

COUNCIL PASSES EMERGENCY HOME DEFENSE ORDINANCE

MAYOR GIVEN BROAD POWERS IN HANDLING OF DEFENSE PROGRAM.

Cooperating with the State Home Defense authorities, the village council passed and approved an emergency defense ordinance at its meeting Tuesday night which gives the Mayor and Home Defense Council broad powers in carrying out its Home Defense Program. Similar ordinances have been passed in Willard, Mansfield, Shelby and other towns in this vicinity.

The ordinance gives the Mayor authority to issue black-out and air raid protection orders, rules and regulations for same, and penalties for their violation.

According to state officials, Plymouth is not so serenely "high ground" as its locality is considered as one of the "hot spots" of the state, and state officials are very much concerned over the fact that the "local element" has a little too complacent about the situation.

Mayor Derr spent Wednesday evening in Mansfield attending a county-wide meeting of the Home Defense League, and special ordinances, and emergency plans were checked over at this meeting.

Richland county has received its allotment of \$18,000 for Home Defense, and Plymouth

will no doubt receive a portion of this sum to be used in buying equipment and supplies. The installation of an air raid siren, special equipment for defense workers, etc., will come out of the money received.

The emergency defense ordinance which was passed Tuesday night is designed to cooperate with the Army and Navy officials, and every citizen should read it over to become familiar with the new rules and regulations covering home defense. The ordinance will be found elsewhere in this issue.

CAPT. E. PARSEL HONORED BY U.S.

PURPLE HEART AWARDS GIVEN POSTHUMOUSLY; HE, EIGHT OTHERS DIE IN AIRPLANE CRASH.

Capt. Elmer E. Parsel of Plymouth and Second Lieutenant Robert F. Spreng, Mansfield, Richland county's first two known victims of World War No. 2, received posthumous decorations from their country Wednesday, along with seven others who met death with them in an airplane crash April 2.

The announcement of the awards, made at New Delhi, India, contained only fragmentary details of the accident.

Major General Lewis H. Brereton, commander of the U. S. Army Air Forces in India, said that the nine victims were killed in a crash as they were taking off to attack the Japanese navy.

"They met their death, Gen. Brereton said, "as the result of an airplane crash, cause unknown on the night of April 2."

The nine victims received awards of the Order of the Purple Heart. The posthumous medals were bestowed, Gen. Brereton said, "for extraordinary fidelity and essential service."

Temperatures for April ranged about the same as those of a year ago, with only four degrees warmer than last April.

The ground should still be very moist in comparison with the total rainfall during April of 1942. The heaviest rainfalls at much rain fell during the past month as was registered for the same period in 1941. Normal precipitation is 3.44 inches, and 3.98 inches were registered during the heaviest rainfall coming in any 24-hour period being on April 10 when a little over an inch was recorded. Total rainfall for the past month was 3.98 inches compared to 1.23 inches a year ago. So despite the warm dry days which we will experience, sufficient moisture should be in the ground to carry over a short dry spell.

SCRAP MATERIAL DRIVE WILL START IN PLYMOUTH ON MAY 18

EVERY HOME URGED TO DIG OUT OLD POTS AND PANS; SCRAP IRON AND STEEL—ALUMINUM; SAVE TIN CANS

With final plans completed for the collection of scrap material in Plymouth, one of the most thorough drives ever inaugurated will start Monday, May 18, and continue throughout the week. Details were worked out by village officials and members of the Home Defense Committee Monday night, and Boy Scouts will participate in the clean-up program.

Plymouth is just one of the thousands of villages in the state that will dig deep for every pound of scrap metal, including aluminum, brass, copper, iron and steel. These can be found in discarded sweepers, washing machines, ironers, lamps, automobiles, etc.

FIRST RATION BOOKS ISSUED HERE MONDAY

Plymouth residents joined with the millions of Americans who began registering Monday for the first ration books. The books are now being used in the sugar rationing but later they may be used for other products. Thus every citizen who has a use for sugar at present are urged to register.

