FUNERAL SERVICES HELD ON WEDNESDAY FOR MRS. H. CHRONISTER.

The entire community was deeply shocked last Saturday afternoon when news of the death of Mrs. Wilma Gertrude Chronister, wife of Harry Chronister, local groceryman, was received here. Mrs. Chronister died late Monday morning at the Mansfield hospital Monday and underwent an operation. Peritonitis set in immediately following the surgery and her condition became very serious. Blood transfusions were made in the hope of saving her life, but death came Saturday afternoon shortly after 4:00 o'clock.

Mrs. Chronister, who was 44, was born at New Concord, Ohio, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William Waddell. HERE AND THERE IN THE SERVICE SHELBY DEPOT TO CONTINUE

ABOARD THE USS COLORADO IN TOKYO BAY—(Delayed)—Robert R. Ross, 20, electrician's mate, third class, USNR, son of Mr. and Mrs. Willard C. Ross, 63 West Broadway, Plymouth, O., was aboard the ship to support the occupation of Japan.

The Colorado, whose crew had taken her through ten invasion operations to help bring the final capitulation of Japan, had sailed from Tokyo before. She had been with American and British warships into Sagami bay, 18 miles from Tokyo, to support the first landings of airborne troops at a rugged airfield. That operation was in preparation for the arrival of General of the Army Douglas MacArthur to make the occupation official.

The Colorado poured thousands of tons of hot steel into the Japanese installations in the pre-invasion bombardments that gave Allied forces bastions on Japan's outer rim. She helped at Tarawa, the Philippines, Okinawa, and in other lesser operations for four years.

From the decks of the battleship may now be seen Fujiyama, the towering volcano that stands as one of Japan's famous landmarks; Tokyo, Yokohama, the naval base of Yokosuka, and other cities with dark smokestacks and debris from Allied attacks. Nearby lies the Japanese battleship Nagato, one of the last remaining enemy fleet units that went down under bombardment by planes from the 3rd Fleet.

Awarded Four Bronze Stars
Pfc. Kenneth V. Myers, now stationed in Czechoslovakia with the Third army has been awarded four bronze battle stars for his campaigns of northern France, Ardennes, Rhineland and Central Europe. He has also earned the Combat Infantry Badge and the Good Conduct Medal.

Before induction into the army in December, 1942, Myers was in the postoffice at Plymouth. His wife, Mrs. Norma Myers, lives at 314 W. Seminary, Norwalk. He has been with the 302nd Regiment of the 94th Division since its activation at Camp Phillips, Kan.

He has recently chalked up one year of overseas service with the 94th Division from its first battle action at the subzero winter attacks of the Siegfried Line and the drive to the Rhine. The division has a record of outstanding service with the United States Ninth, Third and Fifteenth armies.

First Lt. Charles F. Rollins, Jr., arrived at his home in Shiloh Thursday evening after spending two years overseas with the Fifth Corps of the First army. He is now on leave from the 1st Cavalry Division and will revert to inactive status and will be on the Officers Reserve Corps.

He has received the Presidential Unit Citation, bronze star and medal, Purple Heart, five campaign stars and the Bronze Star for gallantry. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Rollins of Shelby and is a brother of Stanley Shaver.

Dan Kirkpatrick Aboard San Diego; Was On Hand For Jap Surrender

Dan Kirkpatrick, son of Mr. Norris Kirkpatrick of Plymouth is another local boy who will have reason to remember V-J Day. He was aboard the San Diego when it steamed into Tokyo bay for the surrender of the Japanese. The following letter will give you an idea of the affair from Dan's personal contact:

Sept. 4, 1945
Tokyo Bay,
Yokosuka Dock

Dear folks,

Here I am, feeling like an old established resident of Japan. The great day has come. Censorship of our letters has ceased. Being in a 'Flag' I have not been able to tell things that the fellows in ships company could. Our letters were censored by our own Flag officers whom we know well and work with all the time.

There are approximately 45 of us in the Flag, 15 radiomen, and the rest signalmen and yeomen. Through the Flag operators is

sent and received the 'hot dope' to and from the task force over which the ship has command. As you know, I am on the Iowa which is the Flagship of Rear Admiral Badger.

