

YOUTH DROWNS WHILE FISHING

TRAGIC END FOR LAD WHO BECAME ENTANGLED IN HIS FISHING LINE.

Funeral services were held on Monday afternoon at the McQuinn funeral home for Keith Frederick, seven and one-half-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Howard Frederick, who was accidentally drowned Friday afternoon in the "oil hole" on Huron River, near the Mary Kate Park. Services were conducted by Rev. E. R. Haines, pastor of the Methodist church. Interment was made in the Dick Cemetery on the Hunter Hill road, near Shiloh.

Surviving the youth are his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Howard Frederick; three brothers, James, John and William, all at home. The family resides on the North Street Road, near the scene of the accident.

In giving an account of the tragedy, Friday afternoon, Dan Franklin, park caretaker, stated he was at his quarters on the park grounds, preparing his evening meal, when two children, Shirley Bradford and Leanna Shields, came up to him and told him that a boy had drowned at the "oil hole." Franklin immediately went to the scene of the accident, and observed the last's fishing pole and line out in the middle of the pool; he also noticed air bubbles coming to the top of the water. He attempted to wade out, but the water is some ten or twelve feet deep at this point, and he managed to hold on to the line, but it broke at the slightest pull.

Franklin then secured a forked pole with the thought of grappling for the youth's clothing, and while at this stage of the rescue, Gordon Brown, who had come down to the park for his son Jimmy, gave a hand, and he was successful in pulling the boy to shore.

Arriving on the scene Franklin told the little girls to summon additional help, and they first went to the Gottfried home, but no one was there; they then went to the Frederick home near by and told the mother of the boy what had happened. Her husband is bringing the body from the stream. The youth was rushed to the office of the hospital, where artificial respiration was employed without success. The youngster had been in the water for a full thirty minutes.

Just what happened to cause the youth to fall into the water is hard to determine. Keith, with his brother, James and their cousin from Mansfield, went over to stream to fish. It is supposed that Keith became entangled in his line and toppled off the high bank into the water. The remainder of the body to the surface the fishing line was wrapped about his feet.

A group of five children who were attracted to the scene by the shouts from James Frederick were in wading at a point several hundred feet down the stream. The "oil hole" is not located in the park, but is several yards east.

The sympathy of the community is extended to the family in the loss of their son, whose tragic death cast a pall over the entire village.

THIEVES LOOT WILLARD FIRMS

Willard experienced a "wholesale robbery" Monday night or Tuesday morning when two thieves were discovered that at least five business houses had been entered by thieves who made away with cash, estimated around \$600.

The robbers knocked the combination from an old fire-proof safe at the B. F. Fine Furniture Co., and took more than \$500 in bills after entering the store by the way of a rear window.

The safe contained silver, bonds and checks which were not taken. It is said this loss is covered by insurance.

Finishing up at Fink's the robbers entered the next store room, Wilkinson's Paint Store, and it is reported that more than \$100 was taken from the safe and the cash drawer. Entrance was made by a trap door in the roof.

The thieves removed a glass panel from the box office at the Temple theatre and here they rifled the cash drawer which netted them \$150.

The two dairies in Willard, the Square Deal and the Willard Dairy were also entered, but no money was in the registers at either place.

The burglars finished up their work at Sam Danforth's filling station where they gained entrance through a rear window. No cash was taken here the drawer was emptied when the station closed up. Danforth did not immediately report the robbery.

All of the stores entered are located on Myrtle avenue, the main street in Willard. Others came in several boys for questioning on Tuesday. So far no clues point to anyone. However, police are making a thorough investigation.

From 6:00 to 7:00 will be the fellowship hour in the form of a "basket supper," and you are urged to request to bring your own table service.

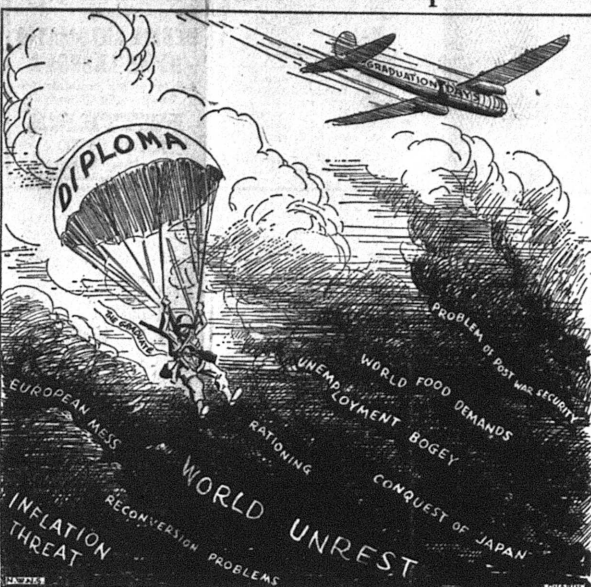
The evening address will be brought by Rev. Daniel S. Packard of Stoughtonville, vice president of Young People's superintendent for the Ohio C. E. union.

