MR. AND MRS. K. I. WILSON PASS AWAY WITHIN FEW HOURS OF EACH OTHER.

Double funeral rites were held at 2 o'clock Wednesday afternoon at the Lutheran Church for Mrs. Leslie Wilson, 74, and her husband Kirk I. Wilson, 67, who passed away at the Shelby Memorial Hospital, Monday morning.

Within a few hours of each other. Rev. Frederick Lambrecht, pastor, officiated and burial took place in Greenlawn cemetery, with arrangements in charge of the McQuate Funeral Home.

Mrs. Wilson was the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Daniel Wyand and was born in Plymouth, Ohio, April 14, 1871 and was a lifelong resident of this community.

Mrs. Wilson had not been ill but complained Sunday of not feeling well; she suffered a stroke and cerebral hemorrhage Sunday evening and with her husband who had been very ill for the past six months were removed to the McQuate ambulance to the Shelby Hospital.

Mrs. Wilson passed away at 3 a. m. and Mr. Wilson lingered until 8:15 a. m.

Mrs. Wilson graduated from the

Plymouth high school, class of 1887 and was married to Mr. Wilson on Dec. 15, 1913. She was an active member of the Lutheran church and its organizations, and a charter member of the Twentieth Century Circle.

Years ago he was employed at the Fate-Root-Heath Company but later conducted a shoe repair shop in Shiloh and Attica and later was employed at the Myers Harness Shop in Plymouth. He was an active member of the Lutheran Church and a member of the choir.

He is survived by four brothers, Harry A. Wilson, Warren, O.; Rev. Gibson Wilson, Ottawa, O.; Chauncey Wilson, Bluffton, Ind.; James Wilson, Unionville, Ind.; and one sister, Mrs. Martha Byrd, Bluffton, Ind.

The bodies remained at the McQuate Funeral Home until Wednesday noon when they were taken to the Lutheran Church.

Post Office To Be Depot For Local Clothing Drive

Mr. Kaiser announced that 9,607 communities throughout America are organizing to conduct drives under the local chairmanship of 4,313 men and women, many of whom will direct county wide drives.

PINNED UNDER TRACTOR, DIES

FARMER EAST OF SHILOH VICTIM OF ACCIDENT THURSDAY.

Ernest Kestner, 27, of R. F. D. 2, Shiloh was killed late Thursday afternoon when he was pinned under a tractor on the Andrew Clever farm east of Shiloh.

According to information obtained by the county coroner's office, Mr. Kestner had been using a small tractor to spread lime on the Clever farm and had stalled the tractor.

The small tractor stalled and a boy assisting on the farm took a large tractor to the field to help. About 5:45 p. m. the boy returned to the farm buildings and informed Mr. Clever that Kestner had been pinned under one of the tractors. A physician was called and he was removed to the General Hospital Mansfield, where he was pronounced dead upon arrival.

What is wrong with America? Are we a decadent nation? Not but unless we refuse to let George do the thinking for us, we soon will be. Man is a lazy animal and to this is the hardest of hard work. But real progress is made by the thinking of the many—not only of the few.

We have permitted the metropolitan press and the radio to theater to do our thinking. As a result we live in an atmosphere of fog, fraud and deception. We see delinquency, and liquor filled streets. We see indifferent preachers, teachers and parent-teacher associations, and yet we complain about the younger generation. We had better look in the mirror and see the fathers and mothers of the younger generation. Their delinquency is our delinquency—our responsibility.

We tolerate, mermaid and questionable programs on the radio. We go to the theater and pretend to enjoy pictures in which murder, arson and theft are exhibited—pictures suggestive and obscene. We see actresses and actors that have a new husband or a new wife with periodic frequency. We see war pictures in which human beings are burned alive. We not only admit, but glory in that kind of exhibition. When man fails to be a moral animal, he is no longer human. "The sins of the father shall be visited upon the son."

I listened to King George call on God to bless the British Empire. He forgot to pray for the Indonesians and the Asiatics, that his Empire is enslaving. I heard our President pray to God for peace on earth, good will toward men." Yet in the Dutch

East Indies and in Europe, he permits our army to be used to crush people who desire their liberty. Only Stalin did not ask God to bless his infamous work—he was too busy.

While the President was calling for world justice, his Secretary of State in Moscow was putting his seal of approval upon the liquidation and subjugation of Russia and Great Britain, and other people and other nations' people—ruthlessly crushing self-determination and ambitions of smaller nations—hamstringing McArthur in his splendid work of democratizing and rebuilding a vanquished nation.

Yes, America is dominated and ruled by a little international elite that control ninety-five per cent of all the avenues of publicity—plus Rhodes scholars and Hollywood. "In hypocrisy thou art a jewel." In this and the two following releases, I shall show our shortcomings, and then after Congress meets, suggest the remedy—"the true grandeur of our nation."

SOCIAL SECURITY BENEFITS 2538 IN MANSFIELD AREA END OF '45

2538 monthly old-age and survivors insurance benefits were in force at the end of 1945 in the area served by the Mansfield office of the Social Security Board, an increase of 760 over the number in force on December 31, 1944. Edward P. Blonston, manager said today in a statement of the activities of the office during the year.