Sugar sales have been stopped for over a week but can now be purchased by those who have the new ration book.

The four-day registration will be concluded this evening (Thursday, May 7th) at 9 p. m. in the high school building under the supervision of Supt. E. L. Bailey and his corps of teachers. The entire family doesn't have to register, although each member will be issued a ration book. Any adult member of a person 18 years or over or any married persons regardless of age—can sign up for the entire family and get a separate ration book for each member.

Four ration periods have been designated for the first four stamps in War Ration Book 1. Stamp No. 1 will permit purchase of one pound of sugar in the ration period from May 3 to May 16. Stamp No. 2 will be good for one pound of sugar from May 17 to May 30. Stamp No. 3 will be good for one pound of sugar from May 31 to June 13. Stamp No. 4 will be valid for one pound of sugar in the period from June 14 to June 27.

Approximately 2500 applications are expected from Plymouth residents. A total of 497 were made the first day with 300 applications received from Richland County; 178 from Huron County and 19 from Crawford County.

Save Your Tin Cans

As you know, tin is a vital metal. Therefore, when you open canned goods, just turn the empty container over, cut the other end about three-quarters around, fold it in, and press flat with your foot. It doesn't take but a very few seconds for this operation, and it will mean so much in saving this precious metal. Similarly, that both ends of the can are cut sufficient to fold in and press the whole can neatly.

Old Rags and Newspapers, Too, are Needed

Conserving every one of these items is vital. And don't forget the rubber situation. Save all old rubber, such as garden hose, raincoats, solid rubber blocks, pads, tires and tubes, hot water bottles and bicycle tires. You will be surprised what can be made from a very few of these discarded articles. And again, it's another step to Victory.

A corps of workers under the direction of Plymouth's Home Defense Board, will make a house-to-house canvass starting Monday, May 18, to pick up all scrap material. Kindly have it all placed in cartons or put it where it can be easily reached by the crew who will do the hauling.

What becomes of all the scrap? Well, arrangements for the sale of the scrap have been made with O. J. Nickler, local junk dealer, who will dispose of it in the proper and most efficient channels. The money derived from the sale of scrap material will be used in the purchase of Civilian Defense material and equipment, and the Boy Scouts will get a share for their efforts. They are doing in the collection of the scrap materials.

If you really want to do YOUR part, start a clean-up campaign this week-end and next, so that by the time the collectors start on May 18 you will be ready for the hauling crew. The big drive is on—let's see how many pounds we can turn in.

AAA PROGRAM LOSES IN OHIO; WINS OVER U.S.

The government's wheat marketing quota program won a 57.6 per cent favorable Ohio vote in the national referendum Saturday. The AAAA reported that this was well shy of the two-thirds vote required, but nevertheless Ohio farmers will continue the program since a 75 per cent favorable response was given the quota system in the nation-wide vote.

Saturday's Ohio balloting was nearly 10 percent greater in favor of the program than a year ago, and Elmer F. Kruse, state AAAA director, said that the "Vote will be more favorable every year as the farmer sees the working of the program."

Kruse announced the Ohio vote with returns from the counties in, as 9,687 in favor, 7,137 against.

Under the system, wheat marketed in excess of quotas will be subject to a 57 cents a bushel penalty.

The referendum failed to carry in favor of the AAA in Richland county by a large majority. Considerable difficulty and delay was experienced in the counting of the votes of the Ohio marketing quota.

TRAFFIC DEATHS SHOW DECREASE

H. G. Sours, Director, Ohio Department of Highways, announced that traffic deaths on state highways outside municipalities have dropped 18 per cent for the first quarter of 1942. This reduction in traffic fatalities, he added, was accompanied by a 9% per cent decrease in the volume of highway travel.

