

NEW HAVEN SCHOOLS ANNOUNCE SCHEDULE AND YEAR'S PROGRAM

Lack of sufficient funds halted the complete program of improvements planned for the New Haven schools, but approximately \$1600 has been spent during the summer vacation for painting, varnishing and general repair, which included a complete overhauling of the heating system, insulation of old portion of building; painting and carpenter repair work to windows, doors, etc.

School convenes Tuesday, Sept. 4, for a half day session; the school enrollment is expected to be slightly smaller than last year with the school census showing an enrollment of 130 pupils in the elementary grades and 90 in the high school. Hours will be the same as last year, 8:45 to 11:45 a. m. and 12:30 to 3:30 p. m.

If help can be secured lunches will be provided by operating a school cafeteria. This will be an entirely new project but will be of great benefit to the students.

To date, the school is still in need of three bus drivers who make two trips each both morning and evening to transport the pupils.

HURON CO. FAIR ENDS ON FRIDAY

NORWALK O. — The twenty-third annual Huron County fair, which has been attracting thousands of patrons here this week, will draw to a close Friday evening, Aug. 31, when the WLS Circus, featuring the famed White Horse Troupe, will be presented. VET KILLED IN AUTO MISHAP

Funeral services for Technical Sergeant Carl Mayer, 33, were held Wednesday afternoon at 1:30 from the Pink funeral home in Willard. Dr. H. E. Pfeiffer, pastor of St. Stephen's Evangelical and Reformed Church, Sandusky, officiated, and burial took place in Oakland cemetery, Sandusky. The Willard Post of Veterans of Foreign Wars conducted military services at the grave. Sgt. Mayer was instantly killed early Sunday morning in an automobile accident ten miles north of Willard, enroute to his home west of Plymouth to Sandusky.

His companion, Richard Armstrong, Willard, in whose car he was a passenger, was thrown clear of the wreckage and uninjured, it was said.

The accident is said to have occurred when the driver lost control upon hitting some loose material, causing the car to overturn. Mayer's death is reported to have been caused from a broken neck.

The son of Mr. and Mrs. Carl Mayer, who make their home west of Plymouth on the Frederick Blackford farm, had just returned last week from the European Theatre of War, after fourteen months of active duty as a radar man on a B-17. He was stationed at an air base in England and had 32 missions over enemy territory to his credit.

A graduate of Willard High school with the class of 1942, he attended Fenn College, Cleveland, before enlisting in the Army Air Corps in January, 1943.

Besides his parents, he is survived by one brother, Wayne, Seaman Cook, 3rd Class, of the Navy, stationed at a base in California.

TWO INJURED IN COLLISION

Two teen-age young people, one from Willard and the other from Shelby, are in serious condition at the Municipal hospital, at Willard, as a result of a collision Tuesday night between the motorcycle on which they were riding and a truck at the intersection of Routes 194 and 99, east of Willard.

Donald Moll, driver of the truck, said he had stopped for the traffic signal at the intersection and the motorcycle collided head-on with the truck when it made a left turn. Moll was not held.

The accident occurred at 10:30 Tuesday night.

FRANK LANDEFELD SELLS NEW HAVEN ROAD HOME

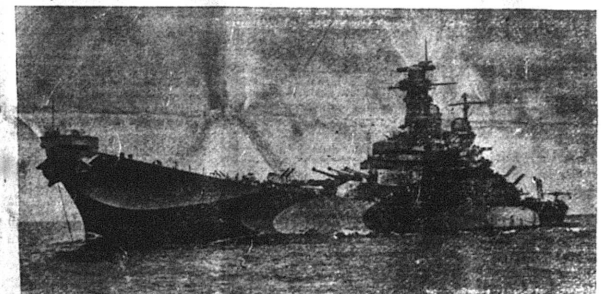

Battleship Missouri To Be Scene of Surrender



The United States Navy's mighty, 45,000-ton battleship, the USS Missouri, will end her World War II career in a blaze of glory Aug. 31, 1945, in Tokyo Bay, when she serves as the scene of the historic unconditional surrender of Japan to the United Nations. Proudly bearing the name of the home state of President Harry S. Truman, the fighting USS Missouri has been named by General of the Army Douglas MacArthur, supreme Allied commander, as the locale of the formal ending of the war in the Pacific. Fleet Admiral Chester W. Nimitz, commander-in-chief of the United States Pacific Fleet and Pacific Ocean areas, will sign for the United States, General of the Army MacArthur, for the Allied

forces which fought in the Pacific. The USS Missouri was launched Jan. 29, 1944. Construction was ordered June 12, 1940. Her keel was laid on Jan. 6, 1941, at the New York Navy Yard.

Local Boy To Be Among Those Present

While first honors will go to the mighty USS Missouri in the unconditional surrender of Japan tomorrow, her sister ship, the Iowa, accompanied by the battleship South Dakota and two British battlewagons, The Duke of York and King George V, along with 25 more ships, which joined the fleet will make up the total armada of 137 vessels to steam into Tokyo Bay.

While no definite word has been received by Mr. Norris Kirkpatrick from his son, Dan Kirkpatrick, RM, 3-c, he has reason to believe that Dan will be among those present, being a member of the crew on the Iowa.

