Unemployment Relief Soars High

COLUMBUS O., Nov. 28.—Unemployment compensation payments in Ohio soared to \$8,646,489 during October, an all-time high.

Accounting for the record increase in October was the fact that the bulk of the workers who had new claims in the first few weeks after V-J Day started receiving their unemployment compensation during that month. Charles H. Jones, administrator of the Ohio Bureau of Unemployment Compensation, said: "It is usually during the fifth week of unemployment that payments start on income claims, providing there are no irregularities to delay the claims, the administrator explained. On continued claims, checks are now mailed within five days after the claim is received in the Central Office in Columbus."

An average of 65,772 Ohioans received benefit weekly during the month, less than half of the approximately 150,000 persons who prior to October 1 had filed new claims after V-J Day layoffs. Many of those who originally filed claims returned to jobs before they had been unemployed long enough to receive benefit payments, the BUC administrator said.

A decline in the number of new layoffs in the state was indicated by a 50 per cent drop in new claims filed by the Bureau. A total of 49,095 unemployed workers filed new claims during October as compared with 115,992 during September.

The average weekly benefit check during October was for \$19.35, reflecting the recent amendments to the Ohio law increasing the benefit maximum in the state to \$21 per week for workers with sufficiently high "Base Period" earnings to qualify.