Traffic deaths on rural state highways totaled 149 for the first three months of this year compared to 182 for the corresponding period of last year, according to reports compiled by the Division of Traffic and Safety of the Ohio highway department.

Coincidental with this decrease in traffic fatalities, a 9% per cent reduction in the volume of traffic on Ohio highways was reported by the Ohio Highway Planning Survey for the first quarter of 1942 against the first quarter of 1941.

"This decrease in travel," said Director Sours, "was undoubtedly attributable to the desire of motorists to conserve their time. And as travel decreased, so did traffic deaths."

Sours pointed, however, that the drop in traffic deaths was probably due to more than just the drop in travel, since the reduction in fatalities was almost double the reduction in traffic.

"So it would seem," he said, "that motorists are not only driving less but are also taking heart the admonition of Governor Bricker to drive no faster than 40 miles an hour and as a result are saving lives as well as time."

GOVERNMENT NEEDS STENOGRS

The demand for marshalling of man power has created an urgent need for stenographers in Washington, Don Ensel, local secretary, Board of U. S. Civil Service Examiners, Post Office Building, Plymouth, Ohio, stated today.

"The marshalling of man power can be no faster than the ability of the Government to handle the enormous volume of work required," he said. "Hundreds of stenographers are needed at once in Washington because time is as important as arms and munitions in winning the war. Stenographers are as necessary in our national defense as are soldiers, sailors and nurses. Those qualifying for the positions have the thrill of being actively a part of our war effort in addition to getting an education in our national affairs which only Washington can give," he pointed out.

Mr. Ensel also assured stenographers that there are adequate housing facilities in Washington that at reasonable rates. Detailed information about both the jobs and places to live in Washington will be given to applicants for these positions at the Board of U. S. Civil Service Examiners in the Post Office Building, Plymouth, Ohio.

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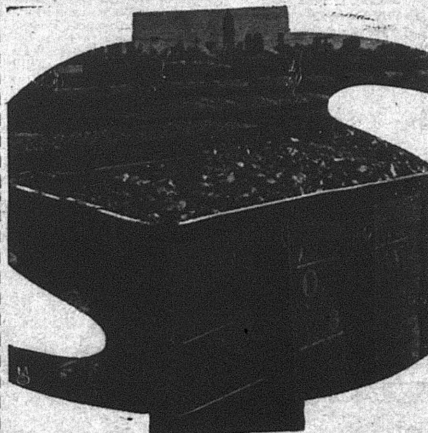

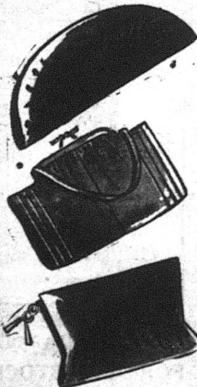

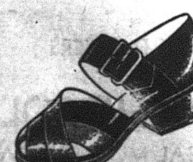

American Red Cross To Have Blood Donor Unit At Mansfield on May 28, 29, and 30th

"I am just an ordinary human being but I am desperately anxious to help my country, and to help those boys who are going to do the fighting. Tell me, what can I do?"

GIVE YOUR BLOOD TO SAVE A LIFE!

The Government is asking for thousands of blood units each month to be used in transfusions to save the lives of men in the Armed forces suffering from shock as a result of serious injury, hemorrhage, and burns.

The Red Cross, which accepted this responsibility, has established the Blood Donor Unit in 18 cities. Mrs. Mabel McFadden will represent the organization and will be on duty this Saturday evening from eight until ten o'clock, at the Brown and Miller Hardware, for registration of all who are willing to cooperate in this life-saving plan. If you can be a blood donor you will be taking an important part in this war program.

Your sacrifice of one pint of blood may mean the saving of a life one year from now on the

other side of the world, for blood plasma may be dried and kept indefinitely, always ready for emergency transfusions.

The Mobile Unit will come to Mansfield from Cleveland.