Of course, the big battlewagons couldn't dock so about a week before the occupation of Japan, Admiral Badger moved the Flag to the San Diego, a lighter ship, and I moved with the Flag. On Aug. 27 we arrived at Sagami Wan and spent the night there along with most of the fleet. On Aug. 28 the San Diego proceeded to Yokosuka bay and anchored about noon. We were accompanied by a couple of minesweepers and destroyers. Aug. 30 was the day we docked at Yokosuka Navy Yard. After that, a steady stream of ships of all kinds and descriptions came in. We were the first ship to dock at Japan.

Soon after we docked, Jap officials with their interpreters, streamed aboard like flies, for

conference. They were kept on deck and we just stood and stared.

The surrender of the Yokosuka Navy Yard to Rear Admiral Badger, is something I'll never forget. It took place beside our ship on the dock. Not much ceremony and very short but exciting. Yokosuka Navy Yard is an enormous place but doesn't seem to have been used for a long time. We saw hundreds of midget subs either under construction or ready to go. It was all I could do to crawl into one. I don't see how two men could survive long in one. Everything looked just as though the Japs had picked up and left suddenly. One thing which amuses me is the attitude of the Japs—not at all like defeated or unhappy men. Instead they seem to take it as a matter of course and act more like the victors.

No one has been allowed on shore yet except on business but a few of us made it. Have been souvenir hunting several times. Was in many houses which looked as though their occupants had too, left in a hurry. The houses are very small and divided into tiny rooms. The ceilings are low and the floors covered with soft straw mats. There is practically no furniture. Every house I was in had several pools filled with goldfish. Each of the better homes had its own network of caves. We figured they were air raid shelters.

You probably have read about Japan's network of caves. All man-made and enormous. Some are factories, some used for warehouses stored with machinery, powder, ammunition and everything imaginable. We went in one and walked at least two miles without reaching the end. We found an underground radio station which we are trying to get on an operational status.

I always imagined that Japanese women were long kimonos, but they wear mostly flowing blouses and blouses. The female population isn't very appealing. About the best description I can give is that they are dirty, fat, and ugly. We found an operational base of Geisha girls, but no gals.

Yokosuka appears to be a lively little city but far from modern. Very unsanitary too. Both men and women use the streets for toilets. Most of the people ride bicycles. There are a few automobiles that run on coke. Another thing that seems queer is that on every product they make, on bottles and packages, things they use themselves every day, the labels and instructions are in American. I would be safe in saying that all the people who have any education at all, know English.

The ship I'm on now temporarily, the Piedmont, is really something. It's a repair ship, a destroyer tender. Just like a floating factory with luxury liner quarters. Best food I've had in a long time. We are returning to the Iowa next week and I'll sure be glad to get back to the old baby. She

is going back to the states to be in San Francisco Oct. 27, Navy Day. The Missouri along with a dozen other battleships is going to New York to be there on the 27th also. You have no idea how

happy we all are. I may get a 30 day leave when we hit the states but don't count too much on it.

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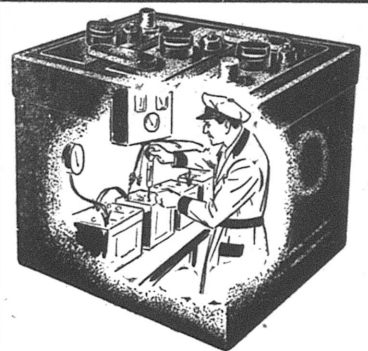
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OHIO POWER CO. OPENS GIANT GENERATING PLANT

A huge new power plant went into operation today and is adding its output to that of the two other giant plans of The Ohio Power Company that previously served the industries, commercial establishments and the homes of the million people living in the territory served by the company. The completion of this plant, after years of planning and after being under construction for almost two years, is an event of outstanding significance to all of the 464 communities served by the company and the entire state of Ohio.

