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Doings In Congress

Lost, strayed or stolen - the loud advocates of the OPA. It is now apparent that the OPA has been the bottleneck of production and distribution. It has created artificial shortages. It, and the printing of money is responsible for the high cost of living. The meat situation is becoming desperate. The farmers are not going to feed the nation as a loss any more than the restaurant owners. They are not going to continue to be the shock absorber of an ignorant bureaucracy.

Prices of articles have not gone up, but the value of our dollar has gone down until it has only 50c purchasing power.

America is on the march. We are recovering our better judgment. There will be better days ahead. On November 3, the people will produce the agricultural and industrial products of the nation, will not be sleeping at the switch. The commies and their cohorts will again have to take to the tall timber. We hope this time they stay there, and that they never again be permitted to practice fraud and deception upon the American people via false propaganda.

Yes, indeed, when the world is hungry, we are big hearted. But let us get caught short, and we find our country sewed up in more ways than one. Whether our statesmen are plain dumb, or whether England is smarter, we are not sure, but in every instance, we've never found the British Empire lacking ingenuity, no matter what the emergency may be, and while we are at it, we might add that England is always on the receiving end.

WAY THE RUSH

The rift which came to light the past week in the office of Richmond County commissioners over the construction of the new \$300,000 sanatorium, for which the bonds have been approved, will no doubt cause various opinions among the taxpayers of the county.

In his charge that the two Re-

publican members of the board were holding up construction, Guy Stewart, Democratic member, possibly overlooked a lot of facts when it comes to building construction these days. With veterans crying for building material of any kind, with an inflated dollar, and scores of other items entering into the picture, Richmond county can well wait for a reasonable length of time before going into a building program of this nature.

At today's figure, a \$300,000 bond issue will construct a building worth only about \$150,000 in normal times. Why be in such a hurry when the county has gone without this institution for many years? The taxpayers will benefit in more ways than one by holding up construction at this time.

We are not defending the other two members of the Board at whom Stewart aimed his charges, but we would like to see a delay in the program with the hope that within the next year or so, building costs will start on a downward trend.

The Norwalk Park

Our readers this week will find a list of bond issues which Huron

County voters will have the pleasure of deciding upon at the forthcoming November election. One of the issues is that of the Memorial Park, which we understand is located somewhere near Norwalk, and which the voters of Huron County are being asked to spend \$100,000.

It wasn't so many years ago that Huron County was in financial difficulties, and we don't believe that the county has any too much money now with which to operate. There are so many other things that the county needs before such a large sum should be spent on a Memorial Park, until it is inconceivable that our county officials would let such an item appear on the ballot.

If Norwalk wants a park, let the citizens of Norwalk support it. Perhaps the main reason we are opposed to such an expenditure is that our own village is having a hard time making ends meet, and with the sales tax revenue coming into Huron County in a larger increase than anticipated, we are getting only a measly little \$95 per month as our apportionment. We have the figures from the State Tax Commission, Huron County has enjoyed a huge growth in sales tax revenue the past year, but the voters in Norwalk always have a reason to give, when we ask:

"Why doesn't Plymouth receive more sales tax revenue?" If Huron County needs as much money as county officials claim it does, then we are opposed to spending \$100,000 on a park. Residents of the southern part of the county will do well to look into the location of the park and the entire proposal before they mark the X on the ballot.

The unprecedented requests for changing to gas heat threaten to tax our transmission and distribution systems beyond the limits of good service. This comes at a time when it is impossible to secure the pipe, fittings and compressors necessary to handle the overwhelming demand.

WHY THE GREAT SWING TO GAS HEAT?

For years gas has been sold as a heating fuel of luxury value. Numerous tangibles, other than fuel cost, were included in its value to win public acceptance. Now the rise in price of other fuels makes gas heat the most economical today on a straight fuel cost basis in nearly all areas in this general part of the country. Also, many customers tell us that the uncertainty of supply of other fuels has affected their decisions to change to gas heat.

MATERIAL AND LABOR SHORTAGE

You who have been trying to buy an automobile, soap chips, white shirts or other scarce items readily will understand our position. We are trying to spend some 25 million dollars to improve the facilities for bringing gas from the abundant fields of supply to your premises. Because of the dire shortage of necessary materials and skilled manpower to install them, only a fraction of this 25 million can be spent this year.

TEXAS GAS

The Tennessee Gas Transmission Corporation, which owns a line bringing a large percentage of our gas from Texas fields, have plans for adding to the capacity of their system for several hundred miles. When completed this will increase substantially the amounts of gas they can deliver to us. By the time this project had run the necessary gamut of federal hearings and approval secured, it was too late to obtain materials to bolster our supply until the coming heating season is far advanced.