Donors must be within the ages of 18 and 60, but if under 21 must have the signed consent of the parents. If you are an average healthy adult you can spare a unit of blood without ill effect. The Red Cross and National Research Council have set up certain regulations for your protection, and it is not necessary for you to have a complete physical examination before being a donor.

WHAT HAPPENS

When entering the Donation Center in Mansfield, the donor's temperature is taken, the pulse is taken, and a test for anemia given. The blood pressure will be taken. A doctor will choose and prepare the suitable area on your arm. When the blood is withdrawn there should be no unpleasant sensation whatever. After having rested for about ten minutes, the canteen committee will then serve the donor refreshment without charge.

WHAT TO EAT

When your appointment is made you will be instructed NOT to eat any FATS for four hours before donating your blood. Blood that contains any fat cannot be processed. This includes milk, cream, butter, chocolate, and nuts. However, it is permissible to take fruit juices or raw fruit, dry bread or toast, and coffee or tea without cream. It is advised to eat a substantial breakfast BEFORE 9 o'clock in the morning, for appointments start at 1 p. m.

AWARDS GIVEN

For your first and second donations the donor will be given a small bronze pin, and after three donations the donor will receive a silver pin.

It is hoped that donors will repeat their donation at proper intervals as the need arises, but it is not compulsory. No one is allowed to give a donation more than once every eight weeks, and not more than five times a year.

Later the Red Cross will send you a small blue certificate on which will be designated the "type" of your blood. It may help to know this, if your blood is suddenly needed for a friend or relative for a transfusion.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q What is plasma?

A The liquid portion of the blood which is left after the corpuscles have been removed.

Q What are the advantages of dried plasma over the whole blood?

A Plasma is as effective as whole blood for emergency transfusions. It can be stored indefinitely, at ordinary temperature, and can be shipped anywhere. Also it does not need to be "typed" and is ready for use within TEN minutes.

Q Can the blood carry an infection to the person who receives it?

A No, the blood is tested at the laboratory.

Q For what reasons might a donor be disqualified?

A If he has had a long chronic illness. If he has a cold within three weeks. Hayfever and asthma do not disqualify a donor.

Q Who actually takes the blood?

A A highly qualified doctor who is in charge.

Q How long does it take to donate blood?

A The actual donation takes five to ten minutes. The time spent at the donation center would be 45 or 50 minutes.

Q How long does it take the body to replace a unit of blood?

A The volume of blood is replaced as soon as the donor drinks enough liquids. The corpuscles are fully restored within a week or ten days.

P. F. C. Ray F. Dawson, who was recently transferred from Ft. Crockett to Ellington Field, as cook and baker for the Air Corps, is confined to the hospital with an attack of jaundice and a chest cold. He is in Ward 5 at the Station Hospital at Ellington Field, Texas.

NARROW ESCAPE

Tony Baughman had a narrow escape when he fell asleep on the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad just south of Plymouth, only to be awakened while a double-header freight train was passing over his body. Baughman, in some manner emerged from beneath the freight, with only slight cuts and bruises, although his clothes had the appearance of being tangled up with a bobcat.

The mishap occurred last Wednesday evening at 7:15 near the home of Sadie Barrel, south of town.

Those who arrived at the scene cannot imagine how the man escaped instant death.

Funeral services for Nelson Jones, 16, of Shelby, who was killed when a load of steel tubing rolled on top of him in a railroad car at the Baltimore & Ohio railroad yards at Brunswick, Md., were held at 2:30 p. m. Monday from the Sutter funeral home, Shelby. Burial made in Oakland cemetery, Shelby.

The body arrived in Shelby late Friday from Maryland. Also killed in the same accident was Morris L. Bert, 19, of Indianapolis, Ind.

Bass Season Closes

The open season on black bass in the inland fishing district of Ohio closed May 1 and will remain closed until June 16, the Ohio Division of Conservation & Natural Resources reminded anglers today. The ban applies to large-mouth, small-mouth and spotted bass.

