

Warning Issued To Pranksters

It is still almost three weeks until Halloween, but complaints are already being received by village officials and the Board of Education, regarding destruction of property and supposedly smart pranks by Plymouth's younger element.

For years the schools in Plymouth have been the target for maliciousness during the Halloween season. Whether this is due to a lack of pride, a lack of home training or just plain thoughtlessness, is not known, but surely any young man or woman who has any respect at all for his alma mater would not stoop so low as to purposely destroy what has taken years to build and paid for with taxes from their own folks.

The Board of Education takes the stand that if students within our own schools violate the rules they must be punished. They have, therefore, announced that the entire student body will suffer unless individual offenders are punished and that school activities will be suspended. The curfew law is still on the village books and will also be enforced if necessary.

The school isn't the only place that suffers. Several property owners have reported the loss of garden ornaments, a sun turned over, rabbits and chickens let loose from their pens and other annoying depredations.

Parents should warn their children of the seriousness of these offenses and should property owners defend their property with a load of rock salt and your child receives it in the seat of his pants—you can be thankful his pants are NOT buck shot.

The village police committee are pretty well informed as to the ringleaders who have started needless pranks so early, and are informed that unless a different attitude is shown during the next few days, they will be called in for questioning. One of the members pointed out that to patrol the village throughout the night with a special police force would cost several hundred dollars of the taxpayers' money, but that the residents believe it will be spent under such circumstances.

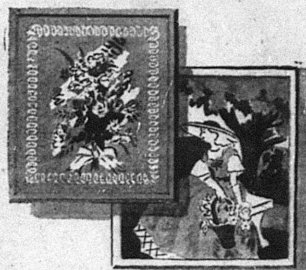

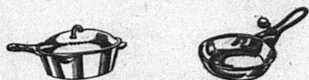

EDITORIAL

LABOR'S 'LABOR FIRST' PLATFORM

INSTEAD of becoming an ally of management and government in working for a common goal of increased prosperity for all, labor has apparently decided to fight alone on a "Prosperity for Labor First" platform. The outcome is fairly obvious. By declaring war on management, union leaders will find they have to fight every inch of the way and will probably never reach the goal, which, had they been more patient, might quickly have been achieved by peaceful, co-operative means.

By declaring war on government, labor leaders are encouraging congress to replace its program to help labor by one which will curb their activities. And by declaring war on the people, by interfering with our return to normal conditions, labor leaders are playing with dynamite.

INTERNATIONAL CONFLICT

FOR many months—if not years—representatives of our government will be conferring with representatives of our Allies to try to work out the complicated problem of a permanent peace.

So far those meetings do not seem to have made the progress which most of us hoped they might. The interests of all nations seriously conflict with one another at times—and because of those conflicts considerable ill-feeling may be stirred up.

It is important that the people of this country be kept fully informed about what is going on about the proposals and counter-proposals. But it is equally important that we hold our tempers in check and realize that there is bound to be conflict among nations which do not think alike or have similar ambitions.

It is possible that the knotty problems of international relations can be worked out. But there won't be a chance of reaching common agreements if any nation considers war as a possible tool for forcing its views on the rest of the world.

PAYS TO SHOW APPRECIATION

HERE'S something you can learn from Ed Wynn, the comedian. He says that some of his success has been due to the appreciation he shows to people who do things for him. He gets, of course, a great deal of publicity, but he never fails to thank the person who has given it to him. When a columnist runs his name, he sends him a single-word telegram—"Thanks."

When he is on the road with a show, and a local reporter calls to interview him, Ed Wynn always gets his name and makes a note of the paper he is working for. After the interview has appeared, Ed sends him his one-word telegram. Is the local reporter pleased?

Alexander de Seversky is very much on the front pages these days, and has become an influence in our air strategy. He has designed basic trainer planes, and has become famous in the world war aviation. But he says that a great deal of his success has come from the men around him, the engineers who work with him. He is famous, also, for his ability to inspire loyalty among the men who work for him. He says he does this chiefly by showing the men appreciation. He makes it a point never to go into his plant and come out without having said something appreciative to some of his workers. Sometimes it is merely a pat on the back, sometimes he says, "Thanks for the fine way you have handled this. I am glad to be associated with you."

E. H. Little was born on a farm in Mecklenburg County, North Carolina, and worked selling mules. One day, to his astonishment, the Colgate company offered him a job as salesman in another part of the state. On the day he was to go to work, he started out early and went from grocery store to grocery store trying to sell his soap. But he was new at the business and did not know his product. At the end of the day he had only one order, and this was from a small inconsequential store.

He was ashamed to come in and show the district manager the small order. But when the manager looked at the order, he said, "Thank you for trying so hard."

Doings In Congress

THERE IS something rotten—not in Denmark—but in the discharge business. There is red tape and more red tape. There is waste of manpower and more waste of manpower. There is squandering of the taxpayers' money, and more reckless squandering. All this in trying to get our armed forces discharged.

THE WAR and Navy departments

tell us what they are going to do. The chief-of-staff, and the admirals tell us what they are going to do, not now but always by next July. Then they satisfy the public, they come out with exaggerated statements that they have discharged 25,000 men in a week or a day. Twenty-six thousand in a week or a day, when we have 100,000 officers to do it with, is

nothing to boast of.