Named the "Tidd Plant," after George N. Tidd, one of the leaders in the electric industry and president of the company, this steam power station, which has just added its mighty force to The Ohio Power Company's electric generating resources, is located on the Ohio River just west of Brilliant, Ohio, seven miles south of Steubenville.

The announcement that the plant is now delivering power came from Mr. C. D. Albright, district superintendent of The Ohio Power Company. "This single plant," Mr. Albright, "adds over 134,000 horsepower to the electric generating facilities of the company. That is quite a substantial increase. If the plant, they would reach all the way across our state with 20,000 miles extending into West Virginia. Every one of them has the power of a big draft horse. Their diet is about 16 pounds of coal a day per horse—in the aggregate, they are capable of consuming about 2,200,000 pounds of coal in each 24 hours."

"The Tidd Plant," Mr. Albright stated, "burns powdered coal and operates with steam at a pressure of 1,300 pounds, at a temperature of 925 degrees Fahrenheit. Its capacity raises to nearly 1-3.4 million kilowatts the total interconnected generating capacity of the 132,000-volt Central System power pool of the American Gas and Electric Company, of which it is an integral part. It is the latest of the 11 generating plants which have been enlarged or installed in that system since 1935, to fit into a long-range system plan that anticipated normal load growth and also enabled handling the unprecedented industrial demands of World War II."

According to Mr. Albright, the American Gas and Electric Company was one of the pioneers in applying high-pressure steam to electric power production, having started such practice prior to 1929 in its intervening applications and extensive research with high temperature steam, it developed the ideas now applied at the Tidd Plant.

Because of long-range outlook which determined its location and design, the Tidd Plant will become an important factor in rendering economical, high-grade, peacetime service to industrial, commercial and residential loads which are expected to develop rapidly with removal of wartime restrictions. It will contribute power to new industries, help create new jobs and provide added comfort, convenience and economy in homes and business establishments.

Mr. Albright emphasized the importance of nearby coal sources and the consequent short haul for the coal. He said that this single plant will consume about 48 tons of coal an hour. That means that about 350,000 tons a year must pour into the mouth of the huge furnace. The Tidd plant is described as a "mine mouth" plant. It now receives fuel from adjacent mines by railroad, but barge transportation on the river will also be available later on.

"Before it is burned," he continued, "the coal is ground to the fineness of flour by massive pulverizers and then blown by air through nozzles into the boiler. Your conception of a boiler may be the iron contraption that encloses your furnace fire. The furnace chamber is as high as an 8-story building, and is approximately 22 feet square. The walls and roof are lined with closely spaced water tubes which terminate in steam drums at the top of the boiler. These drums must have walls over three inches thick to withstand the enormous pressure. When the pulverized coal enters the boiler furnace, it instantly ignites and produces a roaring sweep of flame, a veritable inferno whose heat is largely transferred to the water in the tubes, forming steam which collects in the steam drums. The result is high-pressure, high-temperature steam—1,300 pounds pressure on every square inch of surface and a temperature of 925 degrees Fahrenheit. This pressure is so great that it would force a stream of water more than half a mile high—the temperature is so high that it turns the special alloy pipes conducting the steam to a cherry red, and these pipes must have welded joints and expansion loops to minimize stress."

"Loaded with energy, the steam is unleashed and goes roaring into the turbines like a tornado. In the turbine it strikes thousands of blades, or buckets, and as they take up the energy of the steam, they cause the turbine to spin like a giant powerful top. The fastest blades attain a rim speed of 780 miles-an-hour. Connected

to the turbine is the electric generator which in turn is spun by the turbine and in so doing generates electricity. The generator sends its 134,000 horsepower over transmission and distribution lines until finally, after several transformations, it is delivered to waiting homes and industries.

"During the war, fuel, material and labor costs, which contribute to the expense of producing and delivering power, rose sharply," explained Mr. Albright, who went on to say: "On the other hand, the average unit cost of electric power to customers has gone down steadily. This divergence of outgo and income cannot continue indefinitely. So far it has been handled by applying all the resources at our command. All efforts humanly possible will be continued to maintain high-grade economical service. This objective is contributed to by the installation of the Tidd Plant with its superior economical performance which makes it feasible to shut down some less economical unit or hold them in reserve for emergencies. It will afford greater freedom in dividing system loads among all the interconnected generating plants in the future of the State of Ohio and the 296,500 customers that we serve. The powerful Tidd Plant, pouring out its energy to hundreds of thousands of customers that range all the way from the smallest dwellings to the great industries is a dynamic symbol of that abounding confidence."