In giving his estimates, which are subject to minor revision, Mr. Blonston said that the increase over the year in benefits in force amounted to 22 percent. The in-

crease in 1944 was 35 percent. Approximately \$462,800 in monthly benefits was awarded during the year to men, women and children of this area, Mr. Blonston said. This marked an increase of about \$88,000 over the total sum paid out in 1944. The service area of the Mansfield office includes Ashland, Crawford, Knox, Morrow and Richland Counties.

The number in the different classes of beneficiaries and the monthly benefit amounts received during the year were approximately as follows:

Retired workers, age 65 or over	885	\$20,529.30
Wives, 65 or over, of retired workers	336	\$3,971.10
Widows with young children	313	\$24,774.70
Children of deceased or retired workers	813	\$9,261.98

Monthly benefits are paid also to aged dependent parents of fully insured workers who die without leaving a wife or child.

Mr. Blonston said that a marked increase in the number of applications for old-age and survivors insurance benefits following the end of the war had been anticipated. Many persons who have been eligible for benefits have delayed filing in order to help out in the war industries.

and other important tasks. Their retirement in increasing numbers is expected.

"I don't like to pass on a word of advice or caution to those persons who are not forced by advancing age to retire, but who are beyond the age limit and are giving the question thoughtful consideration," Mr. Blonston said. "It is call at the local office of the Social Security Board. It may be advantageous for you to file your claim at once. The people at the office can help you. They will do it gladly."

Mr. Blonston added that all holders of social security account cards should guard them well.

"People who have earned con-

siderable wage credits in covered employment during the war and who are now returning to household duties, to school, or to other pursuits, may feel that the card is no longer of value to them," he said. "In many cases that will not be true. Many of them will find that the card is of great value in the near future, whether they now contemplate that action or not. The social security card identifies the account to which all past wages earned by the worker in covered employment have been credited and to which future wages will be credited. It may represent an insurance policy to dependents of the wage earner in event of tragedy."

PEACE ON EARTH

CHRISTMASTIME seemed a particularly appropriate date for the meeting of Byrnes, Bevin and Molotov—a time when the ancient, emotion-charged phrase "Peace on Earth, Good Will to Men"—was having its annual revival. It was timely, too, when citizens of the Allied countries let their thoughts run back to the last Yuletide, when Von Rundstedt's push had thrown pinners of fear around holiday celebrations.

The war was won. The boys were getting back to the states. Plans were being checked for the general assembly of the United Nations organization to meet early in the year, when that new boy, the revolutionary atomic bomb, would be discussed. A fly in the ointment soon after the war's end had been the inability of the foreign ministers of the three major Allied powers to reach amicable agreements in their meetings some months ago.

SENSE OF DUTY

ONE of the groups most severely hit by the epidemic of strikes is the American farmer.

While the men in factories are continuing to prevent the farmer from getting the tools he needs—the tractors, the automobiles, the machines and the electric gadgets—he somehow manages to continue to supply them with ample food.

But we wonder what would happen if the over-worked farmer decided to rebel? Suppose the farmers of our country were unionized (as John L. Lewis once hoped to have them) and decided they would cut off the nation's food supply until they received higher pay or better prices for their produce.

Such a condition would be disastrous, but fortunately the farmers have too much of a sense of responsibility to attempt such a thing. The nation needs food—and they know it is their duty to keep the food supply-line operating without interruption.

SUCCESSFUL PARENTHOOD

RESEARCH PROGRESS IN PARENTHOOD

There is a vast amount of fascinating research going on in the field of parent education. There have, for example, been studies at both Yale and Harvard on how bodily type affects temperament and disposition. Yale has also just completed a study, begun 30 years ago, which proved that the children of alcoholics, if placed in acceptable foster homes, were no more apt to grow up into alcoholics than the children of abstemious parents. In other words, an unhappy home environment is more responsible for alcoholism than an inherited fondness for strong drink. These are but two of hundreds of scientific surveys of human beings and family life made at universities and in local communities under parent education leaders. But how to make them available to the whole country has been a problem, especially during the war years. To help coordinate and distribute this priceless knowledge a Parent Education Clearing-House has been established by the publishers of Parents' magazine.

The Clearing-House will create a file of what is being done—and by whom—in the field of parent education throughout the United States, to be published from time to time and to be kept up to date. In addition, the Clearing-House will publish a mimeographed Parent Education News Bulletin which will

carry notes on significant parent education activity from all parts of the country and abroad. The Bulletin will also include bibliographies of current books, pamphlets, magazine articles, and study materials. The more important articles and books will appear in the Bulletin in digest form. Miss Ruth Mallay, former editor of the Bulletin of the National Council of Parent Education, is Director of the Clearing-House.

One of the most practical aims of the Clearing-House is to help local groups with suggestions for programs and personnel. We have more to tell you about this later on if you promises to be an exciting gathering, bringing together the world's best thinking on how to educate and rear children for their responsibilities in a future that they can't even imagine. Local teachers and group leaders who are interested should write the Parent Education Clearing-House, at Vanderbilt Avenue, New York 17, New York, for further information.

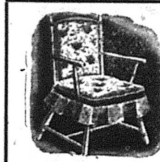
