Pastors Convene At Columbus

The twenty-seventh annual Ohio Pastors' Convention, sponsored by the Ohio Council of Churches, will be held in Columbus, January 28 to 31, with fourteen of the nation's outstanding clerical leaders speaking on the conference theme "Vision After Victory." B. F. Lamb, the Council's executive secretary, has announced.

More than 1900 pastors representing every denomination and every county in the state have already registered. Dr. Lamb said, indicating a new high in Convention attendance.

Climax of the four-day program will be a Fellowship Supper on Tuesday evening, January 29, at which Dr. Walter W. VanKirk, one of four American Protestant leaders sent to Japan to contact Japanese Christians, will speak on "My Interview With Hirohito" and Dr. Herbert Gezork, German refugee, who spent last summer in Germany on an official U. S. Government mission, will talk on "What I Saw in Germany."

Other convention high points include the finals in the Princeton Peace Declaration Contest; a fellowship supper for Town and Country pastors, held for the first time in a Negro church; and a two-hour discussion session on peace and peace problems, led by Bishop G. Bromley Oxnam, president of the Federal Council of Churches of Christ in America, and Dr. Ralph W. Sockman, pastor of Christ Church, New York City, and preacher on the "National Radio Pulpit."

Music for the Convention will be furnished by the Columbus Boy choir and the Wooster College Girls' Chorus. R. Lincoln Long, pastor of Collingwood Avenue Presbyterian Church, Toledo, will be chairman of the Convention.

State Puts OK On Fair Dates

Dates for the Richland county fair, scheduled for August 23 and 24, has the approval of John M. Hodson, state agriculture director, together with those of the Belleville and Loudonville fair directors, which have not been held for several years.

Belleville's fair is scheduled for Sept. 11 to 14 this year, while the Loudonville show will be held Oct. 1 to 3, it was announced.

Hodson approved the dates set for 7 other county fairs, including those of Ashland, Sept. 18 to 21; Cuyahoga, Aug. 9 to 12; Millersburg, Aug. 4 to 7; Norwalk and Aug. 27 to 30; Mt. Vernon, Aug. 18 to 24; Mt. Gilead, Aug. 15 to 17; and Wapakoneta, Sept. 10 to 13.

YOU OWE \$2,140

WE'VE forgotten those ad it was—but we remember one published several years ago aimed at simplifying the picture of what the national debt means to each of us. It showed a picture of a new-born babe and was accompanied by a caption reading something like this: "He owes Uncle Sam \$762!"

The amount was figured by dividing our national debt by our population, and showed that every man, woman and even new-born child in the United States had a considerable stake in the government debt.

But that baby born in 1940 or 1941 was a piker at carrying debt loads compared with the baby born in 1946. For with the national debt now hovering around the 300 billion figure, each child born today owes \$2,140. And the chances are, unless government expenditures are cut a lot more rapidly than it appears they will be, that he, rather than his father's generation, will have to pay that debt off.

The thing that stands out in the government's financial report is that we haven't started to pay for the war we just finished. We've all bought bonds, but they just increased the debt.

MILLIONS IN RAGS

IT IS probably impossible for most of us to realize the destitute condition of hundreds of millions of people in war-torn countries. But it helps us to understand the scope of worldwide suffering when we see the pictures and read the facts being broadcast throughout the country by the Victory Clothing Collection workers.

Along with the pictures of children and adults fighting to survive through the winter in rags, in bare feet, and huddled around street-corner fires, they give us a picture of what in China alone there are 200,000,000 people who are in desperate need of clothing. Add to that millions of improperly clad people in Europe, and you have a probable total of more than twice the population of the United States.

We can't supply enough clothes to fill all of their needs. We would have to turn over all of the clothing all of us own in order to clothe such a multitude properly. But if we only contribute the garments we consider too shabby to wear—the clothes which have hung around the house unused throughout the winter—it can lessen the suffering of some unfortunate.

Some will go further than others in their contributions, but no American family should let this drive go by without at least giving some pieces of clothing to those who are still paying heavily for a war in which we were equally involved.

Doings in Congress

By Cong. W. M. LEMKE

What price war? I address this question to the fathers, mothers, brothers, sisters, wives and children of the servicemen. They and the servicemen made the real sacrifices. Whatever dictators and so-called statesmen were responsible for World War II, will be left to the calm judgment of future historians.