The closed season is enforced to permit bass opportunity to spawn. The open season on black bass in the Lake Erie fishing district will close on May 25 to remain closed until July 1. The ban on black bass does not apply to white and rock bass which are different species.

Fish management men report bass in streams are nesting and water and weather conditions indicate an excellent bass hatch this year.

On the Home Front

THE AXIS has mobilized the slave labor of Europe and Asia. America is mobilizing the free labor of a free nation. The most significant development of the week was the announcement of the national man-power mobilization to be undertaken by the new war man-power commission, under chairmanship of Federal Security Administrator Paul V. McNutt.

Its job will be this: To make sure that manpower needed to make the weapons and planes and ships, will be available when and where it is needed—to find the proper place for everybody in the war effort, to make every citizen in a sense a soldier.

The week marked up advances in the war production drive. 100 more war plants, now 600 in all, have labor-management committees. As war production speeds down or stops. At the same time, people on the "Home Front" will cease enjoying a lot of things, and adjust their lives to the war's grim regime.

FARMERS will soon return to the old-fashioned steel wheel and steel tired wagon. Except for combine harvest-thresher, making of farm equipment using rubber tires was discontinued Thursday. Production of rubber tire combine tires stops July 31.

IF YOU do not need it for direct war work on work "essential to the public welfare," you may have difficulty in getting a new phone service this year. The War P-B has ordered drastic restrictions on expansion of telephone service. As a result of the order, it is estimated that 200,000 applications for residential service will be denied. Order will save 50,000 tons of lead, 35,000 tons of iron and steel, 54,000 tons of copper, 6,500 tons of zinc and 1,890 tons of crude rubber.

MANUFACTURE of fancy fishing tackle is just about out for the duration but WPB just couldn't go so far as to ban steel for the fish hook. No more metal, cork, and plastic for tackle after May 31, and the hooks can be made at the rate of only 50 per cent of production until September 1.

THE RADIO INDUSTRY began "signing off" at midnight, April 22, when 30 of 55 companies ceased civilian radio production and prepared to convert to 100 per cent war production. At the same time, two large companies, RCA and Philco, shrank production 80 per cent. These 32 companies now have war contracts totaling \$700,000,000. The remaining companies are given from one to six weeks to taper off.

AT THE same time practically every product of the cotton goods industry is ordered under a recent OPA price ceiling. The new order covers manufacturers' prices chiefly. Order covers towels, blankets, bedspreads, gingham, table cloths and napkins, etc. Here's the reason: Between July 1, 1941 and March 27, 1942, prices of 49 types of cotton goods were up 21 per cent. Prices will be pushed back to July 21 to August 15 period in 1941.

SUPPLY OF MOTOR trucks is dwindling too fast. Three new Office of Defense Transportation orders are directed to common carriers, contract truck operators and private carriers, and are aimed to prevent over-loading, under-loading, empty return trips. The truck companies are encouraged to pool shipments, arrange for joint terminals, operate joint pick up and delivery service, and split the costs.

CONCERNS operating local delivery services, must after June 1 cut down their truck mileage 25

per cent as compared with the same month in 1941. WPB order is to conserve tires and machines and gasoline. Office of Defense Transportation began to encourage "pooling" by concerns having separate delivery services March 12, when it asked them to submit joint plans which could be approved as not in violation of anti-trust laws. Now the restriction is made compulsory.

THE DISH MAKERS get their price ceiling dishd to them on Monday. Hundreds of china and pottery articles used in the average plans which could be approved as not in violation of anti-trust laws. Now the restriction is made compulsory.

WORKERS in the Republic Steel Corporation plant in Cleveland recently set a world's record for steel plate production in a 24-hour period.

WHAT ABOUT STRIKES in defense industries? During the first three months of 1942, 332,000 man-days were lost by strikes, while workers worked 552,000 man days. During the first three months of 1941, 1,384,000 man days were stuck away, while the workers were on the job a total of 156,000,000 man days in defense industry.

