RECRUITER WILL BE HERE TODAY

Army veterans who enlist before November 21 may regain the highest non-commissioned rank they held at discharge providing they left the army between May 11 and November 1 this year.

Announcement of the November 21 deadline was made today by First Lieut. Anatomy M. Matukonis, commanding officer of the Mansfield, Ohio, U. S. Army Recruiting Station.

Men discharged as privates between May 11 and Nov. 1 will be promoted to private first class if they had at least six months' service and enlist before Nov. 21, it was pointed out.

Re-enlistment bonuses and furloughs will be given to men meeting this deadline. Veterans discharged after Nov. 1 must re-enlist within 20 days to regain their highest former rank.

The November quotas for Regular Army enlistments in the Mansfield district has been set at 49, according to Lt. Matukonis. Since opening the campaign in September, the Mansfield station has enlisted 13 men.

The 70-county Cleveland district, of which this station is a part, is leading the Fifth Service Command's campaign to obtain 70,000 enlistments by July 1, '46. A recruiter from the Mansfield office will be in Plymouth today at the Post Office from 1:00 to 5:00 p. m. to assist any young man with information if he desires to enlist.

MITES HELD WEDNESDAY FOR FOUR CHILDREN WHO DIED IN AUTO-TRAIN CRASH SUNDAY

In the large front room banked with flowers and lined with four white candles, George Stewart of New Haven conducted services for four children Wednesday afternoon at 2:30, victims of an auto-train crash late Sunday which snuffed out the lives of the children, brothers and sisters, from one family.

The rites were private, being attended only by the grief-stricken parents, brother, sisters, relatives and close friends. The last rites were held at the home of the parents, Mr. and Mrs. Ollie Row, on Route 598, two miles south of Plymouth. The sympathy of friends, neighbors and nearby communities was expressed in

the many and beautiful floral offerings that filled the home. The remains of the children were interred in New Haven cemetery.

When he entered the family car to go to New Haven Sunday afternoon, Harold Row, 17, driver of the ill-fated auto, was joined by his brother Earl, 15; Cleopius, his sister, 13, and Jane, 4, the youngest of the family of eight children. Harold had been driving the 1936 Oldsmobile for some time, and when the children got into the car to make the short trip into New Haven other members of the family had no fear or anxiety. But as the car approached the B. & O. railroad crossing, just south of New Haven on Route 598, the suddenness of an impact caused by a freight train striking the car, instantly killed Harold, the driver, and his brother Earl. Jane, the youngest of injured, died at 4:00 o'clock Monday morning, only to be followed in death by Cleopius, 13, who passed away at 5:45 Monday afternoon. Both died at the Willard hospital where they were taken immediately after the mishap.