"As we all know," said Mr. Albright, "this country suffered severely during the war from a variety of shortages—manpower, fuel and transportation, to mention only a few, but the area served by the Ohio Power Company has never suffered from a shortage of electric generating capacity. We, too, suffered from shortages of labor, fuel and equipment, but in spite of these difficulties, we continued to give good service to our customers. This tax-paying, business-managed power company has never failed to furnish industries and civilians with an adequate, dependable supply of electricity throughout the six years since the Nazis invaded Poland. For its war job, the electric power was always there and always on time. This took long-range planning, for in the six years from 1939 to 1945, our industrial load has more than doubled. It now exceeds two billion kilowatt hours a year."

"It took more than planning to add 400,000 horsepower to our company's generating facilities. It took capital and the courage to invest millions of dollars to provide the facilities needed to meet our customers' demands. It took the knowledge—the 'know-how'—to produce this engineering marvel called the Tidd Plant that stands on the banks of the Ohio River."

"Beyond all these attributes, it required an abounding confidence in the future of the State of Ohio and the 296,500 customers that we serve. The powerful Tidd Plant, pouring out its energy to hundreds of thousands of customers that range all the way from the smallest dwellings to the great industries is a dynamic symbol of that abounding confidence."

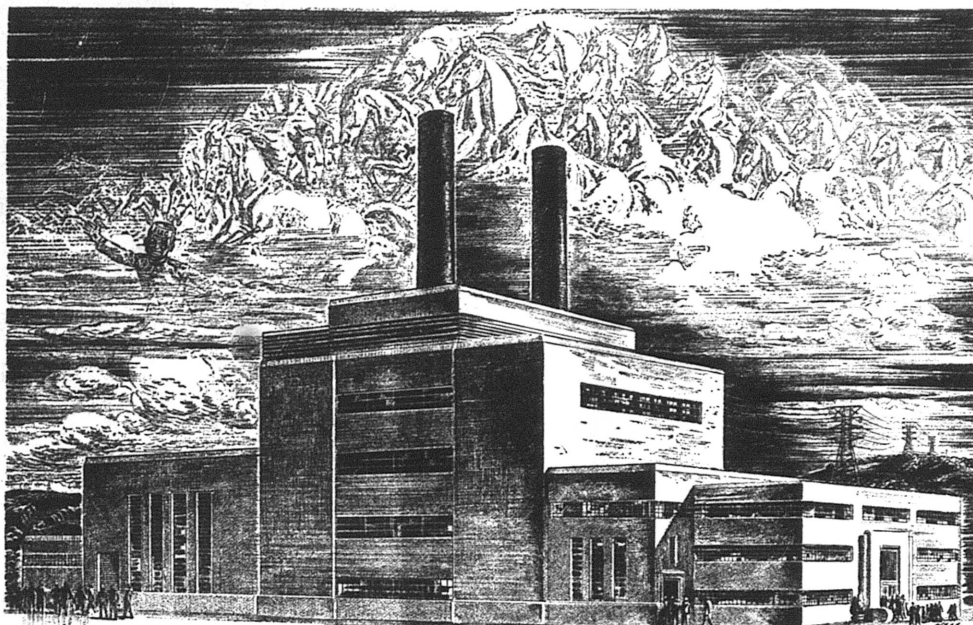

The New Tidd Plant— 134,000 HORSEPOWER FOR OHIO HOMES AND INDUSTRY

The new Tidd Plant adds 134,000 horsepower to the generating capacity in The Ohio Power system and brings the company's total capacity to nearly a million horsepower.

The "thorax" in this single plant would reach across the entire state of Ohio—it is large enough to supply the electrical requirements of a third of a million families. It is a "mine mouth" plant with an ample supply of good coal almost at its feet door.