ACCORDING to the Army's statement, they alone have 176 discharge centers scattered throughout the nation. At each of these centers, they have a large number of officers doing the discharging. If we divide 25,000 by 176, we get 147 as the average number discharged daily at each of the discharging stations. That certainly is nothing to be proud of. They should be able to discharge ten times that number per day. There are some eight million still to be discharged.

HERE ARE facts gathered from one of many letters from a father concerning his son. After twenty-seven months of service in the Pacific, the son landed on Minneapolis on Sept. 23rd. Here he was advised that he would be discharged. He was put to digging ditches for two weeks. Then, he was transferred and arrived in Minneapolis on Sept. 23rd. Here he expected a prompt discharge, an end opportunity to join his family.

HE CHECKED IN at Minneapolis, and then was granted a seventy-two hour leave. At the expiration, he was granted another seventy-two hours. At the expiration of that seventy-two hours, he was granted another seventy-two and ordered to report every seventy-two hours until Oct. 15. Here is a splendid example of bureaucracy in action—wasting their time and wasting his time in having him report. I repeat that there is something rotten with the discharge business.

WHATEVER the cause behind the scene, the American people will not stand much longer for this kind of juggling. If all these discharges are competence—just bureaucratic ignorance—then it is time that we call a halt. If the motive is to continue a large armed force in peacetime, plunging the nation deeper and deeper into debt at the rate of about a billion dollars every two months, then it is time Congress take action.

CONGRESS is still on the job. We find that there is a bottleneck here in Washington. It is a bureaucratic bottleneck through which all these discharges are supposed to flow. Our patience is not only abused, but is becoming exhausted. The American servicemen, who have won two major wars, must be promptly discharged.

AN ORDINANCE DETERMINING THAT IT IS NECESSARY TO TRIM TREES FOR WIRE CLEARANCE, AUTHORIZING THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF PUBLIC AFFAIRS TO EXPEND MONEY, ADVERTISE FOR BIDS, ENTER INTO CONTRACT THEREFORE, AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

Whereas, there is now over four hundred trees which need to be trimmed for wire clearance in order that the electric lines of the municipal light system can be operated efficiently, and, Whereas, the Board of Trustees of Public Affairs has neither the equipment nor experienced man power at its disposal to properly do said work, nor therefore,

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, STATE OF OHIO:

Section 1. That it is hereby deemed necessary to improve the municipal electric light system of said village by trimming all trees along the power and electric lines of said utility for wire clearance.

Section 2. That the entire cost and expense of said improvement is to be paid solely from the revenue derived from the operation of the electric light plant utility. Said entire cost shall not exceed \$2,000.00.

Section 3. That the Board of Trustees of Public Affairs and the Village Clerk are hereby authorized and directed to advertise for bids for the trimming of trees along the power and electric lines of said utility for the purpose of securing wire clearance as provided by law, and the Village Clerk is said Board of Trustees of Public Affairs are hereby directed to open any and all bids submitted pursuant to said advertisement and to enter into contract with the lowest and best bidder as provided by law for said work.

Section 4. That this ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency measure necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health and safety and shall take effect and be in force from and after the date of its passage. The reason for such necessity lies in the fact that this work is necessary for the efficient operation of said utility.

SOLDIER NEWS

Looking forward to home
S/Sgt. Kenneth E. Coy, son of Mr. and Mrs. E. W. Coy of Plymouth Route, is so in hopes of getting home before Christmas that he wrote to Mr. and Mrs. Frank Landefeld, former neighbors, and asked that Frank check his car over and have it ready for him.

He wrote on Sept. 6th "they are getting us ready to move to Japan in October sometime, near Kobe on the main island. We get our occupational training in about a week—the training will last for a month—then Japan bound. I have hopes of going because I have 84 points and expect to be on my way home soon."

"There is nothing definite whether the high point men will have to go yet but if I do, it won't be for long, as I have hopes of being home for Christmas. As there is no more consoling, I can now tell you that I have been in 213 consecutive days of combat. I was in the hospital twice with yellow jaundice. Before I went to the hospital, my company really took a beating. There were 38 men left in our company, out of 225 men. Then we got replacements and now we are nearly full strength again. A lot of the old men have come back to us. I have been in many historical places such as Bataan. It was all jungle and really spooky; at that time we were the strongest armed regiment in the Southwest Pacific. We had 200 airplanes attached to us. We didn't make any contact with the enemy but we sure found plenty of fresh holes where they had been. It was after we went through the peninsula and east of Manila that the 38th Division was reduced to 38 men. Later, we went back to Bataan as

a holding force. We were also holding force on Corregidor; in peace time that was a soldier's paradise but it was in ruins when we were there. We killed four stray Japs there. Then we were sent up to northern Luzon in the Congaleine valley. I was on the front line when the war was over. Boy, were we ever a happy bunch."

On the 12th of August a grenade exploded in front of my hole and a piece of it hit me over the right eye. Just a scratch, though, but I got a purple heart out of it. Now I'm at a base camp waiting to go to a staying area for the army of occupation. From there to Japan, as I said before I hope to be home by Christmas at the most."

S/Sgt. Ervin concludes his letter with explicit directions for fixing up his car that he might go "farm hunting" when he comes home.
