## THE WEATHER

October, 1945 was a cool, wet month. It rained, more or less, on eighteen days and there were very few days of typical "October" weather. The first real falling frost occurred on the morning of the 15th.

The average temperature for the month was 51.6 degrees while the normal is 53.7. The highest was 76 degrees on the 12th and the lowest 31 degrees on the 15th and 27th.

The total rainfall for the month was 3.4 inches while the normal is 2.2 inches. The greatest in 24 hours was 0.96 inch on the 23rd. There were 11 cloudy, 6 partly cloudy and 14 clear days.

At the end of the month considerable corn had not been cut or picked, due to the wet weather, but most of it turned out better than expected. Soy beans did not do so well, due to late planting and the drought in August, and some fields have not yet been combined. Wheat, generally speaking, looks good, although some fields were planted late and need some good growing weather before winter sets in. Pastures look good, or better at this time of the year.

## Voters Favor School Bonds

LASCH WINS OVER ROBINSON FOR MAYOR; FETTERS RETURNED AS COUNCILMAN.

The polls in Plymouth Tuesday attracted the largest number of voters in what is believed to be the greatest vote ever cast in an "off-year" election. There is no doubt but what the local school bond issue brought out voters who, in the "off-election" would not bother to cast a ballot.

While the village was slated to elect new officials, the bond issue came to a boiling point just as the election was being held. Not that there was any public controversy or "urgency" measures used by any group, but the fact that the citizens realized it was now or never to get a new grade school building. And with this determination in mind the bond issue was carried better than a three-to-one vote for the new building.

**New Officials**  
In the mayor's race, Joe Lasch won out over C. A. Robinson by a majority of 73 votes. Both men showed an exceptional showing in the polls, and Robinson was favored in his precinct, while Lasch was the more soundly by a good majority.

In the council race, all were newcomers but two, L. R. Fetters and H. V. Buehler, as incumbents. Fetters gained his seat by coming up in fourth place with a total of 309 votes, while Luckman lost his routing 208 votes.

Harry Trauger, well-known citizen, but new in a political race, was high man for council, taking the lead of the eight candidates with 340 votes while Whitney Briggs came in second with a total of 288 counters. Heed is the votes in the race stacked up: Trauger 340; Briggs 238; Mosier 311; Fetters 309; Fogleson 288; Mosier 274; Burns 226 and Luckman 208.

According to the ballots L. Z. Davis will keep his place as village trustee. He received 277 votes over his opponent, Mrs. Harold Lippus, who polled 181.

In the clerk's competition, L. E. Brown won out over Harold Farrar. Brown polled 257 against Farrar's 189.

## Sgt. R. Hendricks Cited For Bravery

Sgt. Richard Hendricks, son of Mr. and Mrs. Clyde Hendricks, 916 Jackson St., Ft. Wayne, Ind., has been awarded the Bronze Star for heroic achievement while serving with the Engineers Corps.

The citation accompanying the award reads: "For exceptionally meritorious conduct in the performance of outstanding services in connection with military operations against the enemy during the period from June, 1944, to June 21, 1945. As chief administrator of the intelligence section of his engineer section, and performing duties normally assigned to an officer, Sergeant Hendricks contributed materially to the assembly and distribution of engineer intelligence and maps to subordinate units. He was largely responsible for the adequate map supply during the planning stage of the Ryukyu operation."

Prior to entering service Sergeant Hendricks was educational counselor at Grinnell college, Grinnell, Ia. He was graduated from North Side High School and entered the service in March 1942. His wife, Mrs. Elizabeth Hendricks, is residing in Marysville, Ohio.

Local citizens will recall that Sgt. Hendricks and wife operated the Hitching Post just prior to his induction.

## S-Sgt. Dawson Writes Very Interesting Letter

Basca, India  
Sept. 24, 1945

Dear Tommy,

I believe that I'm about the only service man from Plymouth that has not written you, although in the last five years, I have thought of doing it, many times.

In all my time in the army I have not had the good fortune to run across anyone I know from home.

