet acreage was more than doubled in the first year of the new sugar beet program," he said, "and acreage since that time has not fallen below 41,000 acres. This, it seems to me, is the best answer that the AAA can make to critics who charge the federal farm program with discouraging production. Ohio sugar beet farmers have made the deadliest retort to such charges through their record of production under the AAA program."

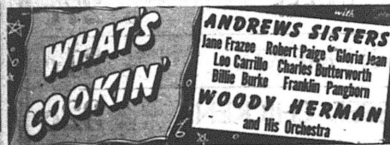