From the Panhandle and Eastern Pipeline Company, another western gas supply, we have been able to contract only half the gas we requested for regular delivery. The situation is not likely to improve until their facilities can be increased.

NEW SUPPLY FOR EXTREME WEATHER

At two key points on our lines we are installing a total of 110 tanks of 30,000 gallons each which will be filled with propane (liquid petroleum gas) of a type commonly used by families living beyond gas lines in rural areas) which will blend with our gas. The project will make available the equivalent of 65 million cubic feet of gas a day. This supply is intended for use only in extreme weather. It will exhaust itself in a few days of use and our suppliers will require months to refill the tanks.

A new, large compressor station near the Ohio river intended to bolster the supply of gas to our transmission system can be but partially completed this winter. A large trunk line to run north and south through the heart of Ohio can be no more than 25 percent completed this season. Some of the orders for pipe placed last year are not promised until 1947.

SOME NEIGHBORHOOD LINES OVERLOADED

A survey just completed has disclosed that more gas heating installations have been made in some areas than the capacity of our street mains can serve adequately. Only major unsumountable problems are mentioned here. There are many, many lesser ones.

HEATING CONTRACTORS AND DEALERS COOPERATING

These reasons have prompted the decision to discontinue the sale of gas heating equipment to those having other forms of heating, at least for the coming season. Responsible heating contractors and dealers are co-operating by adopting this plan. The plan has been cleared with the Public Utilities Commission of Ohio.

Customers, who now have bona fide orders for gas heating equipment on file with us or with heating contractors filing with The Gas Company, will be protected under this new policy. The reason for this is because such persons have lost their place in line for re-ordering the fuel they have been using.

INDUSTRIAL CURTAILMENTS LIKELY

This winter, during periods of severe weather, it most likely will be necessary to curtail industries using gas in their manufacturing processes. All large users of gas for industry have been notified of this possible condition, thus giving them time to make other provisions. Even with this relief, it is possible that some areas will experience low gas pressures if outside temperatures become too low.

PROTECTION FOR G. I. HOUSING

We have a dual obligation to G. I. veterans and the Civilian Production Administration. With both, we intend to cooperate fully by making gas service available to permanent new construction. Through this conservation program, installation materials and resources can be made available for new buildings.

DON'T BE MISLED

By giving you and our other customers reasons for this immediate action, we hope to have the same support from you that heating contractors have promised. Let no one persuade you that the facts are other than here stated. The delay in converting your present heating system to gas until a more favorable time is the best protection of service to your community.

Is There A Meat Shortage?

Out of Washington the past week-end we've heard some mighty interesting viewpoints on the meat situation. We've heard that the packing industry, the army, hotels and restaurants have hoarded tremendous meat supplies. Some of the boys down in the capital have instructed that the Republican cattle growers out West are sore at OPA and the Democrats are withholding cattle from the market; one group in Washington says there is plenty of meat on the hoof, and another will tell you there is a real shortage of cattle.

At any rate, the stores in metropolitan cities have been experiencing difficulties in handling the crowds when there seemed to be only a "smell" of beef. In Plymouth last Saturday morning there was almost a stampede

when one butcher had a small supply of beef to sell. So far as the average citizen is concerned, there is a meat shortage.

Remember a few months ago when the world was STARVING? We shipped wheat to all Europe, we ate black bread; our bakeries closed down, and we stood in line for a loaf of bread, or if the baker was a friend, he'd save one for us. That, dear reader, wasn't last year, either.

Now, if we have a meat shortage, why can't Argentine ship us some? That's what some of our diplomats have asked, but an act of Congress forbids the importation of fresh or frozen meat into this country from Argentine, for fear it might introduce dangerous foot and mouth diseases. Even if there was no law against importation, we'd stand a small

GAS COMPANY RESTRICTS FUEL CHANGES

A request to the public that there be no more changing to gas heat from other fuels, this season, was made today in a statement issued by Neil McCaron, local manager, The Ohio Fuel Gas Co.

"The unprecedented requests for changing to gas heat threaten to tax our transmission and distribution systems beyond the limits of good service," Mr. McCaron said. "This comes at a time when it is impossible to secure pipe, fittings, and compressors necessary to handle the overwhelming demand."

"Those who have been trying to buy an automobile, scrap chips, white shirts, or other scarce items will understand our position. We are trying to spend some 25 million dollars to improve facilities for bringing gas from abundant fields of supply to your premises. Because of the dire shortage of necessary materials and skilled manpower to install them, only a fraction of this 25 million can be spent this year."