Dan was formerly on the New Jersey, which recently returned to the States for repairs and was transferred to the Iowa, and unless other developments have taken place, he should be up front with the Missouri.

Dan is a member of that group of boys of the Class of '44, who enlisted as a body before the closing of school and entered the Navy. After boot training at Great Lakes, Ill., he qualified for schooling at Madison, Wis., and later went to sea.

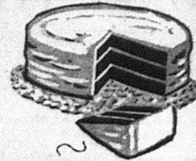

EDITORIAL

UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE

CONGRESS is trying to decide how much a man or woman should receive as unemployment compensation.

In this highly technical age, where jobs for all are dependent upon general prosperity, it may be necessary to have some provision to help take care of those who are unable to find work. But the whole situation must be handled with great wisdom.

We believe that the majority of Americans still insist on doing an honest day's work to get a day's pay. But we also realize that there is a growing minority which has no such compunctions and is hoping unemployment insurance will reach the level where they can make unemployment their profession.

In passing unemployment legislation, Congress must guard against making unemployment attractive to any working man or woman.

NEW AUTOMOBILES

THERE is something thrilling in reading about the new automobiles which are now coming off the production line in Detroit. It may be a long while before we drive one, or even see many in the local showrooms, but it is grand news to know that they are on the way.

But, although all of us can look forward to having a new car before too long, we should remember that the automobiles being turned out today are for war use only. The manufacture of them is being pushed, not just to bring about gradual reconversion to peacetime manufacturing, but chiefly to furnish transportation to war workers, doctors and officials who would be greatly handicapped in their duties if they did not have this necessary means of transportation.

In spite of our many public conveyances—airplanes, trains, buses and street cars—the functioning of our country is dependent upon the automobile. Many old cars are breaking down and must be replaced.

FROM POLITICS TO BUSINESS SUCCESS

HERE'S a woman who gave war jobs to other women in a unique way. She is Miss Vivien Kellems, Westport, Conn. Do you remember when Clare Boothe Luce ran for congress? Well, she ran against her. Clare won and Vivien was defeated, but that's water under the bridge.

Vivien Kellems, 16 years ago, started a manufacturing company of her own. And that's quite a chore. She manufactured a cable-grip and the idea came from a child called a "finger-trap." You stick your finger into it and try to pull your finger out. The harder you pull, the more firmly the thing has you snagged.

She started manufacturing these for pulling cables underground. She got along quite well, too. These cable-grips sold from 20 cents to \$500 each. They'd hold anything from a pencil to a heavy navy shell.

She got an order from the Signal corps to make these so-called grips; the order was so big—2,800 a week—that her factory couldn't take care of it. Then, in the twinkling of a flashlight, the order was doubled.

So she hit on the idea of letting the women in her section do the work at home. She trained two or three housewives to see if they could do the job, and lo! they could. Her own particular work could be done in the sitting room of the home instead of in a factory. And it could be done as the mother sat minding Junior.

She has handed out jobs to 100 women in her neighborhood who were able to earn about 80 cents an hour doing the work; and, they did it at home, too. Eleven of the most expert workers were able to make \$45 a week. Sixty of her workers had been able to make \$15 a week.

She has had such a success using women in their home that I hope other employers over the country will take up the idea and apply it in their own fields of manufacturing.

Doings In Congress

By CONGRESSMAN WILLIAM LEMKE

NOW THAT the war is over, there must be prompt demobilization. Unless this is done the nation will virtually lose a generation. It is not only foolish but expensive to keep the boys longer in the armed forces. On an average it costs the government approximately \$200 a month to keep a person in the armed forces and care for the dependents.

THESE BOYS are all grown up now. Some are getting along in years. They should be promptly discharged so that they can rejoin their families and adjust themselves into civilian life. There is plenty for all in this nation. We have everything we need at our fingertips. Our problem is not production but distribution. Let us see to it that the new wealth created each year is more equally distributed. Our future is secure if we have the intelligence and integrity to face it the American way, unhampered by foreign ideologies.

CONGRESS reconvenes September 5. There are breakers ahead—storm clouds are gathering. The veterans are returning. Unemployment looms on the horizon. All these danger signals can be avoided if Congress, and the people, use their vision and detour in time.

IF CONGRESS will stop the bureaucratic squandering of the nation's resources, if it will do justice to the veterans; if it will give labor a square deal—employment insurance rather than unemployment insurance—then we will have run the gantlet. SOME of the loud super-patriots who clamored for this war, but always at a safe distance, now feel insulted if you suggest that

the man in the service should be given the same compensation as those who stayed at home. They feel hurt if you suggest that those who were discharged because they were thirty-eight years old, or over, should receive the same mustering-out pay as those who were discharged for physical disability.

IT HAS been billions for destruction, billions for foreign nations, millions for cost-plus contractors and interest for bond buyers. But when it comes to appreciating the sacrifices our boys have made on foreign battlefields, in order to save the honor and the glory of our nation, then we hear talk about red blooded Americanism, and patriotism not being for sale. No, not for sale, but it can at least be appreciated.