The Advertiser has been a steady friend indeed. It has been a regular companion. Although they are dated from six weeks to three months back they are still

news to me, I'm happy to see so many of the boys home safely and my discharges, too.

Wish I could have been home for the celebration.

When our speedy troopship left Hampton Roads a year ago last August, I thought we were heading for the Mediterranean sea route for the C. B. I. theater, but when we docked at the Panama Canal a few days later we were considering the chances of service in Australia. After three long weeks of nothing but water and Pacific storms, the ship entered Melbourne harbor.

Next day we shoved off and on Oct. 9th, docked at Bombay. Next day at 4 a. m. we left the great transport which had come to seem

like a home. Our group marched across the city to an enormous railroad station where we boarded an electric train for the first leg of a two thousand mile ride across the heart of India. Authors who write about India never fail to mention the smell and odors and it was here at this station that I knew what the authors were trying to express.

From Calcutta we were flown to our destination. As we stepped off the plane the base mess officer was asking for cooks and mess sergeants, but he didn't need any bakers.

Although I am not a mess sergeant, the job of mess sergeant for the main A. T. C. mess hall was shoved upon my shoulders. Then a few days later, three cooks, myself and some natives were "piled" onto a truck, driven seven miles back to the "sticks" and told to serve dinner next day.

The kitchen was hardly more than a big garage and the separate dining room was only a barn to me. A few months later that same mess hall was to become one of the finest officers' clubs in India. Soon after Christmas I was transferred to a new squadron of pilots, and radiomen, as the baker. By using my imagination and patience I was soon baking plenty of good rolls and pastries.

Next month will be a year at the same area and in the short space of time have learned to like and to hate the place at will.

India is probably the strangest, most fascinating country in the world. I am conscious of my inability to describe the country and its peoples. Right at the moment, as the sun is going down in the west the sky is all one vast curtain of color changing from pink to orange to red and purple, against a blue, green background of sky and the higher also status reflecting rays of pink. The tall coconut palms, making the scene all the more romantic.

As for the people, I cannot write with a free mind. I have been among the natives of this Bengal province and of the Nepal state, but I have not come to know and understand them. The many thousands of coolies (common laborers) who work for the British, are in no position to explain the native life.

I find myself continually thinking of them as animals. In my experience with the wealthy, better educated merchant of Bengal, I find them clever, greedy, proud, narrow, but politely friendly.

Upon our arrival in Bengal province we found the people in a run down condition, glad to work for thirty cents a day and a little bread or dog biscuits and coffee. Bengal had just started cutting its first rice crop in three years. The two years famine had been terrible and there's been almost no help from other Indian states or the British. Consider this quotation: "Where persons die in large numbers, it is always difficult to arrange for their proper disposal according to the religious rites of the respective communities to which they belonged when alive. A very considerable part of the dead lie strewn unattended at all places. Some are thrown into the rivers and streams, or taken to the outskirts of the village and left there to rot and decay, or to be devoured by vultures, dogs, jackals and other animals. It is not a rare sight when these animals are found to be busy with the corpses even at places where people abound. The animals are not scared away from their act simply because in such a case the dead will be lying there for an indefinite period for want of men to remove them elsewhere."

The Indians have endured twenty-two famines during British rule and they blame it on their master. Life does not mean much to these people, they will not kill a cow or a pig, but choose to starve.

May be on my way home sometime in October. I enjoy Sid's letters in the Troop News.

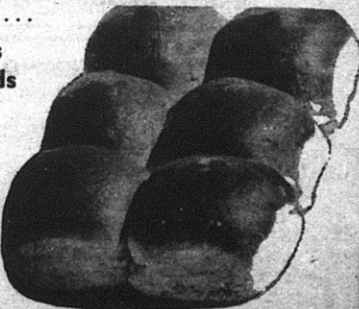

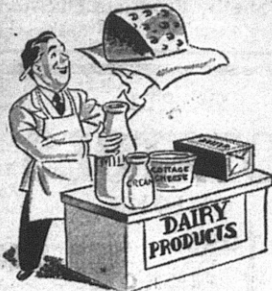

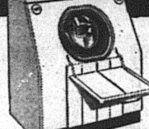