Mr. McCaron said that some of the orders for pipe placed last year are not promised until 1947. As examples of major construction projects that are being held

up, he said that a new, large compressor station near the Ohio River, intended to bolster the supply of gas to the Ohio Fuel transmission system, can only be partially completed this winter. A large trunk line running north and south through the heart of Ohio can be no more than 25 percent completed this season.

"Freezing of installation of gas heating equipment, has been taken in past weeks, some as early as last spring, by big companies serving Chicago, Detroit, Milwaukee, and other large areas," Mr. McCaron concluded.

Huron County Home Report

NORWALK — In his report to the Huron Co. commissioners for the year ended, December 31, 1945, John A. Clarke, superintendent of the Huron Co. Home, makes the following statement:

The total of expenditures for the home, including the salaries of the superintendent and matron and the wages of the other employees, was \$21,872.31. The total of receipts was \$6,

\$35.37 which included \$5,263.56 from the sale of farm produce and stock and \$615.98 paid by the inmates or their friends.

At the beginning of 1945 there were 42 inmates—31 males and 11 females; during the year nine males and three females were admitted.

Of these during the year 12 males and two females died, one male and one female ran away, three males and one female were discharged.

On December 31, 1945, there were 23 males and 10 females in the home.

The per capita cost was \$662 annually.

There are 274 acres of land belonging to the home farm of which 230 acres are improved, estimated value \$18,300.

Estimated value of livestock this year is \$4,450; estimated value of buildings \$70,000; machinery, implements, tools, \$3,500.

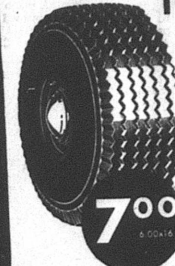

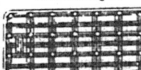

Aid For Aged To Be Increased

COLUMBUS, O. — Frazier Baines, Director of Public Welfare, announced that the next survey during 1946 of the needs of recipients of Aid for Aged with reference to food and clothing has just been completed in the counties of Ohio. This indicates a sharp rise in the costs of these two necessities of life. Based on this survey, the Division for Aged is preparing an increase in food and clothing allowances for all recipients which will be approximately 20 per cent increase on these two items. There will of course be the usual adjustments to be made where there is an unusual increase or decrease in need.

This increase will go to practically all of the 17,550 recipients of Aid for Aged and will amount to an average increase of \$3.00. The Division of Aid for Aged conducts periodic state-wide surveys on the cost of living as required by the Federal Security regulations. As a result of these surveys, the Division adjusts the amount of the awards to meet current costs of living. Last month as a result of the recent special session of the Legislature the maximum amount which any recipient could receive was raised from \$40 to \$50. This meant that any recipient who had reached the maximum of \$40 could now receive amounts which were required to meet his need up to \$50. This applied to approximately 25,000 recipients who had, prior to the August special session of the Legislature, reached the maximum.

The change to meet the increased costs of food and clothing budgets, however, was not a result of the recent legislation, but in compliance with the basic law and regulations that have been in effect since the beginning of the Aid for Aged program. The average award to recipients for Aid for Aged on January 1, 1945 was \$29.61. The average award at the beginning of September 1946 was \$32.62. This is an increase of \$3.01 during that period. The present increase in the food and clothing allowance, plus the increase to recipients who are already receiving the maximum of \$40 will bring the average up to approximately \$38. The August special session of the Legislature also established that an award for medical expense and hospitalization needs up to \$200 may be met from this fund. Director Baines also pointed out that the Division had cut down the period for examination and passing on new claims for that now the average time from application to receipt of the first check is in most cases not in excess of forty-five days.

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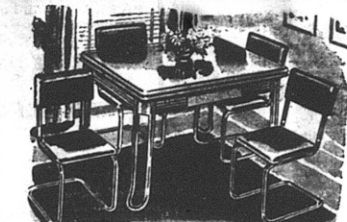

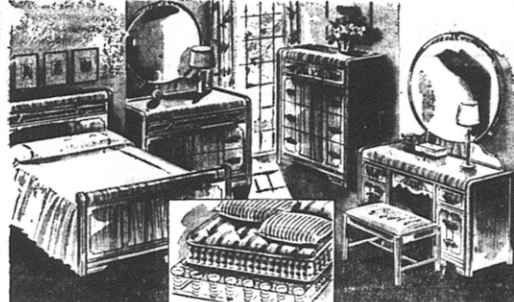

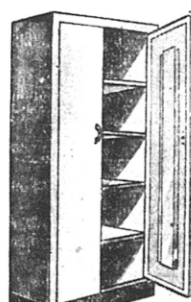