INTERESTING FACTS

One type of air plane motor contains 7,000 parts. Each part is inspected an average of ten times to make sure that workmanship is perfect—which means that there are 70,000 inspections for every engine.

MOVED TO OKLAHOMA

Pvt. Robert Nimmons who has been stationed at Chanute Field, Ill., has been transferred to Fort Silo, Oklahoma. Bob states it is getting as "hot as blazes," and that there is plenty of dust, but after getting settled will no doubt like it.

PREPARE FOR TRIAL

Preparations are being made in Norwalk for the coming trial of Charles Mitchell, alias Colerico Mitchell, 47, indicted recently on a charge of second degree murder in the fatal shooting of Mrs. Rosa Rupino at Bellevue on Christmas Day, 1926.

Inasmuch as Mitchell is charged with second degree murder, it will not be necessary to empanel a special jury for the case.

Because of the fact that the defendant, as well as a number of witnesses, do not speak English clearly, an interpreter will be engaged for the trial.

Huron-co. Prosecutor Herbert R. Freeman will represent the state and K. F. Fox of Bellevue will defend Mitchell.

VOLUNTEERS FOR SERVICE

Robert Burchard, son of Mr. and Mrs. Eli Burchard of Willard has volunteered for submarine duty in the Atlantic. Robert is on a 15 day furlough with his parents. He was at Pearl Harbor, Dec. 7th and has seen active service in the Pacific since then. The Burchard family are former residents of Plymouth.

Here's Text of Emergency Home Defense Ordinance

ORDINANCE NO. 87

An Ordinance Authorizing Blackout and Air Raid Protection Orders, Rules and Regulations Prescribing the Penalties for Violations Thereof, and Declaring an Emergency.

WHEREAS, a state of war exists between the United States of America and Japan, Germany, and Italy, and the defense of the United States of America is in the hands of the Army and Navy;

WHEREAS, in modern warfare no city, however distant from the enemy, is free from attack; and

WHEREAS, Lights at night time are a definite aid to the enemy in reaching military and other objectives; and

WHEREAS, Blackouts, when ordered by the Army or Navy are essential to the preservation of life and property in this municipality, and it is imperative that the residents of Plymouth, Ohio, the Army and Navy by all possible cooperation and assistance; and

WHEREAS, Failure to comply with the orders of the Army or Navy may result in loss of life by hundreds of the residents of the Village of Plymouth as well as the residents of other parts of the Nation when lights in this municipality are used as a guide to other objectives;

WHEREAS, Failure to comply with orders, rules and regulations governing evacuation, traffic movements, congregation of persons in streets and other public places will result in confusion and unnecessary loss of life both during blackouts and during air raids in the daytime, now therefore,

Be it ordained, That the Council of the Village of Plymouth, State of Ohio:

SECTION 1. AUTHORITY TO PROMULGATE BLACKOUT ORDERS, RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR BLACKOUTS AND AIR RAIDS. In order to protect life and property in the Village of Plymouth from enemy action the Mayor is authorized and directed to carry out blackouts and air raid protection measures in said municipality at such times and for such periods as he is authorized or ordered by the Army or Navy and to promulgate such orders, rules and regulations as may be necessary to insure the success of the blackouts and air raid protection measures and to protect life and property during said periods. Said orders, rules and regulations shall include traffic movements of emergency or other vehicles, evacuation of residents, congregation of persons in public streets, sidewalks, and in public places or buildings, but this enumeration shall not be taken as a limitation on the power to promulgate orders, rules, regulations governing any other subject, persons or property which must be regulated in order to insure the proper carrying out of any duly authorized blackout or air raid protection measures.

