YOU OWE \$2,140

WE'VE forgotten whose ad it was—but we remember one published several years ago aimed at simplifying the picture of what the national debt means to each of us. showed a picture of a new-born babe and was accom-nied by a caption reading something like this: "He owes cle Sam \$762!"

Uncle Sam \$762!"

The amount was figured by dividing our national debt by our population, and showed that every man, woman and even new-born child in the United States had a considerable stake in the government debt.

But that baby born in 1940 or 1941 was a piker at carrying debt loads compared with the baby born in 1946. For with the national debt now hovering around the 300 billion figure, each child born today owes \$2,140. And the chances are, unless government expenditures are cut a lot more rapidly than it appears they will be, that he, rather than his father's generation, will have to pay that debt off.

The thing that stands out in the government's financial report is that we haven't started to pay for the war we just finished. We've all bought bonds, but they just increased the dobt.

MILLIONS IN RAGS

IT IS probably impossible for most of us to realize the destitute condition of hundreds of millions of people in war-torn countries. But it helps us to understand the scope of worldwide suffering when we see the pictures and read the facts being broadcast throughout the country by the Victory Clothing Collection workers.

Along with the pictures of children and adults fighting to survive through the winter in rags, in bare feet, and haddled around street-corner bonfres, they give us figures showing that in China alone there are 200,000,000 people who are in desperate need of clothing. Add to that millions of improperly clad people in Europe, and you have a probable total of more than twice the population of the United States.

We can't supply enough clothes to fill all of their needs.

We would have to turn over all of the clothing all of us own
in order to clothe such a multitude properly. But if we
only contribute the garments we consider too shabby to
wear—the clothes which have hung around the house
unused throughout the winter—it can lessen the suffering

Some will go further than others in their contributions, but no American family should let this drive go by with-out at least giving some pieces of clothing to those who are still paying heavily for a war in which we were equally involved.