The plant receives 144,000,000 gallons of water a day—enough water to supply a city of a million inhabitants. The Tidd Plant adds its mighty contribution to a system of approximately 10,000 miles of transmission and distribution facilities serving the homes and industries of Ohio.

ON The Ohio River, seven miles below the city of Steubenville, an army of men has been working day and night for the past eighteen months to complete the new Tidd Plant of The Ohio Power Company. Named after George N. Tidd, the president of the company, the plant increases the company's electric generating facilities by 134,000 horsepower. It contains the largest generating unit in the state.

In 1940, long before Pearl Harbor, this company, anticipating war's demands, began expanding its generating facilities in the huge plant at Philo, Ohio, and late in 1941 had completed and put in operation a giant 114,000 horsepower unit there. While this extension was in progress, it became apparent that still more power was needed and a second mighty unit was installed in Philo. These two units added approximately forty per cent to the company's generating facilities but still more power was needed. Ohio's industrial contribution to the material for war has been enormous. During wartime, the demands on the company for power grew by leaps and bounds. In the past year it produced two and one-quarter billion kilowatt-hours for industrial plants alone, or 125% more than in 1939.

Even with over a half million horsepower of generating capacity at Philo, it became evident that more was needed to take care of all of the electrical requirements of the area and its many diversified industries and so the Tidd Plant was projected. Before beginning construction, it was necessary to secure a site having the required area and properly located from the standpoint of the load of the system as well as the availability of water and coal and such a site was found near Brilliant, Ohio.

Equipped with the most modern machinery that men have yet devised, the Tidd Plant was built not alone for war's demands but to meet the needs of peace as well. It stands a monument—a living pulsing monument, to the faith and confidence of this company in the future of the people of Ohio.

The construction of a group of plants that now aggregate nearly a million electrical horsepower is our contribution to the creation of jobs for returning servicemen as well as those who labored so well to make the equipment to arm them. This pool of power is our assurance of the continuation of adequate dependable electric service at low rates so that the area we serve may grow and prosper.

With the 14th Anti-aircraft Command, South Pacific.

"Sgt. Frederick D. Ruckman, son of Mrs. Maud Ruckman, New London, Ohio, has been awarded the Bronze Star Medal.

The award was given for meritorious service in connection with military operations against the enemy at Morotai, Dutch East Indies on Sept. 30, 1944.

During a simultaneous enemy air attack on this date, the anti-aircraft gun section under the personal direction of Sgt. Ruckman engaged and destroyed an enemy aircraft under extremely adverse conditions. The destruction of the plane before it was able to accomplish its mission, defeated the entire enemy scheme of maneuver to bomb a very valuable and vulnerable target directly in the rear of the gun section. Although the enemy had three other planes within the vicinity flying at long range to draw the attention of all anti-aircraft, Sgt. Ruckman exercised keen foresight and fine leadership qualities under stress of combat by requiring his men to be on the special look-out for the sneak approach of other planes and to disregard those planes, that were being well engaged by the other anti-aircraft units. As a result, his gun section was able to locate an enemy bomber coming in fast and low, and was seen by all other sections, and to destroy it without benefit of searchlight illumination with resulting failure of the enemy's mission. His alertness and unflinching attention to his responsibility and his superlative control of those under him during the heat of battle are in keeping with the highest traditions of the service."

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LT LAMAR FLEAGLE WRITES FROM OKINAWA; INTERESTED LOCALLY

Lt. LaMar Fleagle, a former high school faculty member, writes the Advertiser this week from Okinawa where he is now stationed and is anxious to contact any local boys who may be close enough that he could look them up.

Lt. Fleagle still gets the Advertiser after four years of service with his country and practically all of his former students have been or are now somewhere with the army, navy, or marines. Since the cessation of hostilities we are permitted to publish his address in full, and hope any parent or boy reading this letter who may be stationed in Okinawa or near by will write or get in touch with Mr. Fleagle. The Advertiser is sending this week's issue via Air Mail and hope that more of former issues have reached him by this time.