SECTION 2. GENERAL ORDERS, RULES AND REGULATIONS TO BE IN EFFECT. All orders, rules and regulations authorized by this ordinance for the conduct of the general public shall be in writing and shall be available for public inspection at the place and during the hours fixed by the Mayor.

SECTION 3. ORDERS, RULES AND REGULATIONS EFFECTIVE UNTIL REPEALED BY COUNCIL. Any order, rule or regulation promulgated pursuant to the authority conferred by this ordinance shall be in force and effect from the time of promulgation until amended or repealed by the Mayor or until repealed by the Council of the Village of Plymouth.

SECTION 4. APPOINTMENT OF SPECIAL POLICE—IDENTIFYING EMBLEM. The Mayor may appoint for a specified time as many special police, without pay, from among residents of the Village of Plymouth as may be deemed advisable for service in connection with any blackout or air raid protection measure. Each special police shall possess all the powers and privileges and perform all the duties of a police officer in the standing police force of the Village of Plymouth. Said special police must wear such identifying emblem as may be prescribed by the Mayor and it shall be unlawful for any said special policeman to attempt to carry out any order, rule, or regulation promulgated under the authority conferred by this ordinance when he is not wearing said identifying emblem.

SECTION 5. UNAUTHORIZED WARNING OR ALL-CLEAR SIGNALS PROHIBITED. Any unauthorized person who shall operate a siren or other device so as to simulate a blackout signal or air raid, or the termination of a blackout or air raid, shall be deemed guilty of a violation of this ordinance and shall be subject to the penalties imposed by Section 10 of this ordinance.

SECTION 6. NO MUNICIPAL OR PRIVATE LIABILITY. This ordinance is an exercise by the Village of its governmental functions for the protection of the public peace, health and safety and neither the Village of Plymouth, the agents and representatives of said Village, nor any individual, receiver, firm, partnership, corporation, association, or society in any order, rule or regulation thereof, in good faith carrying out, complying with or attempting to comply with, any order, rule or regulation promulgated pursuant to the provisions of this ordinance shall be liable for any damage sustained to person or property as the result of said activity.

SECTION 7. LIGHTS DURING BLACKOUT DECLARED. PUBLIC NUISANCE. Any light displayed contrary to any order, rule or regulation promulgated pursuant to the provisions of this Ordinance constitutes a public nuisance and when deemed necessary in order to protect life or property during a blackout or air raid the police, or the special police authorized herein, are authorized and directed to enter upon any SECTION 10. THE VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, using reasonable force, and extinguish lights or take other necessary action to make effective any order, rule or regulation promulgated under the authority conferred by this ordinance.

SECTION 8. CONFLICTING ORDINANCES, ORDERS, RULES AND REGULATIONS SUSPENDED. At all times when the orders, rules and regulations made and promulgated pursuant to this ordinance shall be in effect, they shall supersede all existing ordinances, orders, rules and regulations insofar as the latter may be inconsistent therewith.

SECTION 9. NO CONFLICT WITH STATE OR FEDERAL STATUTES. This Ordinance shall not be construed so as to conflict with any State or Federal statute or with any Military or Naval order, rule or regulation.

SECTION 10. PENALTIES FOR VIOLATIONS. Any person, firm or corporation violating any of the provisions of this ordinance or any order, rule, or regulation issued pursuant thereto shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine of not exceeding Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) or imprisonment for not more than six months, or by both the fine and said imprisonment.

SECTION 11. SEPARABILITY OF PROVISIONS. If it is the intention of the Village Council that each separate provision of this Ordinance shall be deemed independent of all other provisions hereof, and it is further the intention of the Village Council that if any provision of this Ordinance be declared to be invalid, all other provisions thereof shall remain valid and enforceable.

SECTION 12. For the reason that a state of war now exists between the United States of America and certain European and Asiatic nations, thereby creating a hazard in that there is an immediate and constant threat of attack by enemy aircraft, this ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency measure necessary for the public safety and shall be in full force and effect immediately upon its due passage and approval.