HOLD UP SHELBY STATION AGENT

At 2:45 Monday morning, just after passenger train No. 5 had gotten out, and the usual crowd dispersed, Bernie Nugent, New York Central passenger agent at Shelby, had just started eating his lunch, when a man appeared at the window and wanted a ticket to Gallon. Nugent went over and was preparing the ticket when another man came to the window and ordered the Shelby station agent to hand over the cash box. The two men then forced Nugent into a green sedan which was parked with the motor running, near the station, taking the cash box with them.

They drove several blocks from the station and then made Nugent get out of the car. He returned to the station and notified police, who sent out a state-wide description of the bandits. One man was described as being slim, about 28 years old, wearing a cap. The second was believed to be about 40 years old, weighing 165 pounds and wearing a hat. Both men were dressed in overalls and jack boots. They brandished heavy revolvers and were not masked.

This is the first hold-up for many years in Shelby, and the one Monday morning at the station netted the robbers about \$60.

Late reports are that no clue has been found that would lead to the apprehension of the two men.

RECEIVES BURNS

When Floyd Robbins, Jr., an attendant at Jud Marmion's Salsola Station took off the cap of a radiator, he received painful burns about the neck and chest, caused by escaping steam. Robbins had no warning that pressure existed in the radiator and he was not aware of the fact that he did not receive serious face burns.

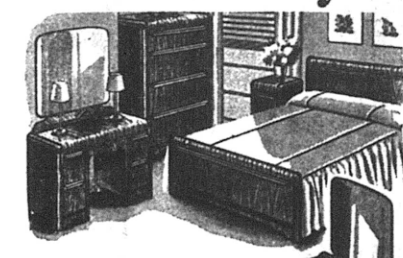

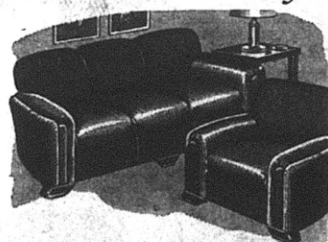

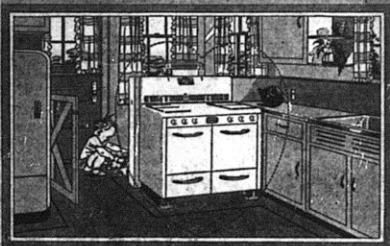

Farmers Will Meet in Willard Tonight; Hear Report, Organize

One of the biggest and most interesting farm meetings of the year is scheduled for this evening at the High School in Willard, Ohio, starting at 7:30 o'clock. Several important speakers will appear on the program and will point out tactics relative to OPA quotas and price ceilings. H. H. Fackler, state chairman of the Ohio Wheat Marketing Protest Association, will be on hand to give a report of his recent visit to Washington, where he was called in with R. H. Myers of Attica, to present ideas to Congress for changes in OPA policies and price set-ups.

Fackler also states that the old organization of farmers formerly known as the Ohio Wheat Marketing Protest Association which opposed the Triple A and its policies a few years ago, will be given a new name. At a meeting of the executive body recently held in Mansfield, the name of the organization will be the "American Farmers Association," and will include not only farmers, but small business men. The aim and purpose of the American Farmers Association will be to secure "cost of production" farm products, and to eliminate subsidies and red-tape that is engulfing farm operations.

Every farmer in this vicinity is invited to the meeting Thursday evening, where informative discussions will be held, and where a program will be outlined for the preservation of the American Farmer as an individual, rather than a collective producing group supervised by government rules and regulations.

More Idle Acres

According to Guy L. Taylor, Richland County AAA chairman, 79 farms in Richland County will

remain idle this year. This represents a total of 4,527 acres which will produce no food. The lack of manpower is said to be the main reason for the suspension of the food-producing acres. Taylor also pointed out that 150 other farms will be under partial cultivation.

Due to lack of space last week the production of the report of the Bowling Green meeting of Wood County farmers was held over. However, the report in full follows, and should prove interesting to our farm readers.