This war largely depleted the world of natural resources that belonged to unborn millions. It took the lives, by fire, sword and starvation, of over 100,000,000, mostly non-combatants—a majority innocent women and children. Our loss is "70,000 killed in battle—another 200,000 died from sickness. Another million disabled, physically or mentally, for life. This is the human sacrifice. Then we plunged the nation \$300,000,000,000 into debt and printed \$28,000,000,000 inflationary currency for unborn generations to pay.

The war disarranged our entire economic structure. Yet that is but a small part of the price we paid. We have lost about one-half of a generation of people. No wonder the servicemen are on the verge of mutiny. The place for a young married man is with his wife and children. The place for a single serviceman is at home renewing his acquaintance with the girl that waited.

When the European war ended, the Army had 8,300,000 men—the Navy 3,500,000. To date the Army discharged 4,750,000—the Navy 900,000. This leaves 3,550,000 in the Army—in the Navy 2,600,000. Since then 900,000 new men were drafted and inducted, and another 425,000 have enlisted in the regular Army. The Navy's enlistments are about 80,000. There are still about 100,000 in the Marine Corps and in the Coast Guard. This gives us a total of 7,555,000 still in the armed forces.

The 325,000 newly drafted and enlisted men are more than any General ever suggested, outside of the Pentagon, "stay at home," brass hats. They are five times more than needed for occupation duty. There is no reason why another 6,500,000 men should not long ago have been demobilized. The delay rests squarely on the shoulders of the President, as Commander-in-Chief, his Chief of Staff and his Secretaries of War and Navy. It was their duty to bring about prompt demobilization. In September in the Congressional Library, in an executive session with Members of Congress, General Marshall assured

us that all the boys that had two years service or more, and all who had taken part in combat would be discharged promptly.

Secretary Patterson pretended that all these boys will be discharged six months after the armistice of this, but he was

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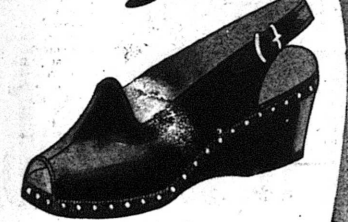

SUCCESSFUL PARENTHOOD TEACH CHILDREN FINANCES

ARE you giving your children a realistic view of the family income? If you haven't done so, and they expect things you can't possibly afford, is it their fault or yours? Nowadays it seems difficult for parents to admit to their children that there are limits to what they can provide. This hasn't always been true—in fact, in more frugal days parents were inclined to put a lighter clasp on the family pocketbook than was necessary when denying their children advantages that they could well afford. This was because their way of thinking was still tinged with the fear of not making ends meet which plagued the pioneers, since the latter often had to keep an anxious eye on a dwindling grain supply, knowing that no more would be available until the next harvest.

It was during the boom days after the last war that parents acquired the opposite fear of losing their children's love if they failed to give them everything their friends had. We still have a slight hangover of that fear, just as it took several generations to get rid of the fear of hunger.

The best policy is to be honest with your children about family earnings. If they are made to understand that living up to the last penny while

they are children may prevent their going to college later on, most of them would value the family savings now. But since children need a specific goal for saving, let them start a college fund. Why not, too, a high school fund so there will be money for the extra clothes high school youngsters need and more generous allowance to provide for money and tickets for sports events.

But will children be willing to forgo their present movies and ice cream cones for a formal or a tux in their teens? No, not if it means giving up all their present indulgences. But you can give them a weekly allowance for spending money and not have them out when it is gone. They'll become much more selective in their movies, too. If the allowance comes only one or two shows a week instead of three or four.

The same is true of toys and materials for hobbies. Give a child a catalogue or turn him loose in a store with no limit on spending and he'll buy far more than he really wants. But give him a definite amount he can spend and he'll have a wonderful time choosing. And he'll be getting practice in deciding what he wants most. A very valuable experience in itself.

Memory Selection: Psalm 119:47. The preamble of the Ten Commandments is the Divine authority in them. Law can have no rightful authority apart from the will of God.

The tenth commandment goes beyond deeds to their source and forebears the teaching of Jesus about purity of heart. It directly concerns desire—"Thou shalt not covet." It operates only in the heart—in the affections, desires and motives. May all of us be able to keep this commandment and all the commandments in love through faith in Jesus.

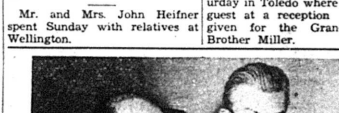
