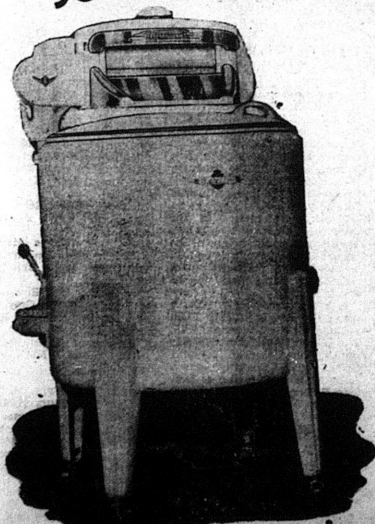

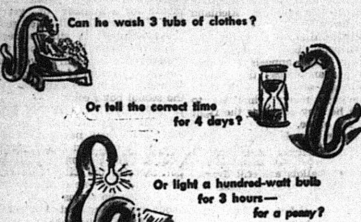

BUREAUCRACY COSTS RELATED TO HOUSING COSTS

There appears to be a much closer relationship between new home costs and the cost of Government than between labor costs and new home prices. For with only two minor exceptions, hourly labor wages in housing have steadily gone up since 1915, and the number of hours worked has steadily gone down, while new housing costs have fluctuated in almost direct ratio with the payroll of the Executive Branch of Government.

Here are the figures at 3-year intervals from 1929 to 1944:

Doings In Congress

This is a non-partisan political release. There are some who say they are not interested in politics. But intelligent people know that everything in America is in politics. The baby is in politics from the time it opens its eyes. This is necessarily so in a Republic or a Democracy.

The election is just around the corner—November 5th. On that day you will shape the future policy of the nation—you are the supreme rulers. To your good judgment all must bow. It is not only your privilege, but your duty to vote. It is also your duty to vote intelligently.

It is the duty of all of us to know who we are voting for and why. To vote blindly is not doing your duty to yourself, your children, your state or nation. If the American way of life is to survive, the right to vote must be exercised, and exercised intelligently. We may not always vote right, but we must attempt to do so. We are not perfect—we all make mistakes. But that is no reason why we should not try to approach perfection. If we do not exercise our right to vote—if we do not exercise

our power to think—we will soon lose both the right to govern ourselves, and the power to think straight. We must not neglect our duty. We must not permit ourselves to be misled by false and dishonest propaganda.

There are always office seekers who try to twist the facts—who would sell their nation short in order to win. Therefore, it is necessary to think straight, and do our duty before an election day. I realize how hard it is to get the actual facts. I could agree on facts, ninety percent of us would agree. The remedy, it is because of distorted facts these days that we differ. This is as true on international issues as on national issues. Just now all nations are suffering from the same disease—concealment of the truth and distortion of facts.

I am not telling you how to vote. That is your business. I am, however, asking you to prepare yourself to vote intelligently. I am also warning you that if you do not exercise your privilege to govern yourself, then someone else will do it for you.

We have traveled a long way toward dictatorship. A majority of the Members of Congress of both parties agree with me on that score.

If you do your own thinking, you will not have much difficulty in separating the wheat from the chaff, but if you blindly follow false prophets with foreign ideologies, then there are dark days ahead. The question is not whether you have had enough of regimentation and bureaucracy, but how to get rid of it. This is not a partisan, but an American issue.

WHERE ARE THE DEAD?

PART II

by DALTON F. McDOUGAL

According to first Thess. 5:23 it takes three things to make man: 1. It takes the spirit, soul and body to make man a conscious intelligent personality; but not one of the three is the man by himself. The body is the flesh, the bones, the organs that makes the physical man. The spirit is the breath of life which he has from God, by which he lives. The soul is this particular instance is the intelligence of the individual, and his moral nature. The idea that the soul is a sort of invisible, immaterial spirit, or ego, which is capable of a conscious existence apart from the body, and that when a person dies the soul goes to heaven or hell according to the life the individual has lived, is entirely without foundation in the Scripture.

Of what union was the soul the result? "And the Lord God formed man of the dust of the ground, and breathed into his nostrils the breath of life; and man became a living soul." Gen. 2:7. The soul did not exist before the body was formed, neither was the soul added to the body, but it resulted from a union of the breath of life with the body. Since the union of the breath of life with the body made the man a living soul, when that breath is taken away at death, it is bound to leave him a dead soul till the resurrection.

What happens when a person dies? The Bible says "Then shall the dust return to the earth as it was: and the spirit shall return unto God who gave it." Eccl. 12:7. The spirit that returns to God when a man dies is not some entity that is capable of a conscious existence apart from the body. In James 2:26 according to the Marginal reading, the spirit is defined to be the breath of life. Also see the book of Job 31:3.

The use of the word "return" in Eccl. 12:7 indicates that the spirit here spoken of is something that had previously come from God to man. Gen 2:7 makes it very plain that this spirit which came from God to man, which made man a living soul, was the breath of life. See also Job 33:4.

In other words, death is just the opposite of the beginning of life. In creation God took dust and formed man. He gave him the breath of life, which made him a living soul. At death this spirit, or breath of life, which man has from the father is taken away and goes back to God, and the body turns to dust again. (Ps. 104:29; Job. 34: 14, 15.)

This spirit will be given back to man again at the resurrection. (Eze. 37:6 Luke 8:53-55). The righteous know that, when their time comes to die, they can safely commit their spirit, or life to God (Luke 23:46; Acts 7:59) and that it will be given back to them at the resurrection day (Col. 3:3, 3). Part three will be—Where does a person go when he dies?