At the meeting of more than 200 farmers on May 21 at the Bowling Green State University, these farmers present made it plain that they had stirred-up production mainly because of government regulation; secondly that they were entitled to "cost of production"; and third, that there prevailed a help-shortage on farms.

OPA representatives present at the meeting were H. G. Bogart, Toledo district director; H. A. Varney, five-state regional agricultural official; M. C. Schow, of the meat control administration, and other analysis, price specialists and gasoline rationing executives, for the most impressive array of OPA officials which has yet appeared before the farm group.

Resolution Adopted

A resolution was adopted seeking elimination of quotas on food production and subsidy payments either to framers, processors or packers.

A free-point resume of their position was offered to OPA. It is:

"1.—We are perfectly willing to cooperate with the price and ra-

tioning programs under wartime emergencies on the basis of cost of production.

"2.—If people expect more food, price ceilings must be adjusted to permit increased production.

"3.—Anything which causes decreased production is directly responsible for the black market. This group feels that OPA rationing policies are directly responsible for decreased production."

Output Rise Not Planned
A poll of the group on present production plans showed that not a person was planning to increase production or maintain it at present levels.

A considerable number of men said they had sharply curtailed raising of beef, hogs, and poultry and several said they virtually had gone out of the business.

The argument that farmers were not meeting their cost of production was accompanied by individual statistics from the records of Rolla Myers, Attica poultry raiser and secretary of the protest association.

Mr. Myers also displayed a number of clothing articles which he termed poor quality and high price. He showed superior material in a toy teddy bear and asked why materials were diverted to unessential items at the expense of essential wares.

Shows Print Material

Mr. Myers also displayed a number of pieces of print material, which he explained were acquired by washing feed sacks. He decried the use of such material for dresses could not be obtained and remarked that:

"What woman in a city wants to buy a whole sack of feed she can't use, just to get material for a dress."

George Maidment, Bowling Green, chairman of the Wood County group, spoke against subsidiaries and predicted food riots among the people unless corrective measures are taken immediately.

He pointed out both the draft and the inducement of industrial wage rates had taken help from the farms and left only old men and women to do the work.

H. H. Fackler, Plymouth, state chairman of the Quota Protest Association, recalled how his group had battled the A.A.A. and protested a requirement that farm gasoline applicants designate their A.A.A. districts when applying for rations.

He told the assembly he served as a member of his own ration board, and charged the demands of OPA forms were "making pretty good jars of the people and penalizing the ones who tried to be honest."

Meat Shortage Blamed

He charged the OPA sought to blame the farmer for the shortage of meat, but said the shortage was caused because the farmer has been forced to produce without earning his cost of production.

Mr. Fackler cited the indifference of a neighbor who fed two steers at a cost of \$376.70 and sold them for \$326, a loss of \$50.30 on feeding cost alone. He asserted the government could not regiment the farmer and charged farmers were unable to replace machinery at present price levels.

He said OPA rationing policies had contributed to the meat short' age in that veal for a long time was point-free. This attracted veal to market and cut down sharply the feeding out to our own meat supply as beef.

Veal Before Beef

"Remember that before you get beef it's veal first," Mr. Bogart declared. He said it was foolish to sell off all the young stock and that it would have been much wiser to hold point on veal and let the beef go point-free.

This, he asserted, would have been an attraction to the A.A.A. and beef to full age and weight rather than sacrifice many pounds of meat by selling off the young stock as veal.

Congress established the OPA, and you will have to have Congress finish it off," H. G. Bogart, Toledo, district OPA chief, told the protesting farmers.

Don't Want Controls

"We of the OPA don't want these controls any longer than we need them," Mr. Bogart said. "We want to get back to our old jobs and business, too."

Mr. Bogart told the group he wasn't a farmer himself, but that he had farmer friends who assured him they were making money. He pointed out that a half-million farmers lost their land during the inflation after the last war and said he felt sure the group didn't want that repeated.

He said he did not dispute their claim to legitimate complaints and asked them to tell him just what their specific grounds of complaint were and what remedies they recommended.

Cites R. Records

He cited records from Mr. Myers' farm as an example of what was required to put across the claims of the group that farmers were not making their cost of production.

Mr. Bogart also pointed out that grievances on farm machinery, lumber supplies, clothing material and similar items were not under the jurisdiction of his agency.

He termed it unfair to lump all criticism of the government into an attack on OPA, when OPA is responsible for only such things as Congress has authorized it to handle.

He said his office would listen to the opinions of any group of citizens and make the recommendations be made specific so he could submit them to Washington.