His address is Lt. LaMar Fleagle, 1374 Sig. Co. WG, APO 902, c/o P.M., San Francisco, Cal., and his letter follows:

Okinawa (A stone's throw from Tokyo)
August 31, 1945

Dear Mr. Thomas,

I just received my first copy of the Plymouth Advertiser since arriving overseas. I was very much pleased to hear news concerning my Plymouth friends. The issue was that of June 28, 1945. I was glad to know that Sid is alive and well. We have been quite fortunate in our family as I have three brothers who have all been overseas for many months. One brother was in the ETO for 25 months and just returned. Another has been in Panama for 36 months and still another has been on an LST here in the Pacific for approximately 12 months. I have been here on Okinawa going on my second month. At this writing all of my brothers and myself are in the best of health although three of us have been in action.

I can't tell you how long I was on the water coming over but it turned out to be a world cruise

of the Pacific and lasted a couple of months. It was a little rough after we first landed because of constant air raids but our fighter defense was excellent so few ever got in to do too much damage on land although many ships were damaged.

I am in a Signal Company Wing which is furnishing communications for the 316th Bombardment (B-29) Wing under 8th Air Force. I have seen General Doolittle several times and he is a very fine officer. He is about my stature but quite a bit heavier. Now that the war is over, it appears that we will be permanent party for awhile until replacements come to relieve us. We are set up quite well here as we have the finest of outdoor latrines, showers, mess tents, and what have you. We actually have a very nice little barber tent with our own company barber. A few of the tents have wooden floors. Wood is an extremely scarce article and can only be gotten by moonlight requisitioning or trading with liquor. A quart will sell for from \$20 to \$50 if you are fortunate enough to have it in your possession.

The food is excellent for being so far away and fresh meats and vegetables appear on our tables quite frequently. We bought a cooling unit in the states and it proved to be worth its weight in gold over here.

I saw Ernie Pyle's grave, Gen. Buchner's and several other personalities. By the way, Mr. Thomas, if there is anyone stationed here on Okinawa or Ie Shima from Plymouth be sure to send one their APO addresses as I would like to contact them, especially some of my former students. I have seen my brother several times here at Okinawa. We are closer together now than we have been for four years. It doesn't seem possible that I have been in the service for that long.

My experiences have been broad and varied. I feel that I can better appreciate many things

now when I again go back on civilian status that I never thought about before but just took for granted. I know that I am not alone in this belief. In my present outfit I have a secondary job as Information and Education officer which has proven quite interesting. My primary job in this outfit has been message center and cryptographic officer. But in the army you are always given several other duties to take up your spare time. At present, I am also filling in as Personnel officer. We don't overwork ourselves but in our outfit we are busy 24 hours a day and have accomplished much in the last couple of months. Over here you don't depend upon anyone else to do your work as it would never get done. You just go ahead and do it yourself.

A big problem of redeployment faces the armed services and civilians. It is up to everyone both military and civilian to help make the necessary adjustments. We are all glad that the war is over. All we want to do now is to get back to a normal way of living.

Mail is always appreciated over here as our only recreation is sports and shows. Whenever you have time, I would like a letter from you and my other friends in Plymouth. I must close for now and again I want to say how much I enjoy reading the Plymouth Advertiser.

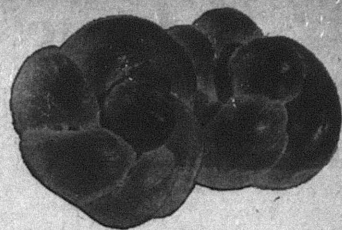

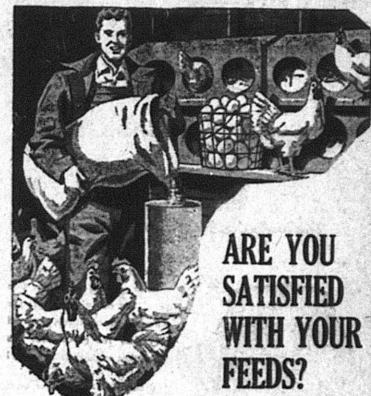
